Now in his fourteenth year as principal on the eagle campus, J. Arthur Nelson has served as president of the Nebraska State Education Association. Mr. Nelson received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Midland College and his Master's Degree from the University of Nebraska. He did graduate work at the University of Iowa. After teaching debate and speech at Fremont High School, he became head of the Language Arts Department at Benson High School. Having served as principal of Monroe School and as assistant principal of North High School, Mr. Nelson became chief administrator on the hilltop in 1944.

Assistant Principal J. Jay Planteen, a native Omahan and a graduate of Omaha University, received his Master's Degree from and did further graduate work at the University of Nebraska. From 1935 to 1937 Mr. Planteen taught science, English and social studies at Plainview Nebraska Junior High School. After serving at West Point High School for three years as an instructor in debate, speech, journalism and English, he transferred to Beatrice High School where he became principal in 1949. J. Jay Planteen entered Central as assistant principal in 1954.







Publicity for the play included a display of posters warning about the approach of "Tarnese."





Familiar songs heard in the opera were "Brigadoon," "I'll go Home With Bonnie


Jean", "Waiting for my Dearie," "Almost Like Being in Love" and "Heather on the Hill".

Several individual acts, including tap dancers, vocalists and pantomimists added variety to the performance.





This year's debate squad, one of the largest in Central history, was coached by Mr. Don Johnson.

Debaters started the season at the Tech Beginners' Tournament in November. The teams of John McLoughlin-Dale Pearson and Bette Jafek-Renee Rimmerman were undefeated, while the former received a trophy for high points.

Justin Lewis was named "Outstanding Speaker of the Senate" at the Student Congress, held at Cathedral High School, November 8.

Sioux City, Iowa, was the scene of Cen-

tral Tournament, where the teams of Sam Bleicher-Dick Kaslow and Ed Sidman-Larry Kohn won 9 out of 10 debates. Repeating the score at the University of Nebraska State Debate Tournament were the teams of Stan Greenfield-Justin Lewis and Ed Sidman-Larry Kohn.

Eagle debaters tied for second place with Hastings in the National Forensic League District Tournament. First place went to Lincoln Southeast. Central's Mary Jean Horn captured second prize in dramatic declamation.

This year's student body and faculty saw 24 speech choir members, under the direction of Mrs. Amy Sutton, perform on the Central Stage.

During the Thanksgiving season, the choir presented "A Nation Prays," written by Bernie DeKoven, at a student assembly.

Dickens's well-known **Christmas Carol**, the story of an old miser named Scrooge, was effectively performed by the speech and a cappella choirs in December.

Road Show featured a speech choir skit entitled "Mrs. Arris Goes to Paris."


Concert Band





RESERVE OFFICERS' TRAINING CORPS

Organized in 1893, the Central Cadet Regiment trains students in leadership, military discipline and respect for authority. During the first year, a battalion of four companies was trained by an officer from Fort Crook, who was assisted the second year by commissioned and non-commissioned cadet officers.

In 1937, the War Department reorganized the cadets into a ROTC regiment. Four years later this regiment became a battalion consisting of four regular companies and one freshman company. The school has since been restored to a regiment with seven regular companies: A,B,C,D,E,F,G and an eighth, band.

In the year 1939, the Cadet Officers' Club was organized to replace the Senior

Cadet Club, which had been in existence since 1895. Also re-organized in 1939 was the Cadet Non-Commissioned Officers' Club.

Central High's Regiment's major activity this year was the military ball, held January 23rd in the Peony Park ballroom. Following an impressive, colorful grand march by the officers and their ladies, 52 senior cadets received promotions. Assistant Principal J. Jay Planteen climaxed the evening with his announcement that Cadet Fred Burbank was to be cadet colonel and was to assume the duties of regimental commander. Nancy Richards was chosen by the senior cadets to serve as honorary colonel. Following the ball, a dinner party for new officers and their ladies was sponsored by the Commissioned Officers' Club.









As soon as the new group was organized, the cadets attended nightly practices at which they became acquainted with many forms of new and more difficult manuels.



convention, open house or other school functions, and performing services to the faculty.


Each monthly meeting is designed to help members learn more about the teaching career. Every member belongs to a committee which organizes and carries out the various activities.


Y-Teen representatives from the six Omaha public high schools meet at regular monthly meetings to discuss their problems and to introduce new ideas.



One of the most interesting meetings of this year was a demonstration on the measurement of radiation. Another program included a discussion by Dr. Harry C. Hender-




son, resident psychiatrist at the University of Nebraska psychiatric ward, on the encephalograph, a graph of the brain's waves.





On September 13, a band of purple and white clad gridders trotted onto the Creighton Stadium turf to begin one of the most satisfying seasons in Central football history. The 6-2 over-all record was not the best ever won by an Eagle ball club; but considering the obstacles which had to be overcome to achieve it, the record was truly outstanding.

Outweighed in almost every position and hindered by a lack of experienced linemen, the gridmen unleashed an attack based on blazing speed and pin-point passing. Roaring past Lincoln High 32-30, they set the pattern for an entire season.

Coupled with the lack of weight and experience was a rash of injuries to key players. This began in the second game, against South High. Charlie Dickerson, a two-year letterman and first string quarterback, and Dan Benjamin, a guard, were sidelined


Under the instruction of Mr. Ed Clark, the varsity mermen had, by all measurements, a successful season.


Other team accomplishments included second place in the Tech High Invitational and a close fourth place in the State Championships.

WRESTLING


For the first time since before World War II, a Central wrestling team has had a losing season. The Eagle matmen won only four of ten dual matches.


In addition to its state meet showing,

VARSITY BASKETBALL


The ball hit the hoop, rolled around and bounced away. The buzzer sounded, thus ending one of the most frustrating campaigns in Central basketball history. The cagers struggled through nine contests decided by three points or less, winning only three of them.

With only one returning starter from the 1958 championship team, Coach Warren Marquiss fashioned a team which gave the opposition a stiff test in each encounter and improved as the season progressed. High points were the two losses to league champion South and a twelve-point victory over North. Low point was an early season loss to Thomas Jefferson.

Johnny Nared led the team in most statistical departments. His 324 points and 19-point per game average were tops. He led in free throws with 72 and in free throw percentage with 63%. Jim Hall was second leading scorer with 138 points.

Nared was named to the Inter-City All Star Team and the WOW and KMTV-KFAB All-Area Teams.

The Eagles were favored to win a berth in the State meet. After defeating Benson in the opening district game, Central's hopes for State were dashed when they dropped a 52-51 decision to Tech High.

The Eagle bid centered on the flashing spikes of the amazing Junior sprint star, Roger Sayers. As a sophomore, he equaled the state 100-yard dash mark and lowered the 220-yard record. Pep Squad members can be recognized by their purple skirts and white sweaters, with the Central eagle emblem on the front. Every girl is required to wear this outfit on "game" days.


