Commencement Arrangements committee, supervised by Biff Olson and Rosemary Faust, made preparations for the class of '57 June 8 commencement.





Mr. Harvey Saalberg advised the two groups.




Math Club







Bill Baudin of the YMCA coached the aquamen, assisted by faculty advisor, Ed Clark. Practices were held at the YMCA pool.




