## Various activities of Central

The Central High staff consists of eighty-two teachers, one principal, three assistant principals, thirteen cafeteria workers, fifteen custodians, and seven clerical workers who all work together for you, the students. The teachers' duties are to teach the students; they also are in charge of various activities from coaching a football team to advising a foreign language club.

The principals are involved in student discipline and the overall supervision of school functions. Dr. Moller said, "My favorite job is visiting classes and counseling students." The cafeteria workers prepare meals for students, five days a week. They serve a lunch and a breakfast, which they begin preparing early in the morning. The custodians keep our school in good repair and clean for each day. And finally, the clerical workers keep the whole operation running smoothly.

All of these people work together to perform one job: to help Central students achieve their fullest potential.

## Diverse

The administration at Central consists of one principal and three assistant principals who keep the school running smoothly. Not only are they in charge of student discipline, but they are also involved in the various school activities.

Dr. G. E. Moller, Central High principal, has duties of overall supervision of the school, teacher appraisal, and special discipline. Dr. Moller said his two favorite jobs are visiting classes and counseling students with their personal and school related problems.

Mrs. Udoxie Barbee, assistant principal, came to Central this year. Actually Mrs. Barbee has been here before; she is a Central High graduate. She stated that the only thing that has really changed is the courtyard and the new gym. A few of Mrs. Barbee's duties are placement and supervision of student teachers, cafeteria workers, career day, and fire drills. She is also in charge of regular student discipline.

Mr. Richard Jones, assistant principal, came to Central sixteen years ago as a counselor. The following year he became assistant principal. Mr. Jones became the athletic director this year. He has supervision over the whole athletic department, from uniforms to the hiring of referees. Mr. Jones also handles supervision of SA tickets, determination and publishing of honor roll, and disciplining students.

Mr. Al LaGreca, assistant principal, came to Central nineteen years ago. Four years later, he became assistant principal. Mr. LaGreca's duties include processing of student schedules and grades, handling all school activities, and disciplining students. Mr. LaGreca has also worked on planning for the schools renovation during the past several years.
