## 269 Eagles to Attend City Music Festival

Omaha's annual All-City Music Festival will be held in the civic auditorium on January 16-18, at 8 p.m. Over 269 Central Students will be participating with other Omaha public high school students.

The purpose of the Music Festival is to draw students from the whole city into one activity on an educational and non-competitive basis. It also gives students the chance to perform work which is above their usual routine.

Mr. Robert Harrison, Instrumental Music Director at Central is chairman of the festival orchestra committee. He is preparing the following numbers which are to be played at the festival. Dr. Thor Johnson, from Northwestern University is the guest conductor. The All-City orchestra will play "Music for the Royal Fireworks" by Handel-Johnson, "Psalm and Fugue" by Hovhanness, and "Can Can" from "Gaité Parisienne" by Offenbach.

## Debaters Capture Girls' Mo. Valley

Despite a sudden substitution in the final round, Central's debaters captured first place in the Girls' Missouri Valley Invitational Debate Tournament. The tournament was hosted by Thomas Jefferson High School in Council Bluffs on Thursday and Friday, December 5-6.

Central was represented by a four-girl squad consisting of Bev Jafek, Gerry Schneiderwind, Ellen Berman, and Netta Kripke. Towards the end of the tournament, Carlotta Trumbull substituted for Netta, who became ill.

Bev and Gerry were undefeated in their five rounds of debate; and Ellen, Netta, and Carlotta compiled a 4-1 record. Thus, the Central record was 9-1—sufficient to win the tournament and to carry away the first-place trophy.

## Nat'l English Council Selects John Zysman

Thursday, December 5, marked the announcement of senior John Zysman as winner of the annual National Council of English Teachers Contest.

Each school is permitted to enter one student for every five hundred enrolled. John, one of four entrants from this school, was the only Central winner.

The test was a comprehensive four-part exam designed to fully evaluate a student's ability in English. The objective portion consisted of both reading and grammar exams. This was followed by the essay test. Topic for this year's contestants was "Tell how three authors of different literary periods developed the concept of man's search for values."

For the final evaluation, each student was required to submit a piece of his own writing. This second essay could encompass any topic the student choose, and it was to be completed at the contestant's own speed. Style of writing was not limited to either poetry or prose; John's sample was a combination of both.

Following the completion of the exam, each school then submitted recommendations for its entrants.



## Perry Takes New Job As Math Co-ordinator

Following additions to the Omaha School Board committees last month, Mr. Duane M. Perry, Central High mathematics instructor, was announced as the new Coordinator of Mathematics. When Mr. Perry takes over his new job at semester's end, he will terminate a twenty-one year teaching profession at Central.

Aside from his two-year service in the U.S. Navy, Mr. Perry has taught continuously at Central since he joined the faculty in the fall of 1940. He was promoted to head of the mathematics department in 1954 and has continued in that capacity for the past ten years.

His teaching duties have included all math courses offered at Central, but during the past few years he has limited him-

self to geometry, algebra, and senior mathematics. He has discontinued instruction in both general and advanced placement courses.

In his new position as Mathematics Coordinator, Mr. Perry will be concerned with a unified curriculum starting in kindergarten and continuing through twelfth grade. His responsibilities will be to evaluate and adjust mathematics course offerings, rather than to analyze the methods of teaching.

In addition to turning out many of the finest young mathematicians in the state, Mr. Perry has coached the highly successful math team. His efforts have paid off with an unprecedented achievement: the math team has annually captured, with the exception of one year, the Nebraska State Mathematics Championship, since the program's inauguration in 1956. This was due entirely to Mr. Perry's coaching, and his absence next semester will prove a great disappointment to math team members as well as to his many other students.

## Creative Writing Class To Number Sixteen

Members of next semester's Creative Writing class have been announced by teacher Josephine Frisbie. The new class will consist of 16 persons. "The aim of the Creative Writing class will be to help students learn to say what they want to say," stated Miss Frisbie.

Work in the class will be the writing of 15 manuscripts during the semester, learning of vocabulary, since words are the tools of the writing trade, and reviewing of the latest books, movies, and television shows.

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

Her favorite thing in America, according to Yoko Ikeo, the American Field Service exchange student to Central from Japan, is the snow. In Japan, she explained, there is not the cold weather or the heavy snow that she has found in Nebraska.

Yoko, who is a senior at Central, lives in Osaka, Japan. This is her first visit to this country. While in Omaha, she is living with Mr. and Mrs. Howard Drew. Her "sister" in America is Wendy Drew.

Her course of study includes American history, English, advanced placement algebra, speech, and girls glee. Some of the courses at Central, she said, are harder than those in Japan, while others are not. Her most difficult subject is American history.

At Central, Yoko is a member of the student council, Y-Teens, and the pep club. Among her hobbies, she enjoys playing the piano and the ukelele. She also enjoys singing and one of her favorite subjects is girls glee.

Yoko observes many differences between American schools and Japanese schools. For example, although the schools have cafeterias, all of the students at her school in Japan bring their own lunches. She considers it much more difficult to find her way around Central. In Japan, the school year begins in April and runs through March.

When Yoko returns to Japan, she will have one more year of high school to complete. After graduation, she plans to attend the International Christian University in Tokyo. The university has students of many nationalities, and the lectures are given in English. She hopes that her study in the United States will help her on her entrance examinations and in her work at the university.

Yoko will leave Omaha in June. Before returning to Japan, she will take a tour of the United States sponsored by the American Field Service.

Saturday the 14th proved to east no better fate for basketballers than did Friday the 13th. The Eagles really looked like they were going to outlast the Packer outfit but then the bottom fell out of the Eagle attack.

The first quarter was a seesaw affair with South gaining the advantage 17-14 at the buzzer, but the second quarter proved quite the contrary. The Eagles broke loose for 24 points to 16 for South. With a five-point bulge at the half Eagle rooters sensed victory.

The third quarter was much the same as the first quarter with South outscoring the Purple and White 18-16. At this time, however, Central still held a three-point lead. The fourth quarter was the casket sealer. With leads as big as 10 points in the middle quarters, the Eagles were pressed into a 58-53 tie with 4:14 left in the game. A dry spell then followed and South gained 11 more points to a mere five for the Varsity.

One of the big factors in the game was that Art Allen, Central's top scorer, and Woody Dillman, big man under the boards for the Eagles, both fouled out. Without these two toughies under the boards the Eagles couldn't keep up their terrific pace.



## State Champs Clip Eagles

Dennis Tibbits and Ken Glasser led the swimming team to three state records, but the Eagles were downed 63-32 in a dual meet held at Norris Junior High Friday, December 13.

Tibbits broke the oldest state record when he swam the 100-yard butterfly in 00:57.4, three-tenths of a second under the record posted by Bill Fowles of Lincoln High in 1960. Ken Glasser also stroked his way to a new state record. Glasser, however, broke his own record in the individual medley one-half of a second in the impressive time of 2:11.2. Central's 200-medley relay team clipped two seconds of the state record. The team of Larry Charles, backstroke; Ken Glasser, breaststroke; Dennis Tibbits, butterfly; and LeRoy Martinson, freestyle, was challenged until Tibbits leg of the relay. Tibbits gained a full body length of his Southeast foe and Martinson held that lead to the finish. This was the only lead Central held in the meet which was 8-0 after

the race. Before the diving, the half way point, Central trailed only 16-14, but S. E. divers swept the event to give them a commanding lead.
