
Drifting into Fall

















































The election experience

Diverse activities keep Central


The administration at Central consists of one principal and three assistant principals who keep the school running smoothly. Not only are they in charge of student discipline, but they are also involved in the various school activities.



Varsity Eagles claim hard-earned 4-5 1982 season record







Although the seniors did not end their last high school football season with spotless records, all their hard work paid off. Several players have been highly recruited by large colleges and universities.





With a 5-4 season the Junior Varsity had their ups and downs including a win against Prep, the first in over ten years, and an error-filled loss against Burke.


"The team overall came a long way in playing and working together, and matured like expected although there was a lack of conviction on some of the player's parts," stated Coach George Grillo.






Varsity Volleyball players





Weightlifters have powerful season



These records, and increased participation and support, will help build up recognition for the weightlifters.



"With team captain Pete Tracey the constant best, and all the other members improving every week, it has been quite a successful year," concluded Coach Waterman.




The Boys' Cross Country team finished seventh in Metro and an impressive fourth place at the Roncalli Invitational Meet.

















Wrestling season projects hope for '84





Coach Kubik is looking forward to another good year as well, when the 1983-84 season begins. Several experienced wrestlers will be returning to the Wrestling squad.















Gymnastics team: just warming up







Beginning practice in the summer, the Eaglettes participated in an N.C.A. pom-pon camp at Okoboji, then they began working with the band for football season.




















Anthropology Club tours sites







O-Club

Students sold candy to raise funds for the annual O-club banquet in May. Awards went to the best athlete in an individual sport and also to the best all-around athlete.













spring musical 'Charlie Brown'










