The party is over, and it is time to make a choice: college or a job. Move ahead for college; skip three for a job.



Junior Jackie Gargano states, "It's nice but not the ultimate."


Wade Goehring comments, "It feels pretty good: I still have things to look forward to: the completion of renovation and another year of free education."


Mr. LaGreca's job includes scheduling final examinations and fire drills, and running the summer school program.





Coach Bass stated, "By the time these guys become seniors, it is possible that they could become State champs."










Volleyball players successful


Runners have rebuilding season


The season was very definitely a winning one, yet it was a very disappointing one. The girls' season record was 9-0, but they were upset in their district meet.

Thus, next year's team should be very experienced, but still very young.






































Golf team improves




"This year we had a lot of inexperience. We only had two seniors: Andra Jones and Busy Schenken. The problem."







The team was well-rounded, and they wished to keep winning, so they worked extra hard and won.












Power lifters dominate meets

Central's weightlifting team has been gaining recognition recently. Central lifters have been breaking national records and dominating the meets that they have attended.












(Middle right) Centralite lifting at the bench. Central won the Tech Invitational with 46 points. Tech was in second place with 21 points.








The J.V. and Reserve cheerleaders discovered that cheerleading is a lot of fun but an unsuspected amount of work.











ROTC involves over 100 students. Some students feel that JROTC fulfills their military obligation while others will go on to pursue a military career.












