
Leo Chaiken teaches ballet dancing, and has put Theodore Kosloff out of business, while Audrey Groves is running a pawnshop in Korea,


In swimming five of the members of the team: Gallup, Peterson, Larkin, Smith, and Enger were expert participants.

The National Honor Society, 1925

THE National Honor Society, founded in 1920 largely through the efforts of Principal J. G. Masters, was organized for the purpose of encouraging and recognizing scholarship, leadership, service, initiative, and character among high school students. The members are chosen annually from the Senior Class by a faculty committee of which the Principal is chairman. The record of each candidate is carefully investigated before he is elected.

Only Seniors who stand in the upper fourth of the class in scholarship are eligible for membership, but not more than fifteen per cent of the class may be elected. In addition, each member must excel in the other requirements of character, service to the school, initiative, and leadership in some of the numerous activities such as debate, athletics, drill, Register work, or in one of the many student organizations.

The Gamma Chapter

THE Junior Honor Society was founded in 1923 by Principal J. G. 
The Band


A new man, Coach F. Y. Knapple, came to us from Sutton high school as basketball and baseball coach. His value has been proved by the fine work of the teams under his supervision.





Raymond Lepicier, tackle. An All-State man, a deadly tackler, a hard worker and an all around good fellow.


Fred Oliver, tackle. Last year he played at center, this year "Papa" shifted him to tackle. In both places "Fritz" made good.





For the first time in the history of track at Central, a team of eight men were taken to the Drake relays where they made a splendid showing. A team composed of Doty, Muxen, Solomon, and Jones placed second in the 440 and 880-yard relay. The mile relay team composed of Marrow, Reed, Nestor, and Hamilton



This was the first state record broken by a Central athlete since 1915.

For the third consecutive time the Purple speedsters ran true to form at the Nebraska Medical relays, taking first in the mile and half-mile relays and second in the 440-yard relay. Acting Captain Wally Marrow took the high hurdles and placed in the high jump. Doty took first in the broad jump, with Muxen a close second. Jim Hamilton left everyone behind in the 440-yard dash, while Bill Egan tied for second in the pole vault.

The first out-state game Central won from Ashland by the score of 5 to 4. Glade pitched this game while Bleicher featured with the stick. He made the first homerun of the season.



Swimming 1925

BY conquering Tech, Lincoln, South, and Creighton during the past season, Central's championship tanksters now have a perfect record for the last two years. During this time they have won seven meets and lost none.

In the state meet, Central presented a well-balanced team and amassed 41 points. Lincoln was second with 25 points, and Technical third with 18 points. Central won the diving, 50-yard free-style, 100-yard breast-stroke, and the 100-yard backstroke. A new state record was set in every event Central won. New records were also made in the plunge for distance, the relay, and the 100-yard free-style.

Later in the year, Central easily defeated South in a dual meet by a score of 55 to 13. In this meet, our team won seven out of a possible eight first places. The only new record was in the 100-yard breast-stroke.

The city meet, held March 19, is not officially recorded because one of the Tech swimmers entered illegally. On April 10, Lincoln forfeited a dual meet to the Purple splashers.

Student Association

N September 23 the Student Association elected officers for the coming year. The voters were all students who had bought Student Association tickets. These tickets, of which about 1,350 were sold at three dollars apiece, besides allowing the holder to vote for Student Association officers, admit him to all home athletic contests and to all other contests in which Central is a participant. This plan of the association was started in 1912 to provide a sure means of paying expenses and to raise the spirit of the school by uniting the student body into an efficient organization.

There have been three mass meetings held at the Rialto Theatre under the supervision of the Association. The first was held to create school spirit preceding the Tech-Central football game. This was held on Color day and ended up in a parade back to the school. The next was on Lincoln's birthday and was under the direction of the military organization of the school. The last was held to announce the names of Seniors elected to the National Honor Society.

The Association also held four old-time mass meetings in the auditorium. One of these was sponsored by the January Senior class to boost their class presentation of John G. Neihardt. Another was held to boost Going-to-College. There were two to boost Debate, one for the reception of the Reed Cup which Central High won, and which was shared by track and the State Scholastic contest held at Lincoln, and the awarding of the medals won there.

Because it was impossible to accommodate every one in Central's auditorium mass meetings, a new plan of holding four assemblies was worked out. One is held in 215 with Lloyd Marquis in charge, one in 235 with David Waterman in charge, another in 435 with Wilma McFarland at the head, and one in the auditorium with Beth Cole presiding. Seven successful assemblies have been held under this plan. The first three assemblies were held to boost football, one assembly before the Sioux City game, one before the Lincoln game, and one song assembly preceding the Central-Tech game. At the opening of the basketball season one was held for this sport. The other three assemblies were held to boost other school activities. The Junior Honor Society held one to create interest in the Honor Societies, and one was held for debate before the Tech-Central contest. The last was a health assembly to commemorate National Health Week. A play, written by Mrs. J. G. Masters, was given at this assembly.






THE TITIANS, one of Central's newest organizations, and perhaps also one of the most unusual, is a society to which none but auburn or red-haired girls are eligible.








The Neihardt Performance



The Senior Play





Much has been accomplished under the direction of Miss Mary Angood. It is for the benefit, not only of the pupils, but of the school as a whole.



The Project Room

A GREAT pageant of the progress of the world unfolds itself in a wondrous manner when one steps into Central's Project Room. Here is exhibited the work of hundreds of students who from their study of English, history, and many other subjects, have created many interesting models from a radio set to a catapult such as Caesar used so long ago.

The work in the Project Room, which has been conducted by Miss Geneive Clarke for the past eight years, has, during the last semester been organized on a supervisory basis, and has been given a place in the curriculum. Students may enroll in room 130 during the day to read and to work on the various group projects.

This group work could be divided into four general classes, namely, historical tableaux, methods of warfare, progress of the Industrial Revolution, and life in the Middle Ages. All representations are historically correct, and the proportions exact. All these reproductions are made by the students voluntarily. The classes of sixteen teachers were represented by additions to the Project Room this year.

Among the outstanding projects made this year, is the entire construction of an English Manor, assembled by a group of ten students. The model shows division of the fields, construction of the buildings, apportionment of the flocks, and every detail is carried out explicitly. A movable tower of Charlemagne's period occupies a prominent position as does an induction coil of the late eighteenth century.


Somewhat more than a year ago, an arrangement of scenes from "Ivanhoe" was presented by members of freshmen English classes, while again this year a medieval playlet, "Life in a Castle," and scenes from "The Lady of the Lake," were given.

A student committee composed of Elizabeth Waldo '26, Mildred Goosman '28, Lillian Field '27, Dorothy Cooley '25, and Caroline Sachs '28, held an open house in the Project Room every Wednesday and Friday.

The project and problem method of education is fast becoming popular and has perhaps reached the highest point at Central. The collection has been adjudged by national school authorities as the best in the United States.

A S THE culmination of the most successful debate season in its history, Central high school achieved the long-coveted honor of state championship through a series of eight elimination contests.

By defeating South, Blair, and Technical by unanimous decisions, and by winning a unanimous decision over Plattsmouth through default, Central won the city championship and championship of the east-central district arguing on the state question, "Resolved: That the United States Should Enter the League of Nations."

By virtue of winning the state championship, Central gained the second leg on the W. E. Reed Cup offered last year, and as victors in the district, won the right to compete in the state debate tournament at Lincoln, May 7, 8, and 9.

Entering a three-man team composed of David Fellman, Byron Dunham, and Sam Minkin into the state tournament, Central eliminated Alliance in the first round by a 3 to 0 decision, Lincoln in the second round and Brock in the semi-finals by split decisions; and in the final forensic battle with Superior, a third split ballot gave Central the victory and championship of Nebraska.

Previous to the district debates, Central entered into competition with Technical, Lincoln, South, Thomas Jefferson, and Abraham Lincoln of Council Bluffs in the newly-created Missouri Valley Debating League. Meeting each school in a dual debate, Central won six out of the ten participated in, and tied Thomas Jefferson for second place.

V. E. Chatelain, the debate coach, deserves much of the credit for this year's successful season. Being the man behind the guns, his work is apt to be passed over lightly, but it was only through his unceasing effort, mastery of the strategy of debate, and profound knowledge of the art of argumentation, that a city, district, and state championship were realized.

Credit for the splendid backing received by debate this year from the student body is largely due to the activity of the Faculty Debate Committee, which made possible the mass meetings and general assemblies held during the year, and generally supervised the advertising.

Following the precedent of the previous year, a banquet was held in the cafeteria on the evening of the first debate, an event which gives promise of becoming an annual affair. After winning the state title, a picnic was held to celebrate the victory and to lay the foundations for another banner season next year. Just before the close of the school term, a debate club was organized to co-ordinate and centralize the various elements at Central boosting debate. This organization will commence its activities next fall, and promises to be one of Central's greatest units.

With such a list of achievements, every loyal Centralite can be truly proud of Central high school's record in debate, and should look forward confidently to a duplication of this year's achievements next year.

Henry DeLong was another valuable member of the school team. His ability to handle evidence and actual facts, and his splendid voice endeared him to all lovers of debate at Central.

Harry Wise, though a new man in debate, is becoming a most fiery and impressive speaker and participates in many of the important forensic battles.


Inter-class debates have taken their place in Central as an annual event in which class and school interest reaches a high degree of friendly rivalry and keen competition.


"Voice of Omaha Central"

OCH, the Voice of Omaha Central, was established in 1923 by C. H. Thompson, mechanical drawing and radio instructor, assisted by a group of students from the radio class. The station is of the class A type, operating on a wave length of 258 meters with a power of 50 watts. Since the first inauguration of a regular schedule, in 1924, the Voice of Central has been heard as far as Porto Rico, Cuba, California, Massachusetts, Maine, and British Columbia.

In conjunction with the programs, a remote control line was established between the Rialto theatre and Central. By means of this, Rialto music is broadcast daily except Saturday at 3 p. m. On Saturday night, the leading organists of the city are presented in special recitals. Studio programs are broadcast on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday at 7:30 p. m. Lectures on Americanization, Journalism, Spanish, and Household Arts have been features of the past year's operation.

The staff for the station is under the personal supervision of Mr. Thompson and is composed of the chief announcer, Arnold Cisler; engineer, Bert Badgerow, and Paul Maxwell, assistant operator.




Prominent among its features are the sections devoted to the Activity Points System, College Education, Organizations, Athletics, Awards, and School Songs. Other sides of school life are also presented.


