




 Jack Adrian (10) said masking and social distancing shouldn't be something that political figures argue. "Omaha was one of the LAST cities to make mandate," Adrian said.

The 1918 yearbook was a paper cover, bounded with a string. It was filled with a large regimental staff and lots of chapters within. The football team held the title of Missouri Valley Champions. They had uniforms consisting of sweaters and knee high socks. Finally, Roadshow was an important aspect

that had various kinds of performances.







1905

1905 was one of the oldest yearbooks in Central's possession. There was a thin paper cover and thick inside pages. There were different clubs such as The Cadet Officers Club and the Demosthenian Debating Society. One of the sports Central had was the girls and boys basketball teams. The uniforms were striped, included knee-high socks and tank top jerseys. The 1905 yearbook also had ads that related to the times such as Expert Watch Makers and a Dime Pantalorium Pressing Co.







1930

The 1930 yearbook was also paperback but featured artwork on colored paper for dividers. One of the most interesting things about this yearbook was the different clubs that were offered. Some of them include the Stamp Club, Dog Fanciers, Central Colleens and Mathematics Society.

1967 was a hardcover yearbook that featured lots of hand painted and watercolor artwork of trees. One of the main spreads was Road Show. To advertise they had a large sign hanging with 300 Central students and 23 acts participating. There was dancing, singing and instrumental music.







In 1983, one of the things featured was senior head shots in color. Most of the others were black and white except for a select few. The yearbook also featured a varsity cheer team that preformed stunts such as pyramids and jumps. There were 11 members on the team and they preformed at pep rallies, games and even in Central's hall.

The O-Book of 1970 featured a senior class that was described as a "melting pot." It also had a list of all the activities each student participated in. There was also a men's gymnastics team that competed, winning 6th place in the metro.







1994

In 1994, sports became an important aspect of student life. There were sports such as boys volleyball and womens gymnastics, which Central does not have today. There was also a womens softball team that made it to state and a football team that had a great season record. One of the other student life aspects was the cars the students drove. The spread featured all the best cars around school and fit the time they were in.



New Exhibits at the Henry Doorly Zoo By Claire Linnell






And We're Live
