Following is "standard" information we feel you shou. for graduation:

1. May graduates may attend all activities.
2. At the discretion of the teacher a senior maintaining a . semester grade of "3" may be excused from a firial examina
3. Commencement program rehearsal will be at 9:00 a.m. in the Ci . Arena on Thursday, May 23, the same day as graduation.
(a) ATTENDANCE IS REQUIRED OF ALL WHO PLAN TO BE IN THE COMMENCEMEI CEREMONY.
(b) Do not bring your cap and gown to rehearsal.
(c) Rehearsal will take about two hours. Please do not p!an to leave nol ask to leave before it is over.
(d) Get your seating assignment from your counselor and take your assigned seat as soon as you enter the auditorium.
(e) There is to be no smoking during rehearsal.
4. The Commencement programi starts at 7:30 on May 23. All seniors are to report to the Exhitition Hall of the City Auditorium no later than 7:00. Qut of respect for others, jeans should not be worn. Any conspicuously inappropriate article of dress couid result in your removal from the program.
5. Caps and tassels may be kept. Gowns are to be returried to your counselors in the Exhibition Hall of the City Auditorium immedately after the Commencement program. Their return and your getting proper credit for their return is your responsibility. The Willsie Cap and Gown Company will bill you for approximately $\$ 75.00$ for your failure to return the gown.
6. Seniors should make sure they have no fines or unpaid bills by

Commencement time. A diploma will not be issued until fines are cleared.
7. Baccalaureate Services in the City Auditorium Arena at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, May 22.
(a) There is no practice for this program.
(b) Senior participants are to enter by the Chicago Street (north) entrance only. Report by 7:00 p.m..
(c) Girls are not to remove caps at any time during the service.
(d) Boys are to remove caps before the invocation, leave them off during the entire service, and replace them after the benediction just before leaving the arena at the end of the program.
(e) There is no reservation of seats for relatives and friends. Seating is on a first-come, first-serve basis.
8. Omaha Public High Schools use minimal cost admission tickets for graduation programs. We will issue some free tickets and sell others to those who wish to include tickets in some of their graduation announcements.
(a) Tickets are 10 cents each.
(b) No seats are "reserved" tickets.
(c) Tickets will be on sale at the Auditorium the night of Commencement, but we urge you to buy plenty of tickets here at school before the program to avoid lang lines at the auditorium.
(d) Everyone who enters must have a ticket.

This year, as in past years, Central's Counseling Department will offer the PSAT/NMSQT (Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Test) to all juniors at Central.

Although the test is offered to all juniors and a few selected sophomores, the Counseling Department particularly would like to encourage those students who rank in the upper one-fourth of their junior class to participate in the testing program. Your support and encouragement would be greatly appreciated and could be well rewarded if your son or daughter does favorably on the test.

Central's test date will be Tuesday, Qctober 23 rd. All interested juniors must register for the test and pay a $\$ 5.50$ fee in the Counseling Center, room 129, no later than October 10 th. At the time of registration, each student will receives a PSAT/NMSQT Student BuIIetin which will contain a full-length sample test and information to help students prepare for the test.

The PSAT/NMSQT measures verbal and mathematical reasoning abilities, important in college work. The test is co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation. Following is a brief sketch of how students benefit from participating in the testing program.

Central High School "Position Statement" for Sophomores:
Through your elementary and junior high years your parents and teachers expected to have extra patience with you, to give you special support in your school work, and to give you many reminders of the work you had to do and the deadlines you had to meet.

We know you still will find your high school teachers more than reasonable in helping you to succeed with your high school work. However, you are now in high school. Expect a difference. Beginning with this your sophomore year and with each succeeding year of high school you will be expected to assume more personal responsibility for your school work than you have had to assume up to this point.

Prepare yourself well for any quiz or test the first time you take it. Don't assume that you can take it over if you get a poor grade or that you can take it over until you get a passing grade. No teacher is under any obligation to let any student repeat any test because of a low grade.

If you are failing or nearly failing a class, don't expect special opportunities to earn "extra credit" to improve your grades or to get you through the course. This is not your "right" and teachers do not have to allow special extra credit.

Have your assignments done and ready to be handed in when they are due. Don't expect assignment deadiines to be extended. Teachers have full authority to give you failing or reduced grades for work that is not handed in on time.

Generally speaking you have one day to make up work for each day you are absent. If you're absent one day, you have all day of the day you return to school to do make-up work and you will be expected to hand it in the day following your return to school.

If you are absent two days, you have two days and two nights for make-up work; three days and nights for make-up work; etc. We emphasize this strongly: It is your responsibility to ask for, to do, and to hand in on time all make-up work. A teacher does not have to remind you of make-up work and failing grades will be given on that which is not done or on that which is not handed in on time.

One last warning: In some schools there seems trexcessive pressure on teachers to keep their failure rates low. This is e at Central. We expect teachers to give you reasonable help, guidance, - pement; but they are not expected to pass anyone who does not do passir pes not do all required work. They are not expected to assume your good attendance, daily homework handed in on time, adequate pren -up work handed in on time, and generally good effort.

## Nurse keeps students in school

Mrs. Geri Thomas describes her job as nurse here at Central: "I try to keep the students in school." In addition to this she attends nurses' conventions, checks the eyes and ears of as many juniors as she can, and she talks to some classes here. But that is not the end of the list. Mrs. Thomas also administers first-aid at JV football games and judges Road Show acts.

Some of the most common excuses she gets from students is that they went to the doctor or dentist and lost the card that she gives them to have the doctor sign. Last year when Central sent a group of people to the Academic Decathalon in California, it was mainly as a reward for their achievements. The team did not receive much advanced coaching in the six weeks it was allotted.

This year, the team's training has been described as "intensive." The team, which has undergone some changes, started training on November 14. Since then they have been coached by several of the faculty to learn many different areas of study.

According to Mrs. Bernstein, the team is stronger at the higher levels, the A group. The B and C groups are at a disadvantage because of Central's five point grading system. ## Advanced placement classes: taken for college credit

The AP classes' teachers who were interviewed said that the students appreciate the advantages of an AP class. Mr. Williams added that this was true after the student has left Central.

Approximately 90 percent of the students in the AP classes take the exam for credit and 90 percent of those people get credit.

## Eagles outplay opponents enroute

Many complications had to be overcome while Central was enroute to its first state championship. Injuries, controversial forfeits, and the mistakes made in the first halves of the state play-off games were all obstacles the team had to overcome, according to head coach William Reed.
"We had some key injuries at some important times, but we still were able to win games without these players," he said. Senior and all-state defensive end Sean Ridley missed the first two games of the season with a shoulder injury.
"Opposing teams are intimidated by Sean's presence, and that makes our defense a more dominating unit," said senior nose guard Mark Buckner. Mark himself missed two and a half games because of a summer heatstroke. "We really missed Mark's leadership at that point," said Coach Reed.

Another injury to fullback Richard Bass midway through the season hurt
the offensive unit. "Rich is a hard runner and a great blocker," said senior offensive tackle Paul Flaxbeard. "Fortunately for us we have a good back-up fullback in Junior Jesse Owens.'"

Although injuries to these players did hurt the team, Coach Reed said he feels lucky. "I said at the beginning of the year that as long as our line stayed healthy, we would have a good year. Everyone on the line played every game, and the end result was the state championship."

All season long, both offensive and defensive units had confidence in their abilities. This showed as all three playoff games were close at the half. "The whole team knew all season long that they were a second half team. They also realized that if they lost, it could be the last time they would be putting on their uniforms," Coach Reed said.

The biggest obstacle cleared this year was the N.S.A.A. ruling regarding the forfeiture of three games. Central had just defeated Burke, the number one team in the State, and the players were
turning their heads toward the state playoffs. However, officials thought an illegal player had been in three victories.
"The Burke game was an extremely tough game for me to coach, knowing the ruling that the board had just put on us," said Coach Reed. The next two games were even more difficult for the players.
"Playing football while the ruling was being appealed was extremely tough for the kids," Coach Reed continued. "It was hard for the players to get their intensity level up for a game." The ruling even affected the players after it had been changed. "We almost went out and got beat by T . J. the day after the ruling was made. We were all so emotionally drained.'"

The team overcame all these difficulties to become Central's first football team to win the State Championship. Coach Reed said, "This is the top of all top feelings. We have finally reached the end of the rainbow."
