The 1982 Central High School O-Book is the 83rd edition of the book. This year ended a three-year contract with Walsworth Publishing Company. Central's representative was Bryan Smith. The typeface used throughout the book was Avant Garde. Body copy was printed in 10 point and captions in 8 point.

Many changes were instituted in this year's book including a price increase. This year the book sold for $\$ 10$ with an S.A. ticket and $\$ 11$ without. This may have been the cause of decreased sales, with only 948 copies sold. Another alteration was the conversion from the
traditional three column layout to the more conventional mosaic layout.

Two new sections, student life and an ad section, were added to the book. The 1982 O-Book also will include a supplement.

The theme for this yearbook was the product of many long debates. The movie theme promotes the idea of the processes involved in making a movie with you, the students and faculty of Central, as the stars. The theme is not as pronounced as last year's Plain Label, but the symbolic piece of negative follows throughout the book to unify the idea. Several other themes such as

Rainbow, Melting Pot, and Year of the Eagle were discussed.
