




Dr. Harry A. Burke

## Math Team

The 1961-62 Central High Math team placed eighth in the state competition held Mar. 8.

Michael Siemon, a junior, placed second in the Nebraska High School Mathematics Contest with a score of 81.00, making him eligible for the National Honor Roll which is comprised of participants with scores of 80.00 or better.

Another team member, Dale Brodkey, with a score of 48.00 placed higher than any Central girl in a long time.

Other high scores were made by Robert Gross 44.50 and Barry Kort 44.25.

The team score was 173.50. This is found by combining the three highest individual scores on each team.

As the Eagle gridmen took the field in the season opener on Sept. 9, it was only the beginning of the gruelling and hard-fought campaign that awaited the Purple and White. In contradiction to the final record, 3-5, the Eagles played inspired ball complimented by bruising defense. However, the Eagles, scoring punch was hindered by an inexperienced backfield and technical errors.

In the weeks that followed, the team played aggressively but just couldn't seem to salvage a victory. Tech, Prep and North managed to slip through the Eagles' defenses just enough to score

once or at most twice. But the offensive attack of the Eagles slumped so severely that these meager scoring efforts were enough to propel the opponents past them.

In the finale against Westside, the Eagles finally began to move offensively; a late spurt by Westside fell short and the gridders ended the season with a victory, 14-12.

Although the final record of the Eagles read only three wins and five losses, this was no indication of the toughness and strength of the ball club in all departments.

Probably the finest interior lineman in the state was none other than Central's big 230 pound tackle, Jim Brown. Apparently the Omaha World-Herald felt the same way because Jim was named to both the All Inter-city and the All-State Football teams of 1961. Central gridders lost a tough game to the Tech High Trojans, 13-0. Discouraging fumbles at key moments haunted the Eagle 11 as they went down in defeat. Central's punishing defense silenced the Trojan speed merchants the first half, but the Eagles' offense couldn't push over a touchdown as a Central back fumbled inside Tech's five yard line. The first half ended scoreless. The Eagles were off







With only one returning starter from the 1961 basketball squad, Coach Warren Marquiss fashioned a team which gave the opposition stiff competition in every contest.


High points of the season were the upset win over Benson and the ranking as number one team in the state of Nebraska.

Inter-city standing. The men wearing the purple laughed at the forecasters as they led the Inter-city and State races for more than a month.





During the 61-62 season Central met and defeated the North High Vikings twice.

In the first contest of the year the Eagles needed a torrid fourth quarter to overcome the Vikes, 61-54. In that final quarter Central outscored its opponents, 23-12. The first period was played rather cautiously but in the second quarter the Eagles opened up only to see a large lead fade by half-time to two points.

Central met the Tech High Trojans twice and were defeated in both outings.

In its first meeting an underdog Central squad took on the highly-touted Trojans and fell, 53-48. Tech was outshot from the floor by the hot Eagles but survived as a result of Central fouling.

The Purple and White had to battle all the way as they came from behind more than once to tie or go ahead of the Techsters.

In the second clash, Central ripped Tech defenses as they stormed to a 17-7 first quarter lead. With Tech's big guns silenced, Central continued to hold the lead at the close of the half, 30-21.

In the second half, however, Fred Hare opened up and Tech pressed the Eagles, 39-38 at the end of the third period. The lead see-sawed back and forth until the game ended with Tech on top, 60-58.

Lincoln Southeast and Council Bluffs Thomas Jefferson, both non-league rivals, were only two of a long line of Eagle victims.

Central rolled over Southeast using its usual tactics of victory, the fast break and the tight defense that brought top state rankings to the Eagle cagers.

The high-flying basketballers continued to harrass the Knights as they kept on widening their margin until they had as much The Vikings went so far as to take the lead in the third period shortly before the Eagle comeback.

In Central's second meeting with North a similar situation prevailed. The Eagles trailed as the slow first quarter came to a close. 
as a 36-14 lead by half-time. From then on the Eagles coasted to victory, 65-38.






Central's real threat was in its fine relay teams, the broad jump, the weights and the short sprints.






The Central High O-Club, founded in 1920 by Frank Knapple, was one of the big promoters of school spirit at Central during the 1961-62 year.




The O-Club and the Girls' Athletic Association joined forces to present the O-Ball at Peony Park in late spring.
