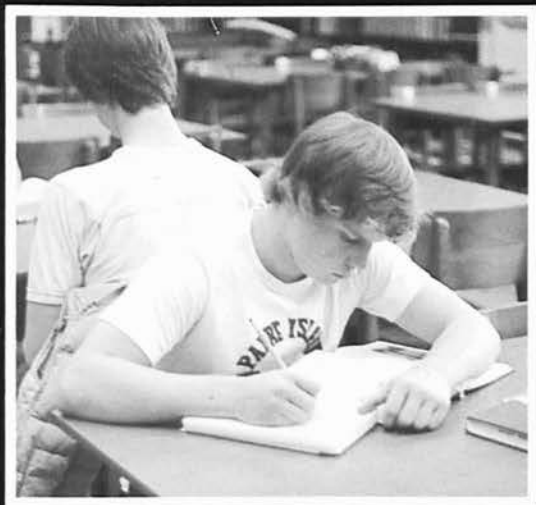

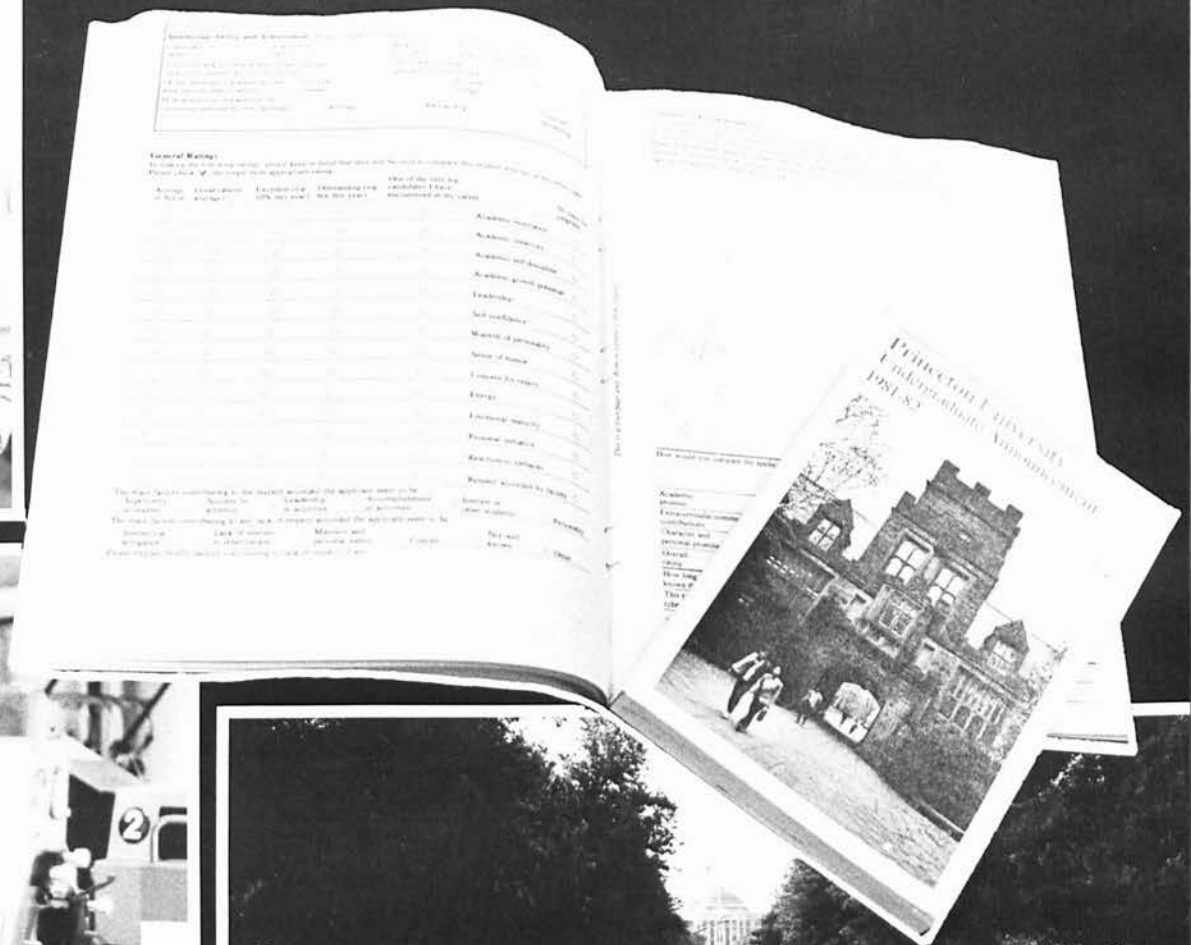
The party is over, and it is time to make a choice: college or a job. Move ahead for college; skip three for a job.

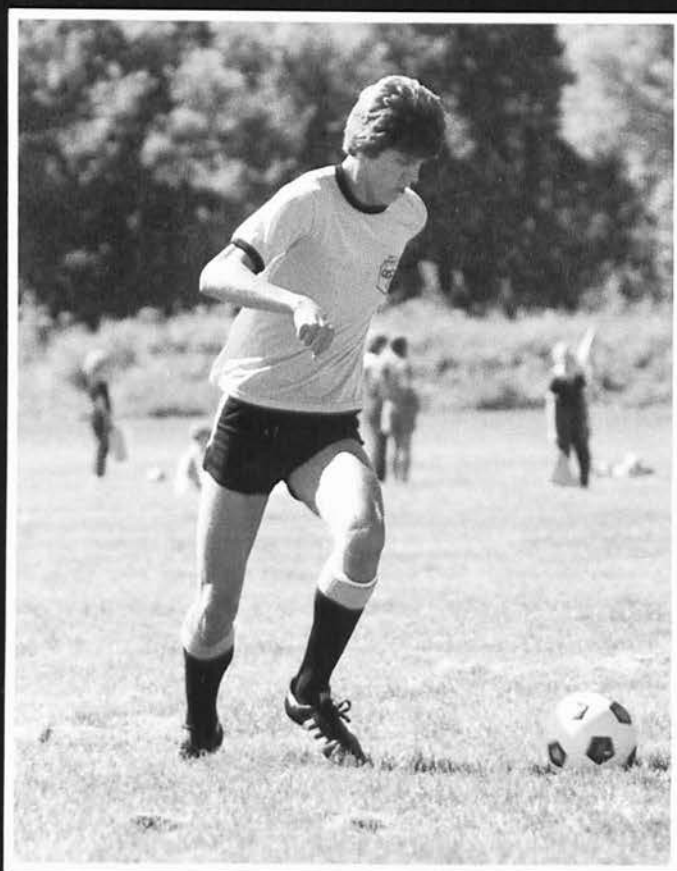

Roxanne Gryder and Pete Tracey both agreed that the comment, "you're just a lowly sophomore," is the worst.

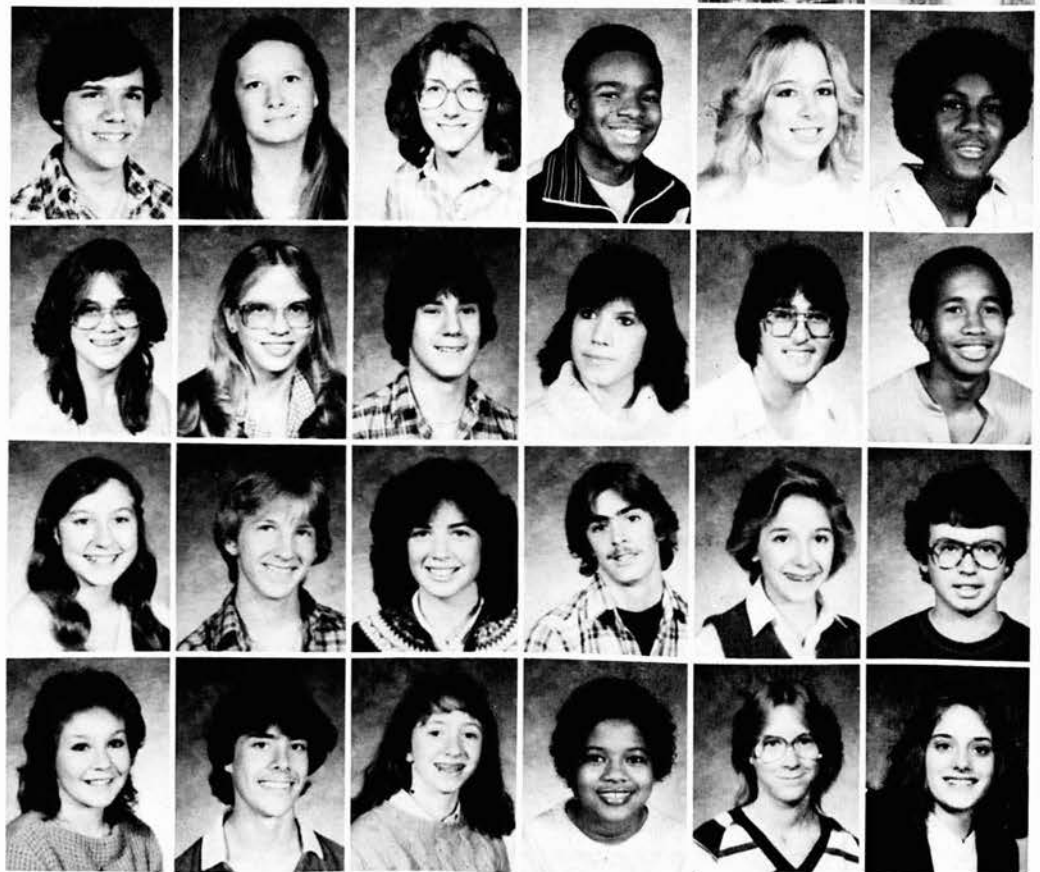
Dan Bye is bothered by comments of the older guys in sports. "They tell me I'm younger, so I'm not good enough."

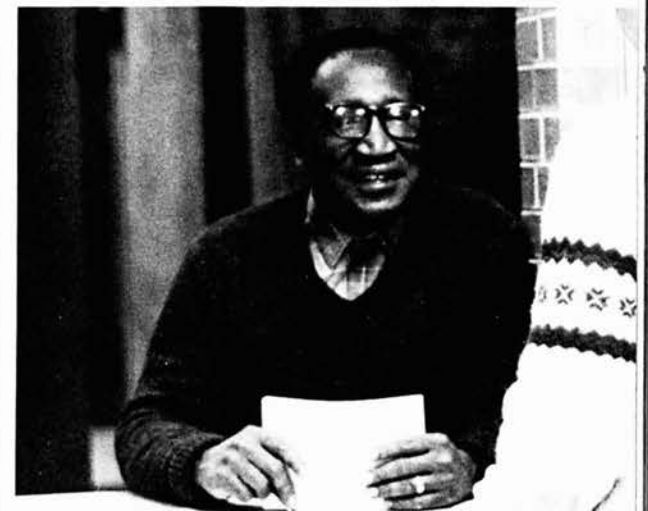
. . . the custodians?

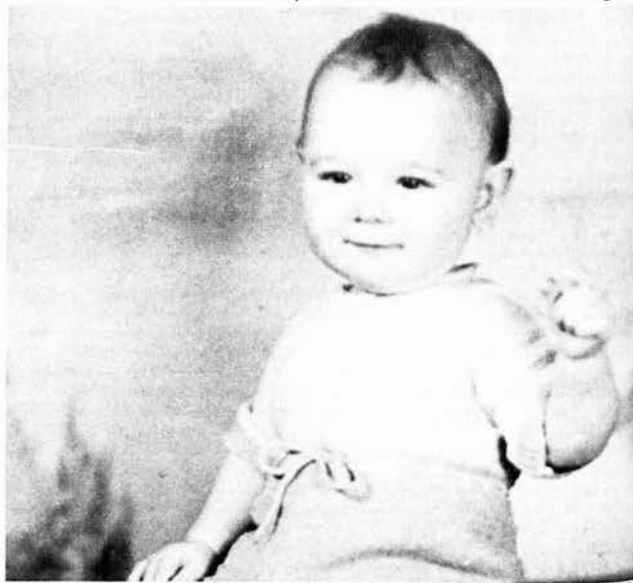
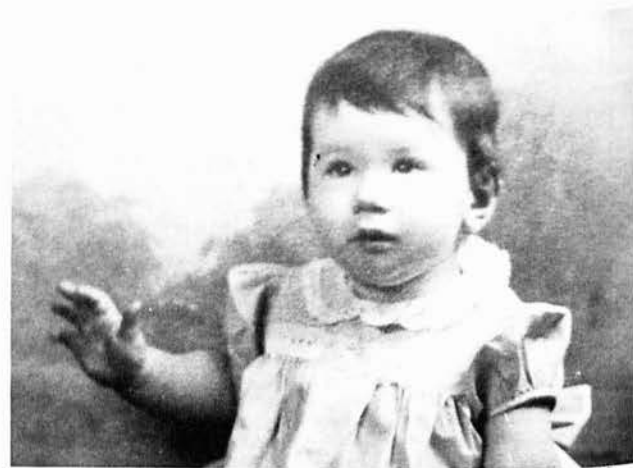

The OMAHA WORLD-HERALD picked up on this and placed Central in the number one spot in the preseason ratings. The only thing that the Eagles had to do now was earn the right to that spot.

The first game of the season was against Lincoln Northeast, which was then rated 10th. The Eagles ran over, around, and through them winning the game 40-7. Now all of Omaha knew that Central was the team to beat. Central won the next two games against Bellevue East (22-0) and Gross (34-14).

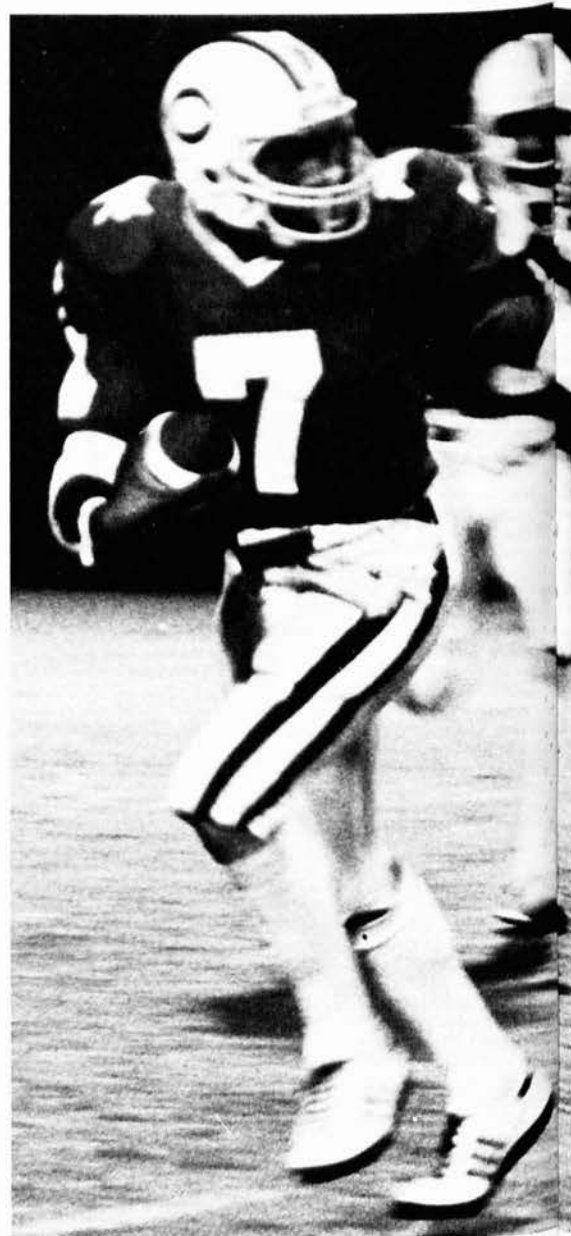
However, Central's bubble was broken the next week by Prep. The Eagles lost the game 10-0. Coach William Reed explained, "A lot negative things began the week before the Prep game. The week ended with Homecoming plans being diminished and one player being hurt in a freak accident. The overall pressure of the game proved too much."

The Eagles bounced back to win their next five games, with an impressive come-from-behind win over Burke, 29-13. The Varsity Eagles ended the season with a very

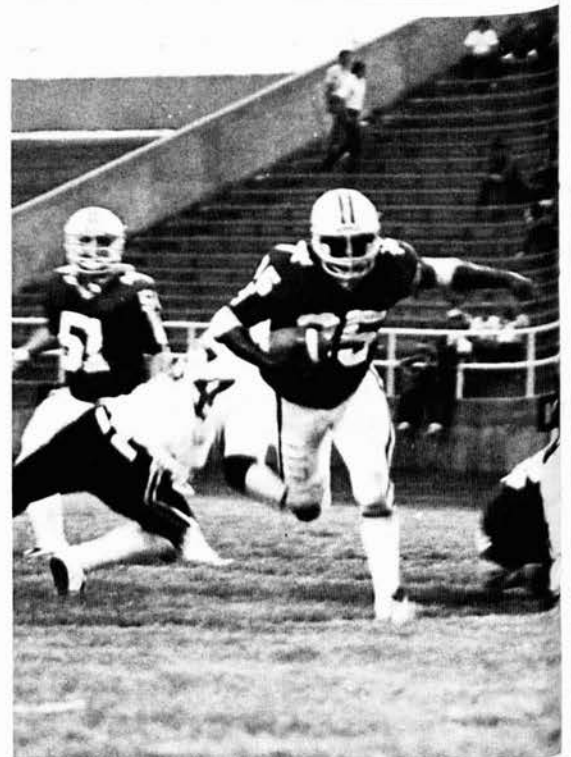

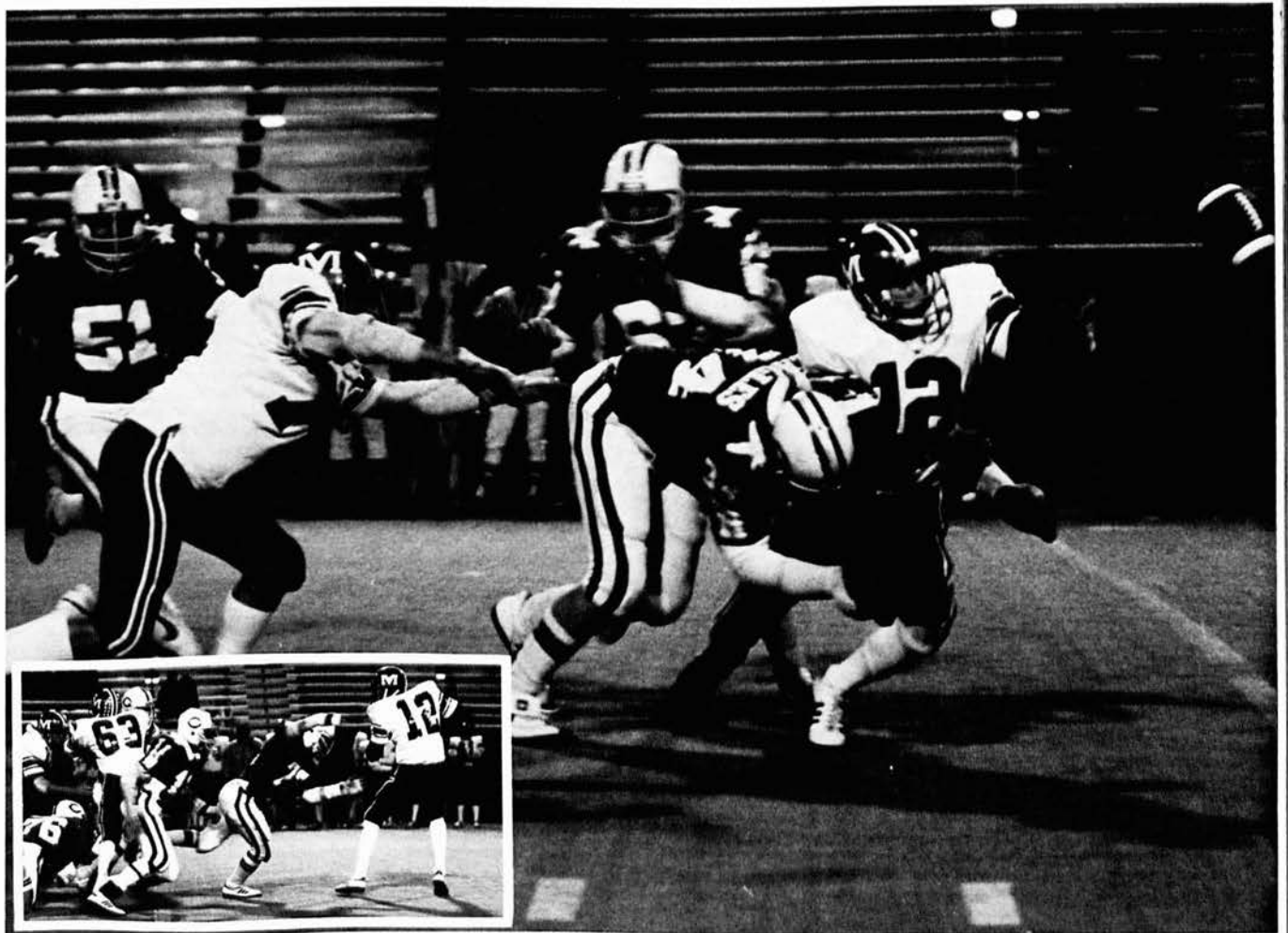

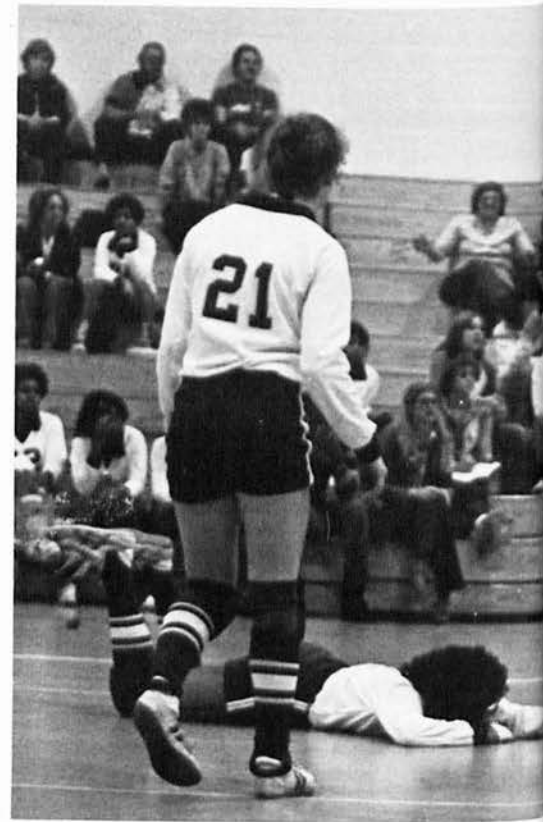

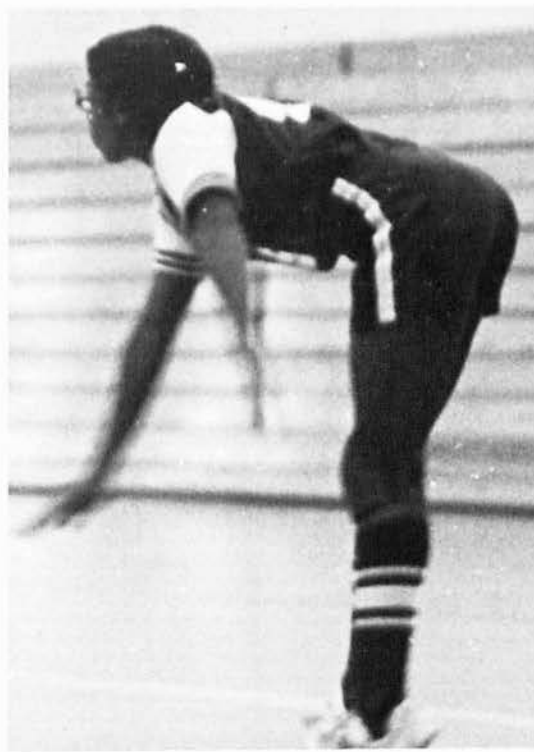
Volleyball players successful

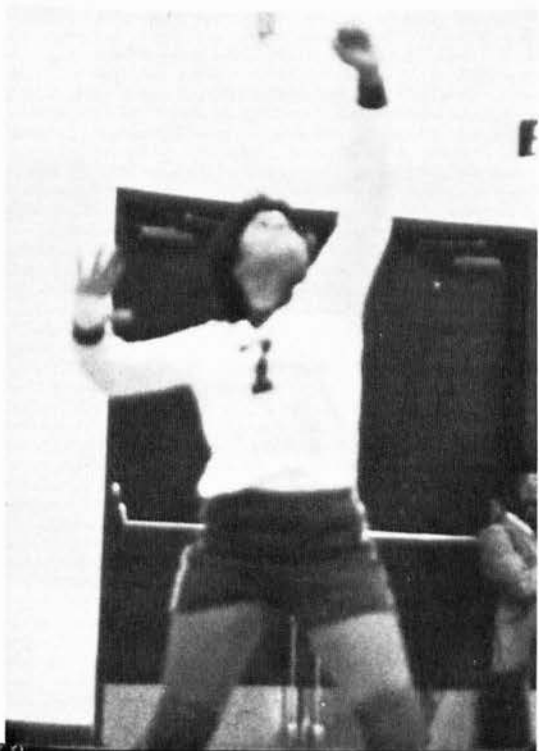

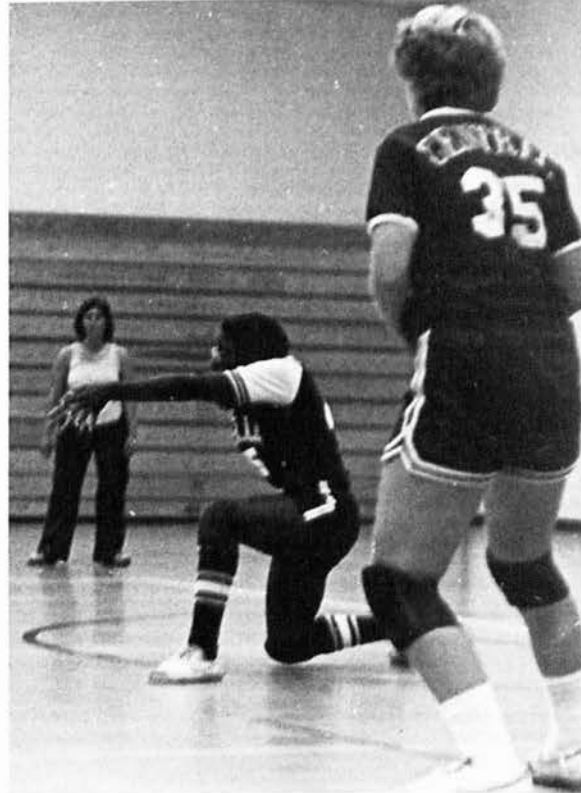

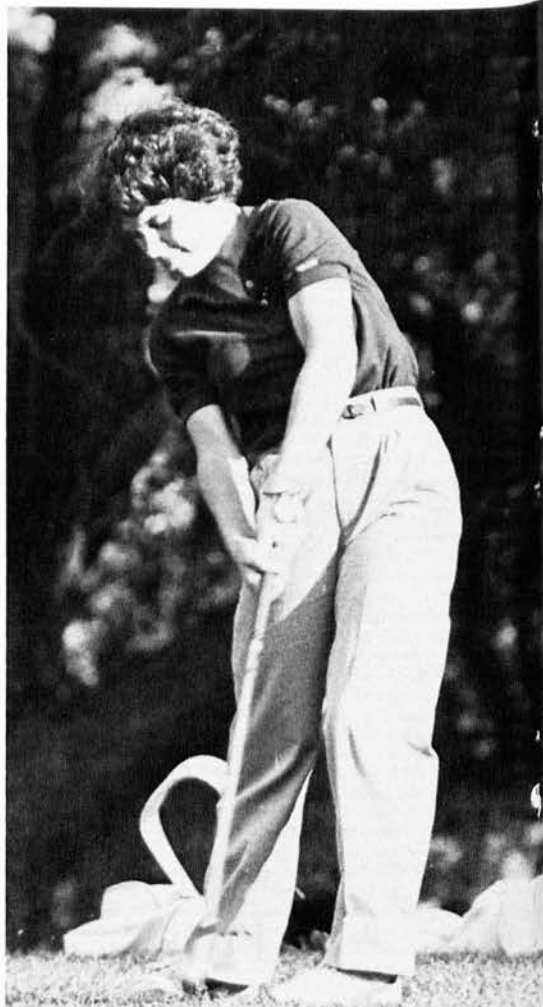

Coach Waterman hopes not to take such a beating in state next year

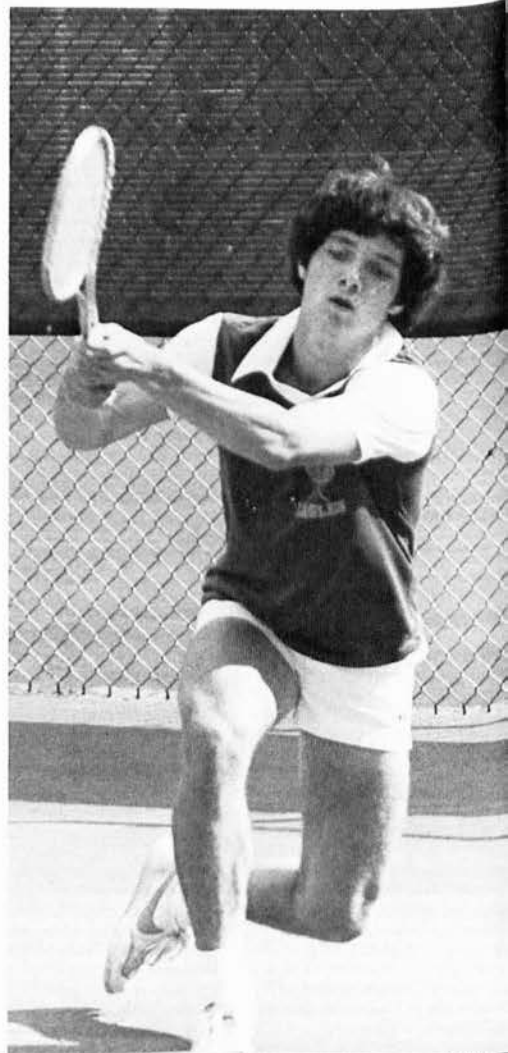
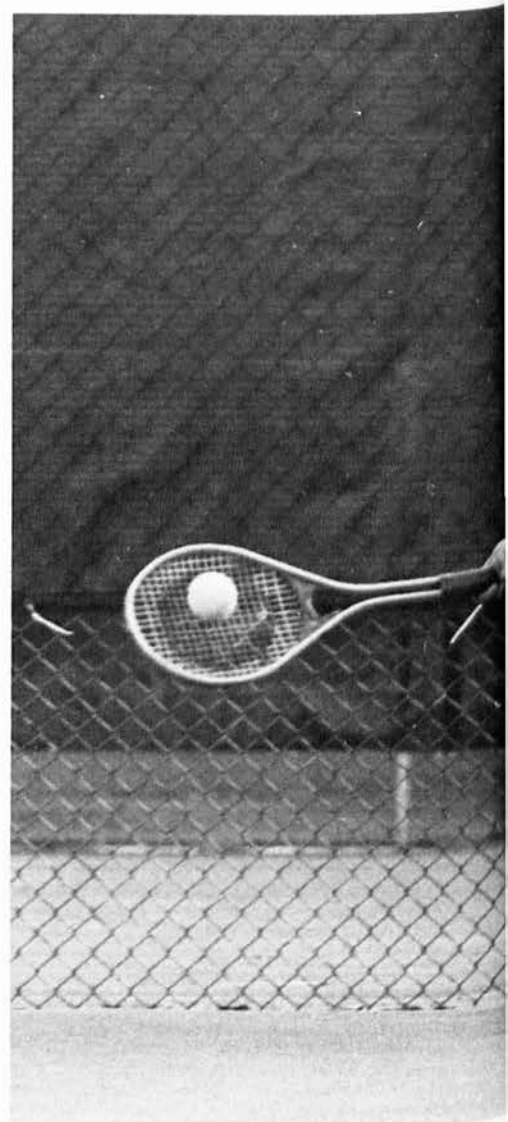

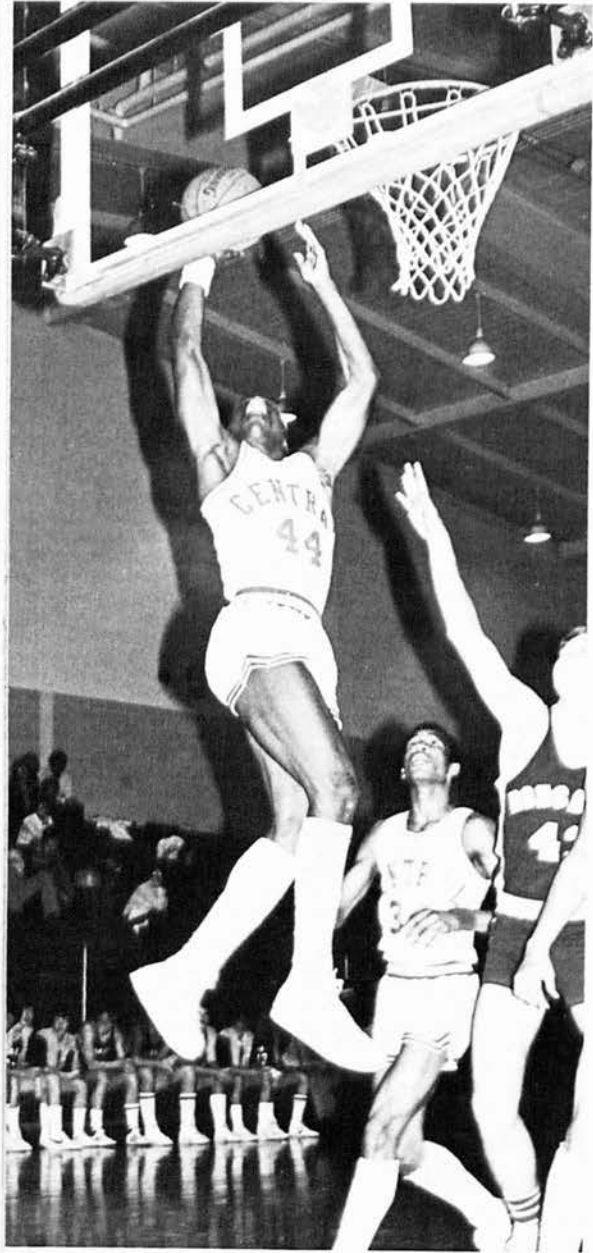
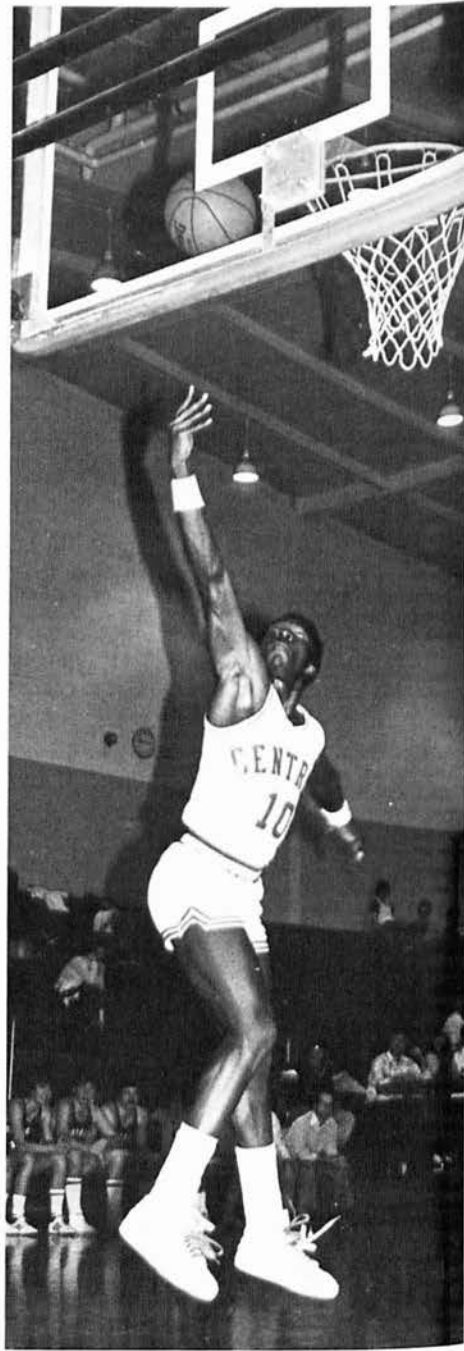

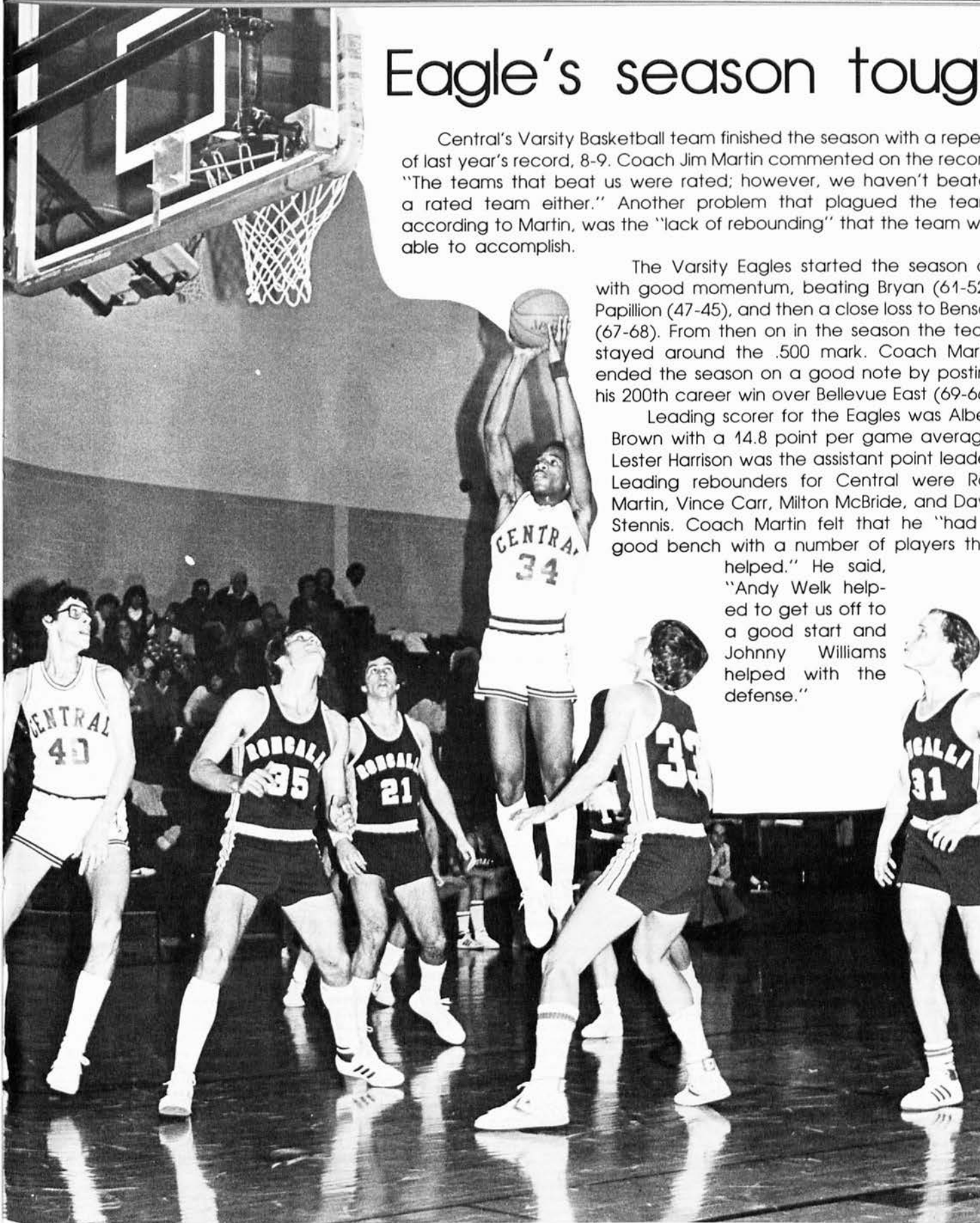

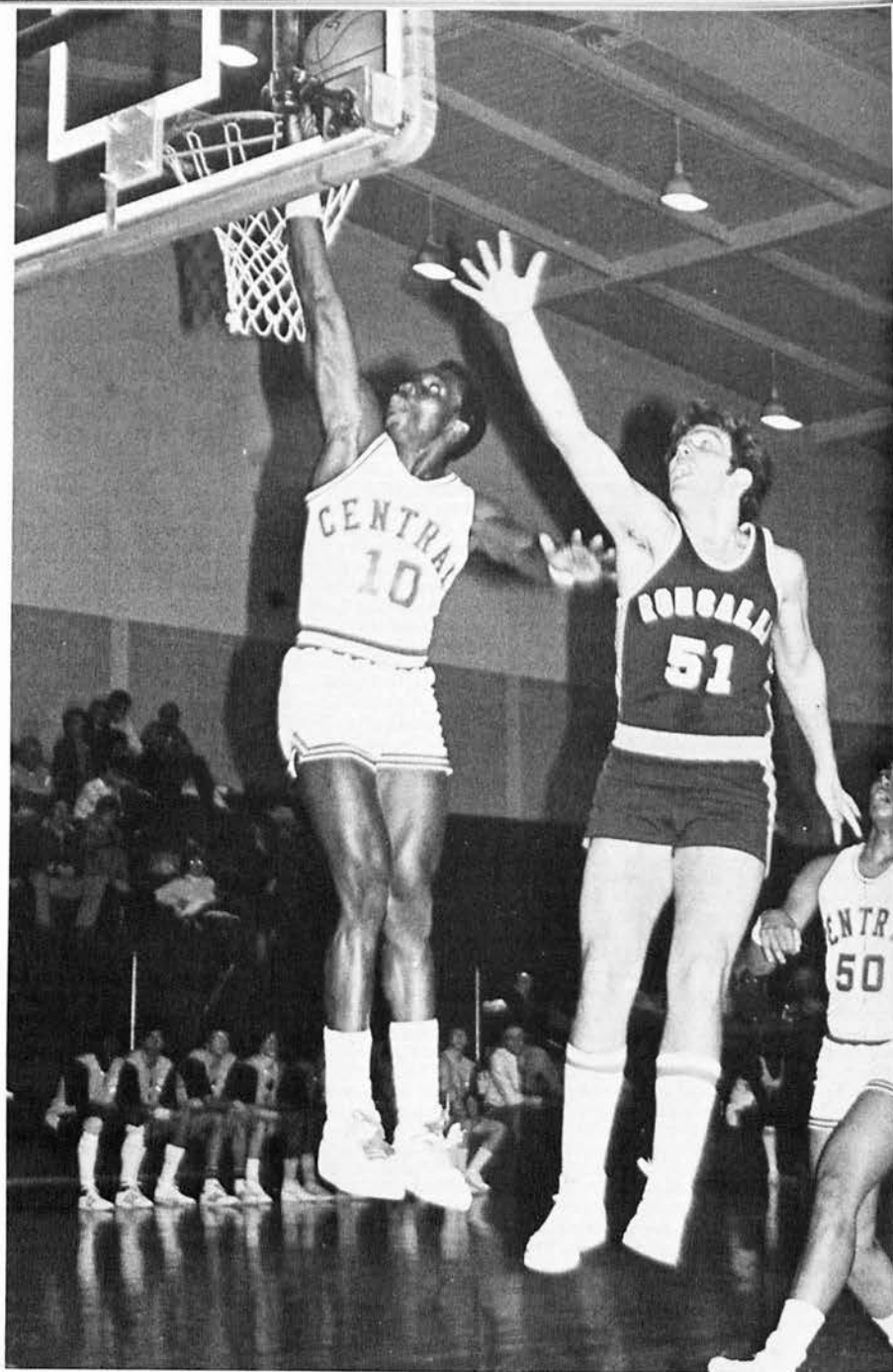

Much publicity has been written about the team in general but especially about Maurtice Ivy and Crystal Hicks.

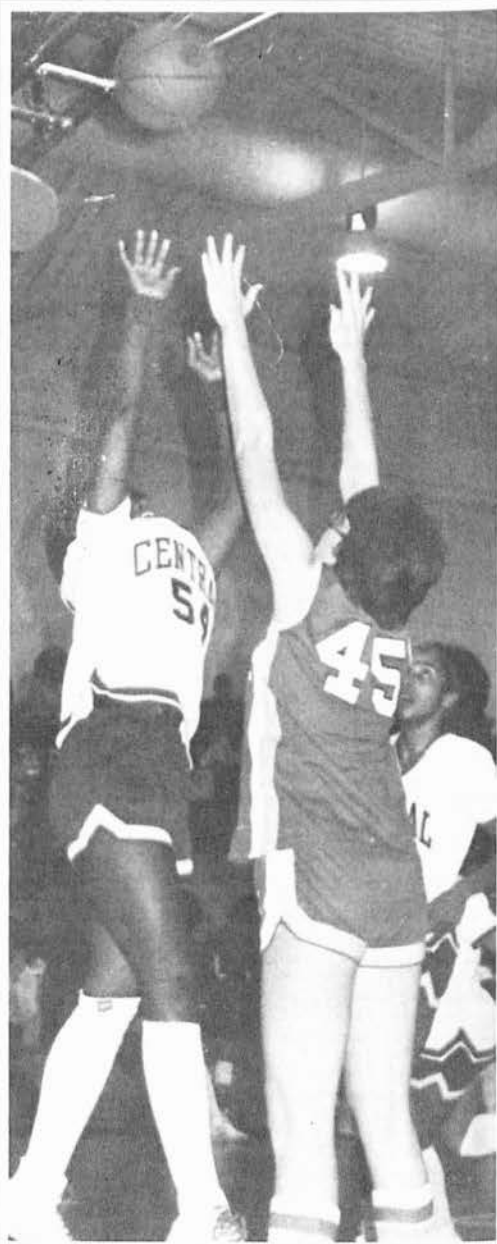
"Crystal Hicks is a fundamental player; she shoots well and plays very good defense," comments Mr. Semrad.

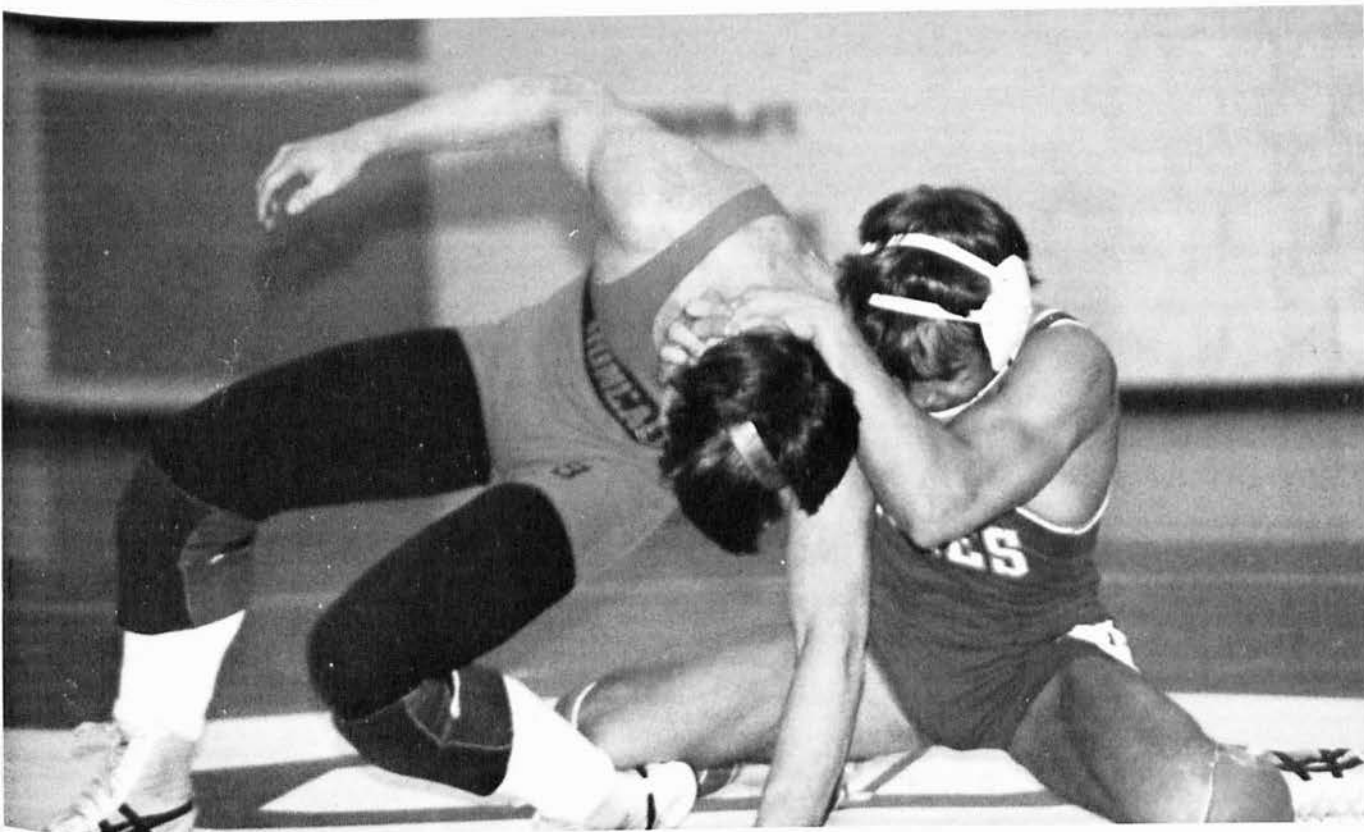
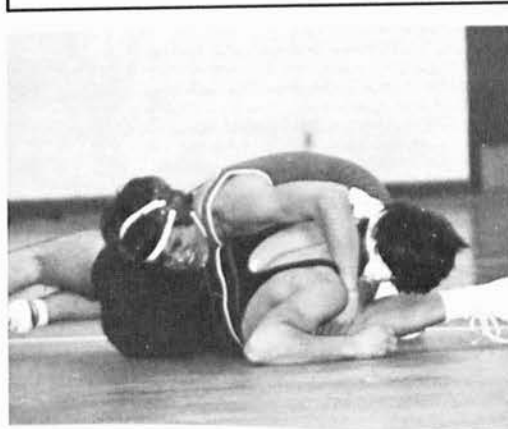
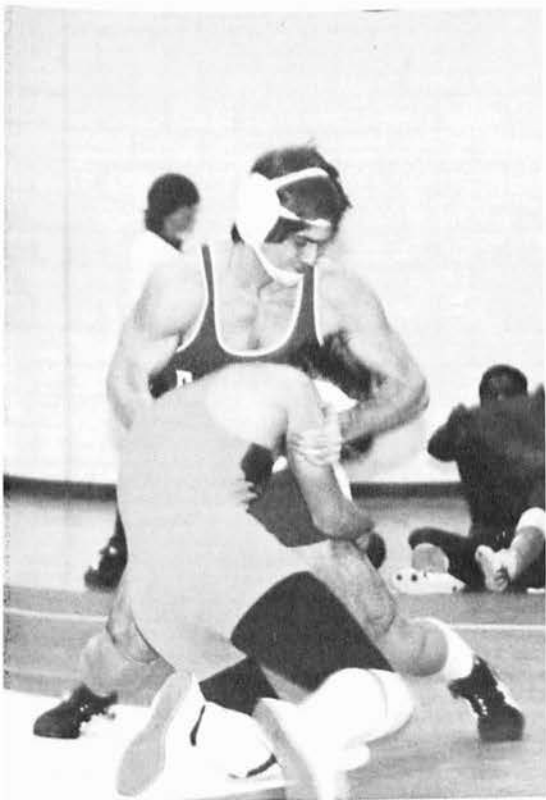
Central wrestlers show authority

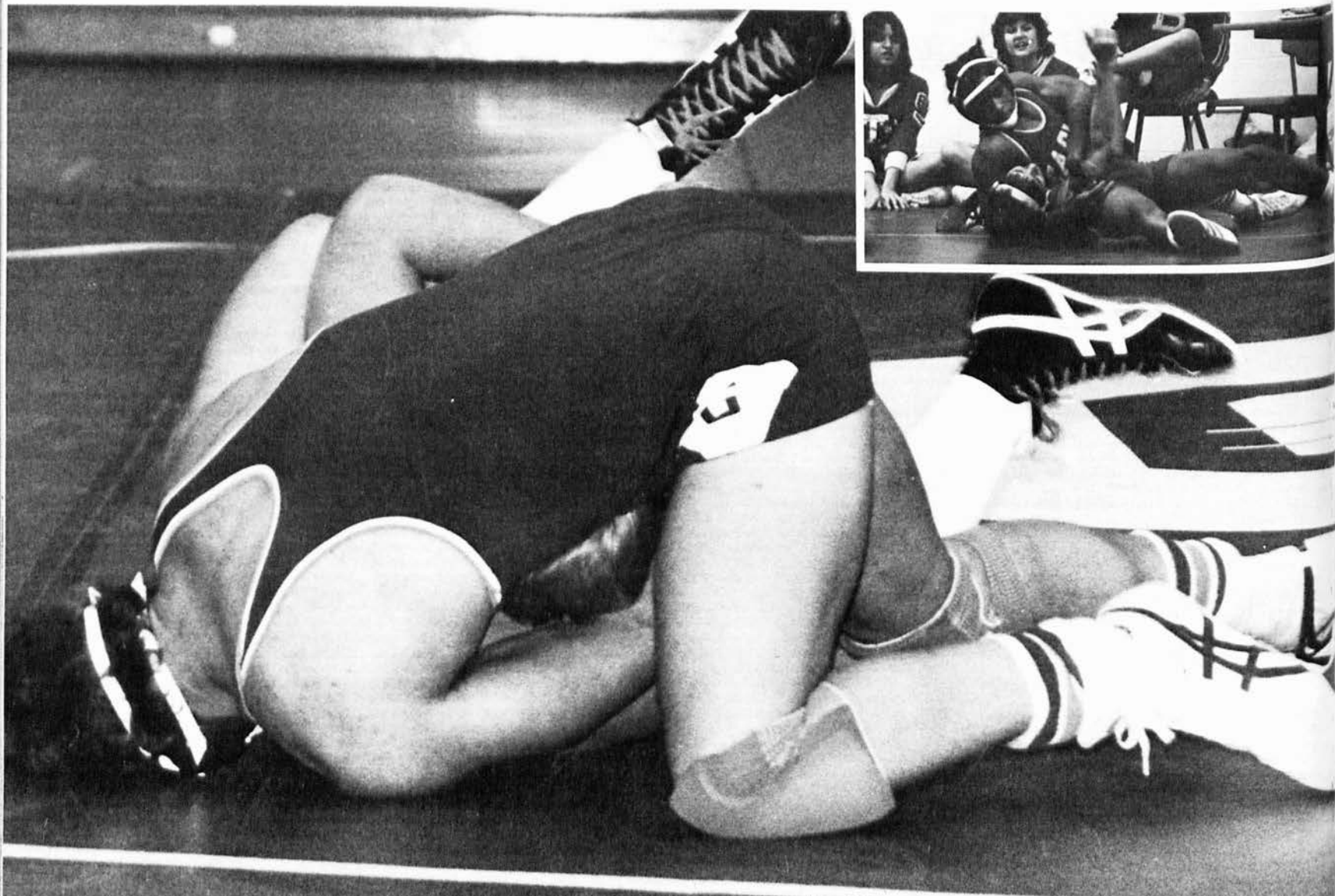


(Above) Tim Chamberlain putting a 3/4 nelson on a Roncollini opponent.

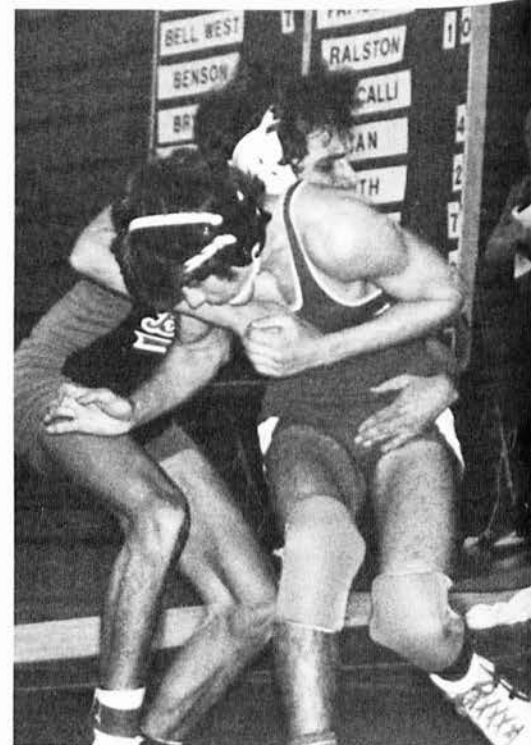

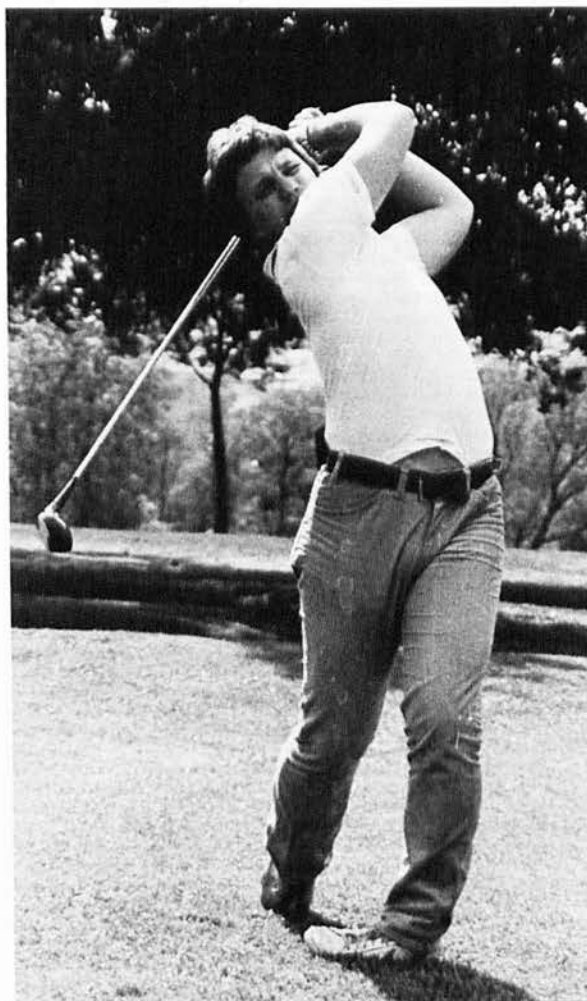

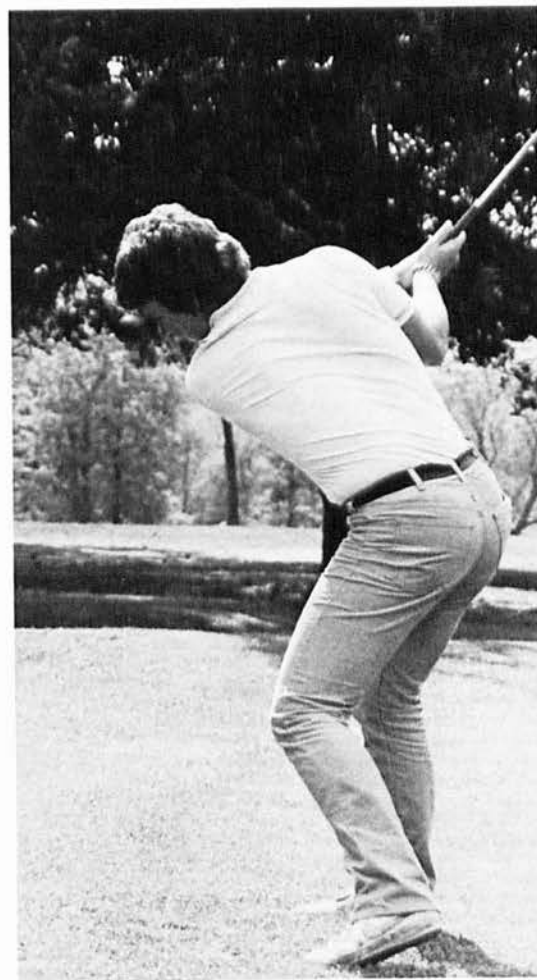

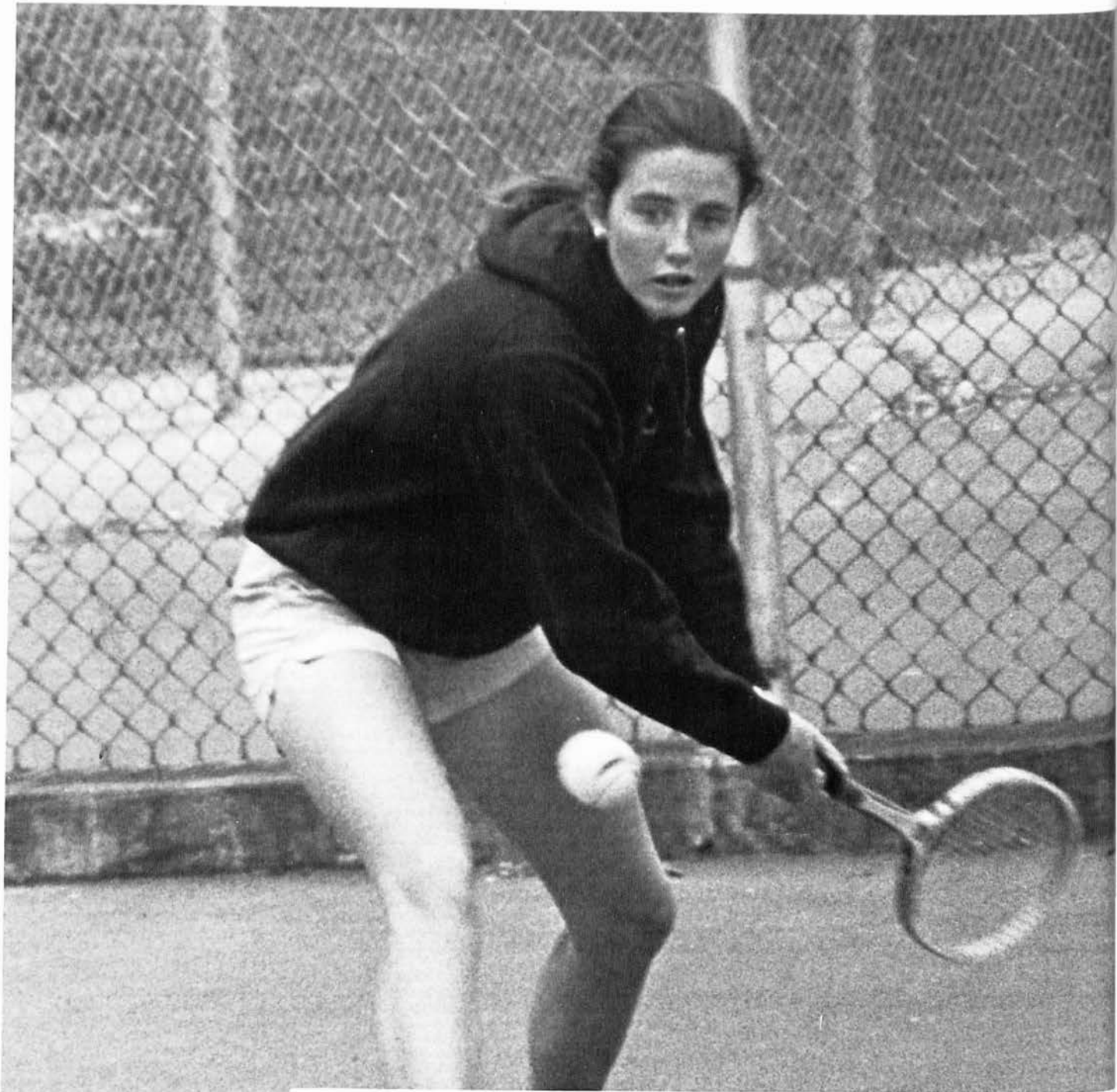

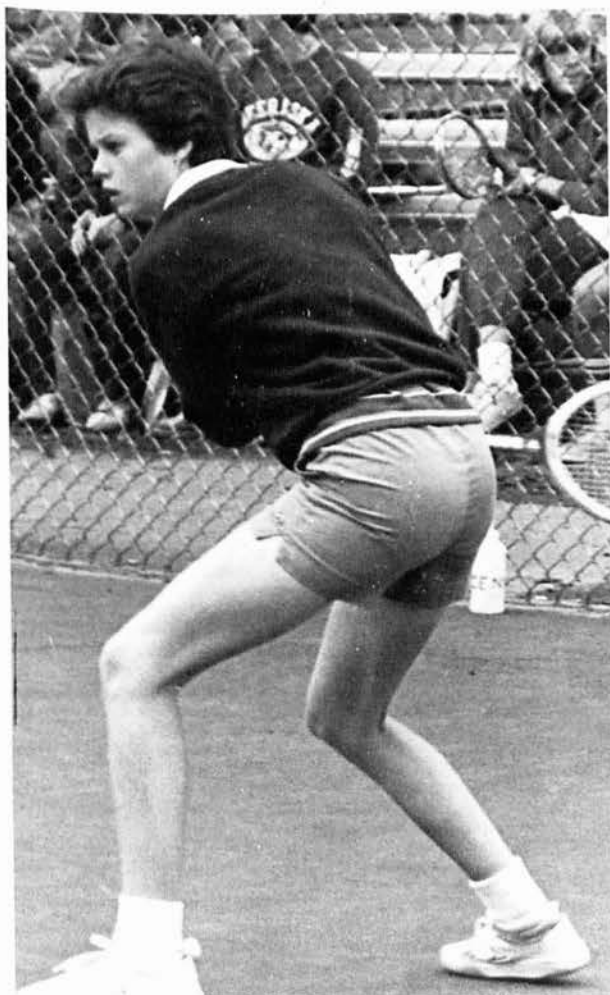
"This year we had a lot of inexperience. We only had two seniors: Andra Jones and Busy Schenken. The

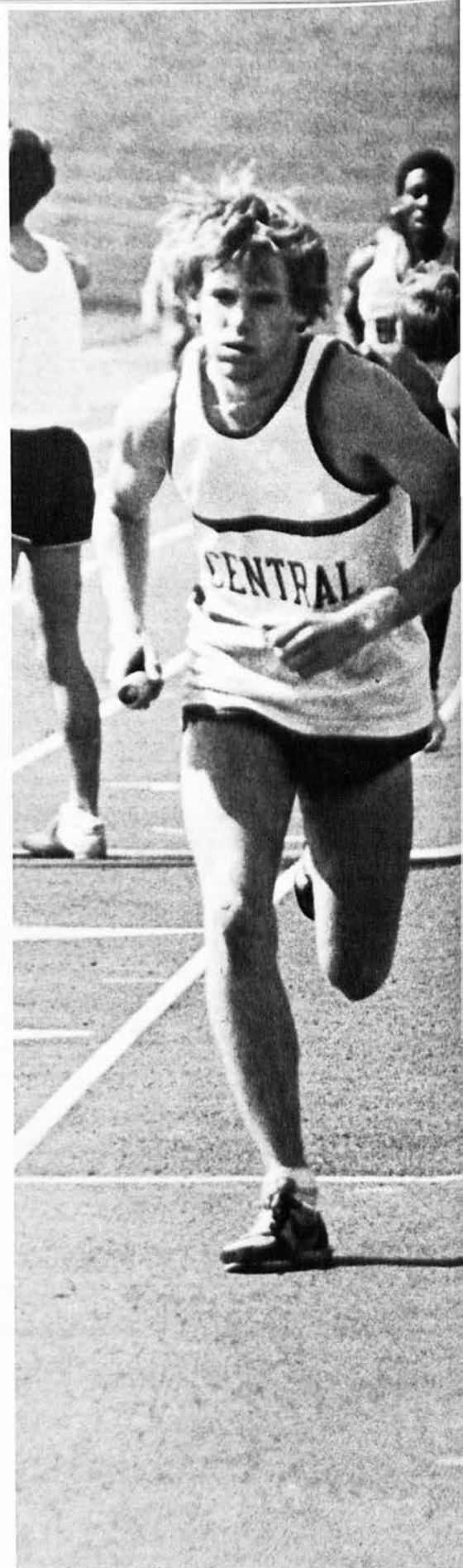
Records fall as track takes 2nd in State

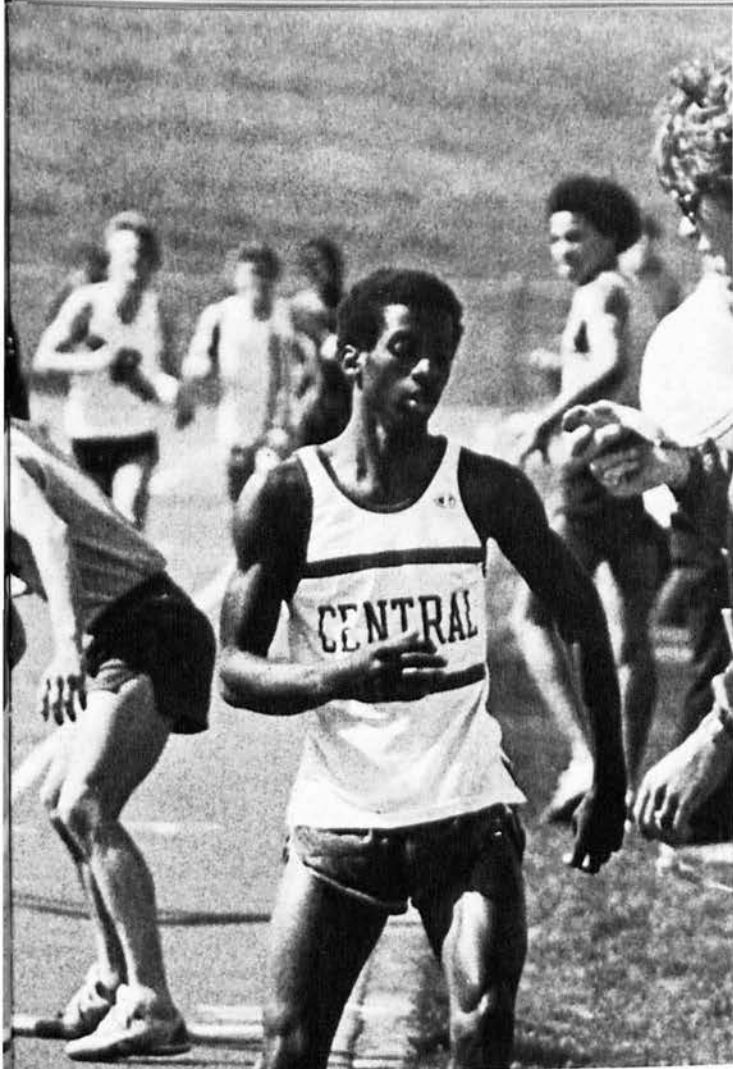

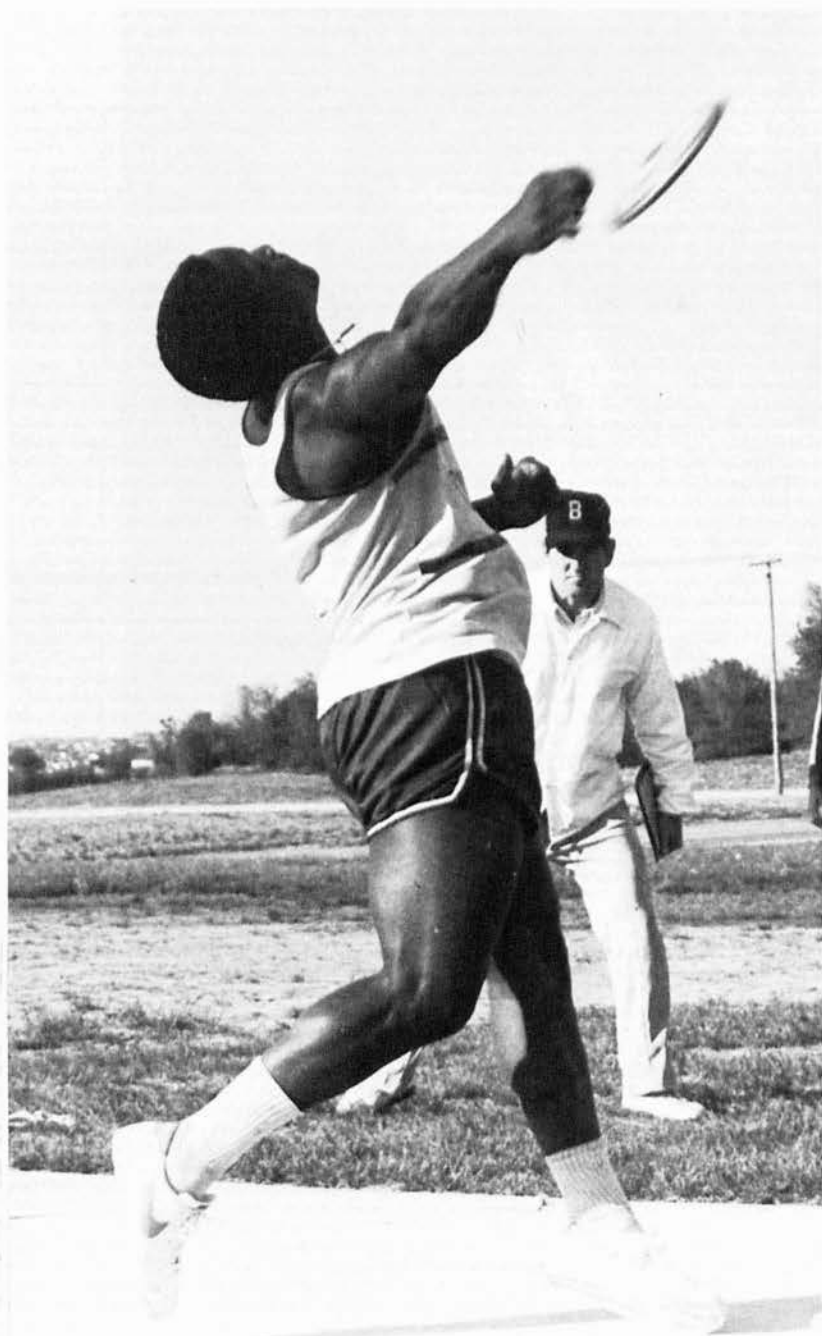

Once again, the girls' track team took state for the third year in a row.

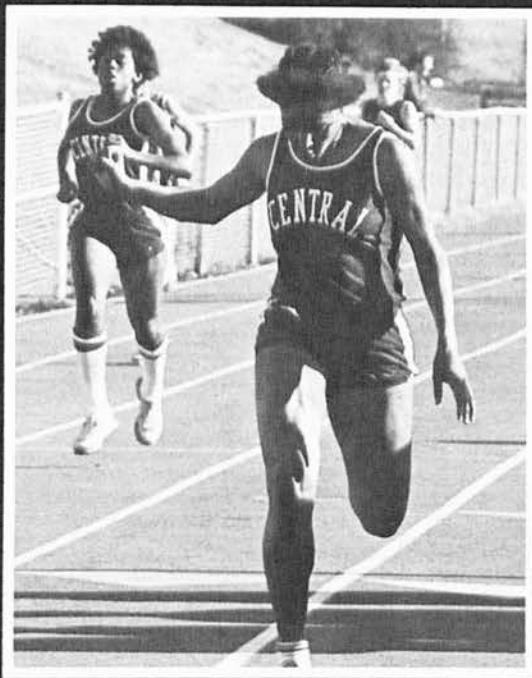
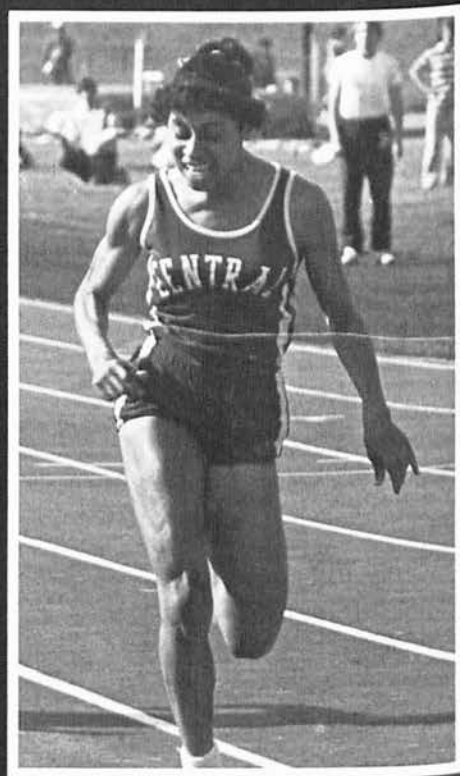

The team was well-rounded, and they wished to keep winning, so they worked extra hard and won.



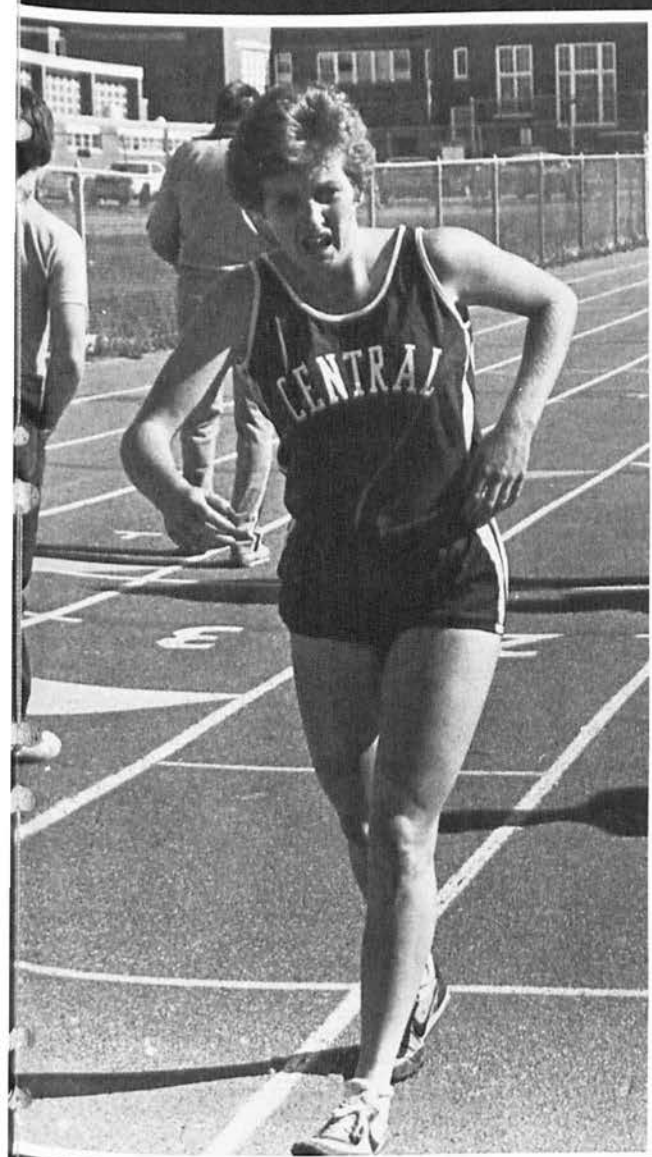

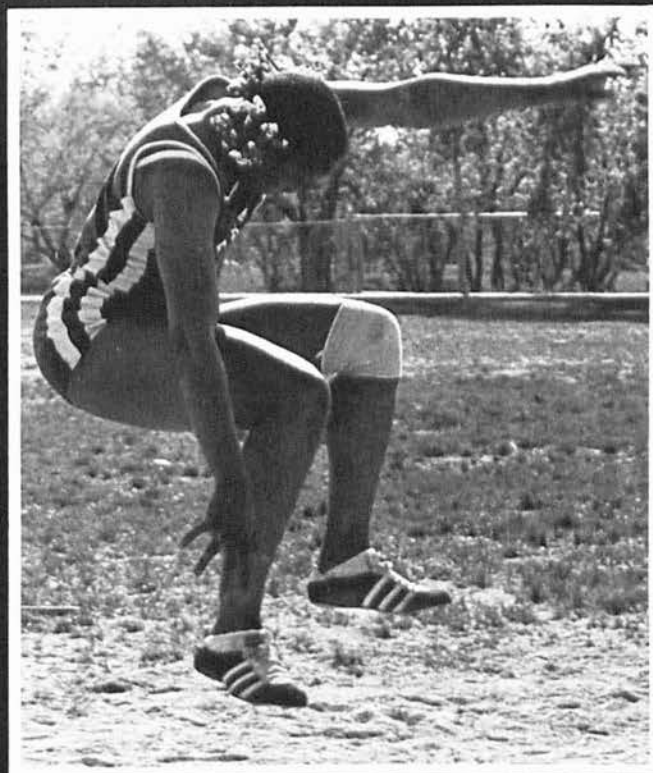

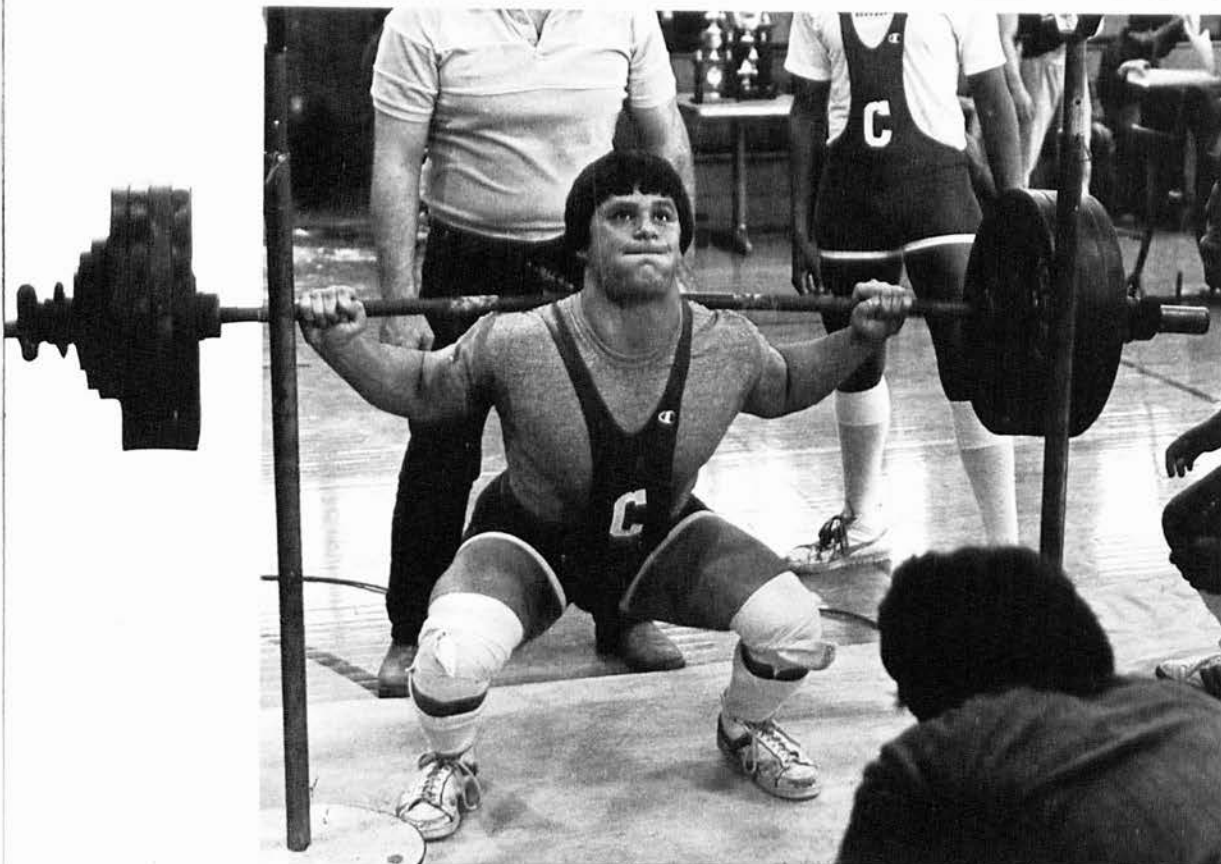
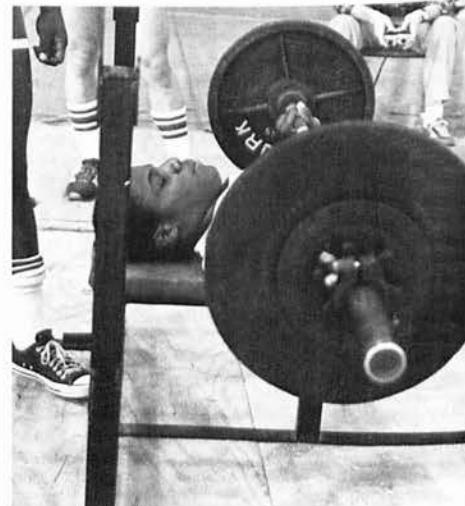
Power lifters dominate meets

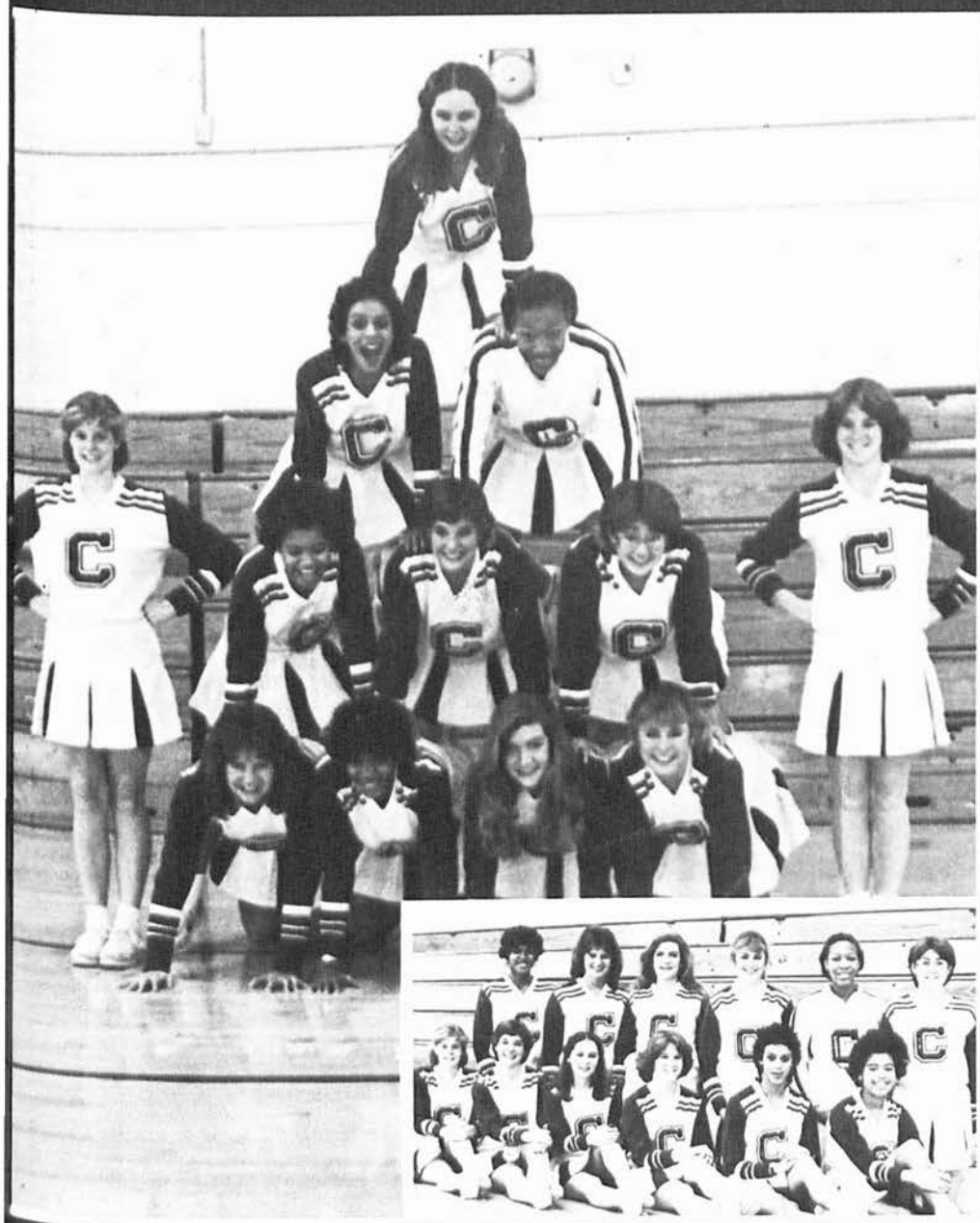

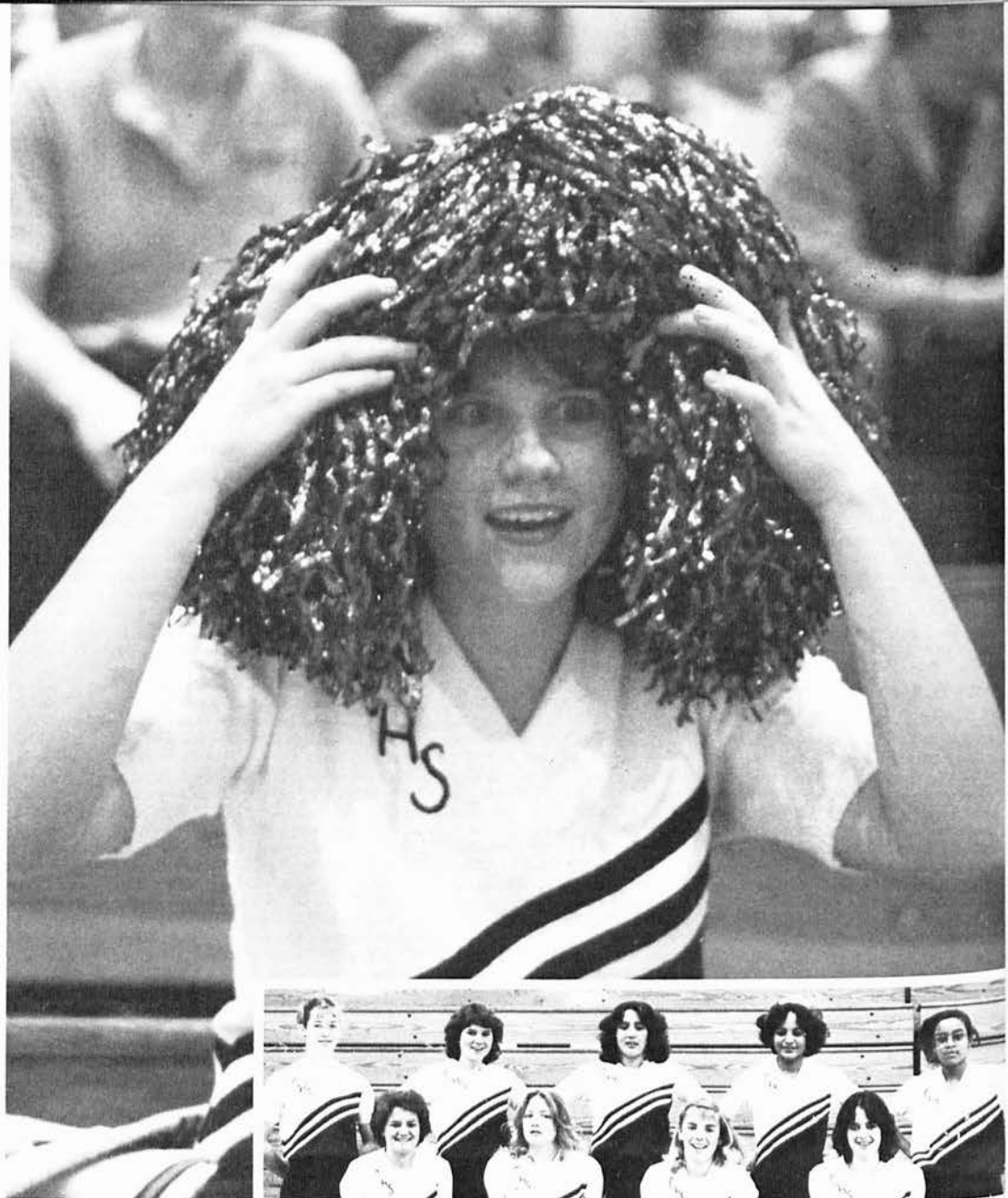

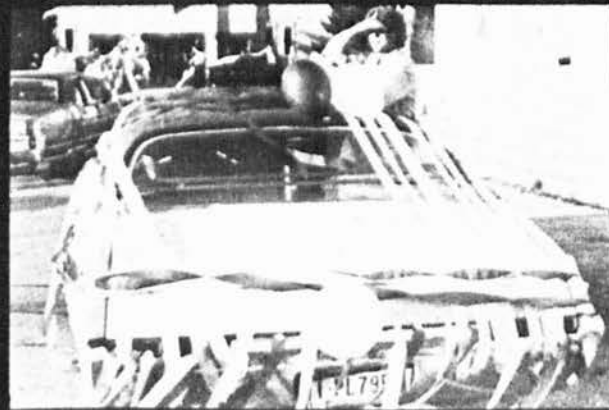

Mrs. Bayer wishes to keep the club active and increase membership.

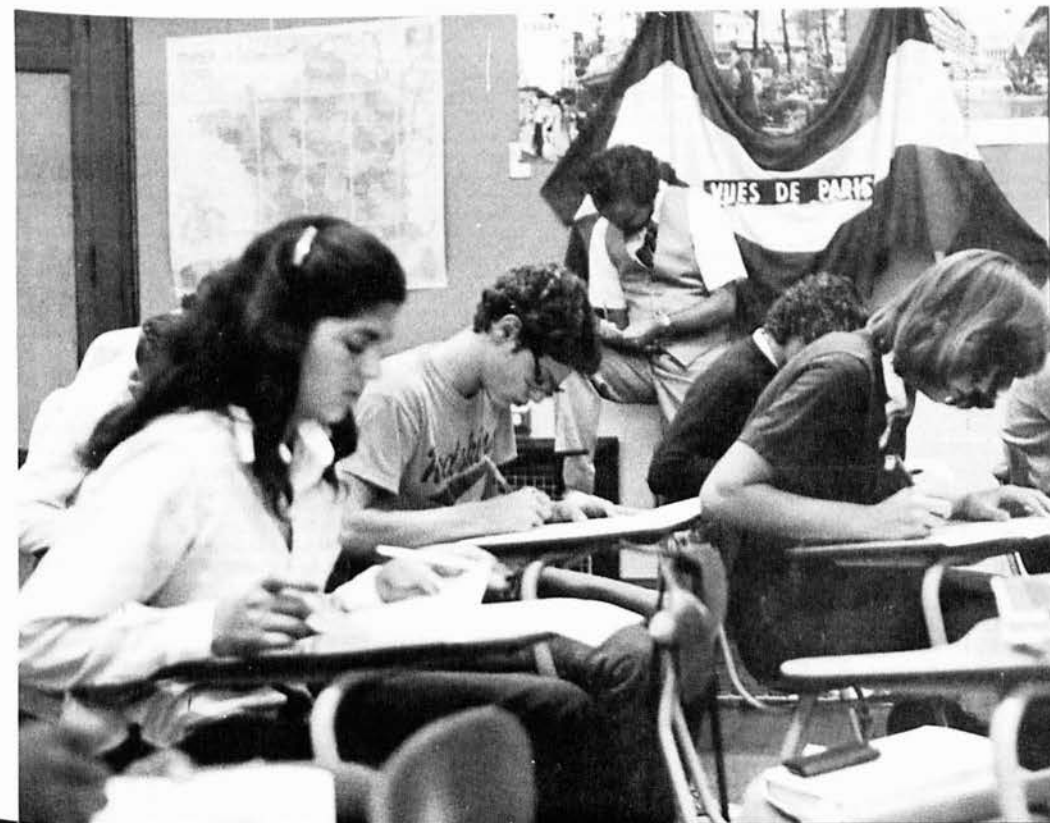

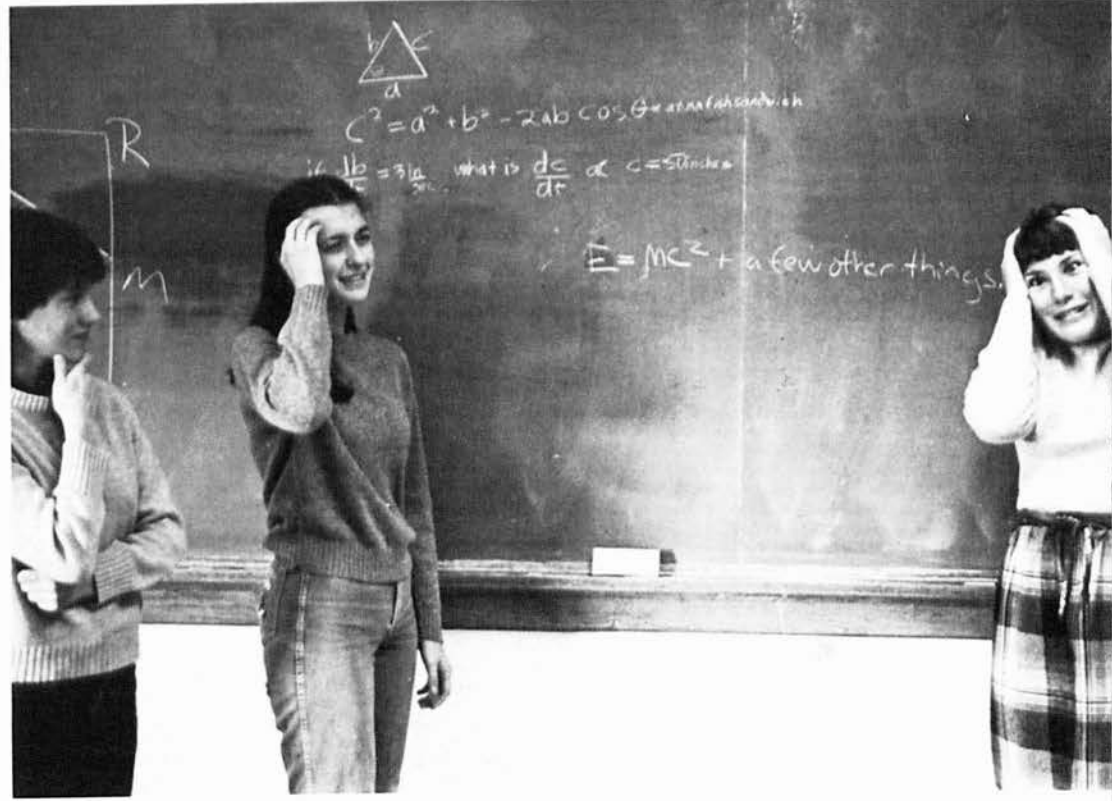

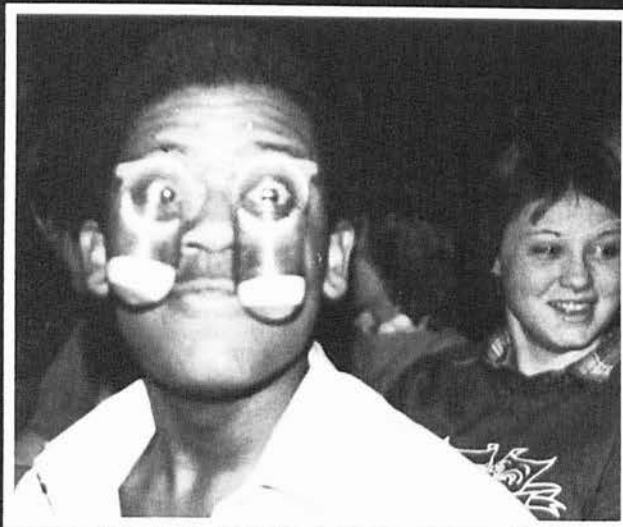


Pegi's Players play again

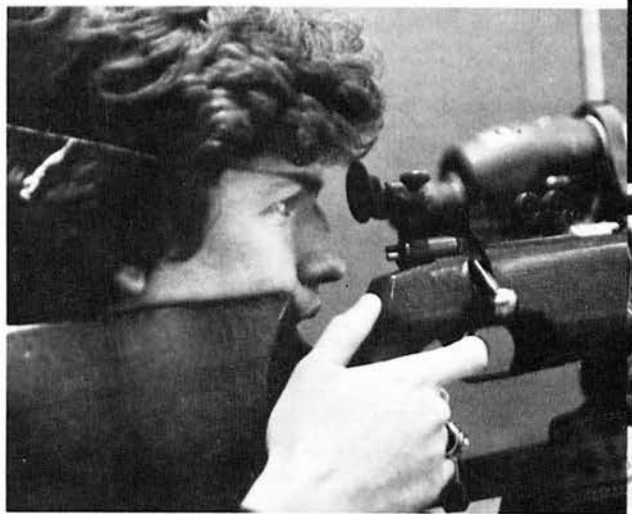
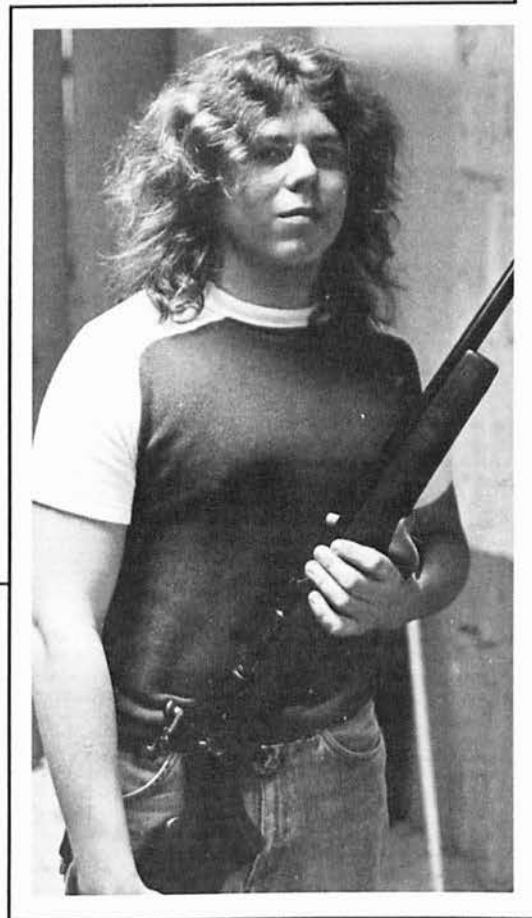


Rifle team shoots ahead

JROTC falls in line with pride!

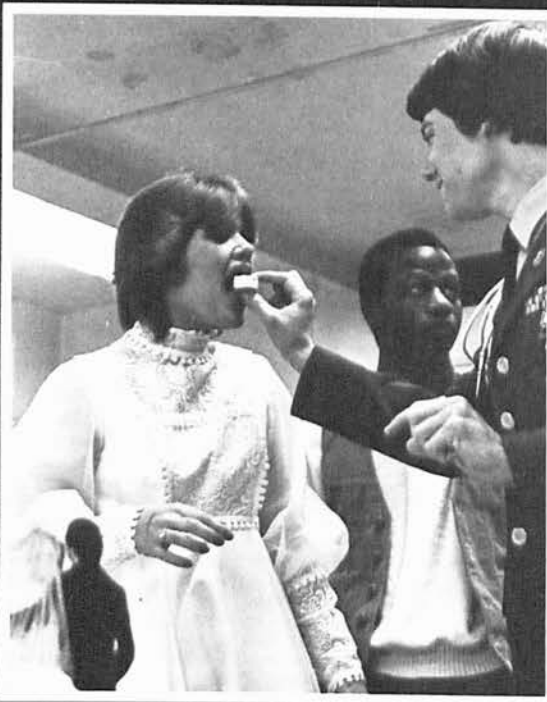

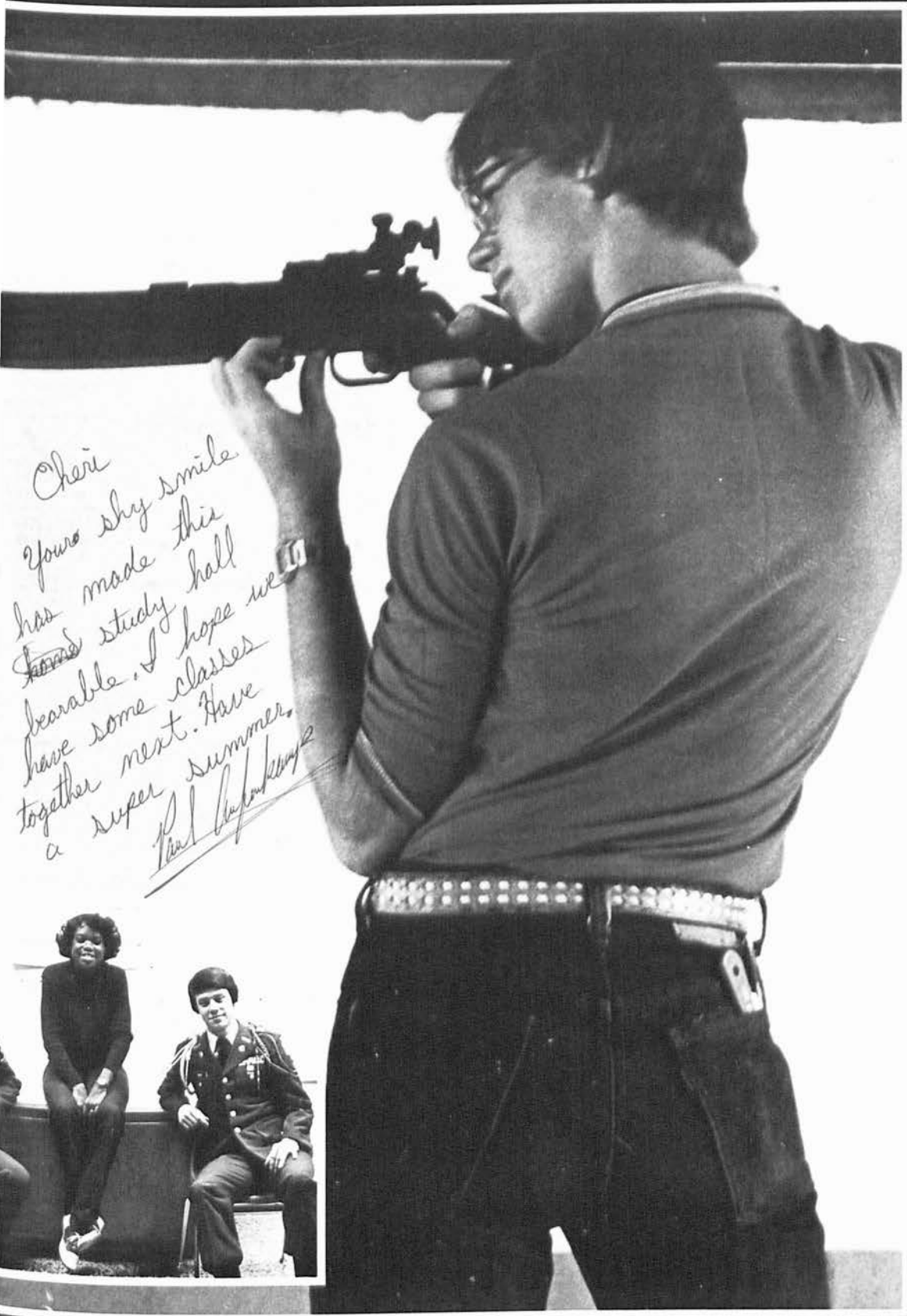

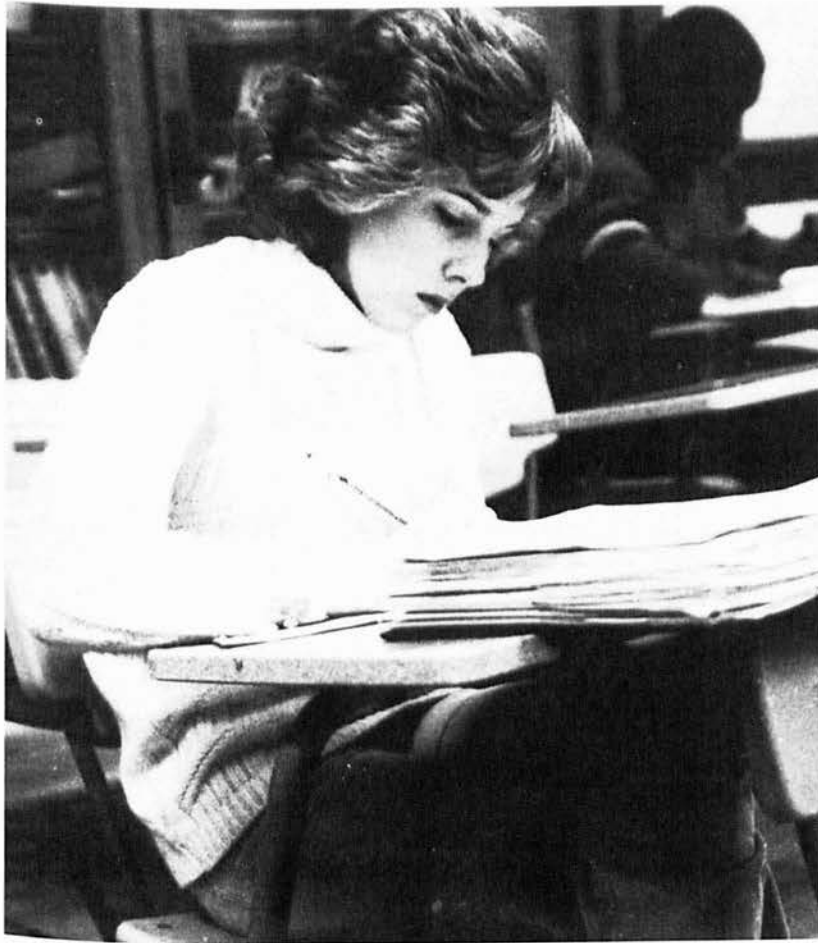

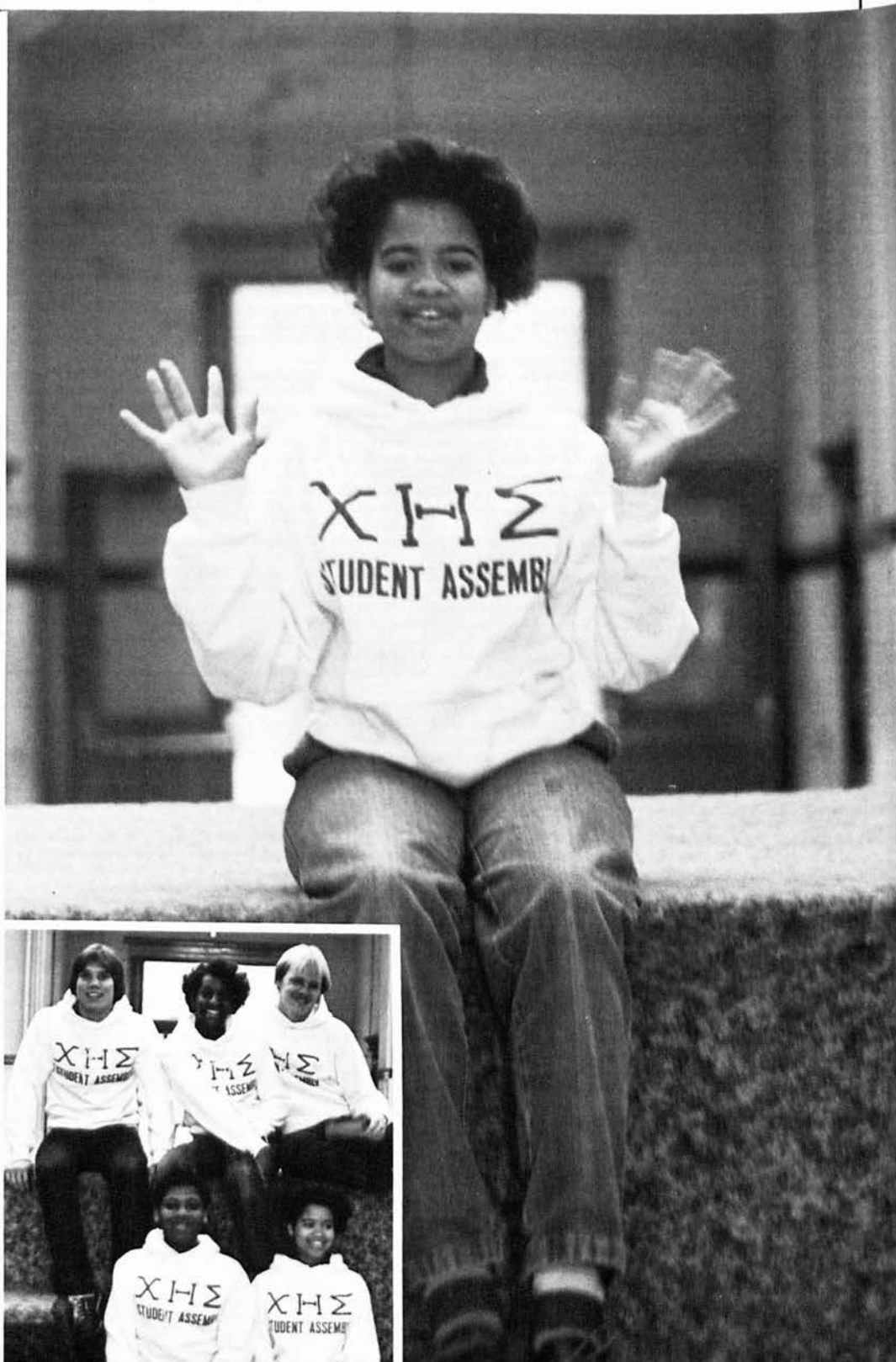

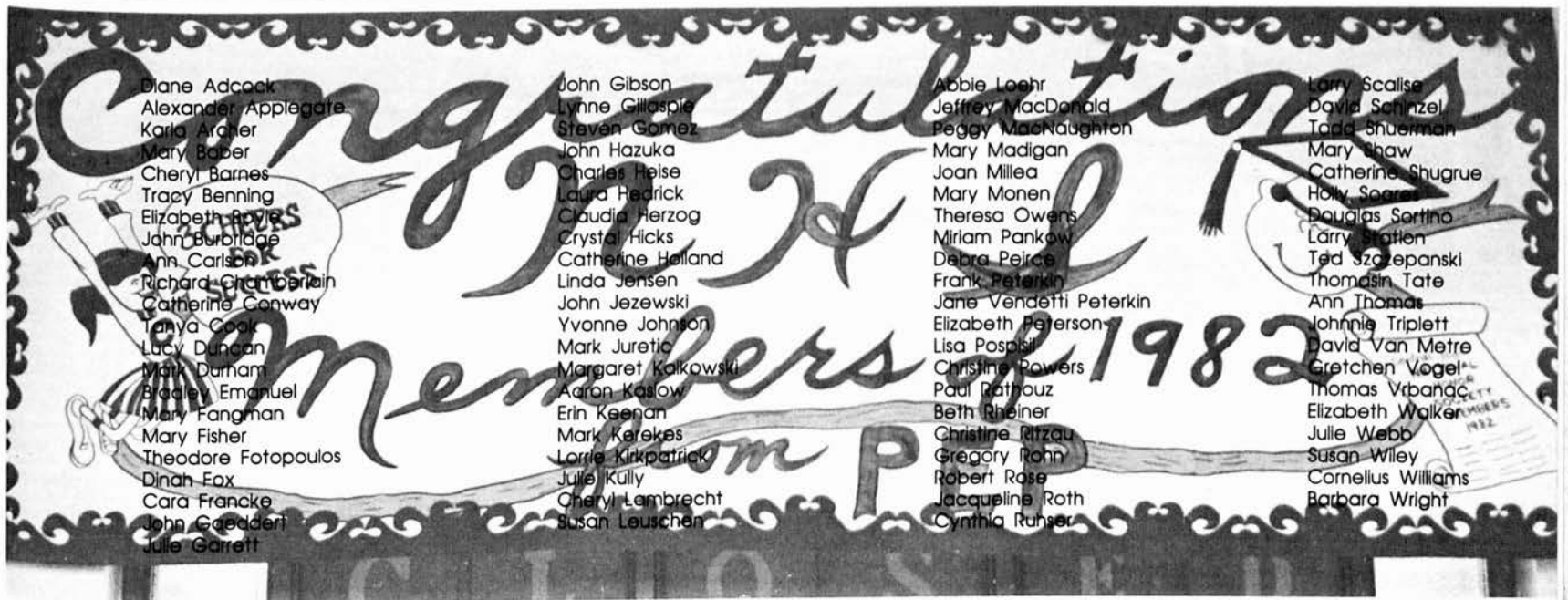

Top scorers (based on a minimum score determined by each state) become National Merit Semi-finalists. This year, eight Central seniors were semi-finalists, more than any other school in Nebraska. The National Merit finalists in Nebraska represent half of one percent of graduating seniors of the class of 1982. 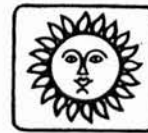

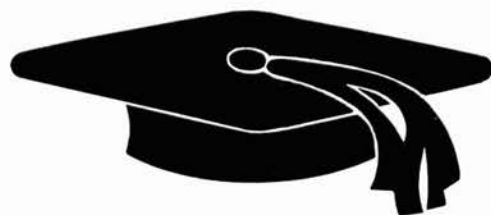

The 1982 Central High School O-Book is the 83rd edition of the book. This year ended a three-year contract with Walsworth Publishing Company. Central's representative was Bryan Smith. The typeface used throughout the book was Avant Garde. Body copy was printed in 10 point and captions in 8 point.

Many changes were instituted in this year's book including a price increase. This year the book sold for \$10 with an S.A. ticket and \$11 without. This may have been the cause of decreased sales, with only 948 copies sold. Another alteration was the conversion from the

traditional three column layout to the more conventional mosaic layout.

Two new sections, student life and an ad section, were added to the book. The 1982 O-Book also will include a supplement.

The theme for this yearbook was the product of many long debates. The movie theme promotes the idea of the processes involved in making a movie with you, the students and faculty of Central, as the stars. The theme is not as pronounced as last year's Plain Label, but the symbolic piece of negative follows throughout the book to unify the idea. Several other themes such as

Rainbow, Melting Pot, and Year of the Eagle were discussed.

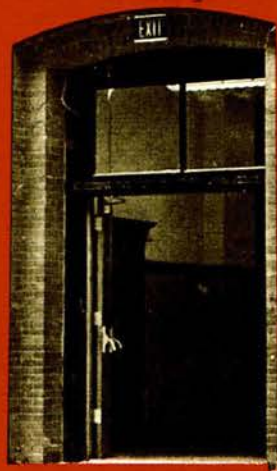
