The interest on the \$1,000 is awarded each year to the winners of the examination.

The announcement of winners of the World-Herald and Brandeis awards will be given at the senior graduation, June 9. The World-Herald scholarship is a cash award given on the basis of faculty vote, scholarship, leadership and citizenship. The Brandeis award is a watch given by J. L. Brandeis and Son, on the basis of service to the school, citizenship and scholarship. To both awards is attached a considerable amount of prestige, and the announcements of the winners is awaited with considerable suspense.

The scholarships received by this year's class include those from the National Merit foundation, the Nebraska Regents and from such schools as Dartmouth, Yale, Chicago, Ohio, and Duchesne.

Council Corner 'The Summer Ahead







Richard Beran, one man gymnastics team.


John Zysman, racketman who didn't end up in court; Dick Zevitz, strong man with a serve.

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

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




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
