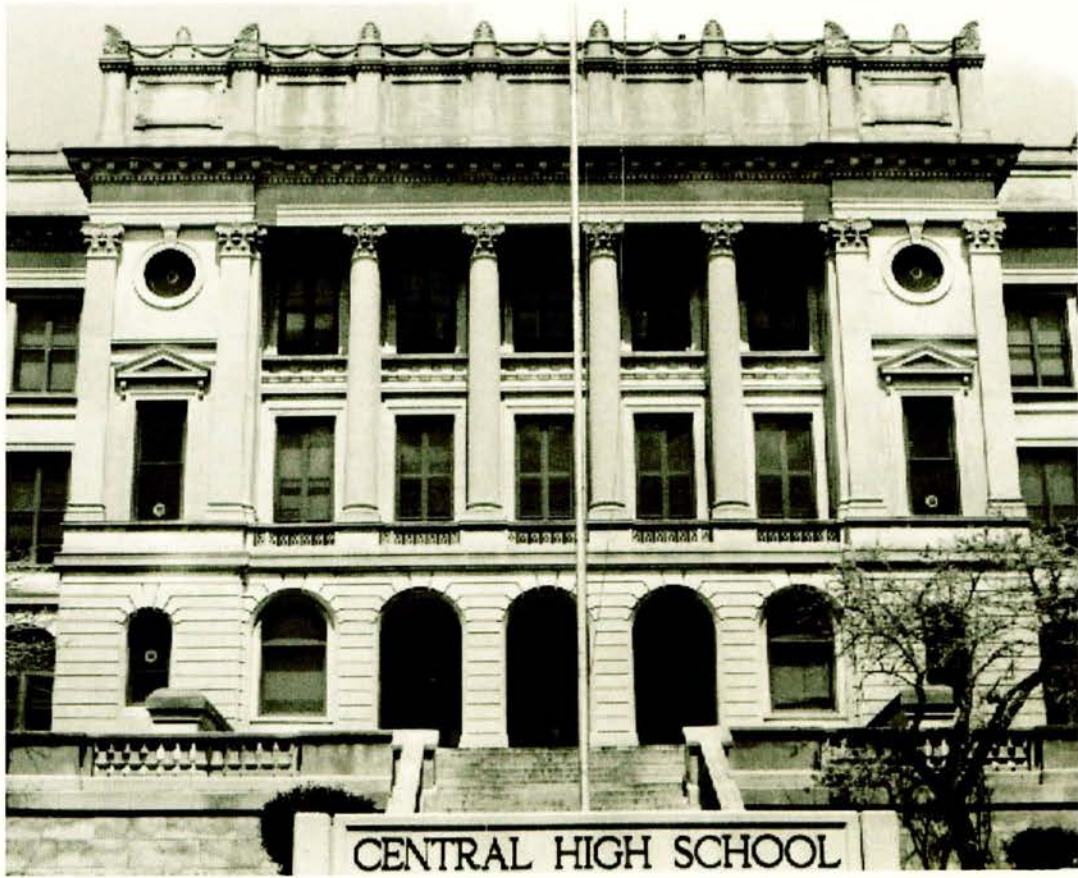

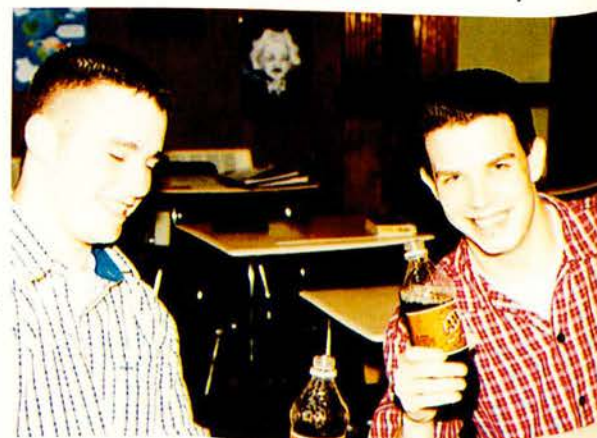

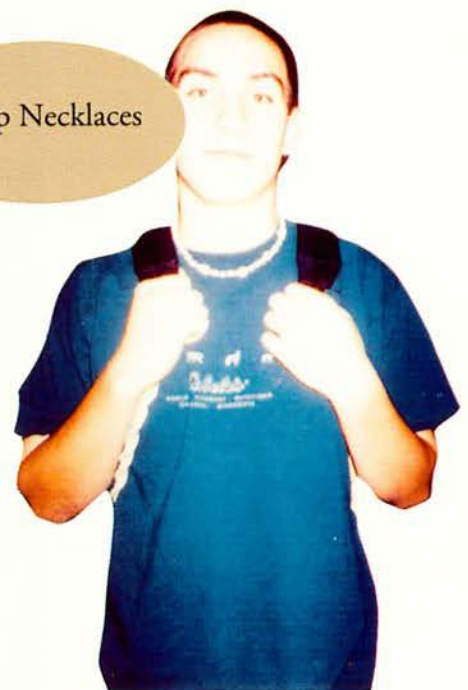

“I didn't really pay attention to the game,” Caroline Walburn(10) said. “I probably could not tell you the score to any of the games I went to.”

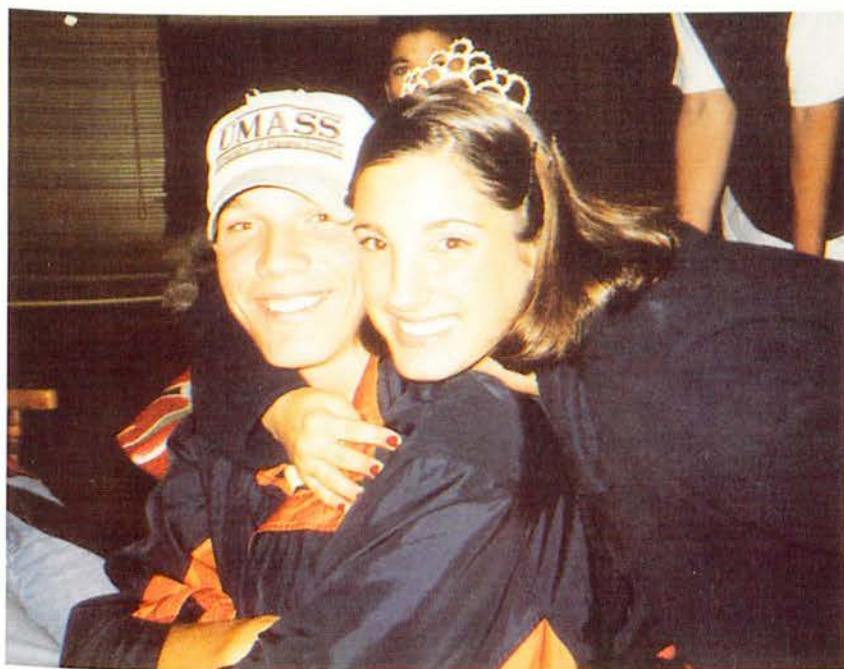

And if these things weren't enough, we all spent endless amounts of money on our favorite clothing, shoes and accessories. But who's to blame?

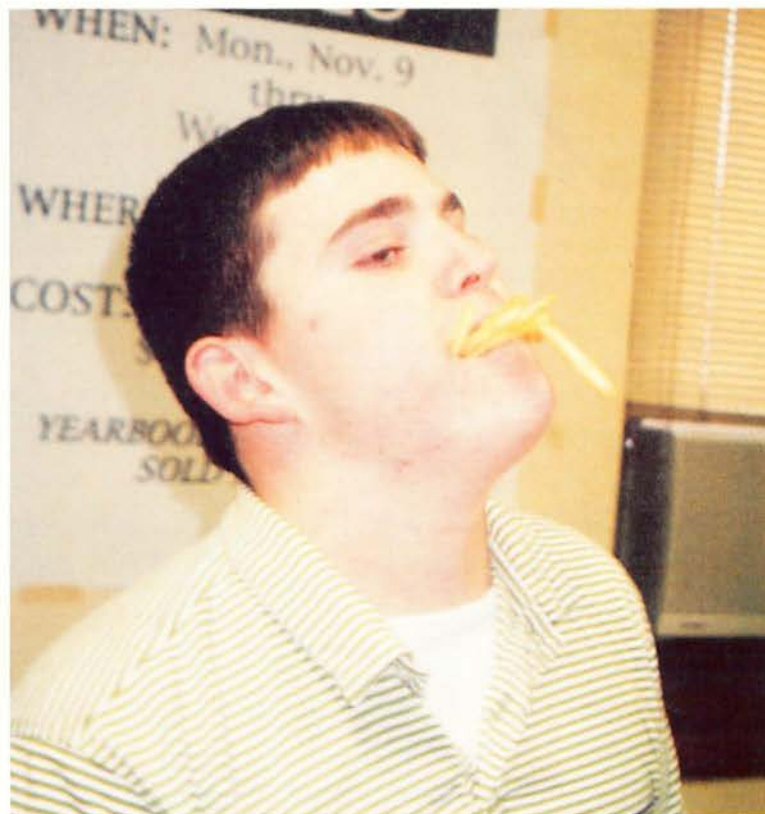

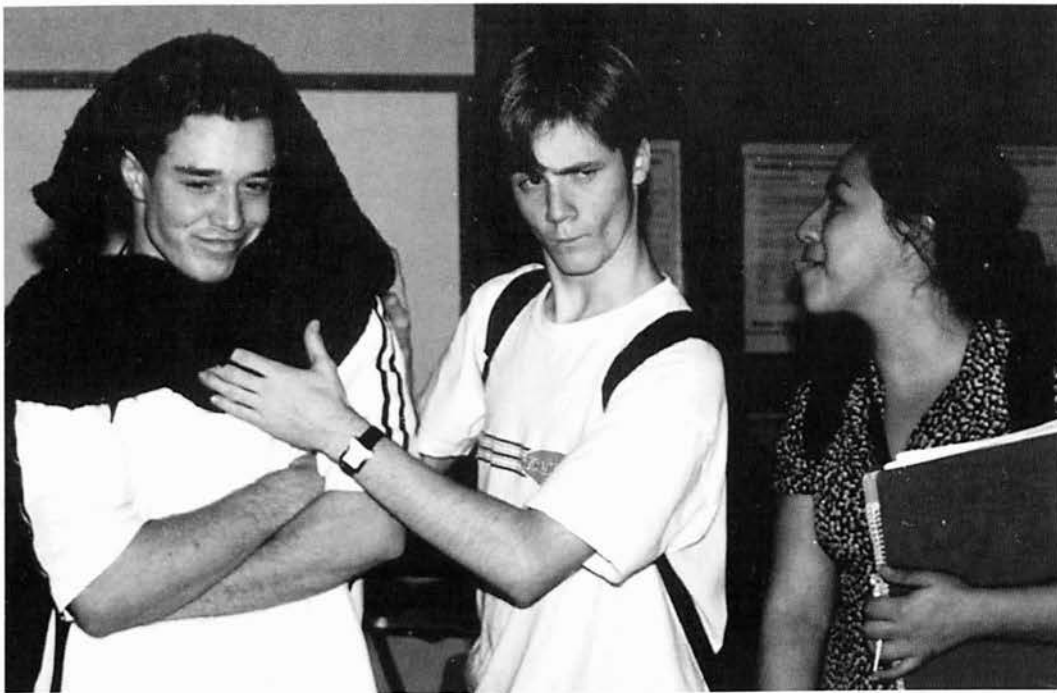

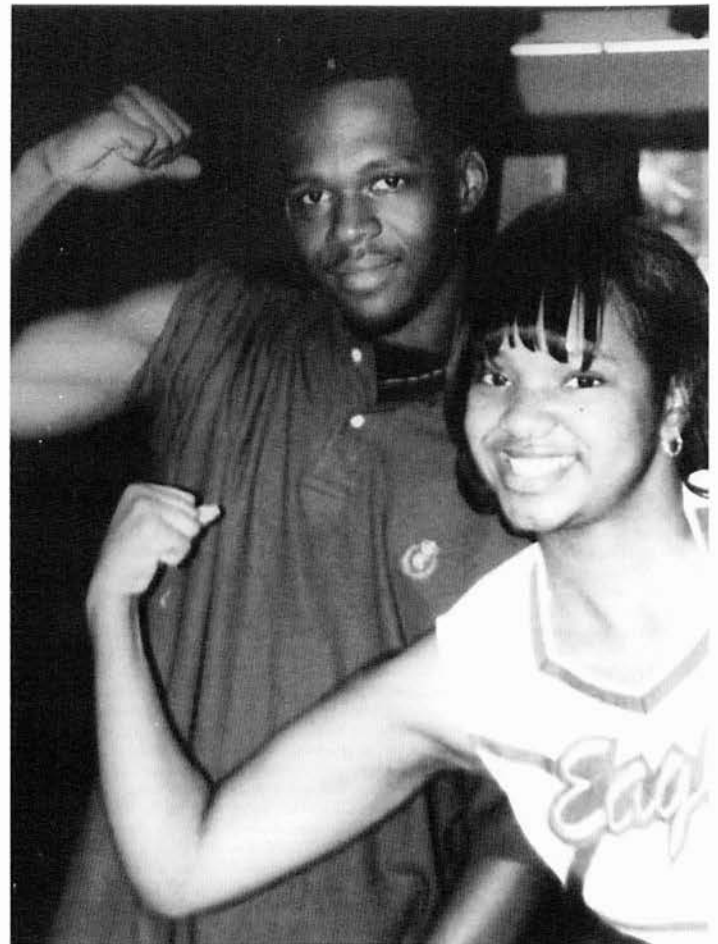

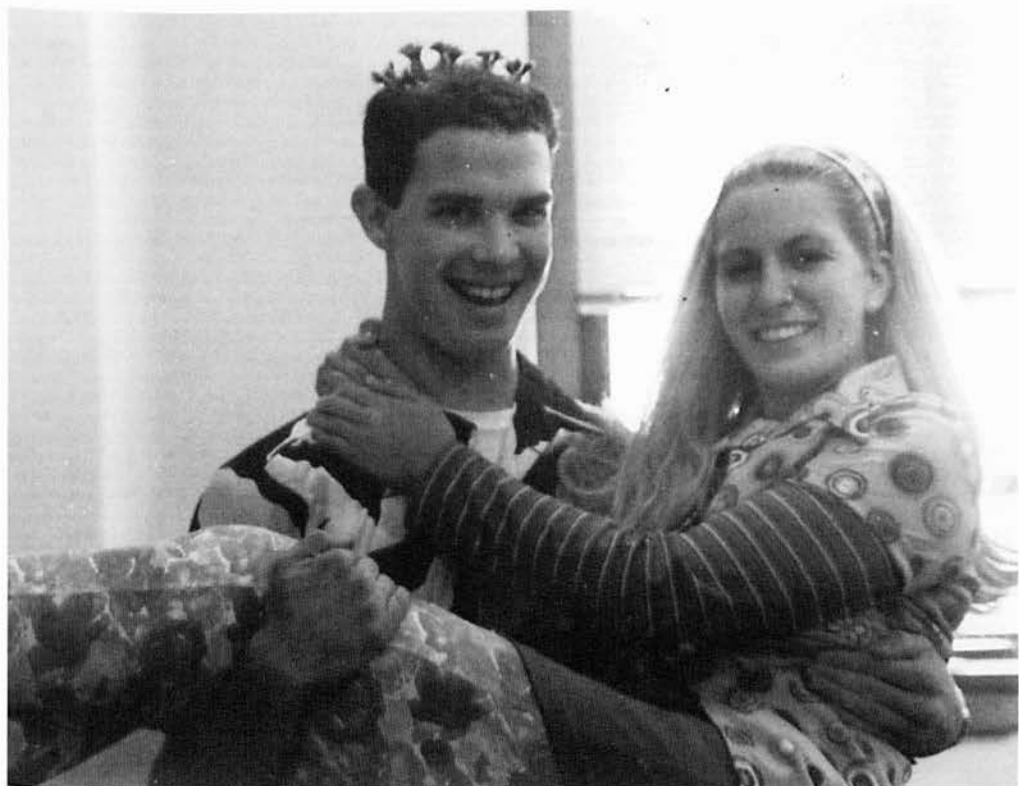

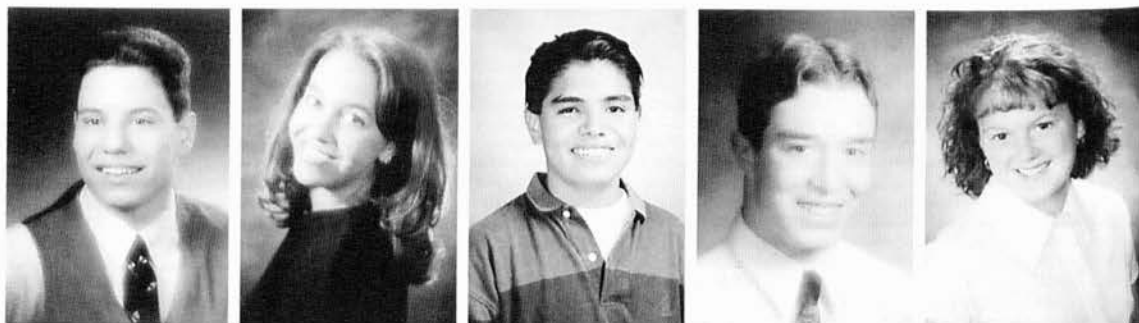

"I was cheering at a game and my hair weave came off and fell on the floor," Cooper said.

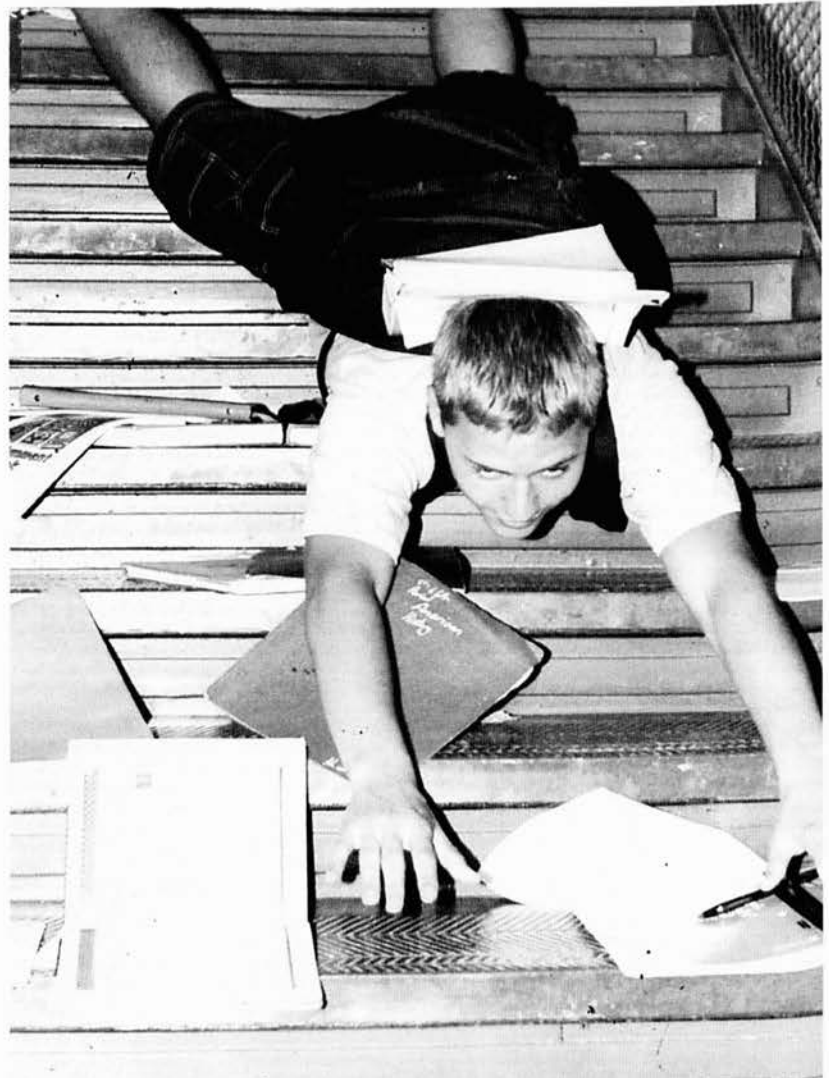
She didn't even notice it and when she did there was nothing for her to do but pick it up and continue cheering.

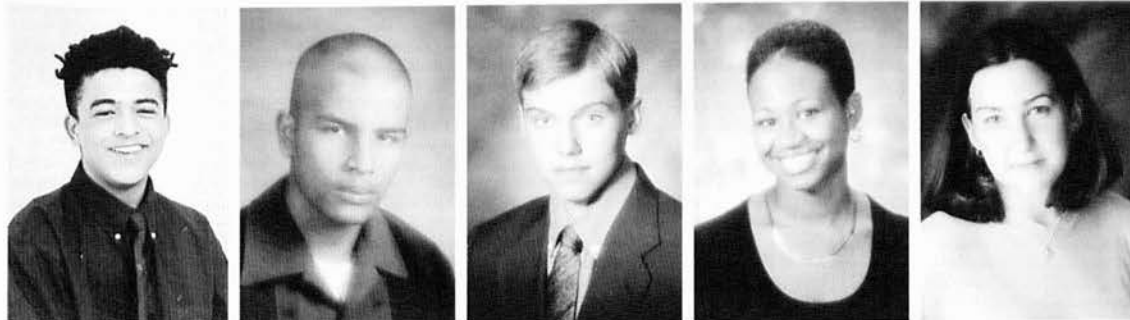

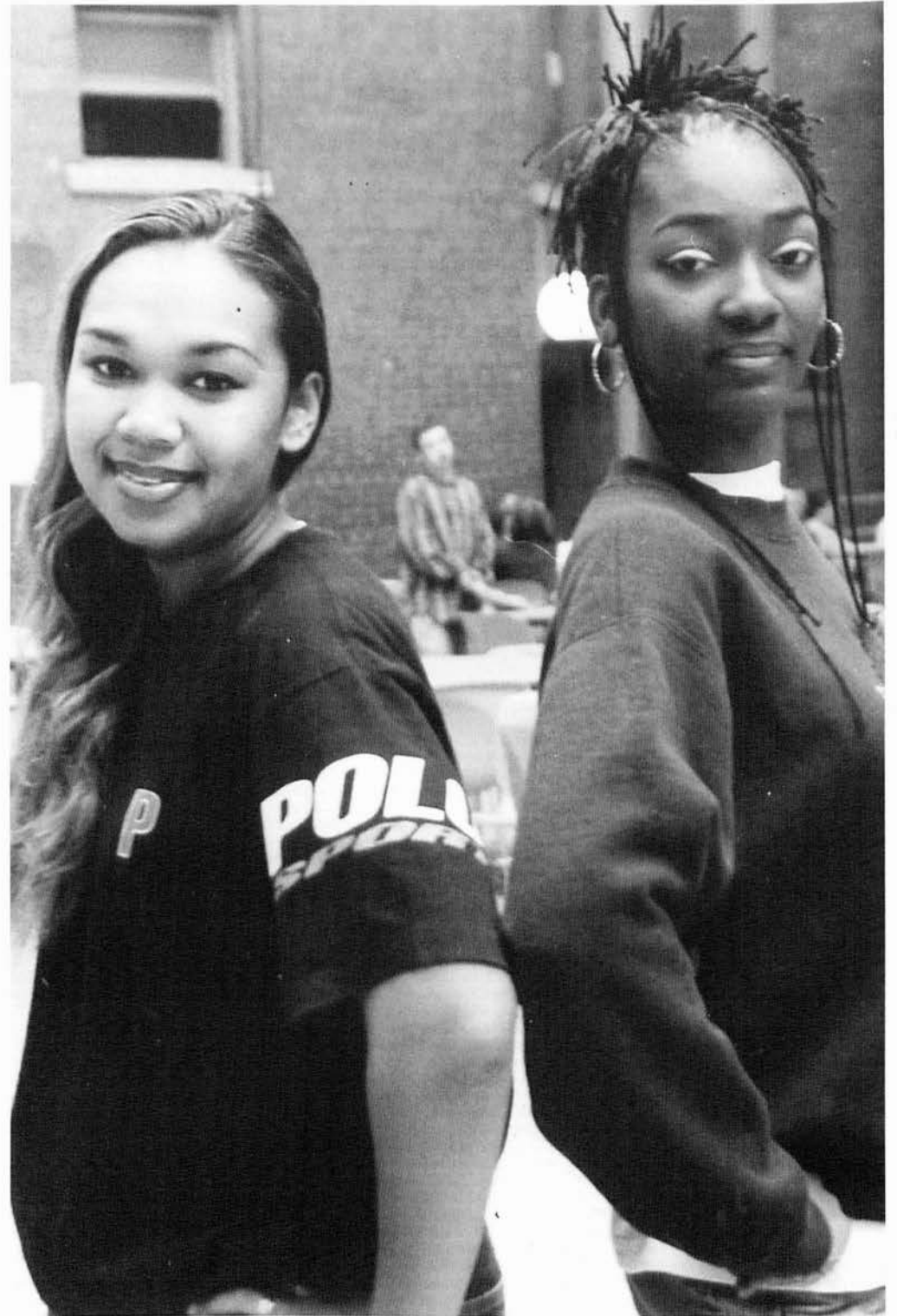

Students found many ways to deal with these problems. For example, many helped each other out by organizing study groups, collaborating on English themes and sleeping.

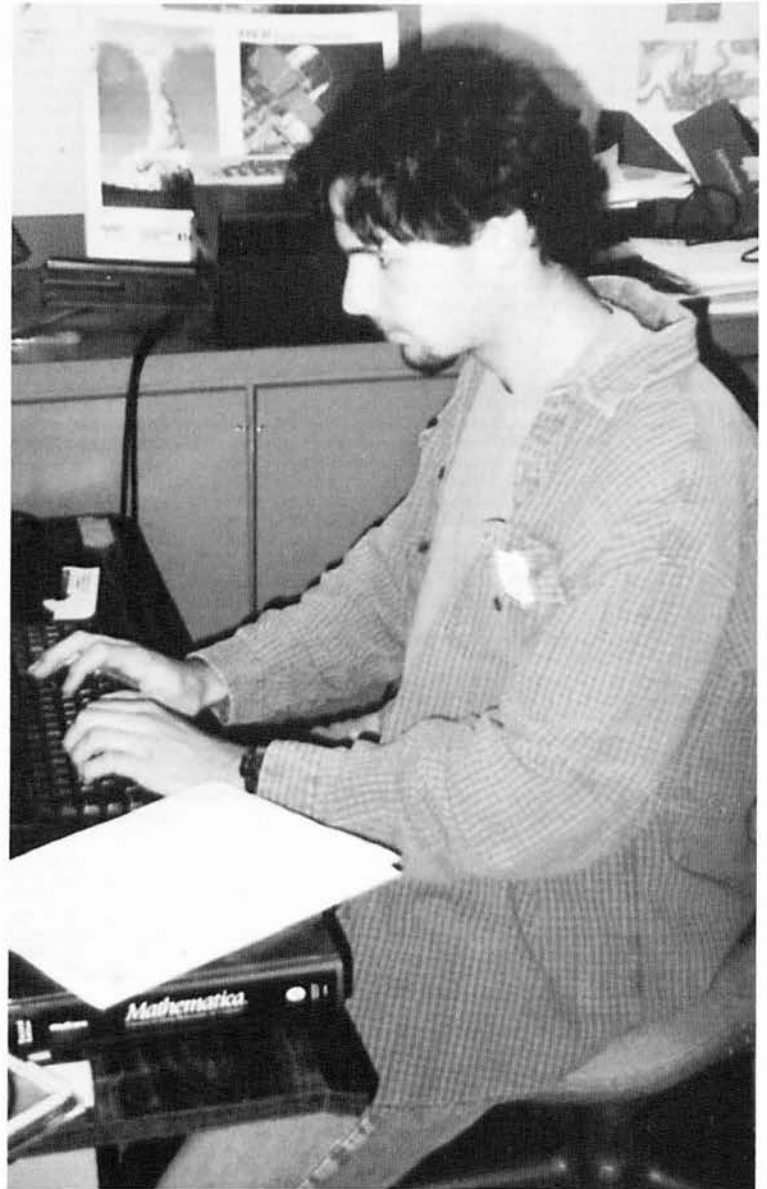
"My favorite way to deal with stress was to sit around talking, eating and laughing with my closest friends," senior Lauren Pettit said.

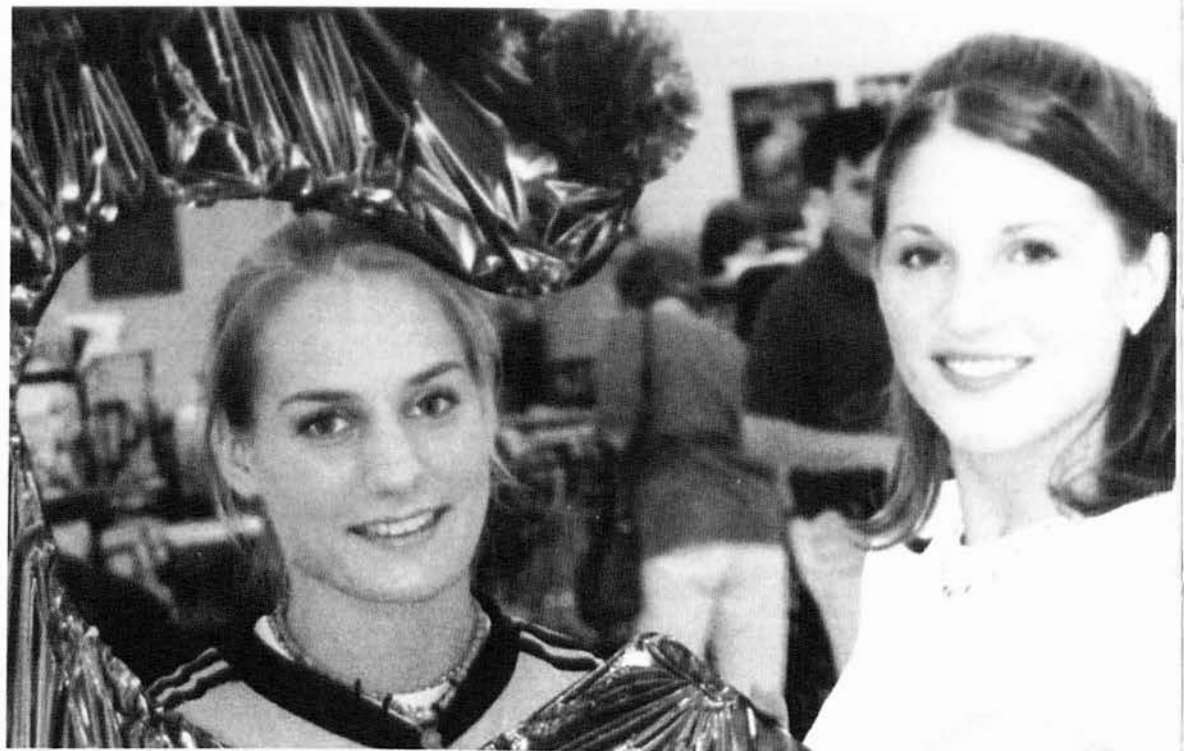
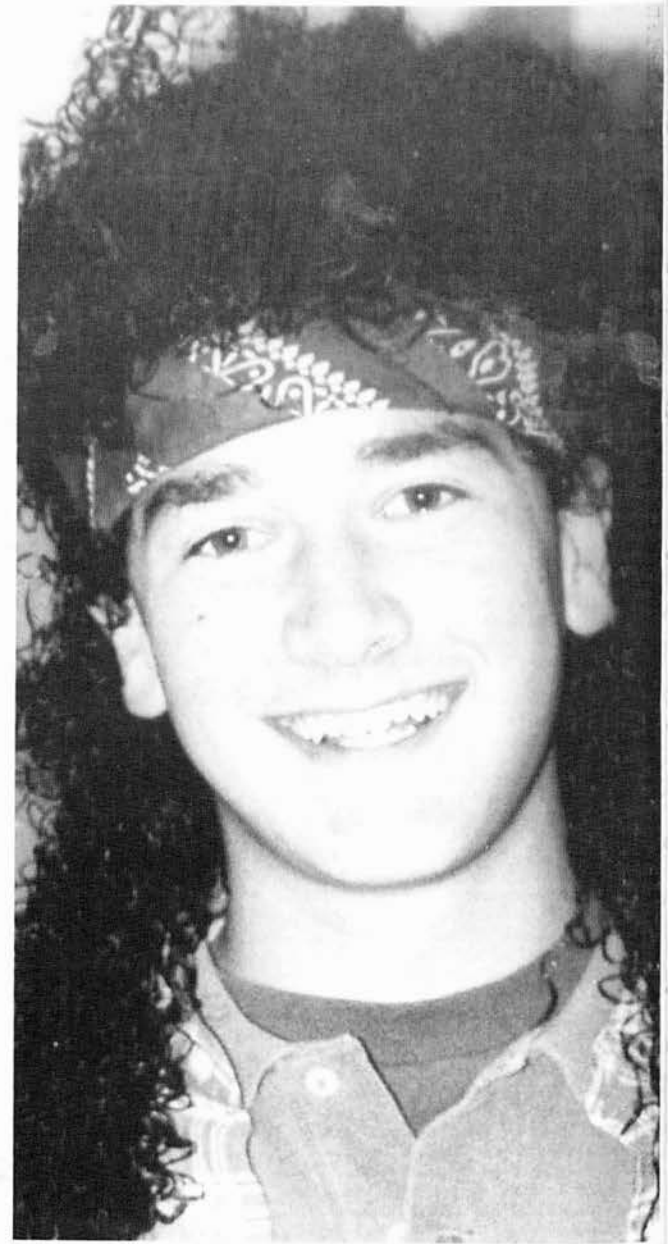
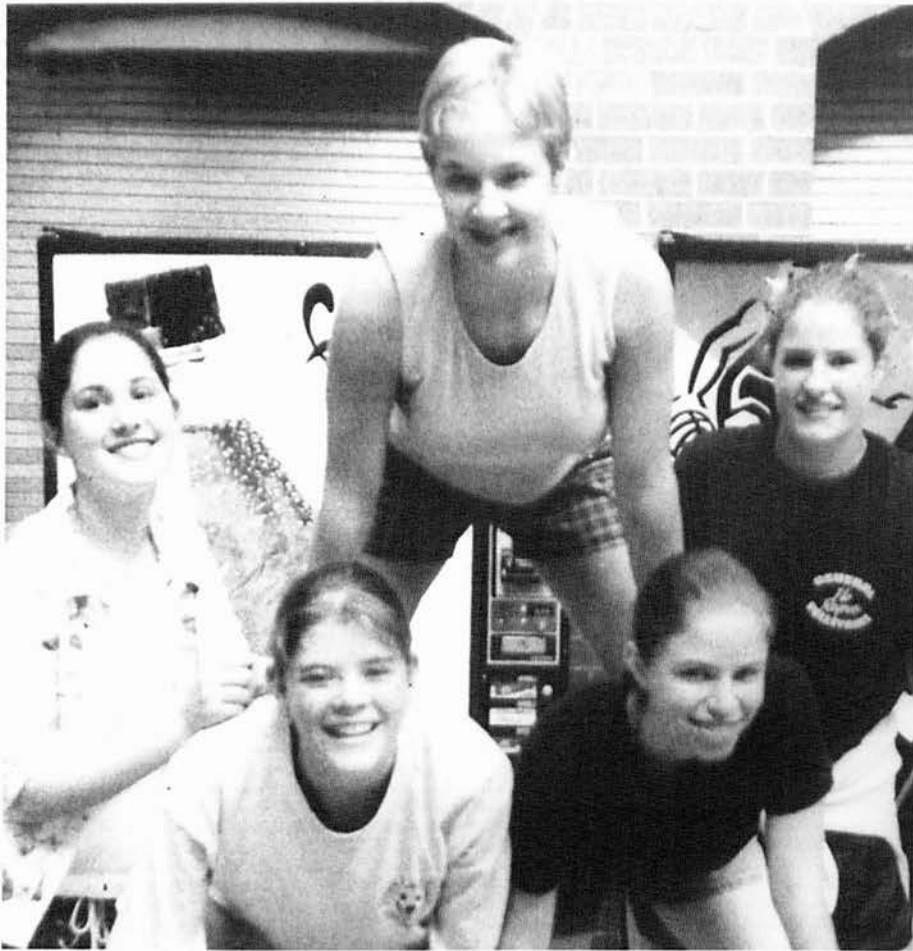
The officers and representatives planned many new events this year. These events included field goal kicks at football games, a senior class picnic and many other fundraising activities.

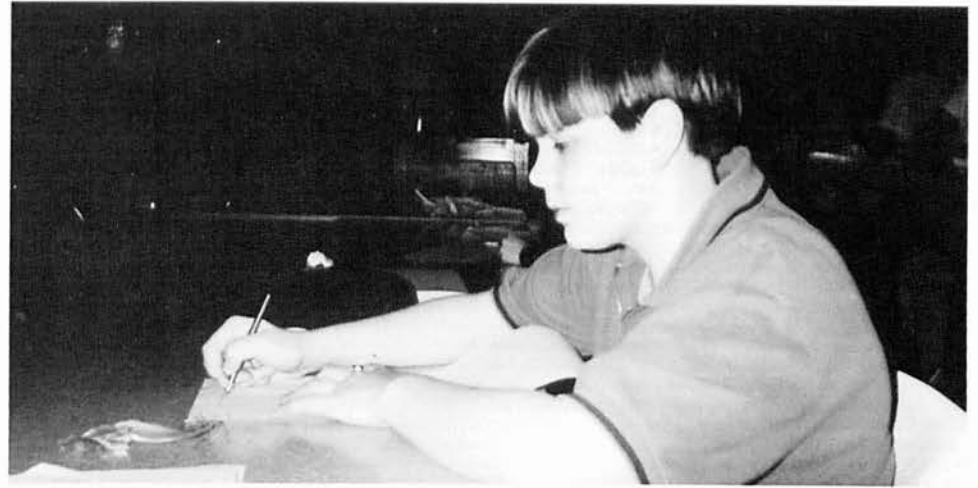

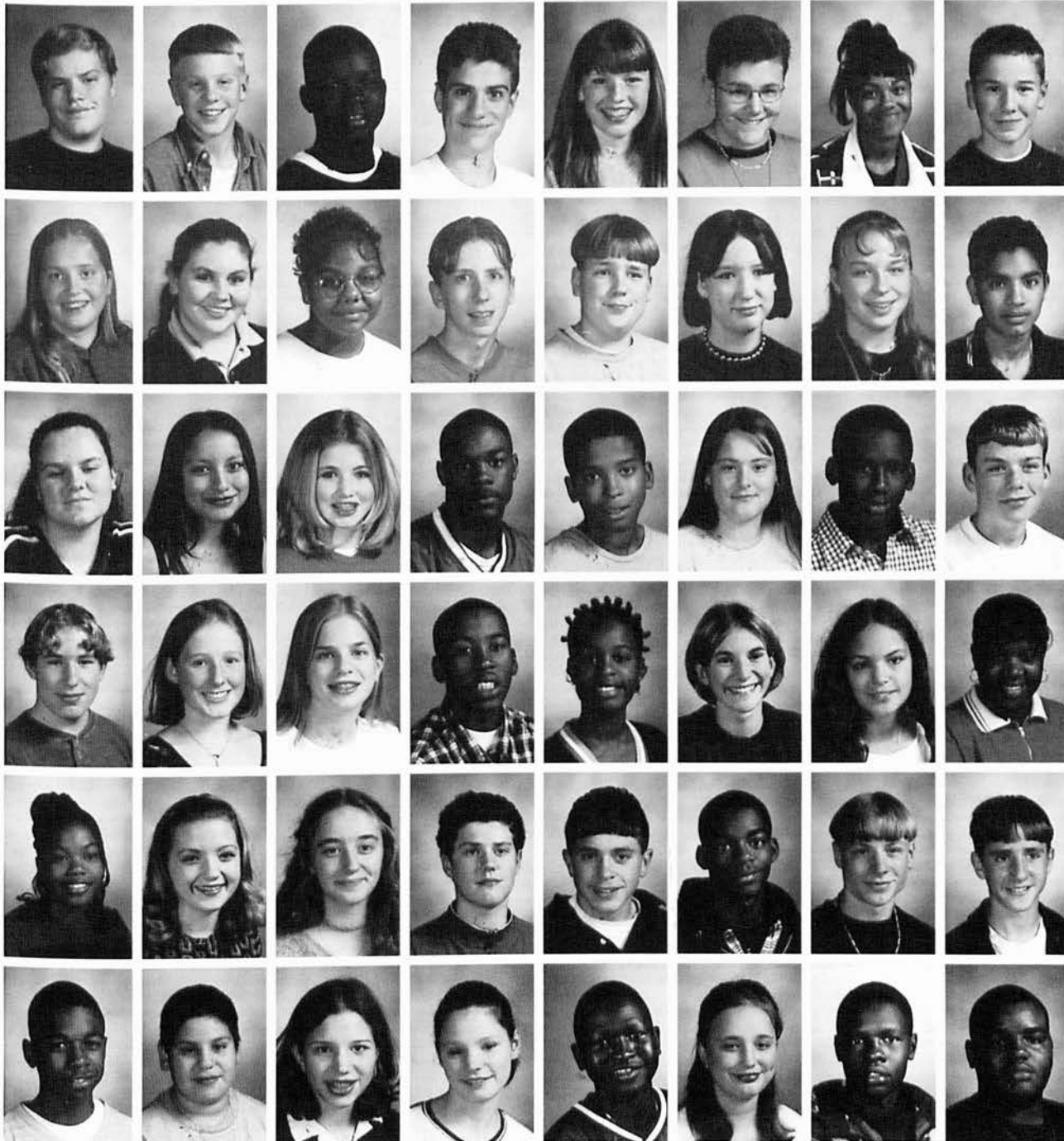

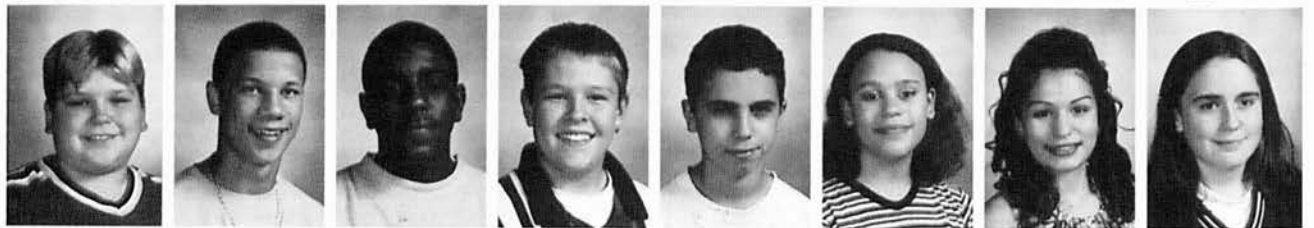

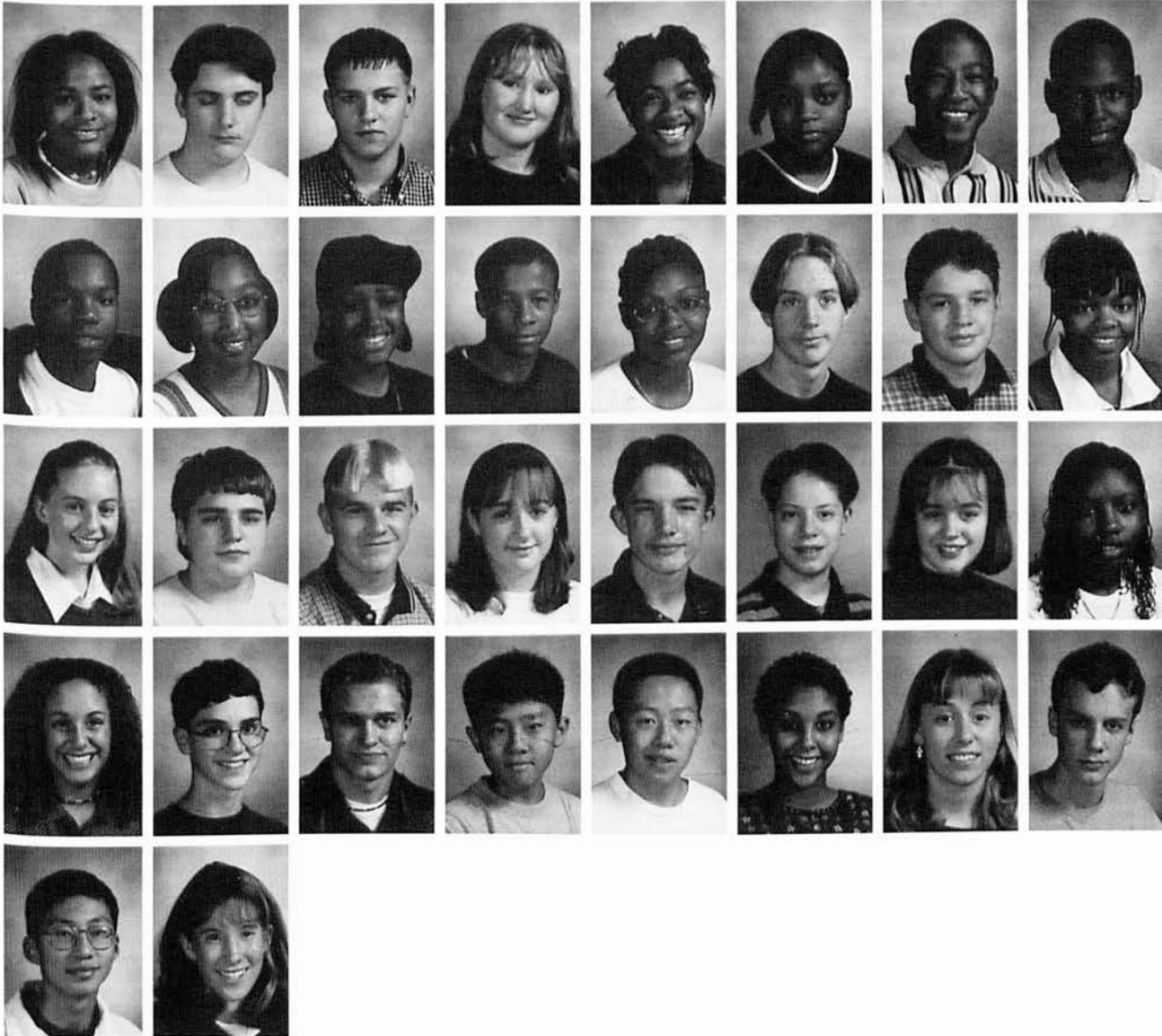

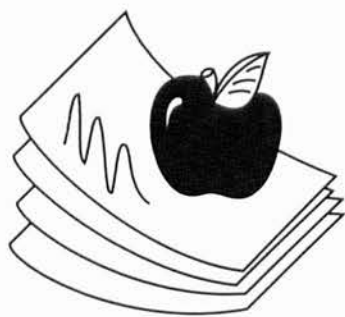

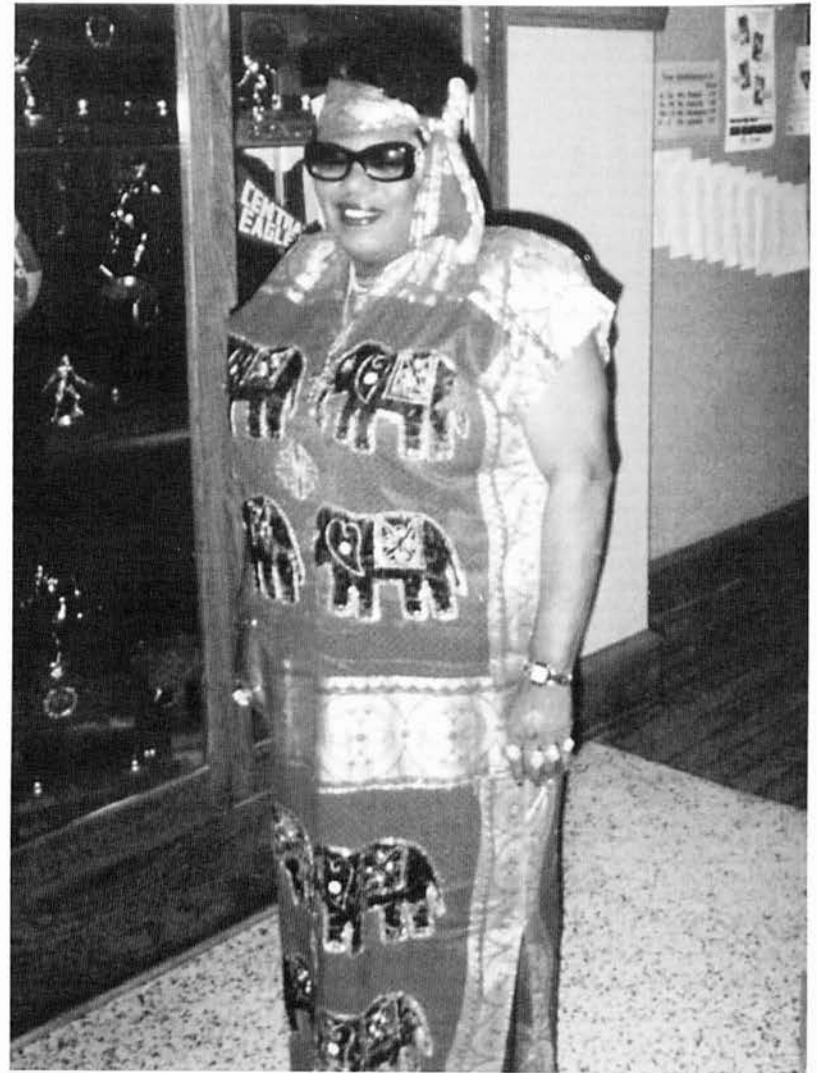

Homecoming was a momentous occasion. The bright lights and Las Vegas scene made it a night to remember.

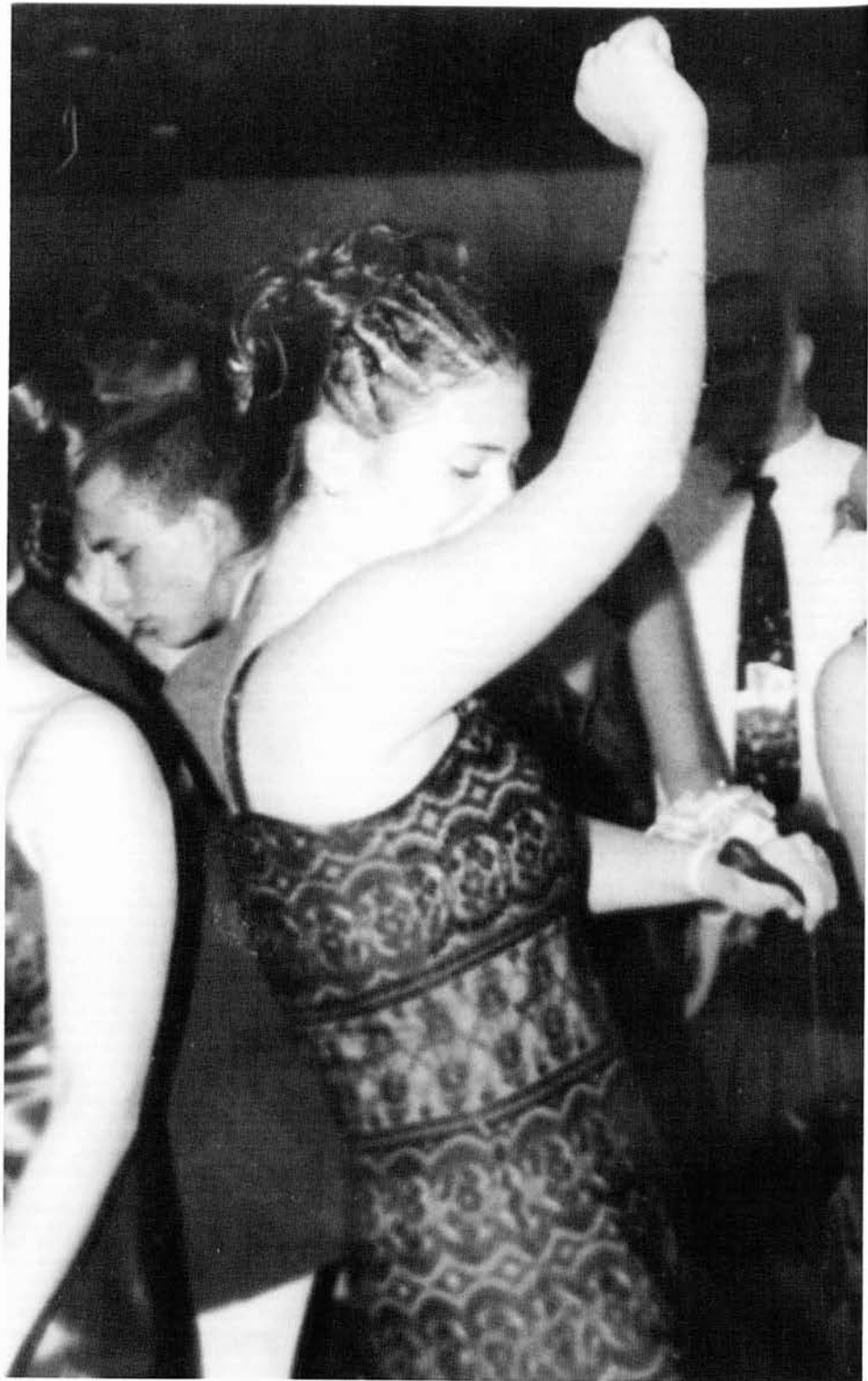

"This was my most memorable Homecoming," Brandon Williams said. "It was a total shock. I guess now I can say I won something."

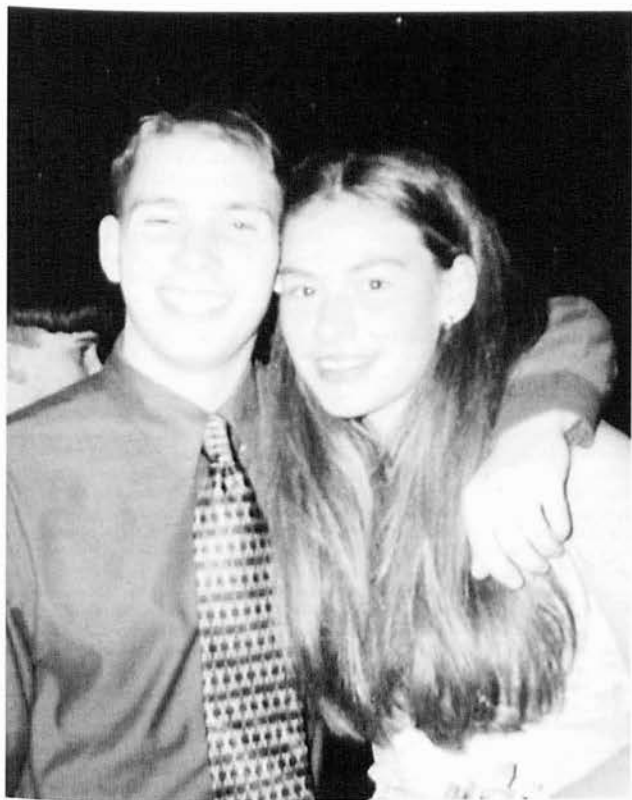

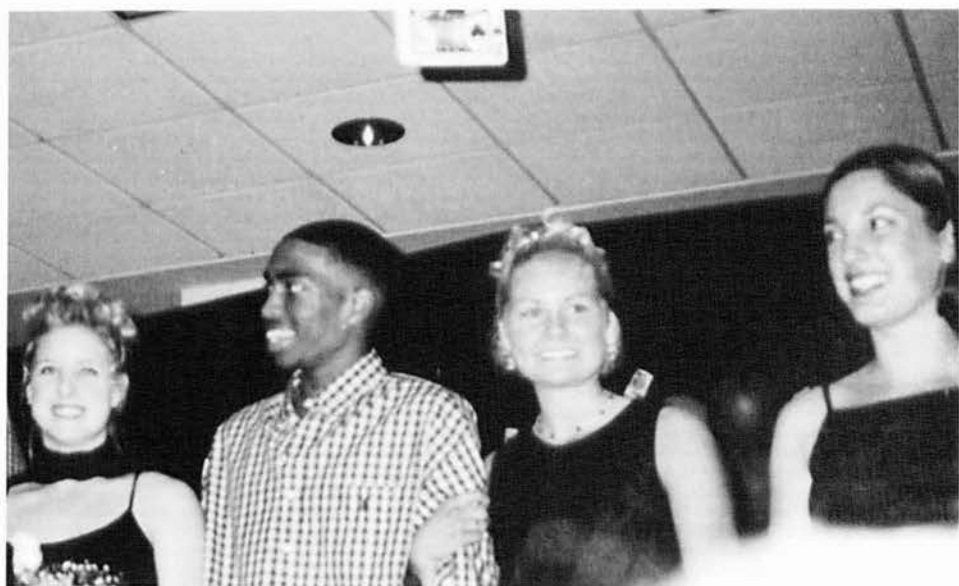

"This was an outstanding group," Judy Storm, sponsor, said. "I was very fortunate to have had a president serve a second term for the first time."

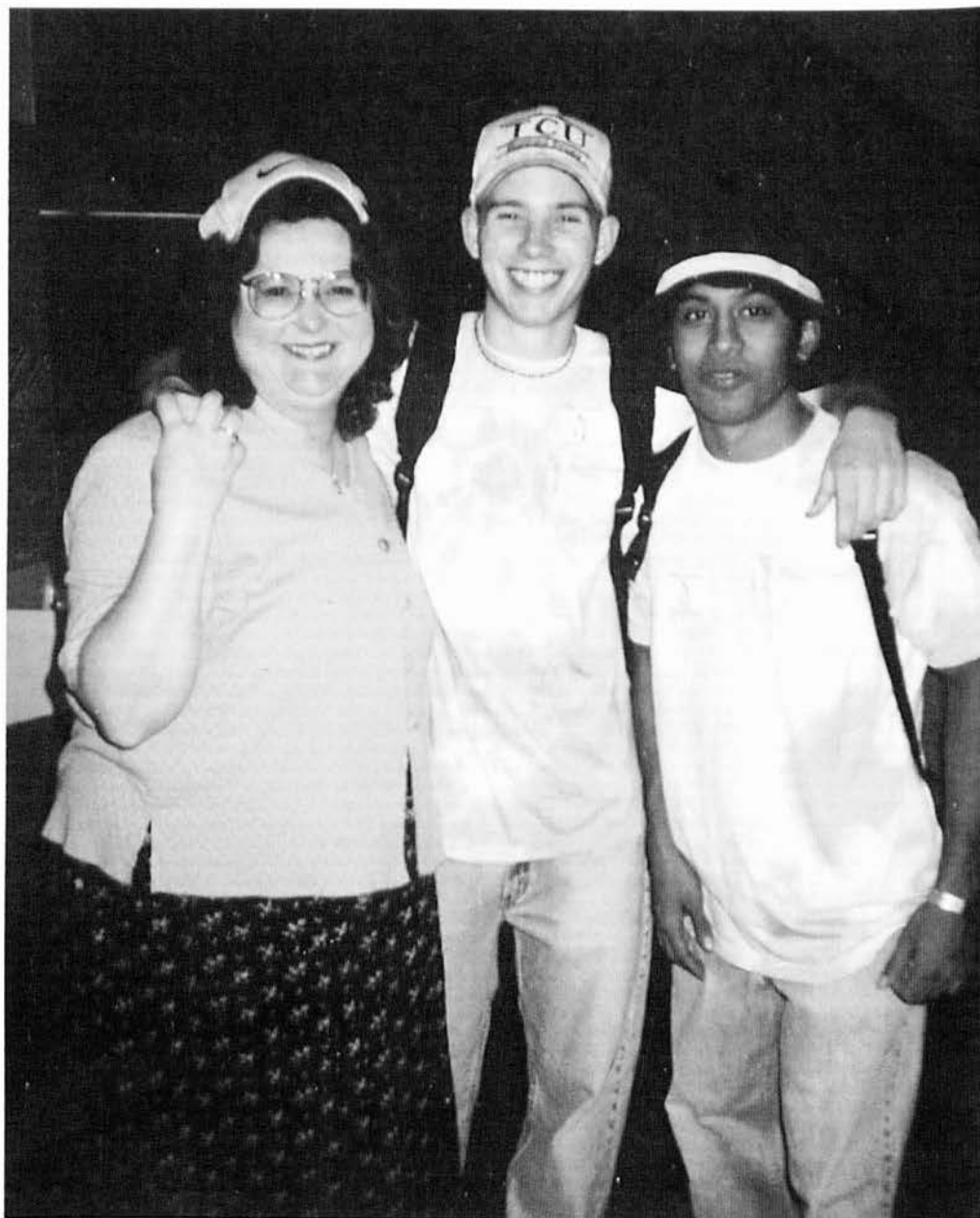

Student council also sponsored canned food drives, a car bash and the Red Cross blood drive.

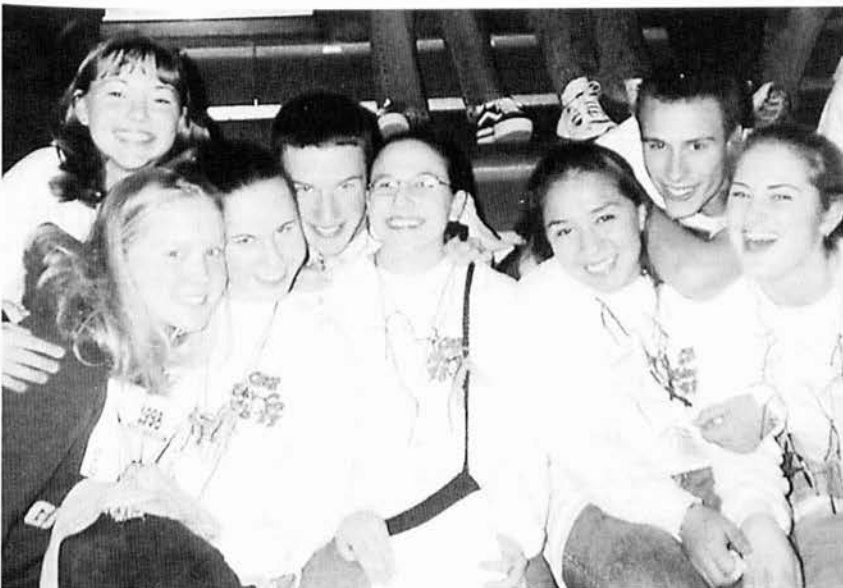

National Honor Society members made a big difference this year by changing not only themselves, but also their community.

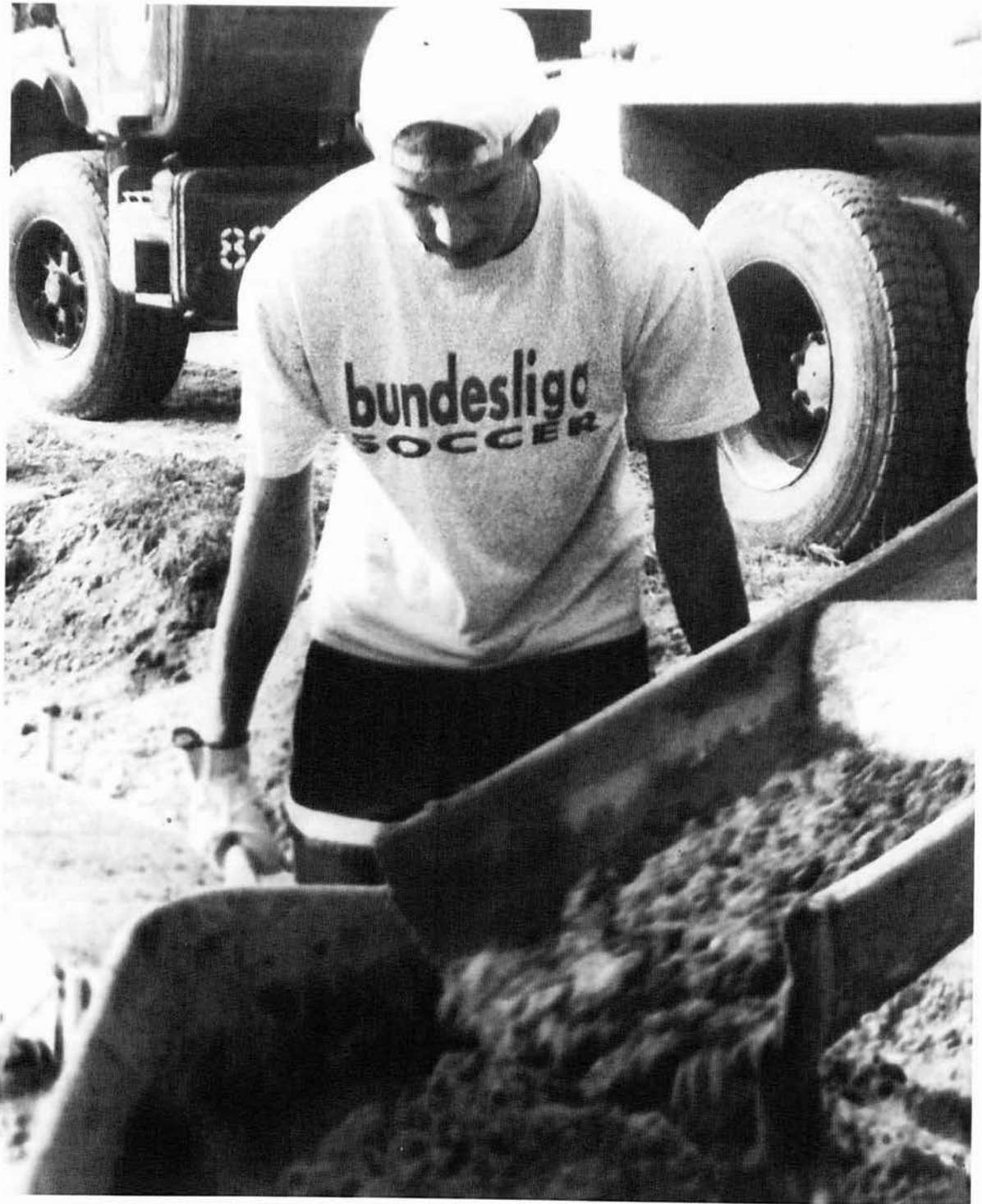
"NHS is a recognition of academic, character and community service history," John Waterman, advisor, said.

The main topics for this year were foreign policy with Russia and capital punishment. Under the guidance of Kris Jonyka, the debate team competed in tournaments almost every week.

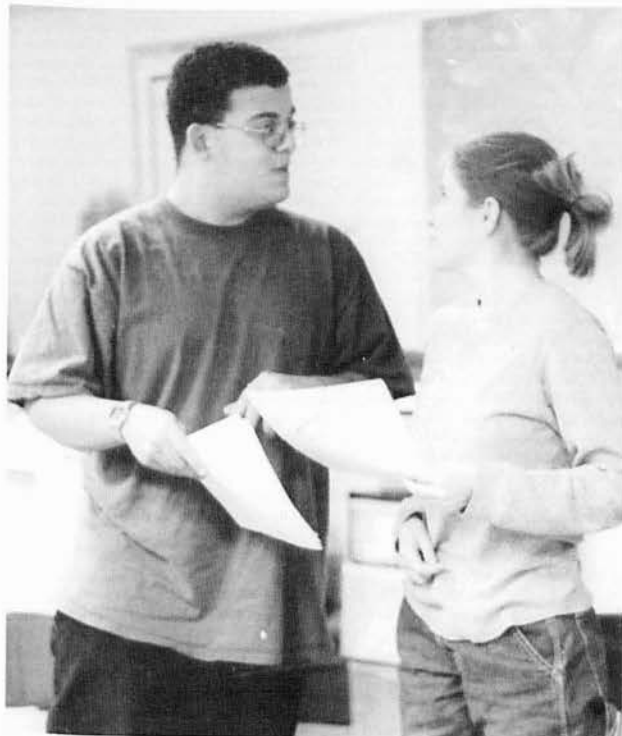

Color Guard produced a different look, movement, color and overall effect to the music played by the band.

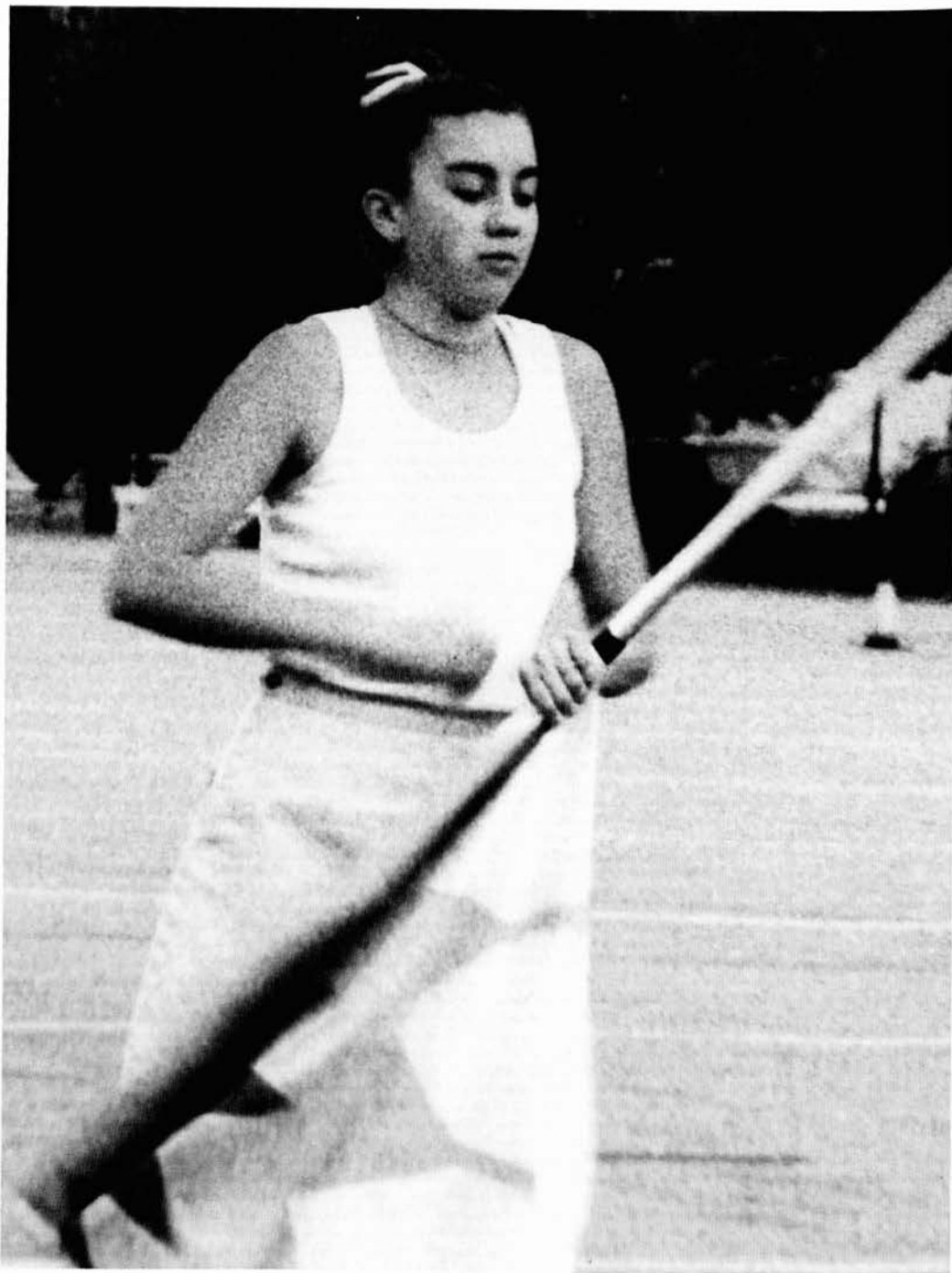

"Color guard consisted of ten girls who really did a good job," Mr. Wilger said "They had good attitudes and wanted to do the best they could."

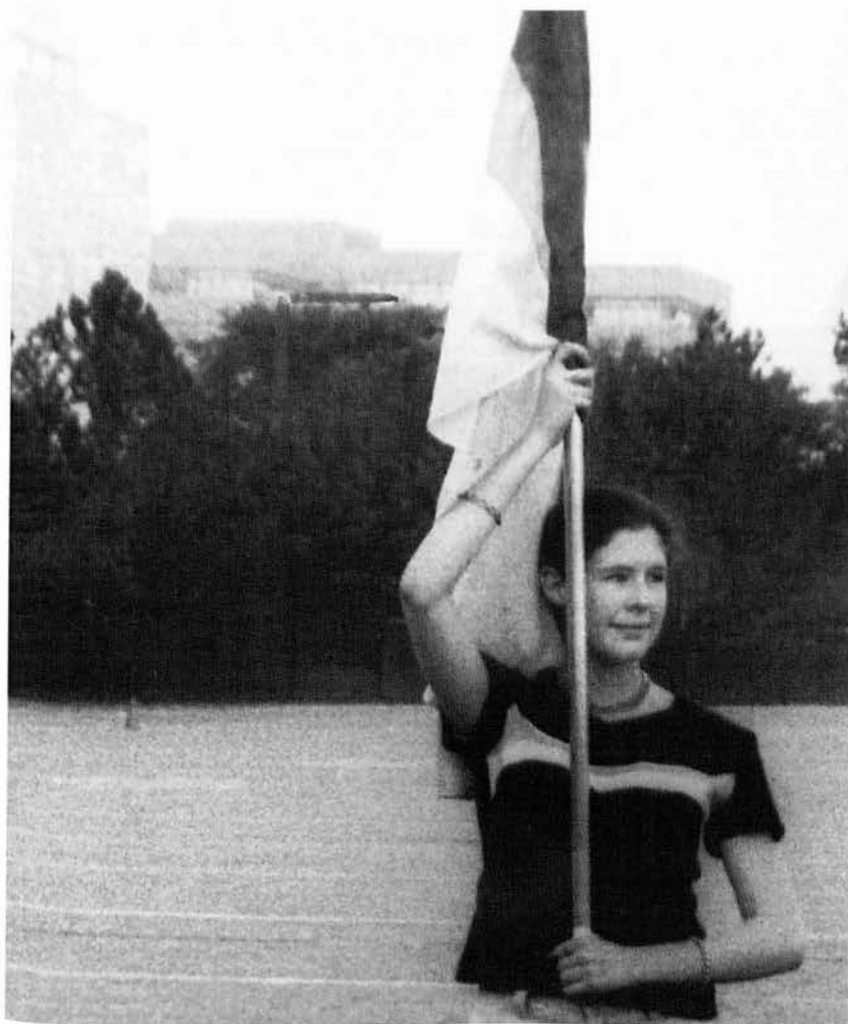

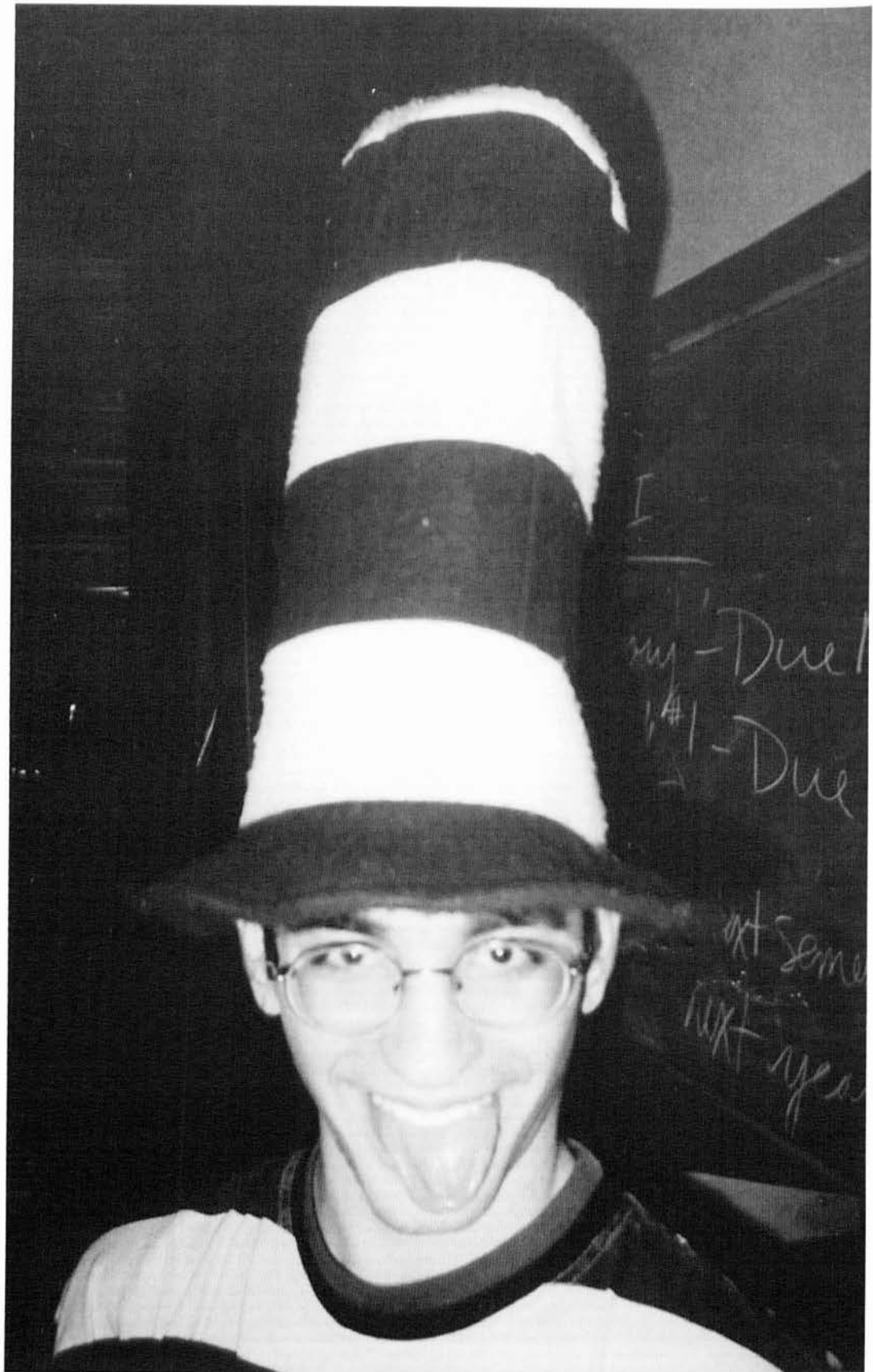
The Register staff members spent many long nights this year staring at computers trying to achieve the perfect layout, Advisor Matt Deabler said.

The Register staff produced nine newspapers, which included reports on everything from reviews and sports highlights to hard core news.

"The format of the newspaper was enlarged this year to make it more challenging," Deabler said.

The Register obtained nine new computers from the combined proceeds of advertisement sales from the *O-Book* and *the Register*. The new technology helped the staff strive for its tradition of excellence as one of the top newspapers around.

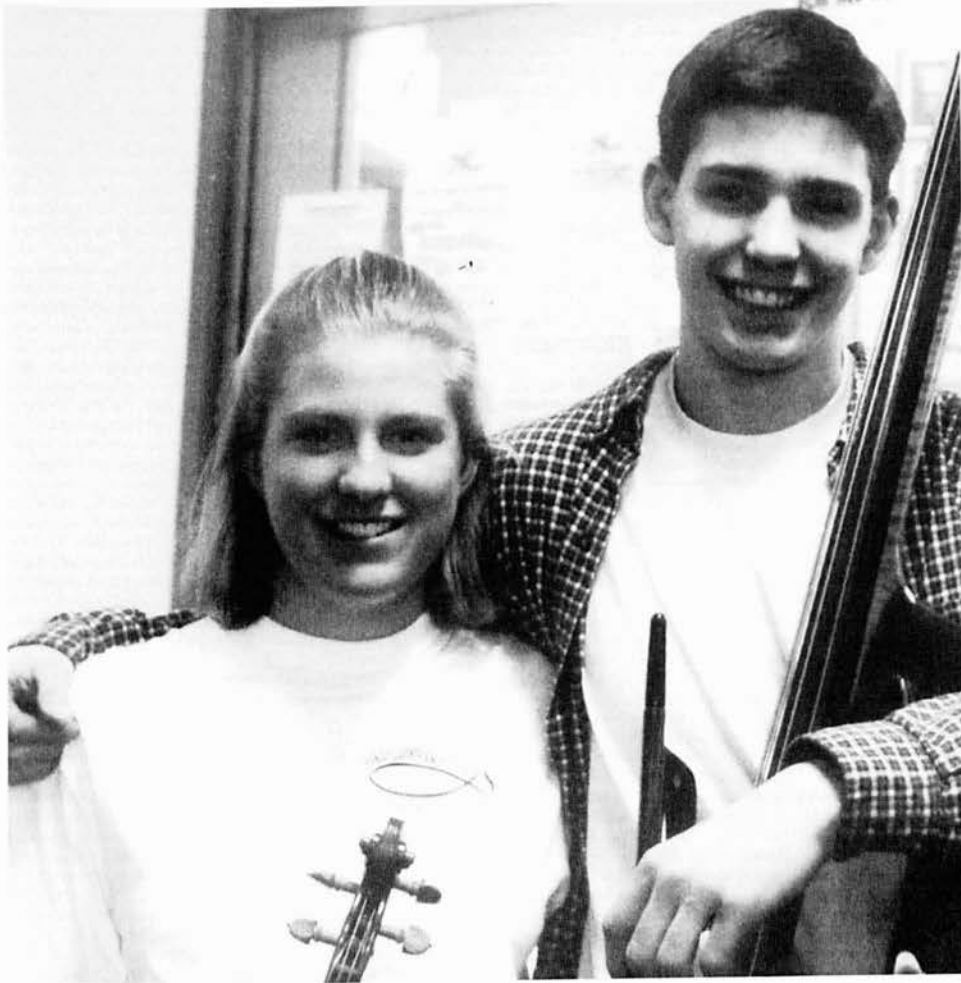

Band members practiced three times a week during zero hour, Monday nights and Saturday mornings.

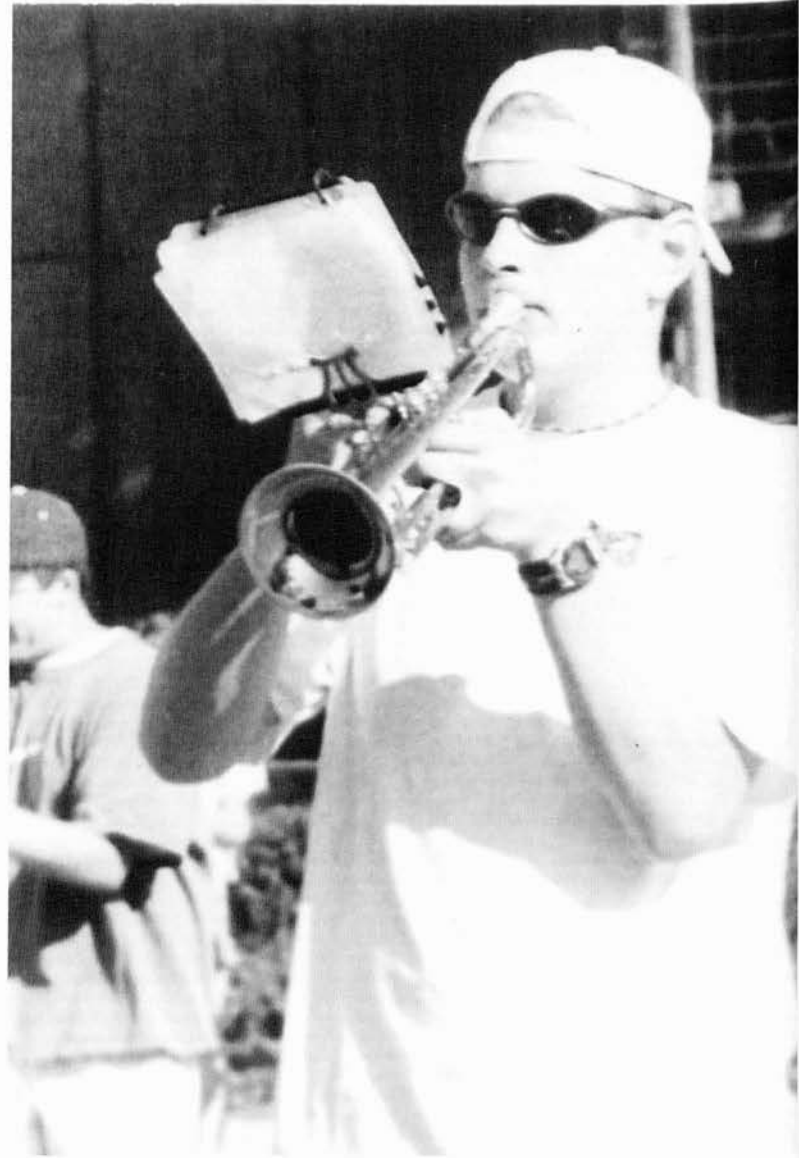

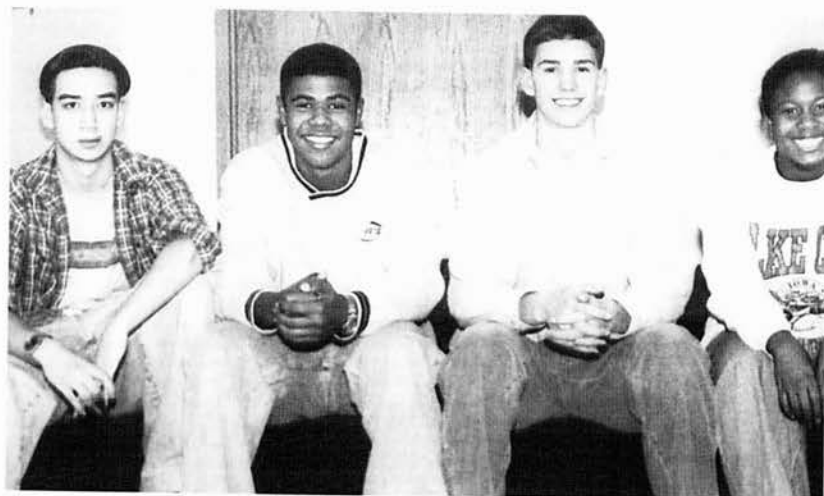
All-State was a state-wide musical competition made up of the best high school musicians from Nebraska, Lyn Bouma, vocal director, said.

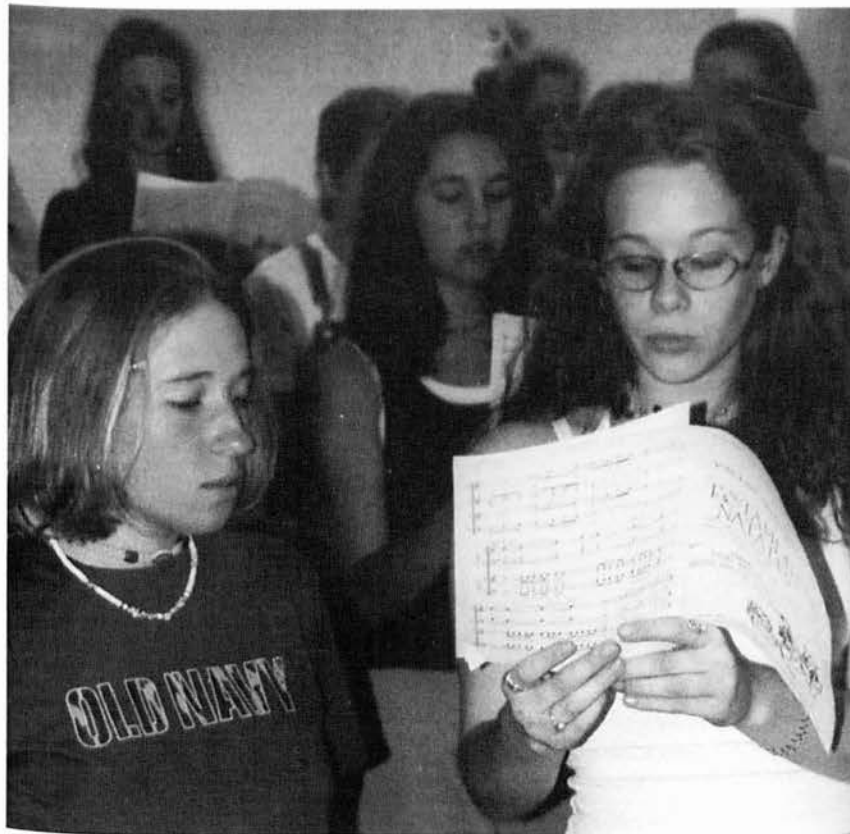

"This ensemble was probably the best CHS Singers group since I've been at Central," Bouma said.

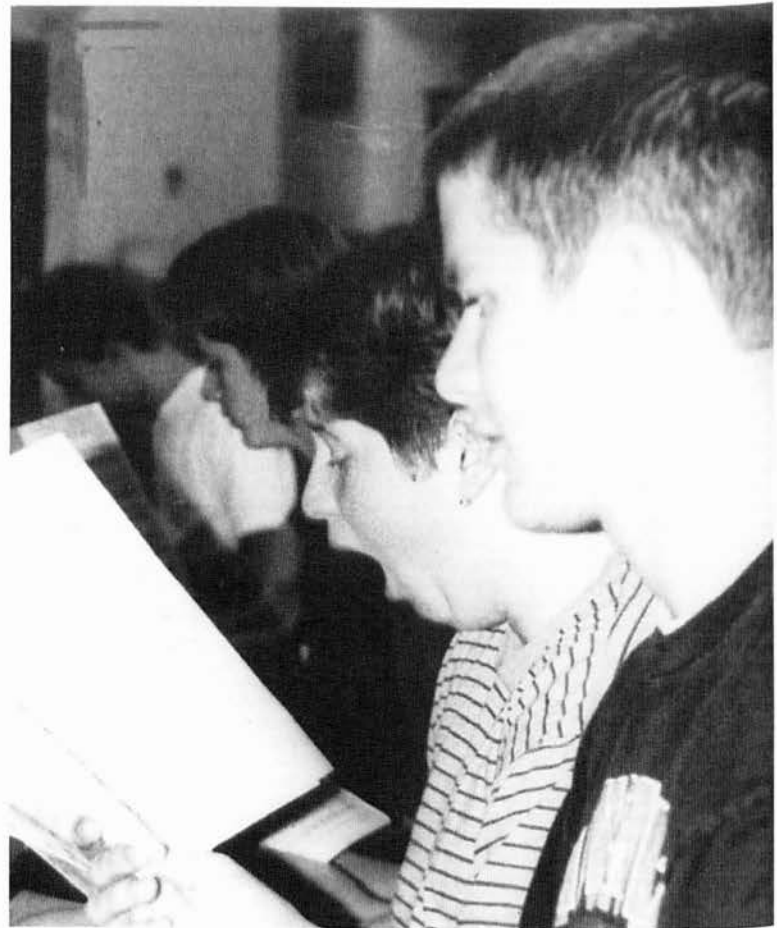
The select choir ensemble was made up of both female and male juniors and seniors, who also had to be members of A Cappella.

Feelin' a little bit jazzy, baby? Well, you can rest assured that members of the Jazz Band perfected the art of being jazzy.

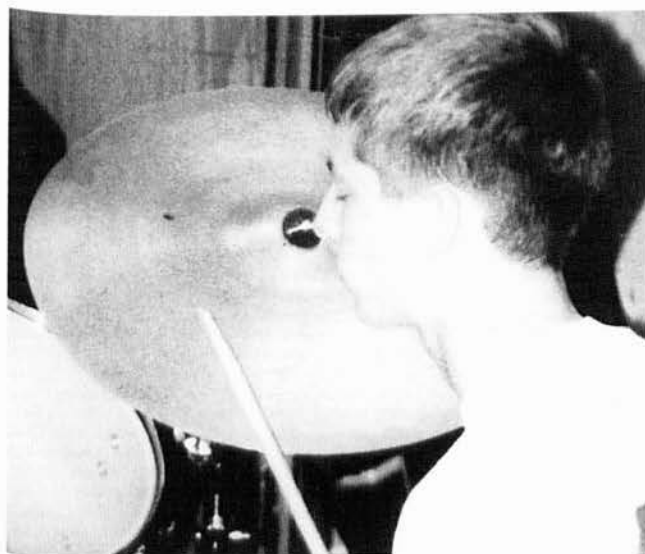
The group practiced every day to work on the basics of jazz music, in order to play it more stylistically.

"People came from miles around to see us," Pegi Georgeson, director, said. "It wasn't just a production for the student body, but for a variety of audiences."

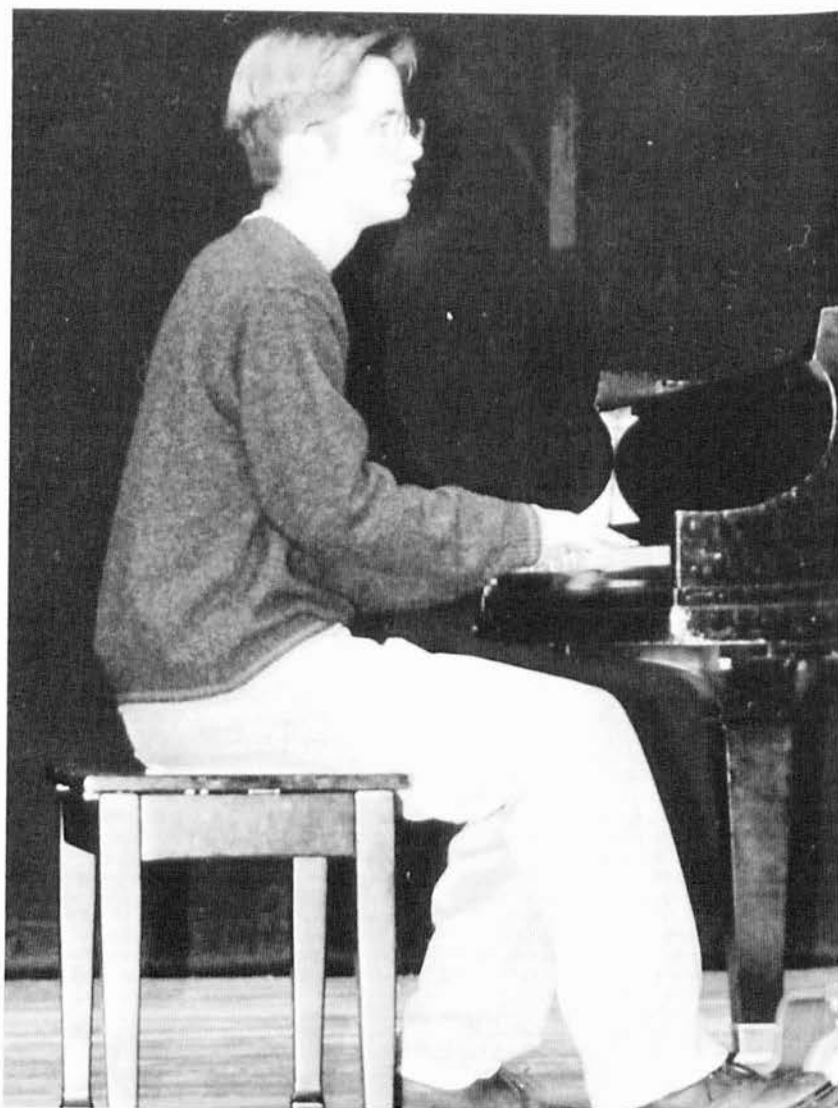
Acts had to be performance-ready by the time of auditions. Of the over 60 acts that tried out, 21 made it into the final show.

After only three weeks of fine-tuning the show, the final productions were performed on Feb. 19 and 20th, with two student matinees on the 18th.

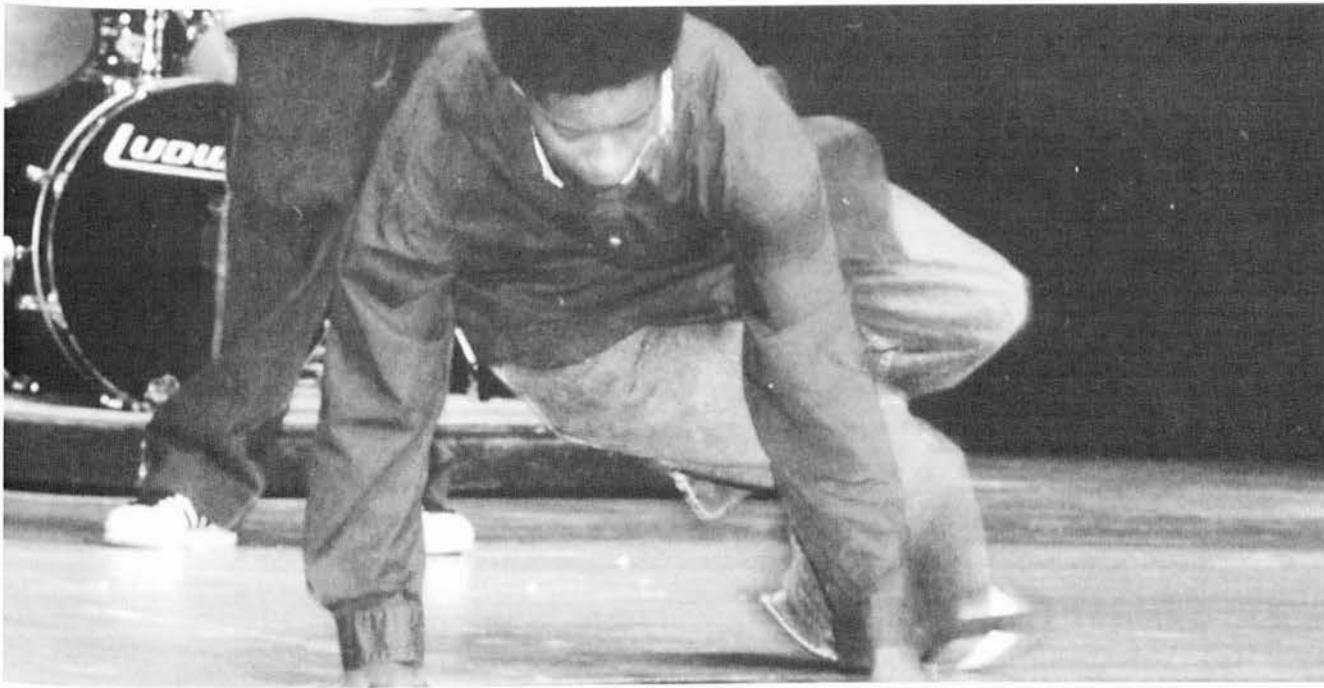
"Road Show was a great experience for everyone involved," Katrina Kerns(11) said. "It gave students an opportunity to show the school their special interests and talents."

"I felt all the new people added to this year's many accomplishments," *O-Book* Editor-in-Chief Jane Swirzinski(12) said.

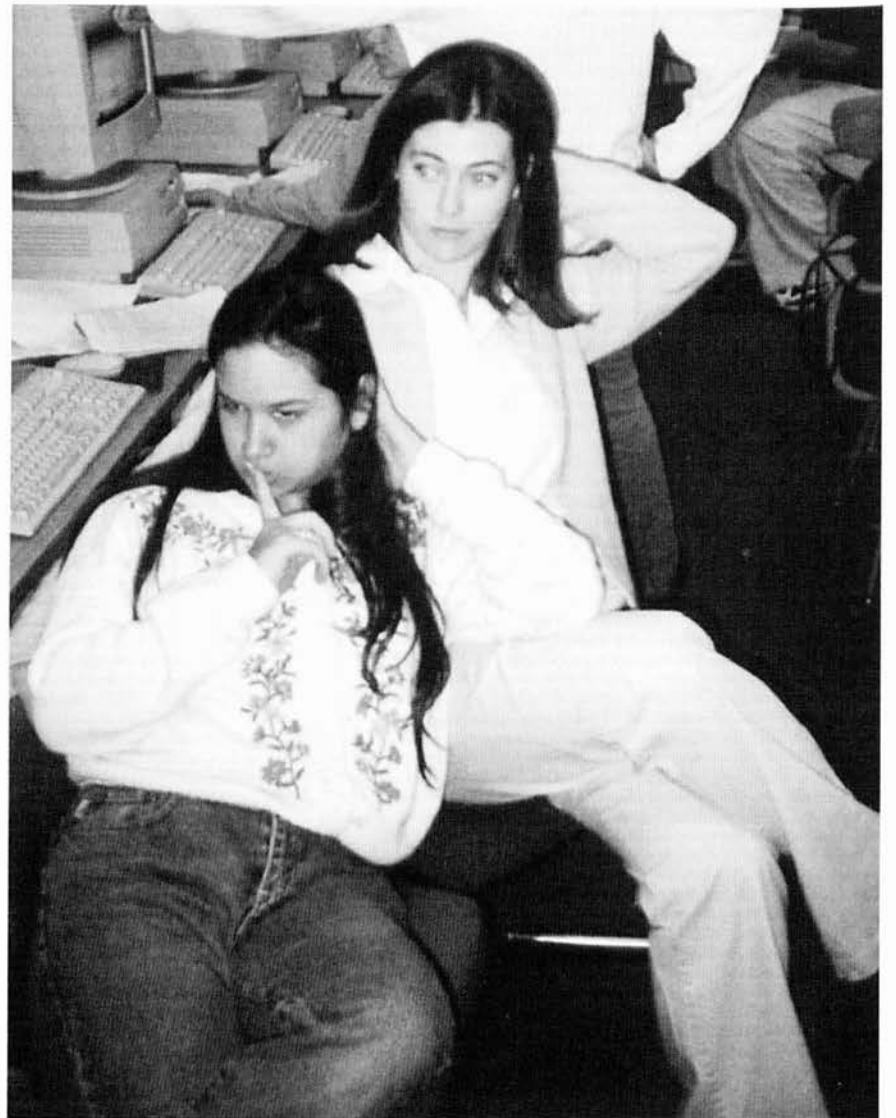
A larger staff enabled the *O-Book* to do more and opened up many options.

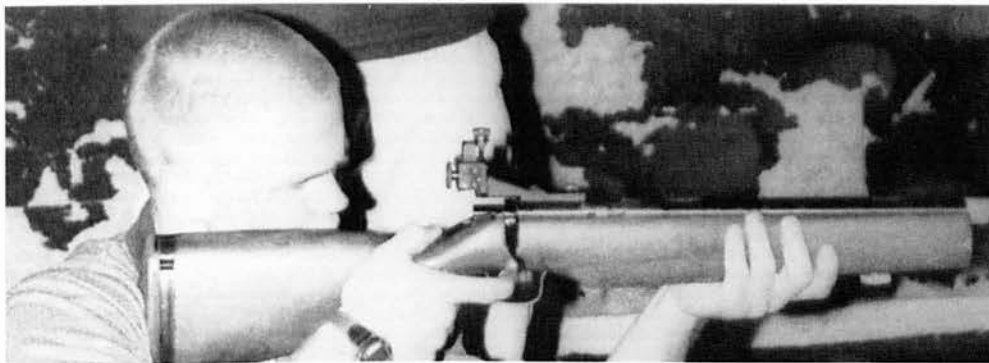
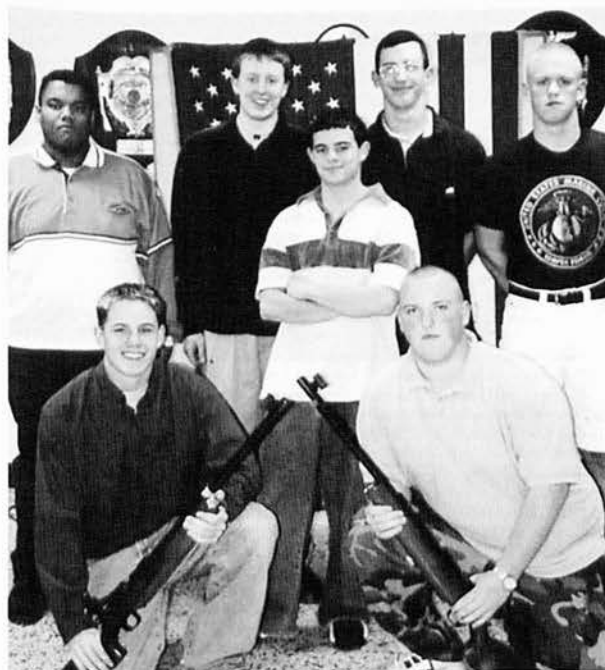
With a pull of the trigger, this year's Rifle Team exploded through local high school opposition.

"This years' group definitely had more dedication than groups in years past," Mahoney said.

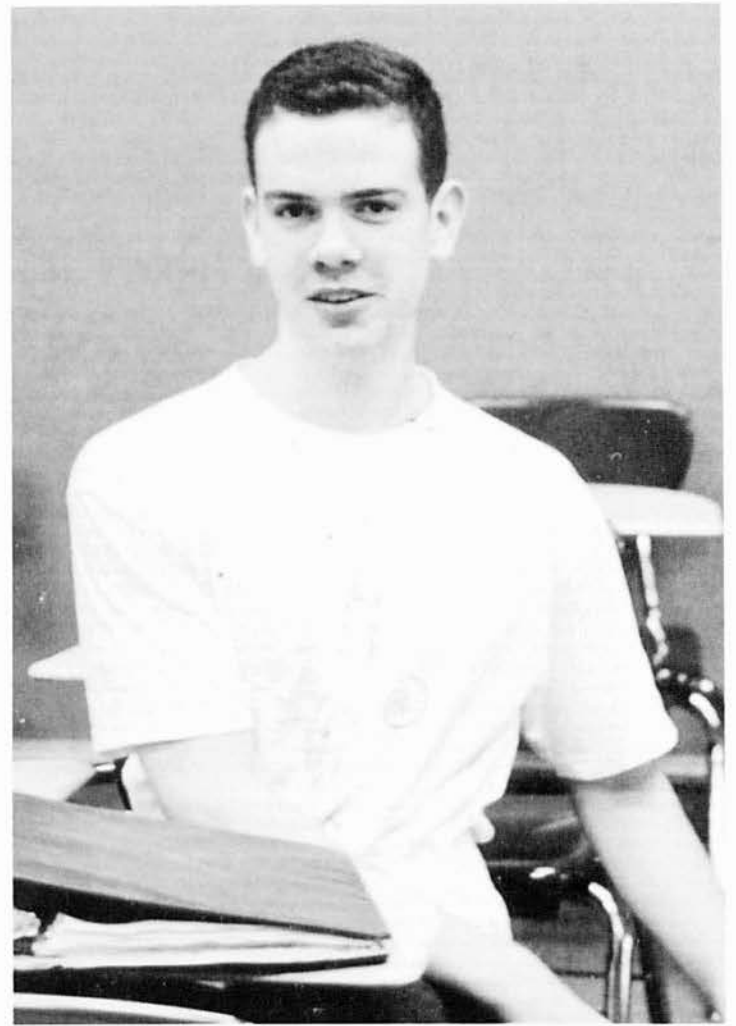
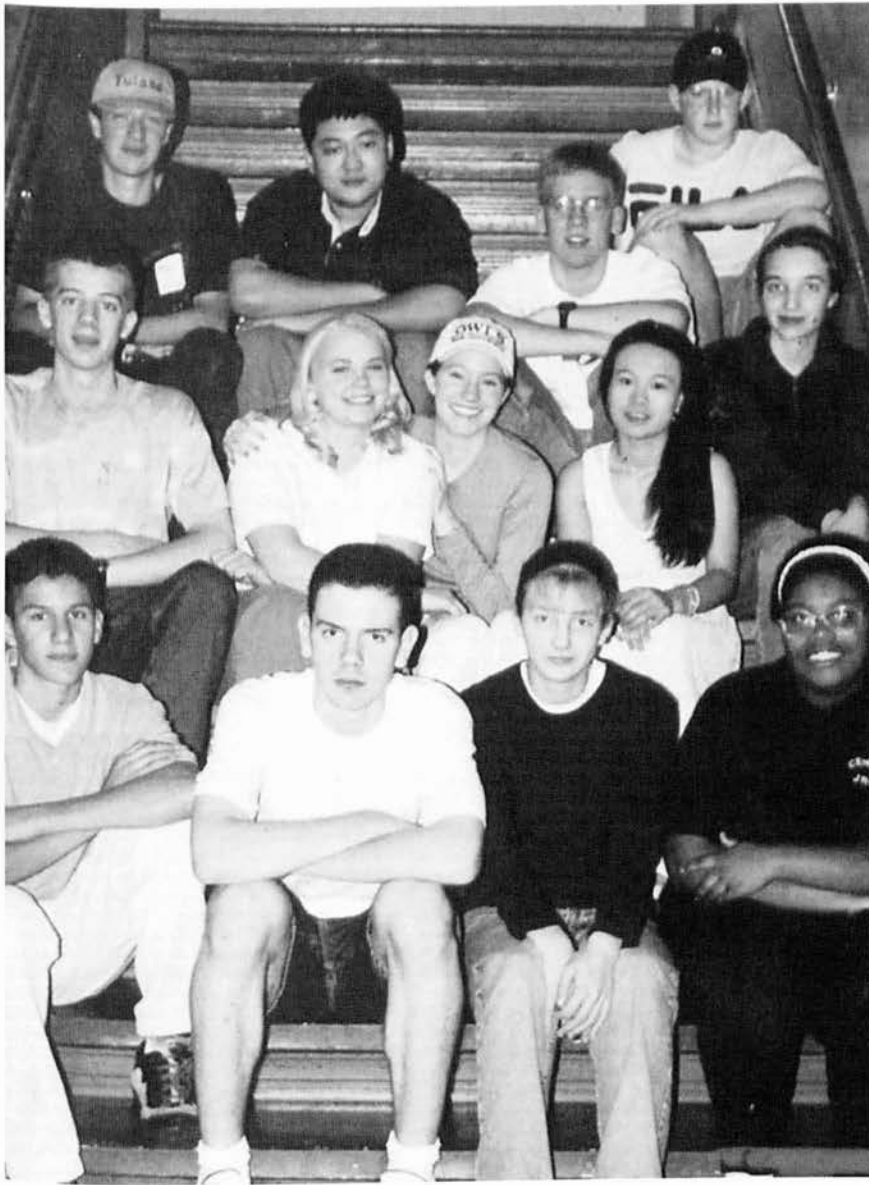
The main focus of the year was to score high enough to make it to the State Competition and place first in the Superquiz.

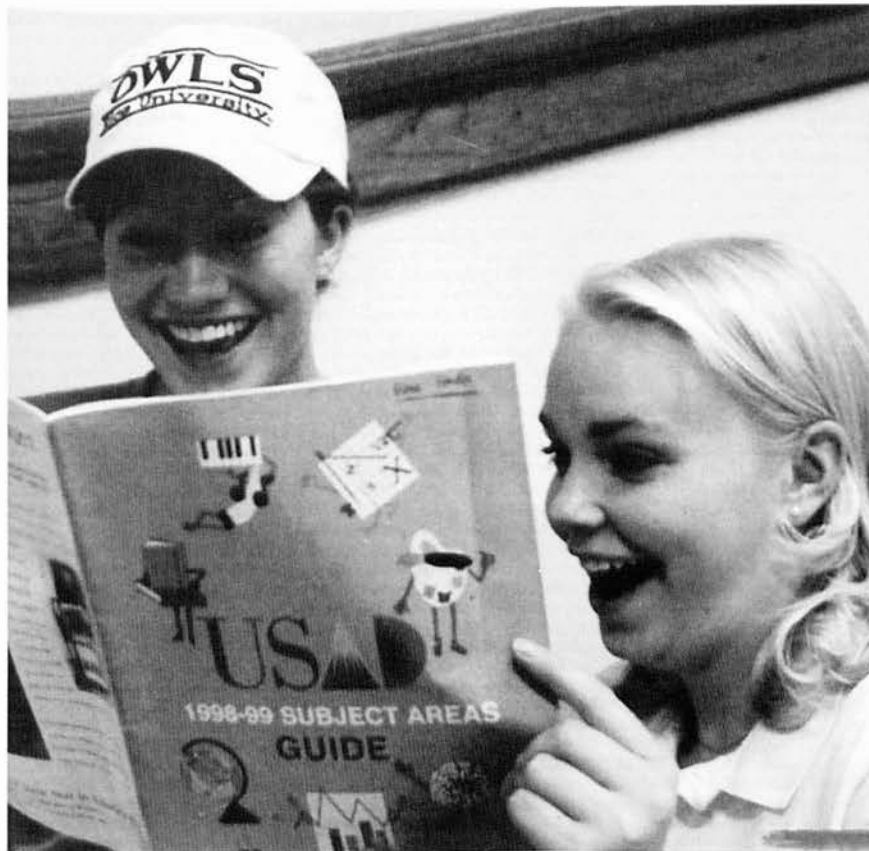

Spanish Club Participates in Cultural Activities

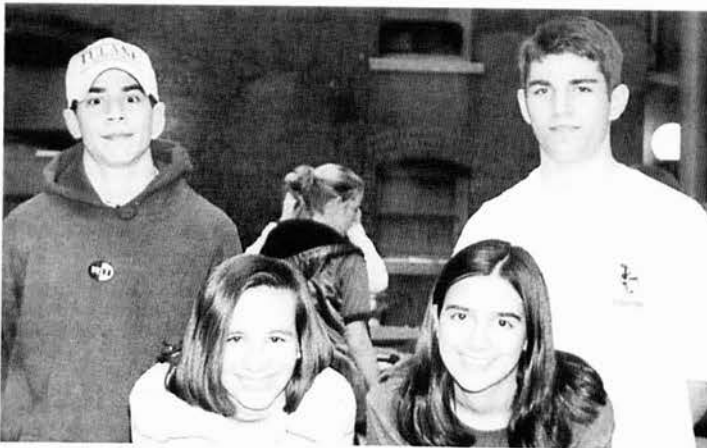

"The club was much more organized this year than in the past," Vickie Anderson, sponsor, said. "All of the officers did an excellent job of planning a meeting and activity at least once a month."

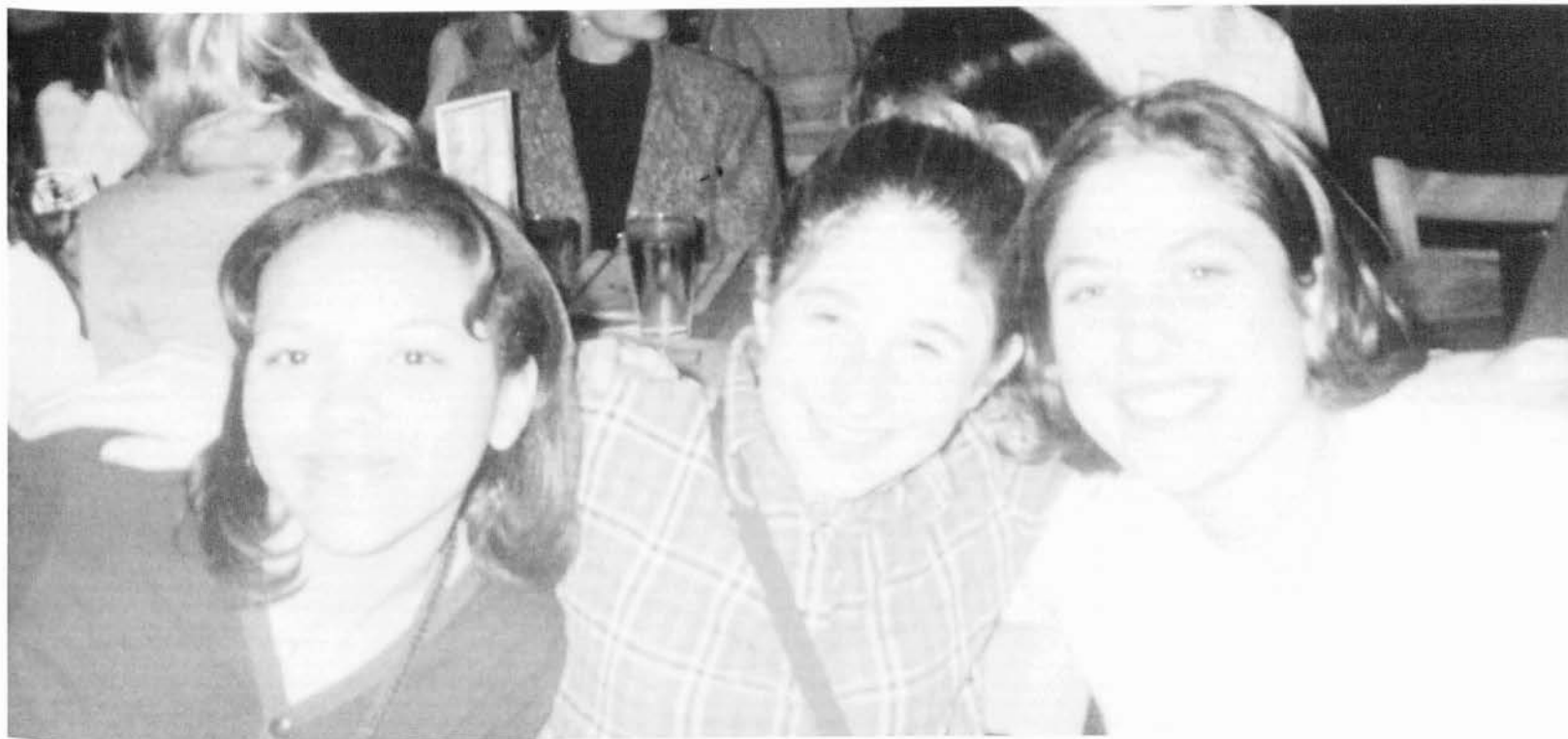

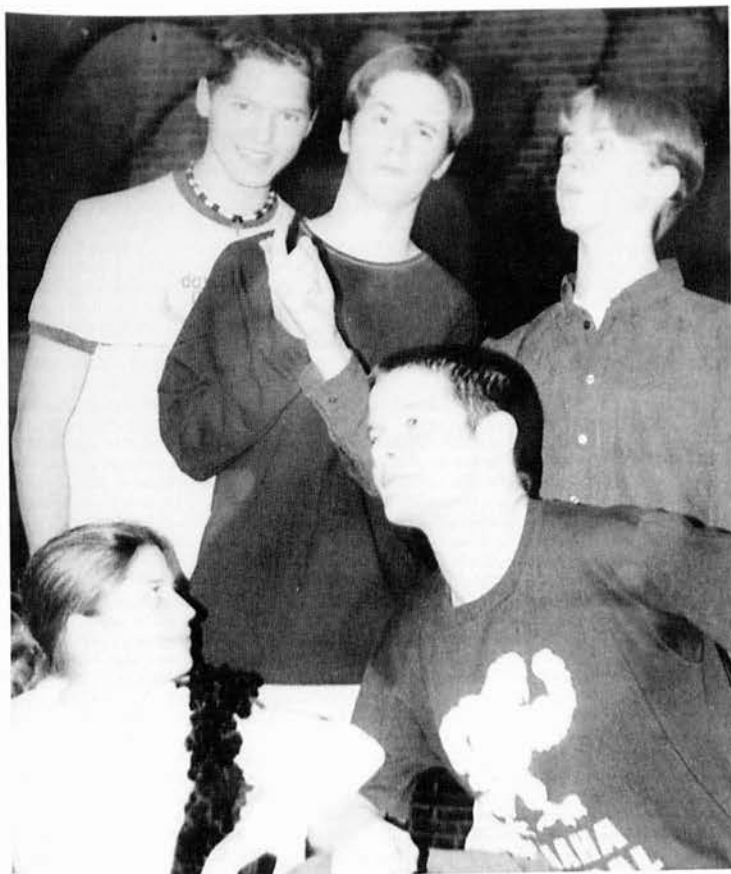
Members of the Thespian Club participated in many educational activities to improve their skills in acting and drama.

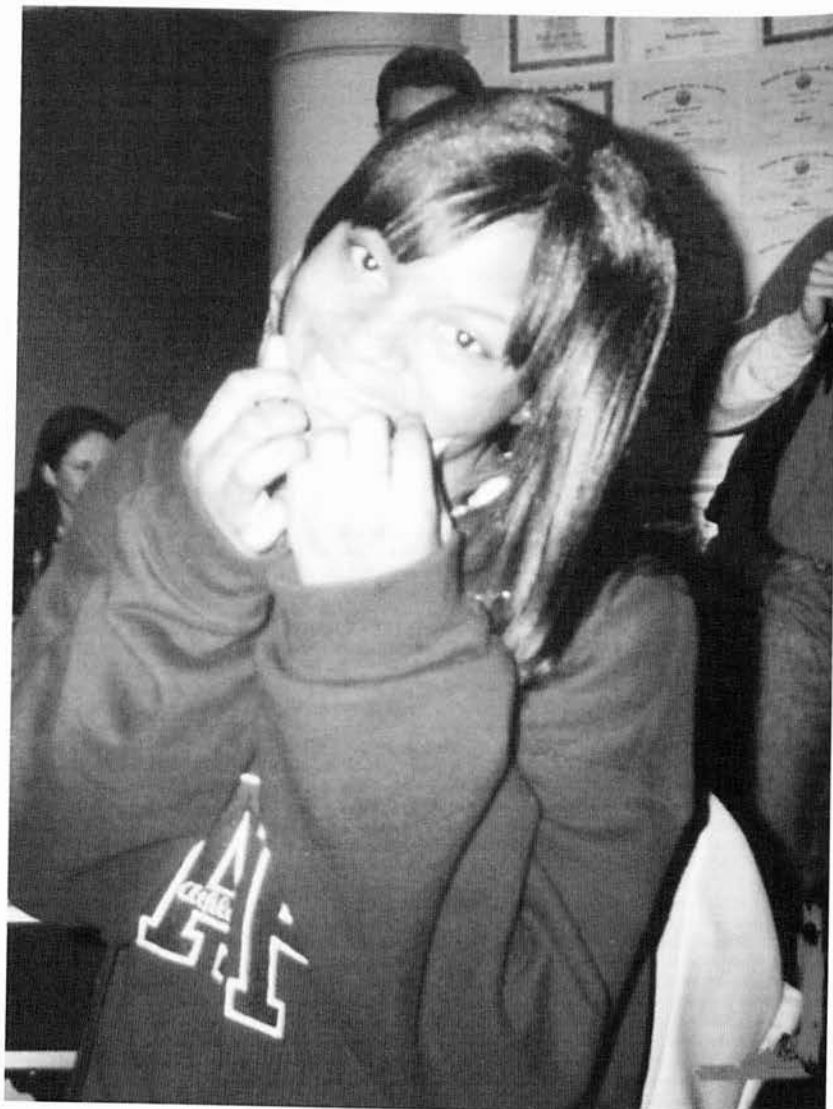
Members toured colleges and participated in the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Red Letter Day in an effort to enrich their minds.

History Club members used their wits in many activities including the club's annual Trivial Pursuit tournament.

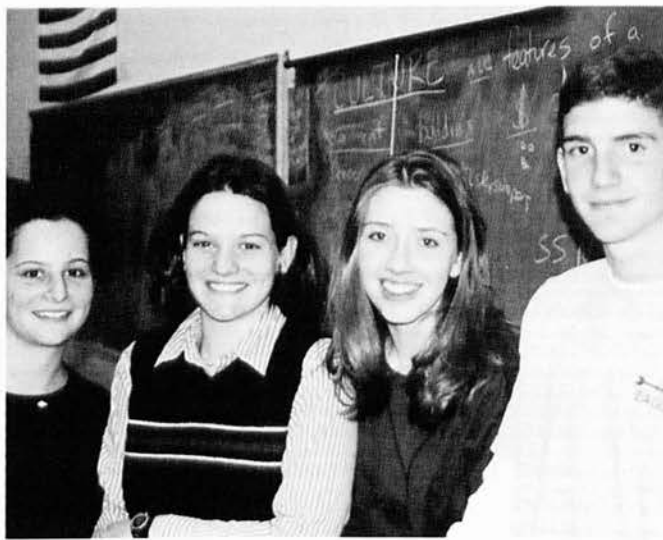
"It served as a great source of entertainment and education," Vicki Deniston Reed, sponsor, said.

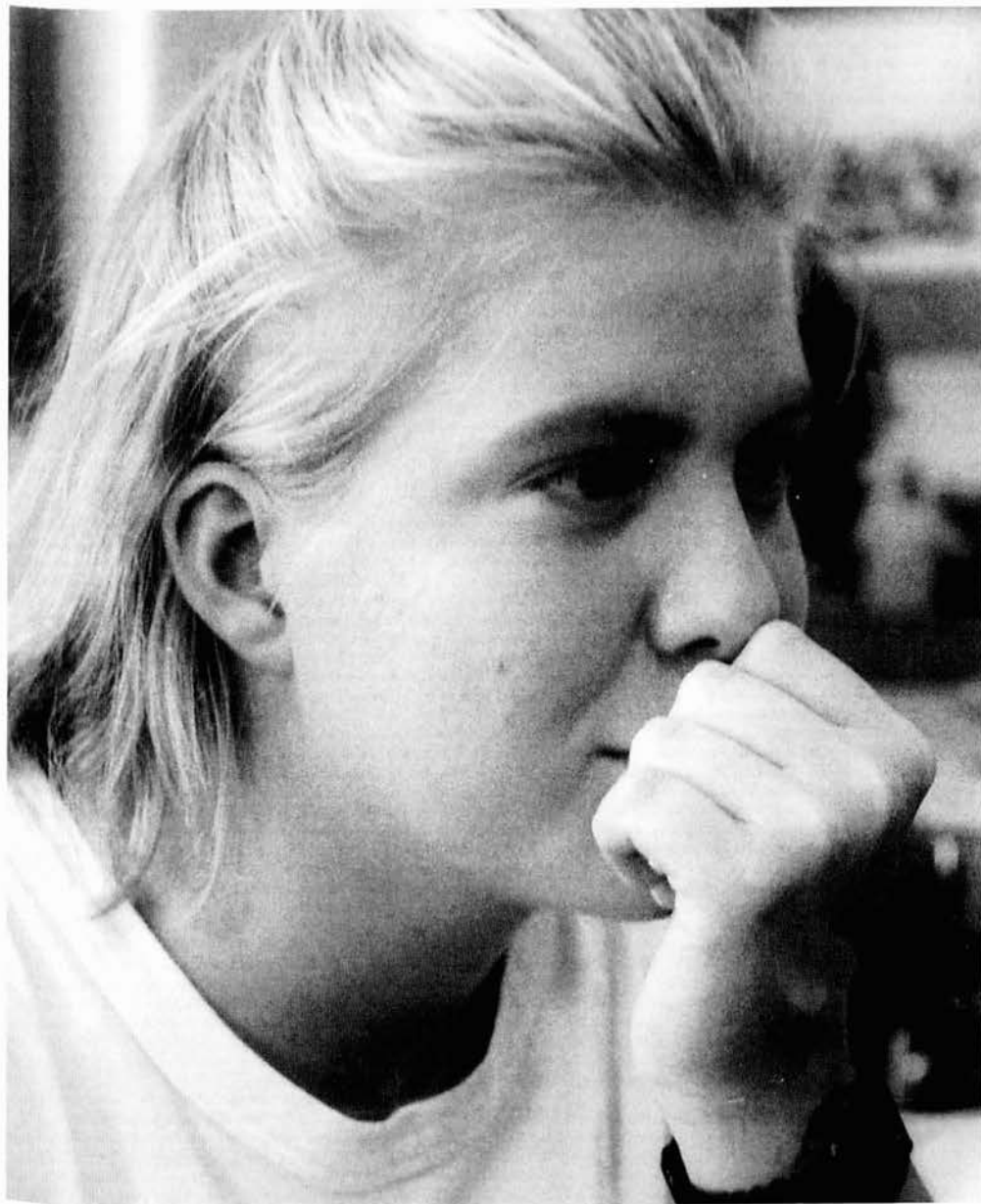

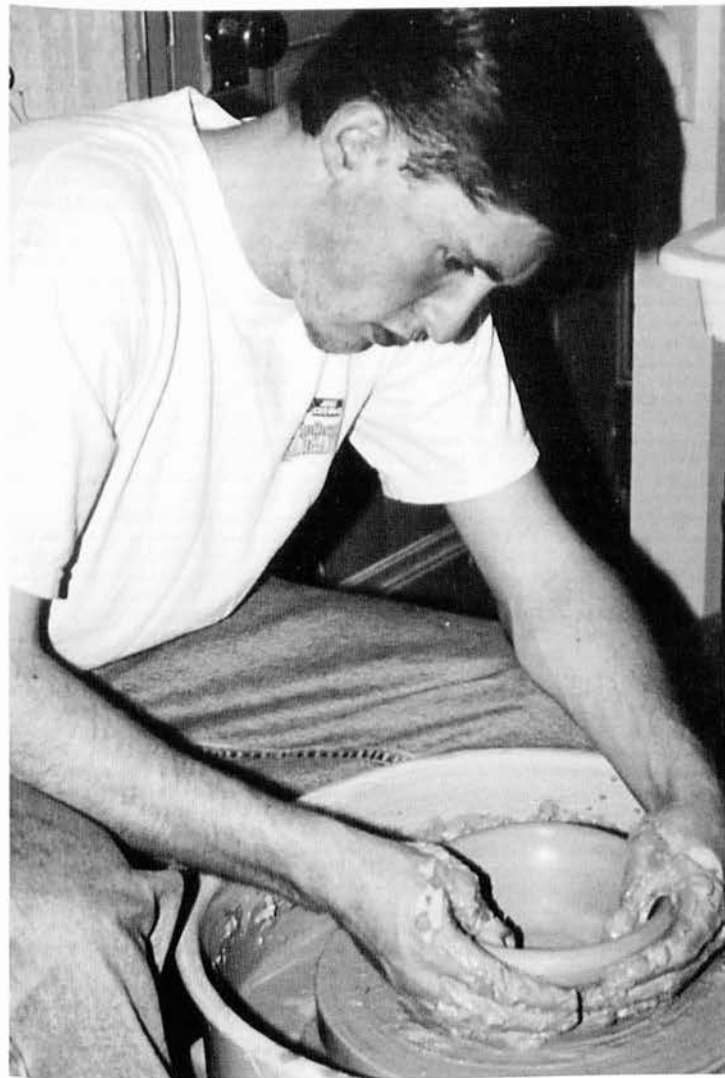

African - American History Studies Cultures

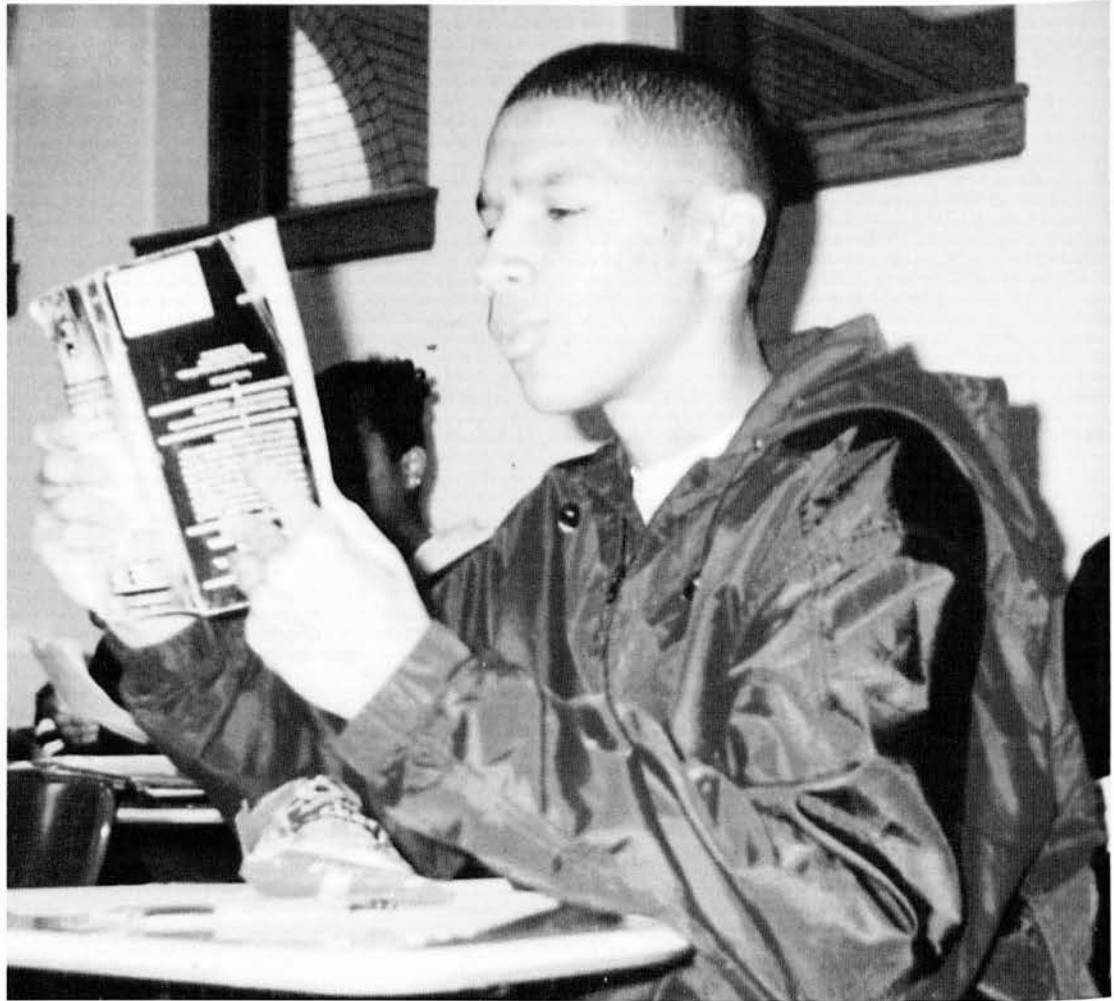

"Central High's bowling team consistently remained in the top 20 percent of all Nebraska teams," Bowling Sponsor Marty Cap said.

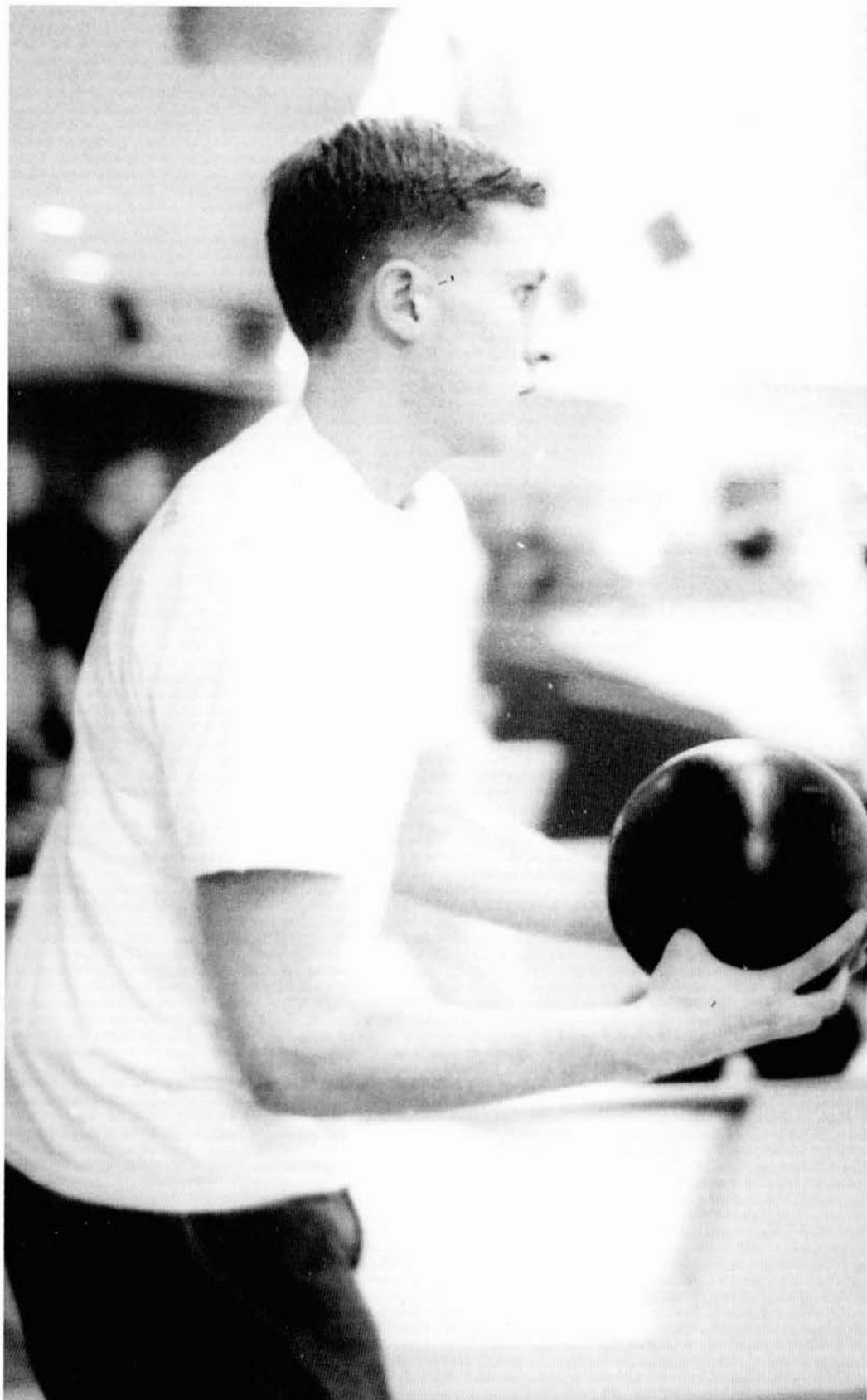
Central's bowling team competed in several statewide tournaments throughout the year. Each of the five teams achieved its own success.

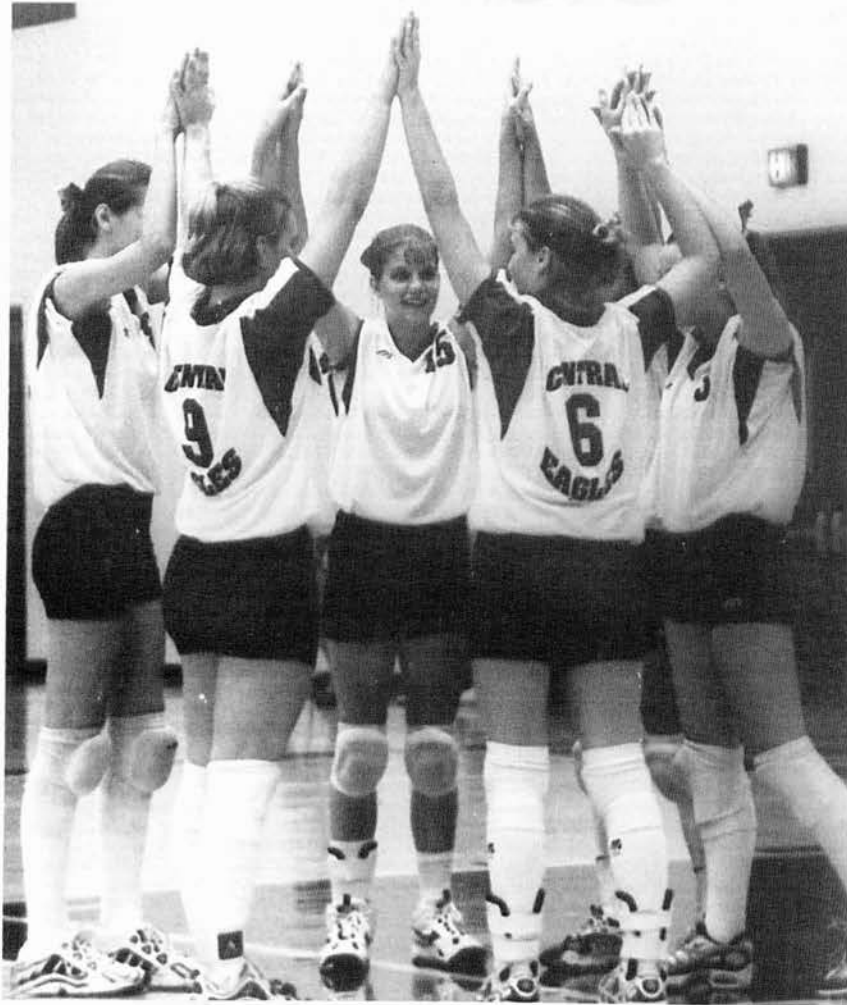

The Varsity football team started the season off strong and never looked back.

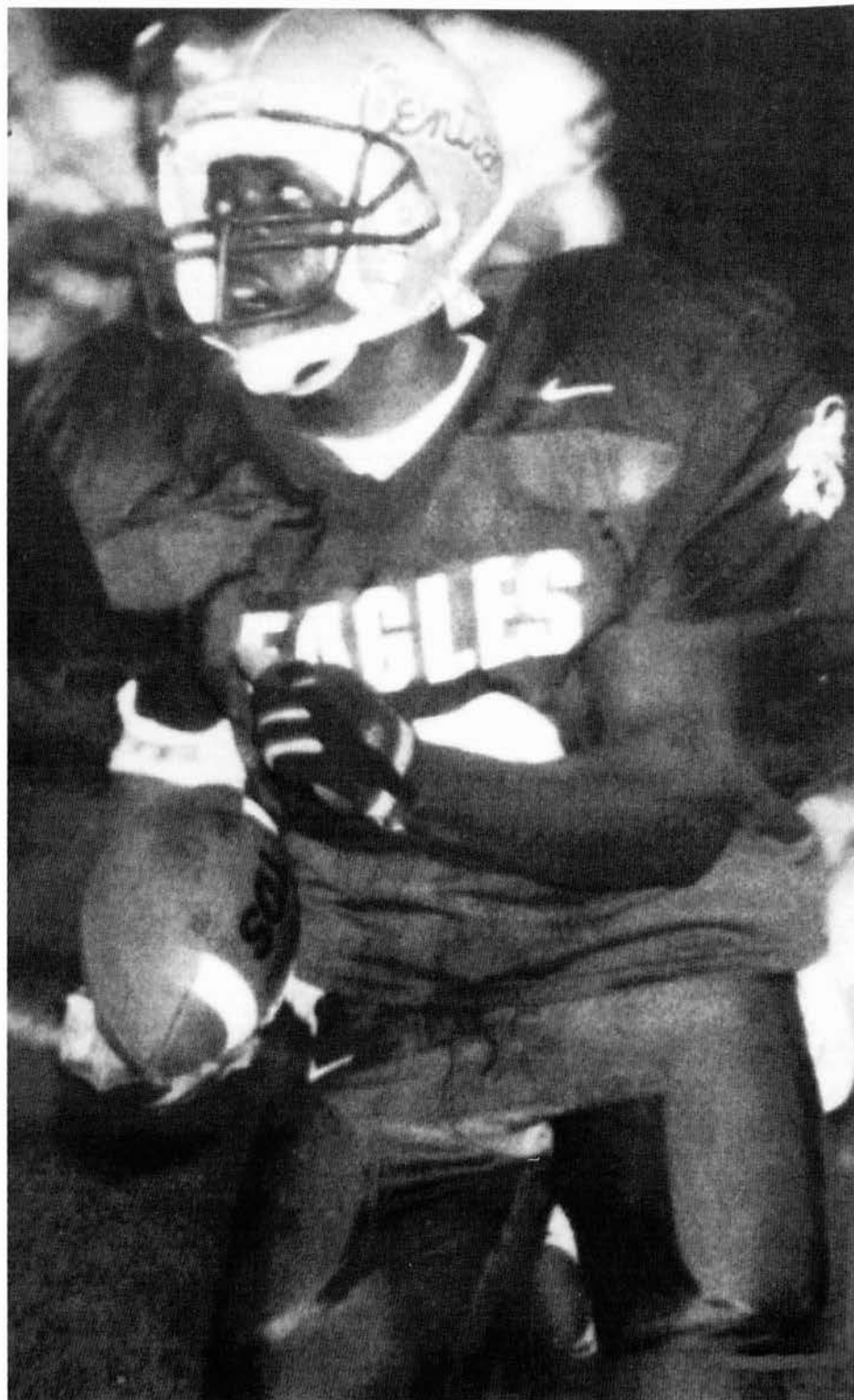

"I think the coaching staff did great this year and really helped us out a lot," Jeffrey Myers(12) said.

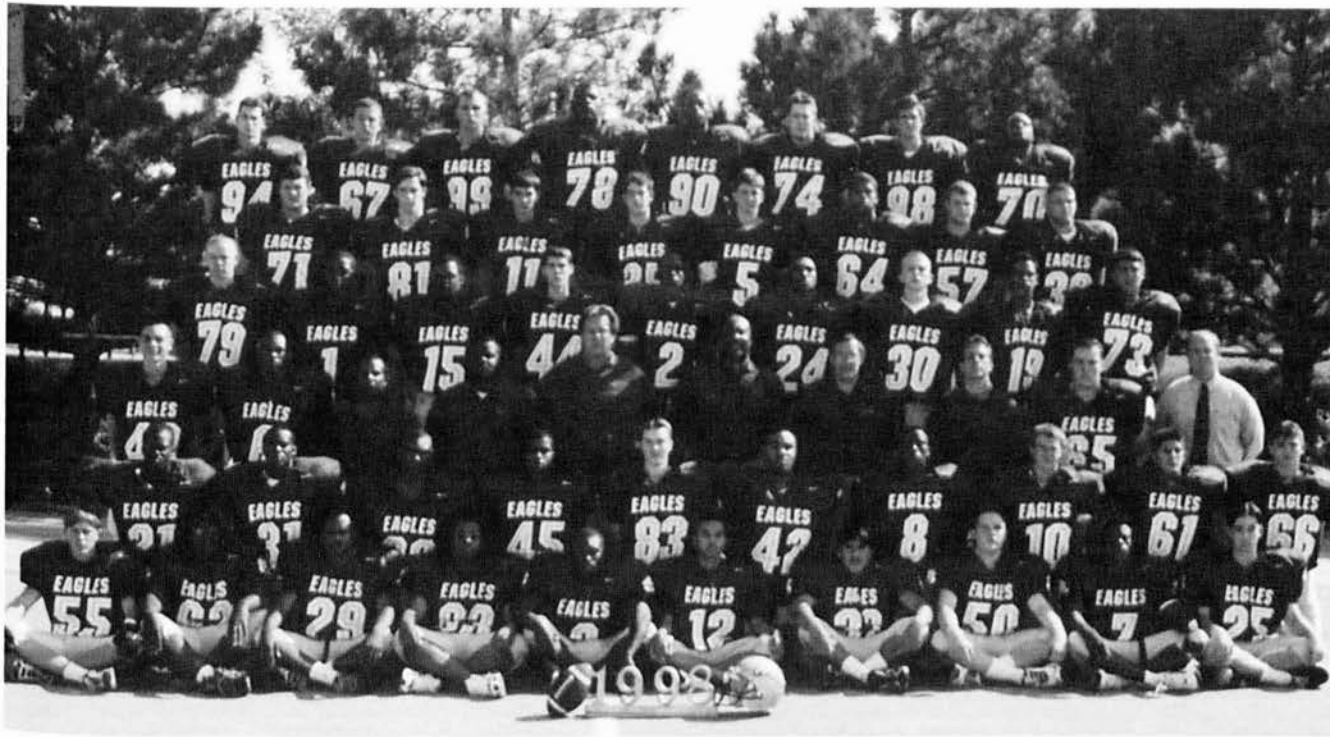
With key players Terrell Gardner(12), Brandon Williams(12), Errol Randolph(12) and Jamaine Billups(11), the team had no place to rise but to the top.

Despite the lack of players, the underclass teams worked hard throughout the season, Coach Mark Allner said.

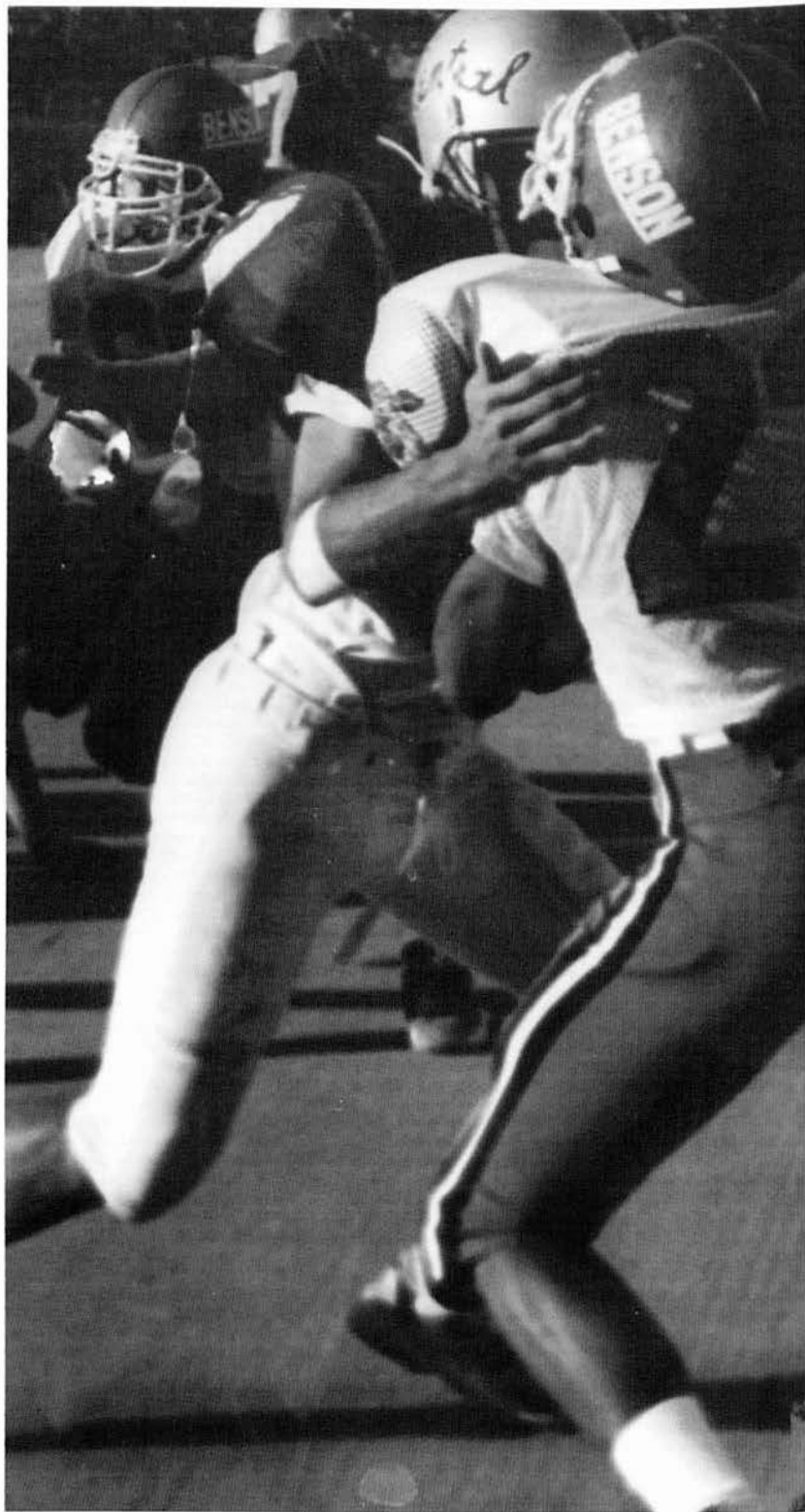

"We didn't get a chance to practice as an entire JV team, but we pulled together and had a good season," Alec Alba(11) said.

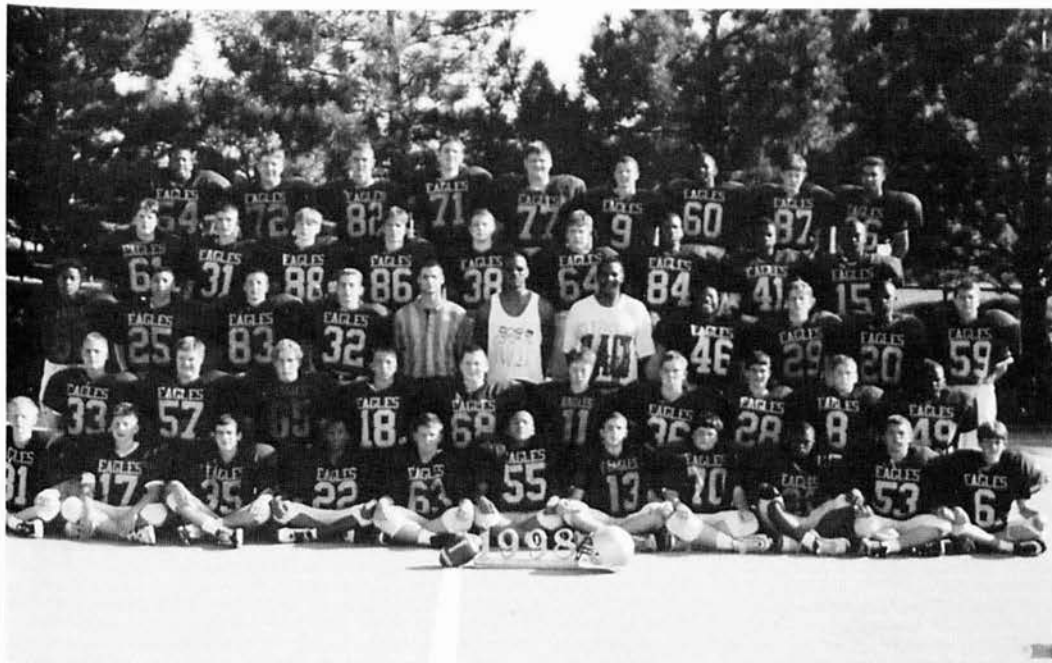
The Reserve team had a rough season, finishing 0-6. However, they practiced and played their hardest.

Another big event for the team was districts in Fremont. The team finished the year with a 14-13 record.

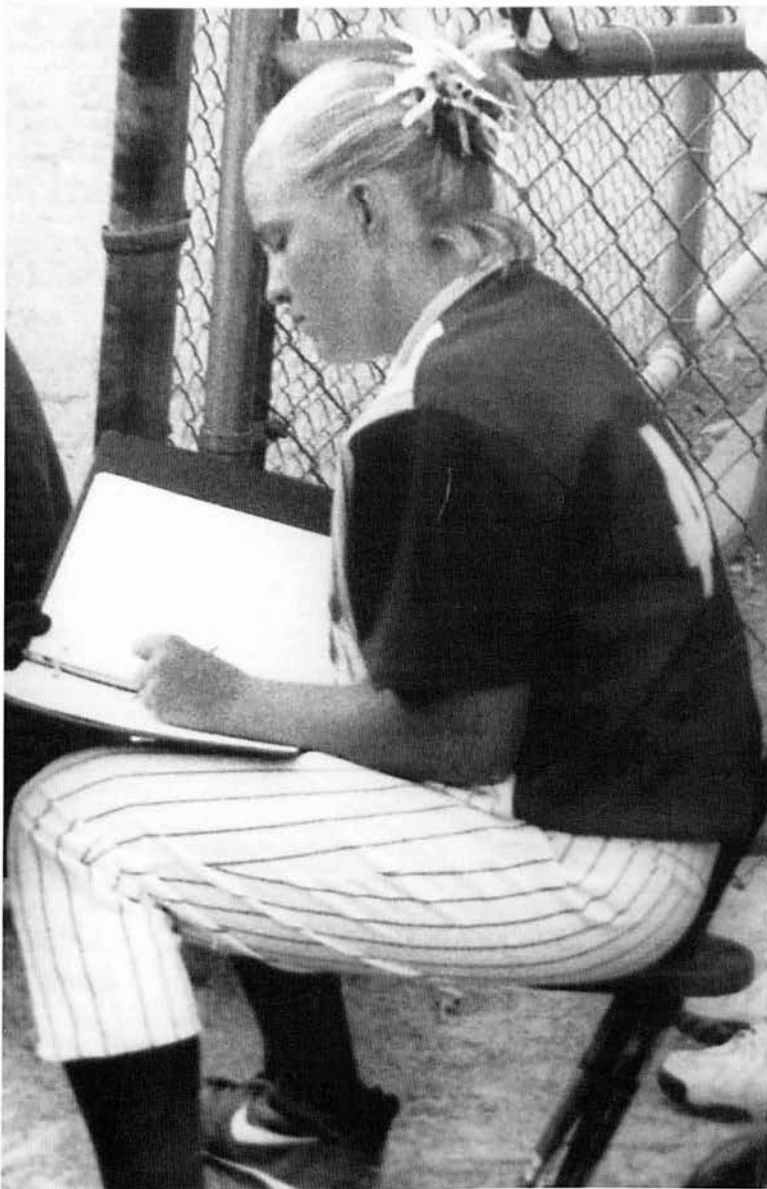

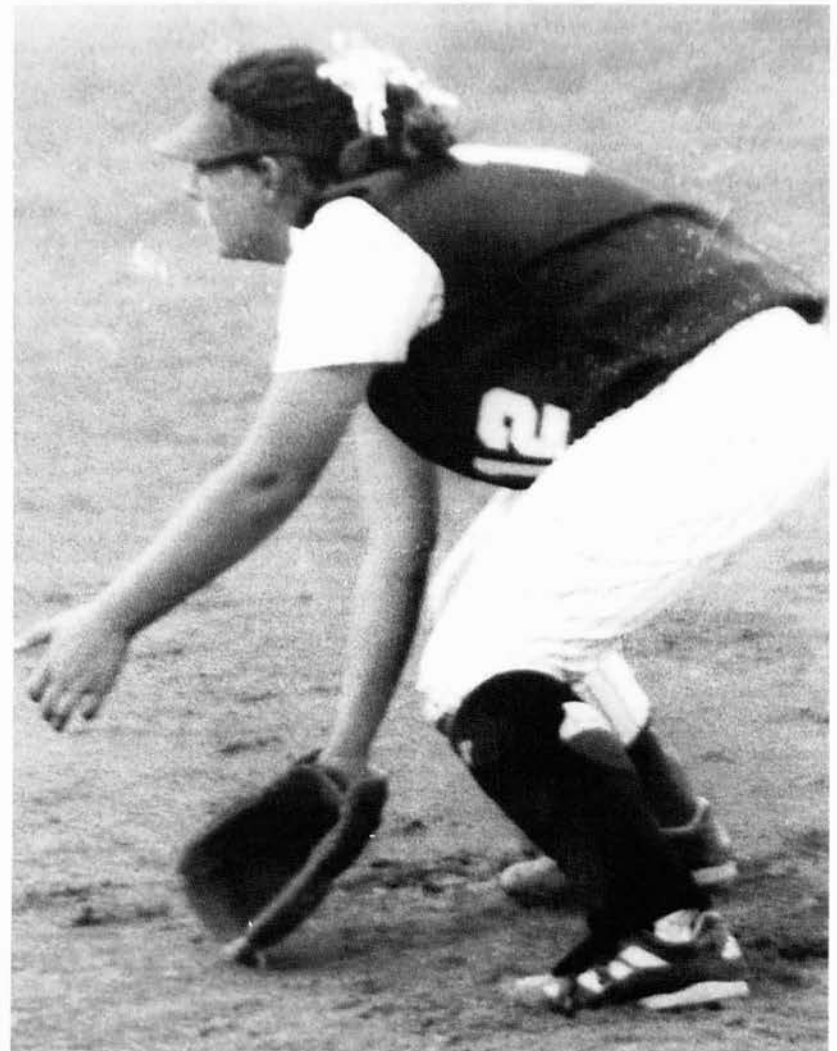

Despite a mediocre start, the tennis team swung into action with a win over North, Varsity Tennis Coach Matt Shafer said.

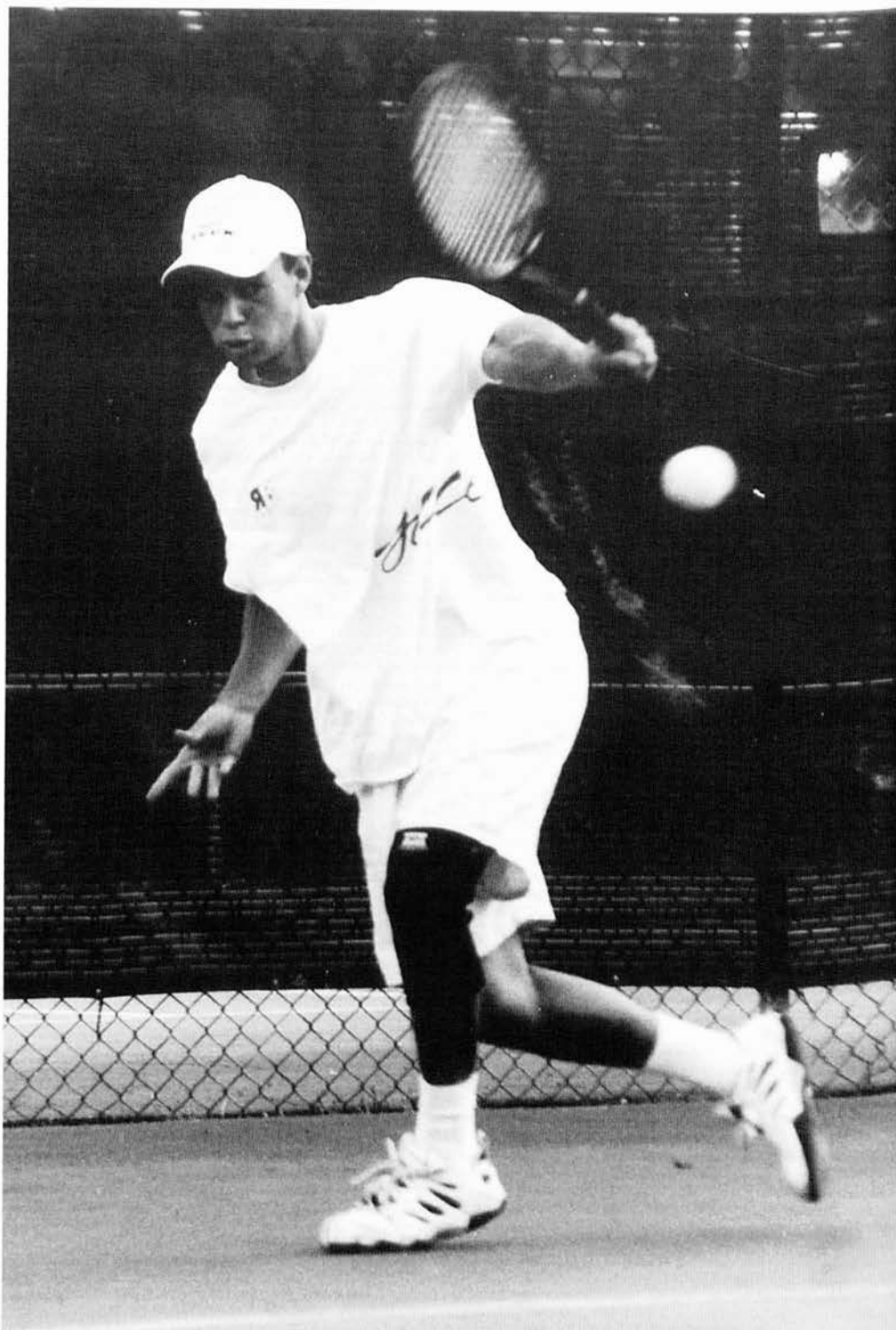
"These guys were hardworkers who I enjoyed a lot," Shafer said.

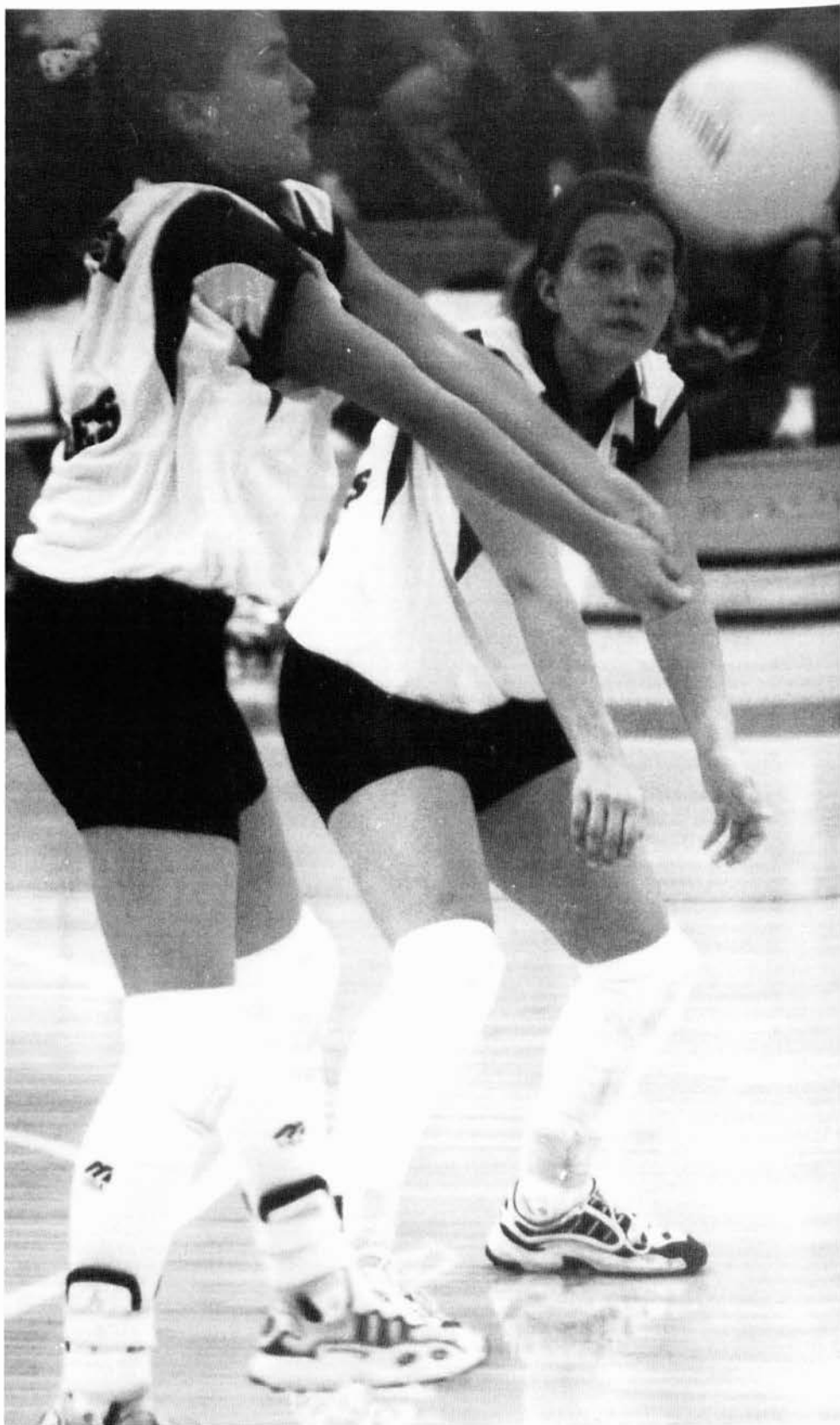
"Seven of the 14 girls have been on varsity for three or more years," Coach Reichmuth said.

The team reached new levels and obtained many of its goals. Many of the girls represented Central as Metro Conference Leaders.

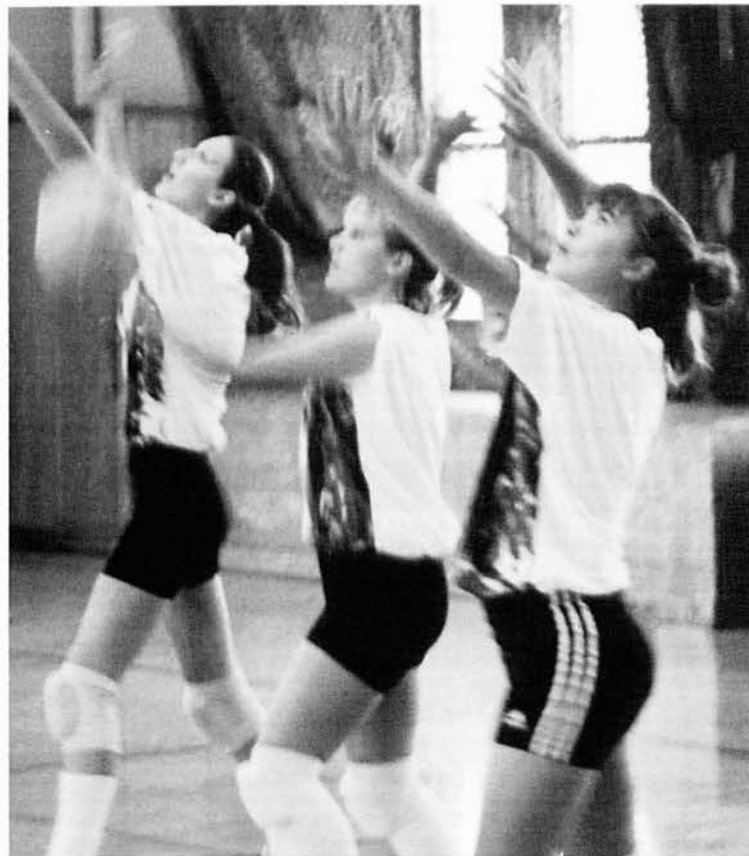
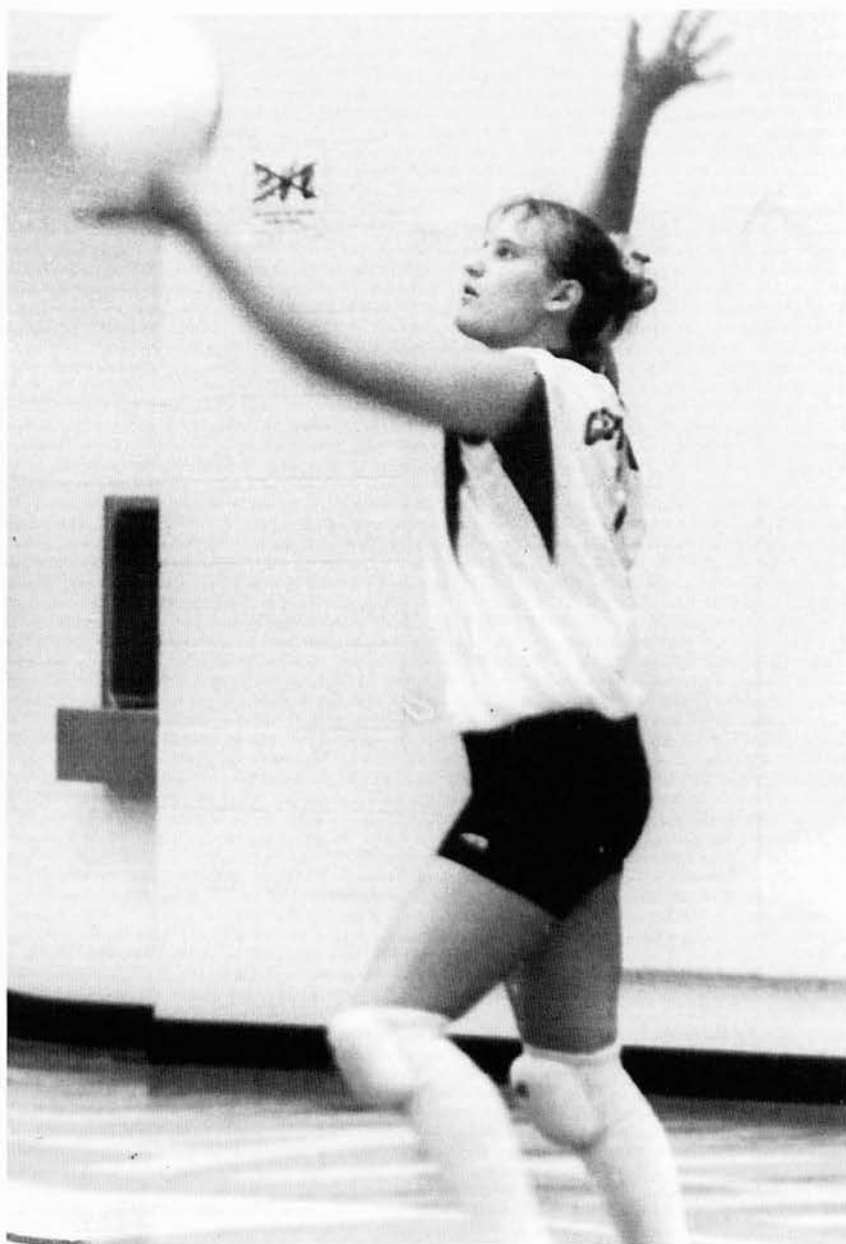

"The Junior Varsity team worked hard all season long to achieve their team goals," Coach DeyErmand said.

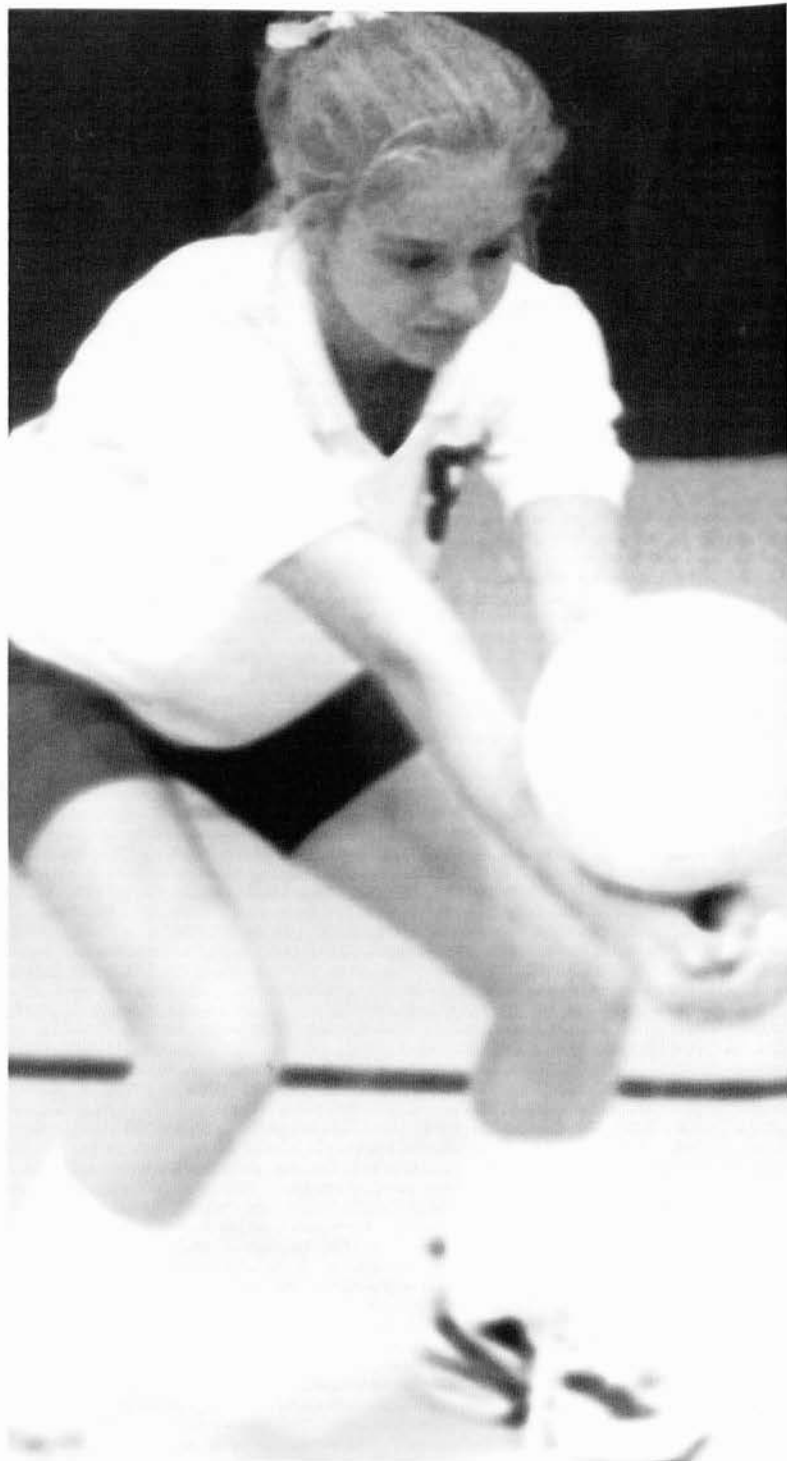
The Reserve team worked hard and showed promise for the years to come.

The Freshmen team worked on improving basic skills, preparing for higher levels of play, and obtaining a winning record, Coach Tammy Wade said.

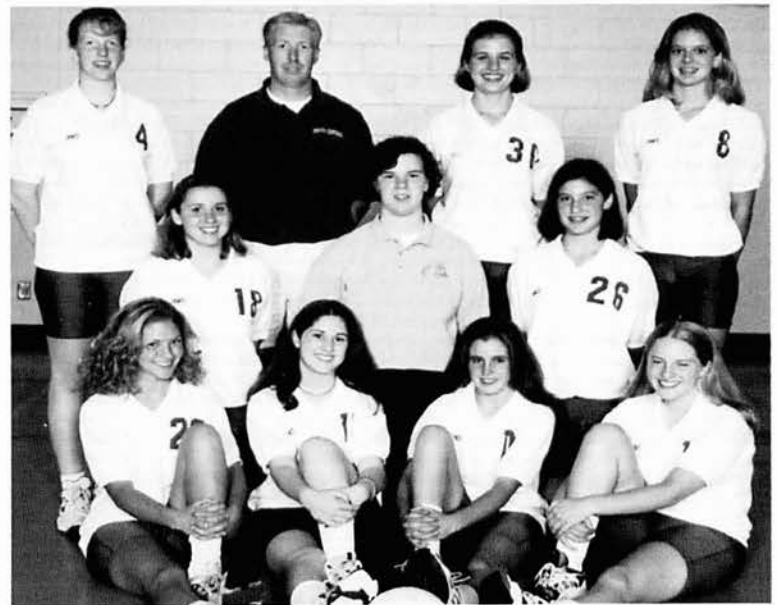

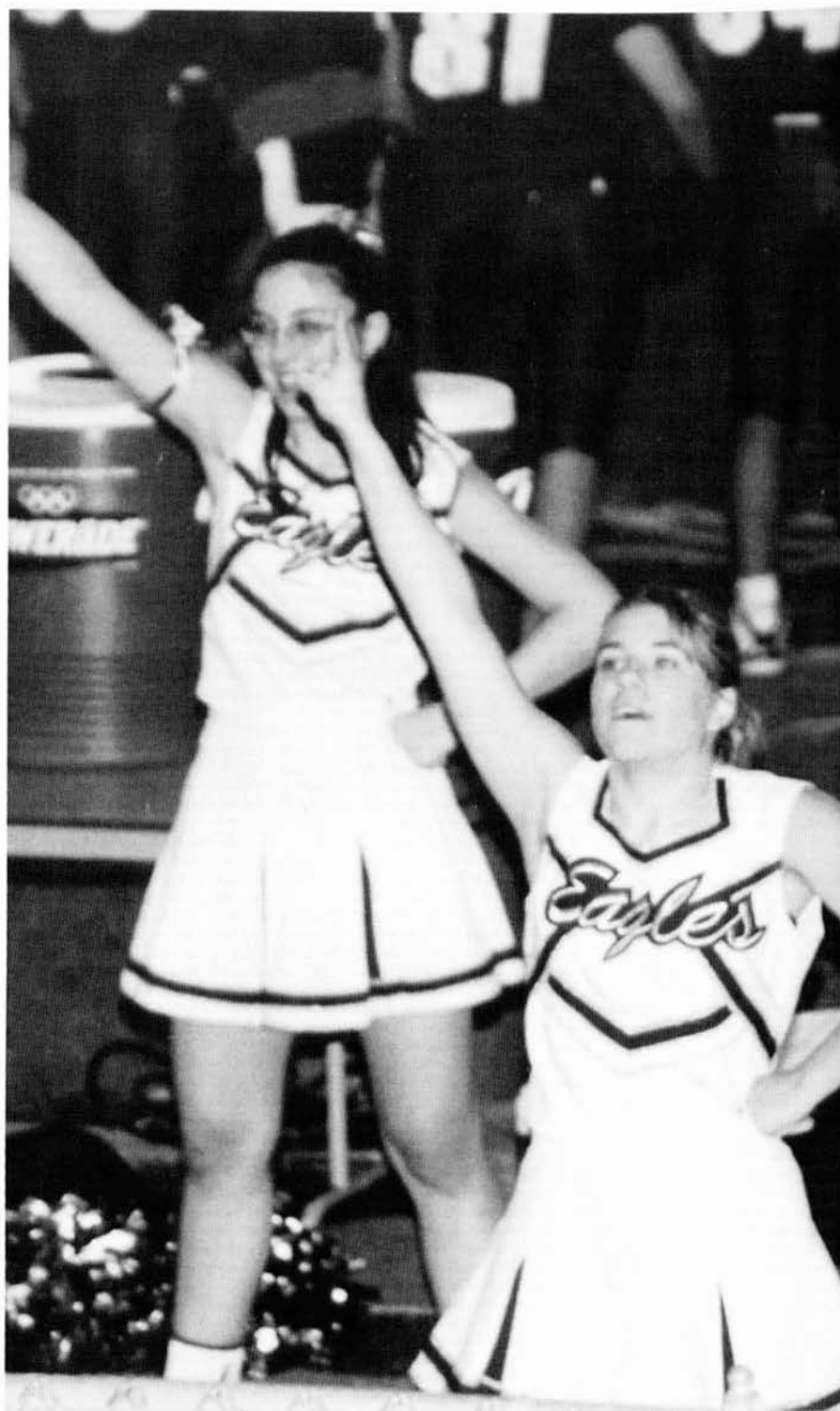

The squad was composed of seniors and juniors. All members of the squad attended numerous games. This dedication was due to a very successful camp in the summer where the squad competed against other squads.

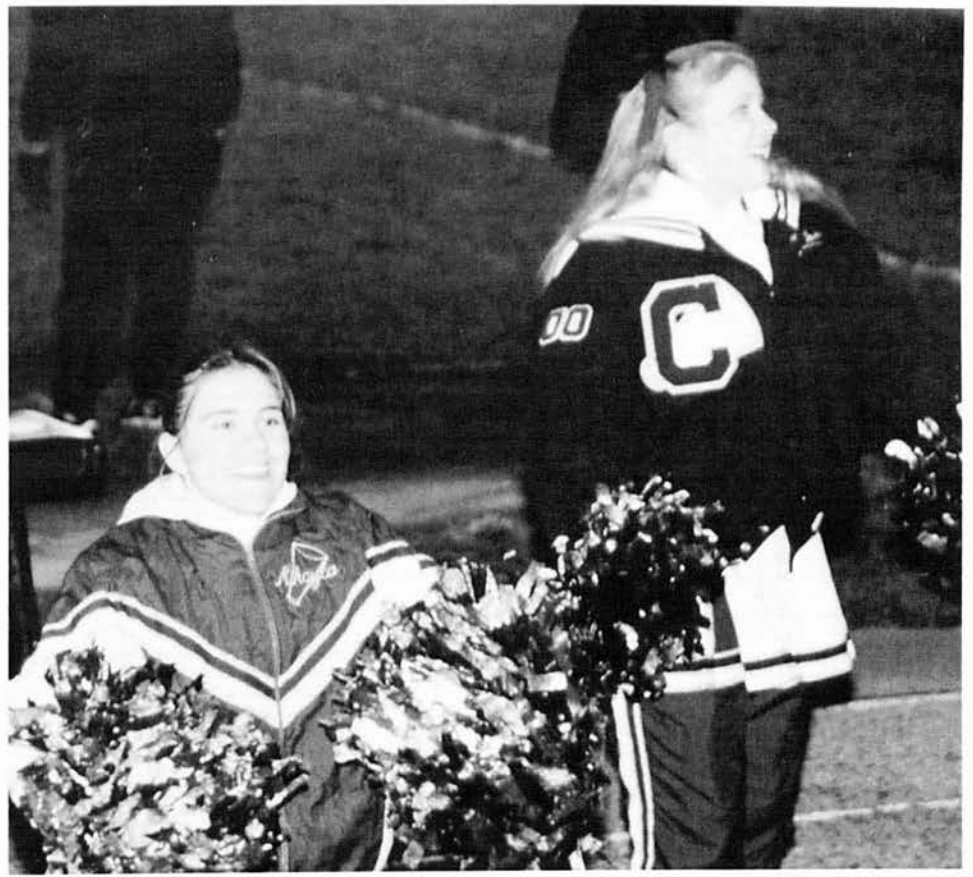

The Cheerleaders practiced all summer in order to prepare for the football season.

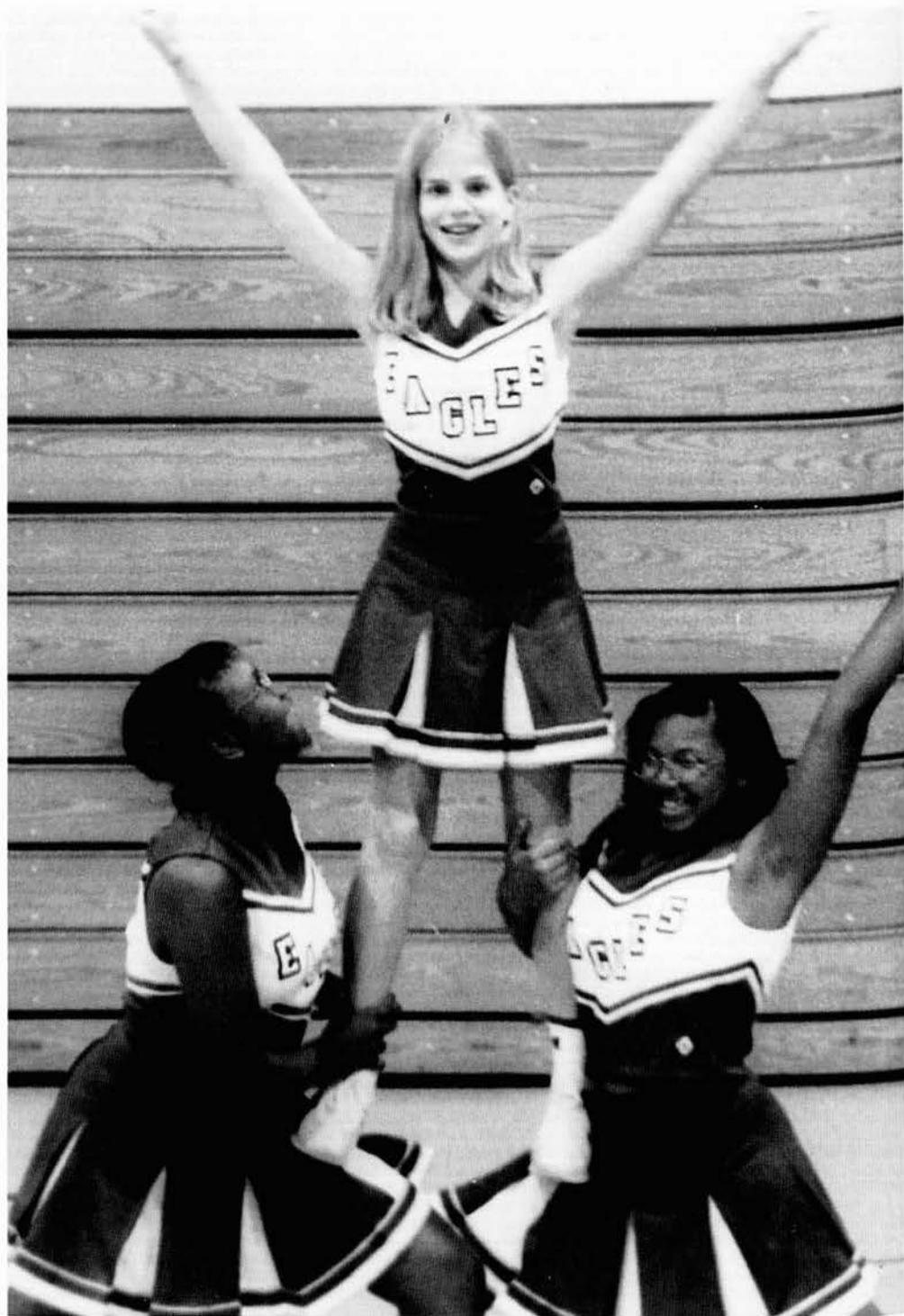
The majority of the girls attended a National Cheerleading Association (NCA) Cheerleading Camp held at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

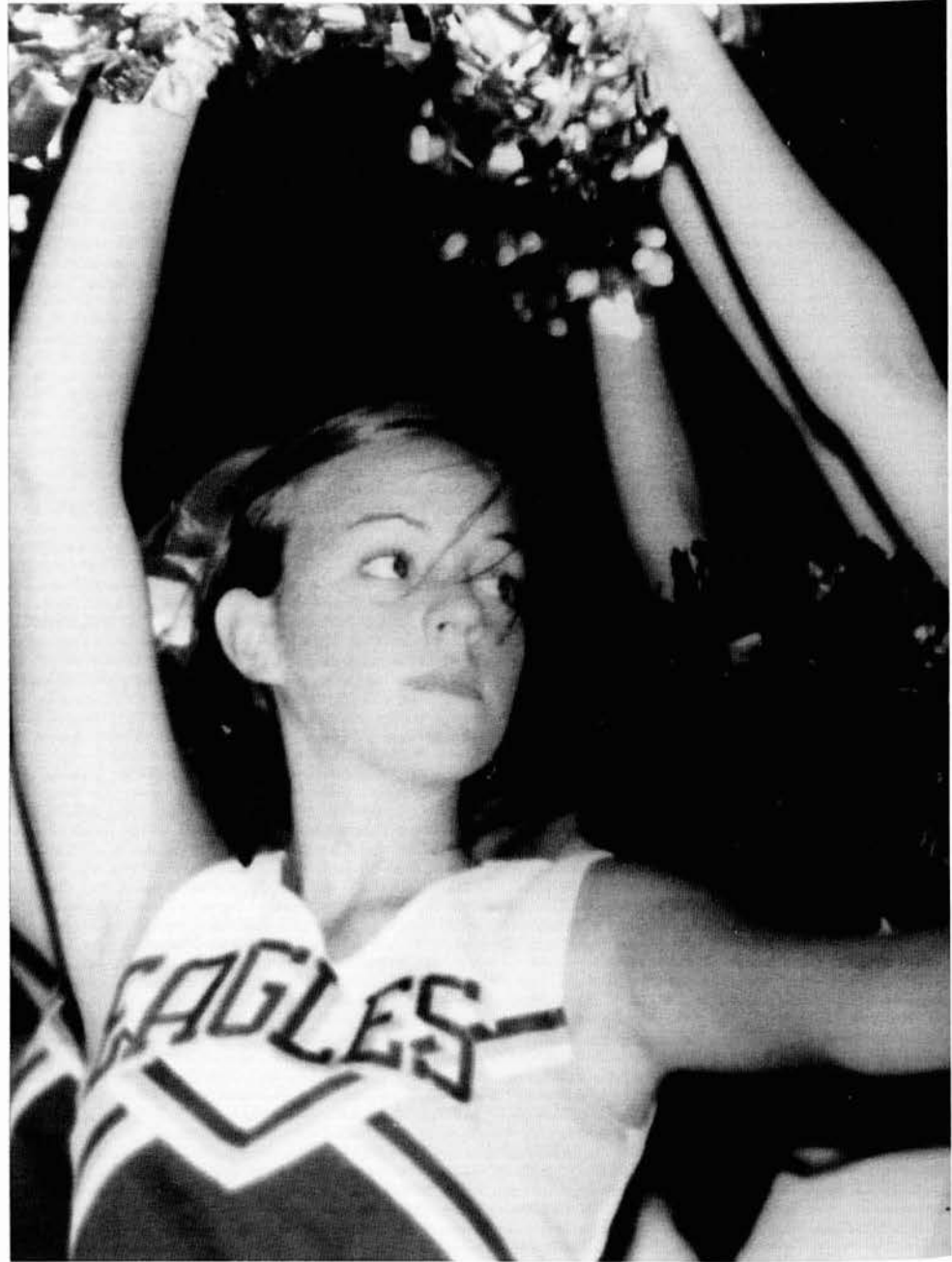
"This was the best squad Central had in years," Chloe Karpf(11) said.

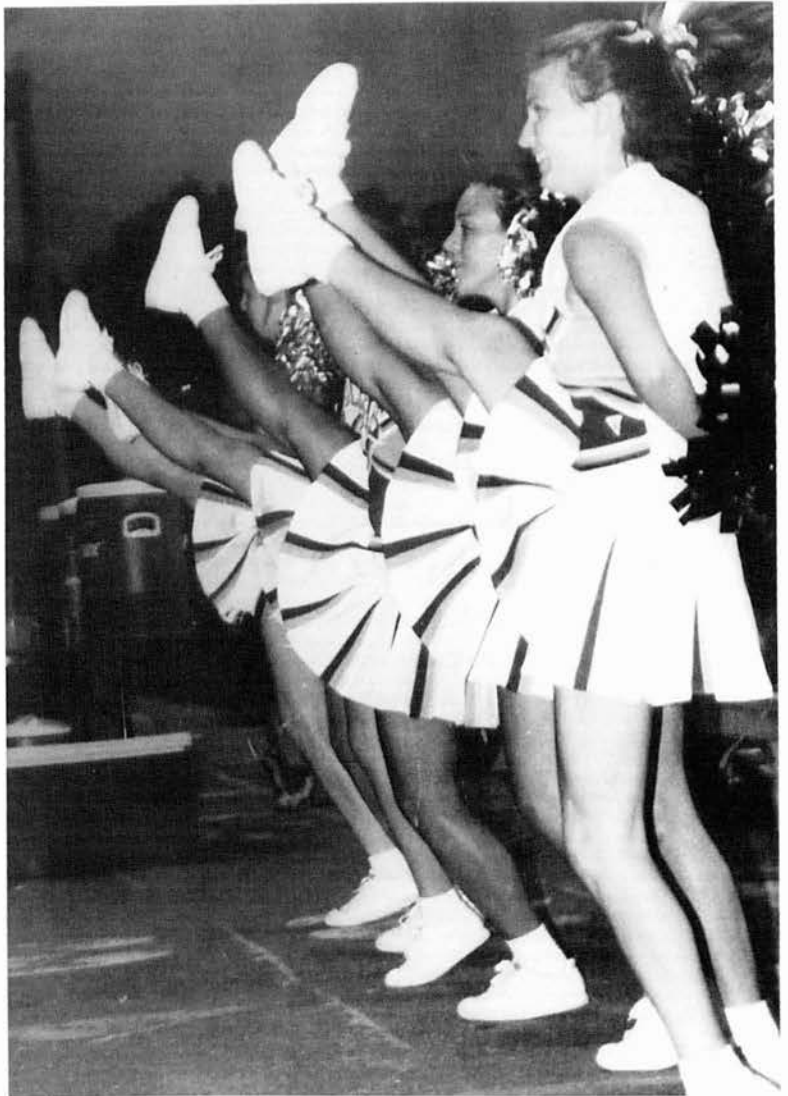

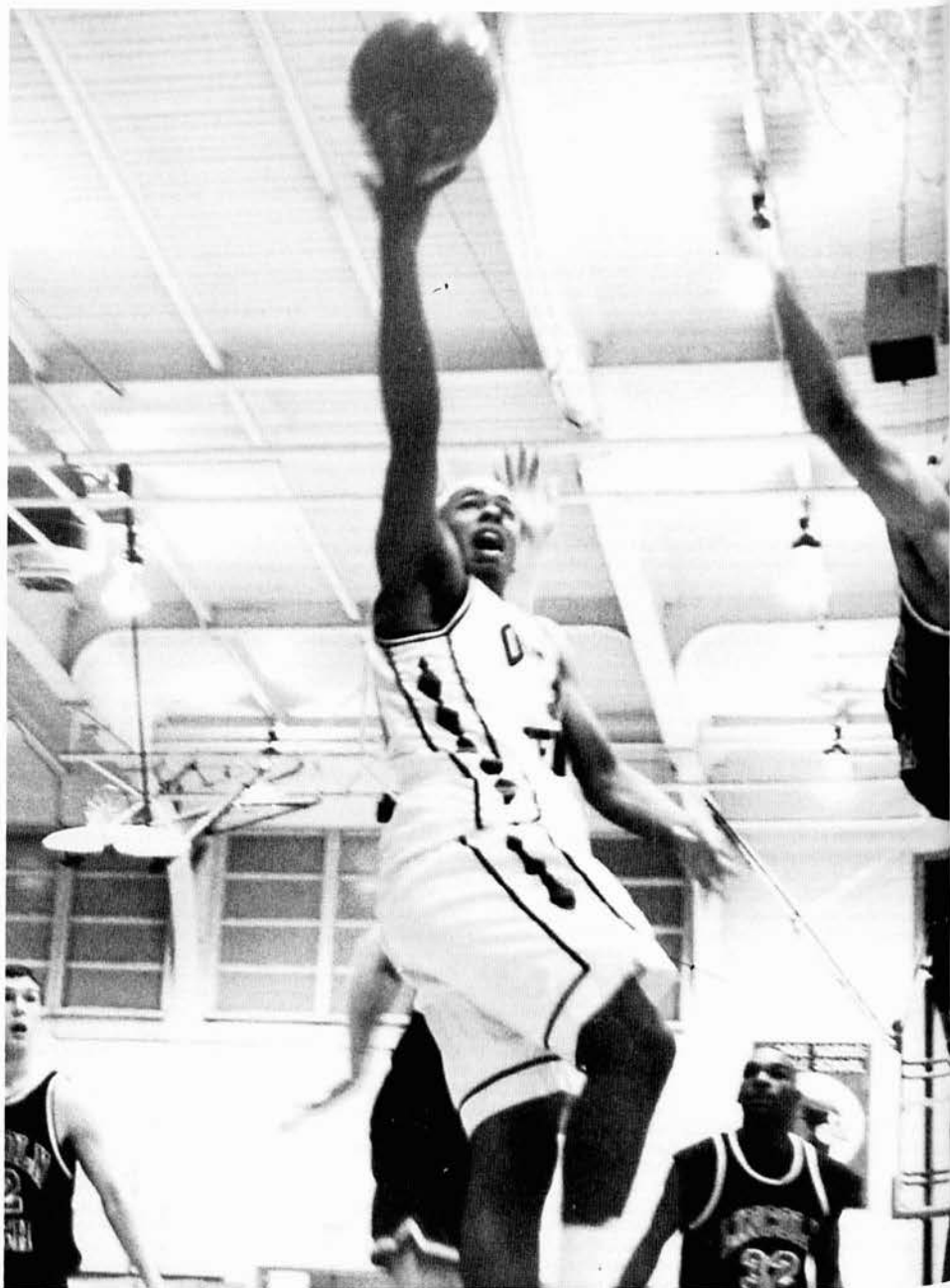
"The team was made up of a good, competitive players," Coach Rick Behrens said.

"The teams for the next three to four years have a lot of potential to win a state title if everyone plays and stays together," Smith(12) said.

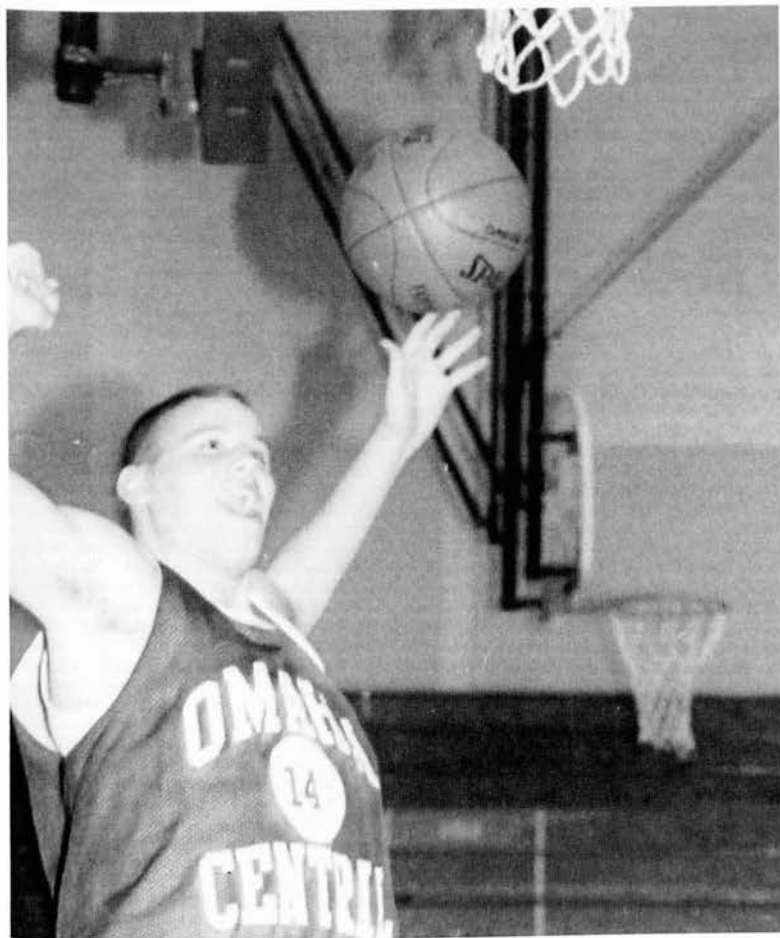

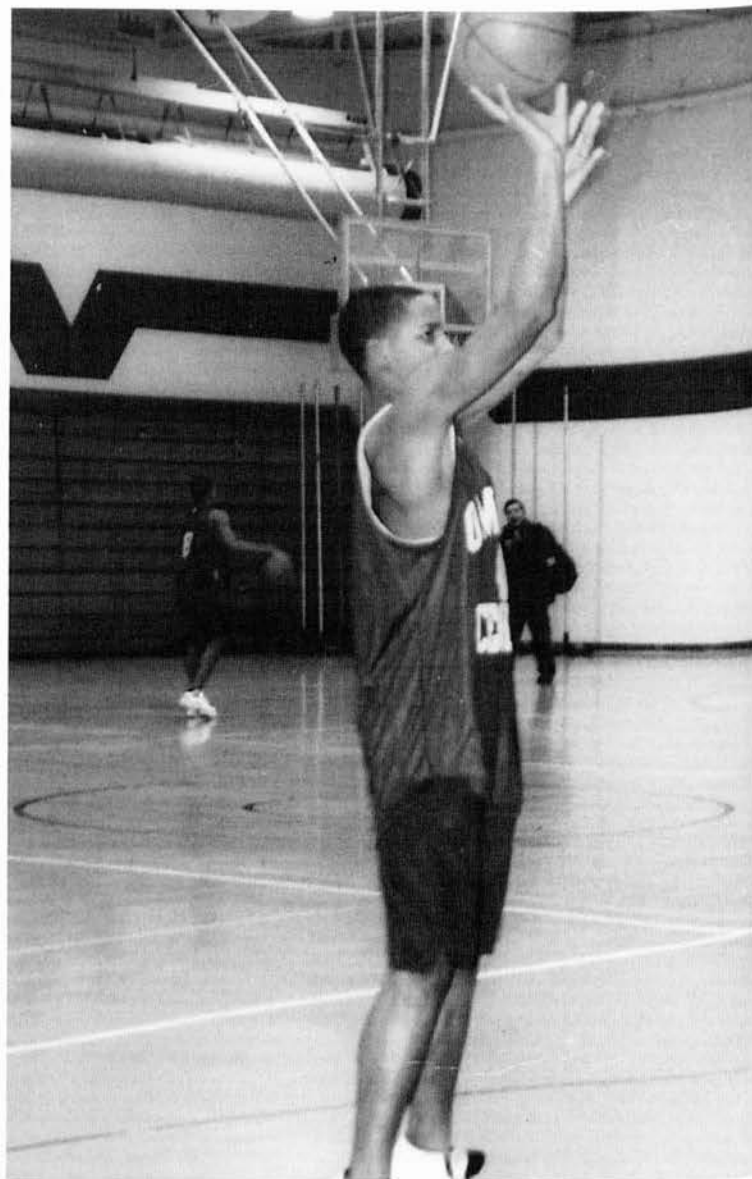

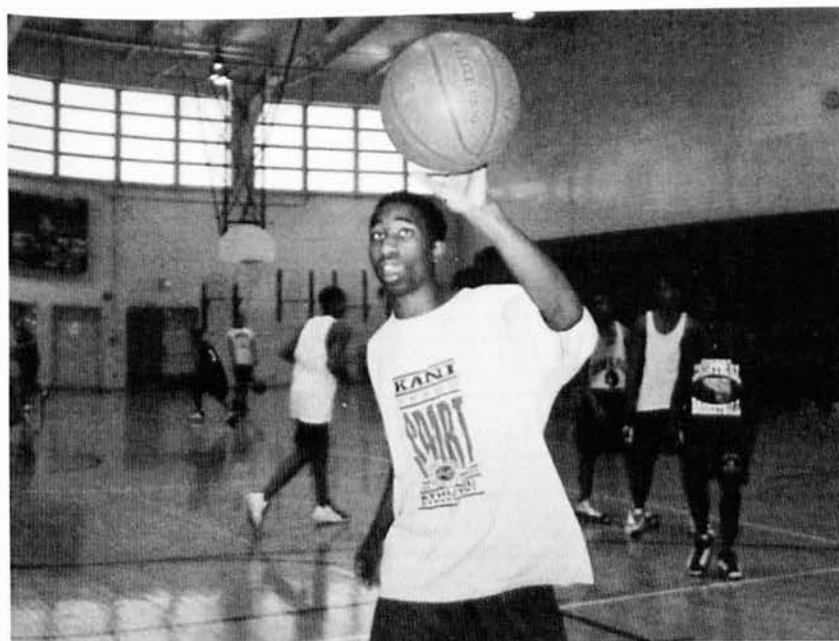

This was Roberts' first year as the head coach of Varsity Women's basketball. She said that the team adjusted well to having a new coach.

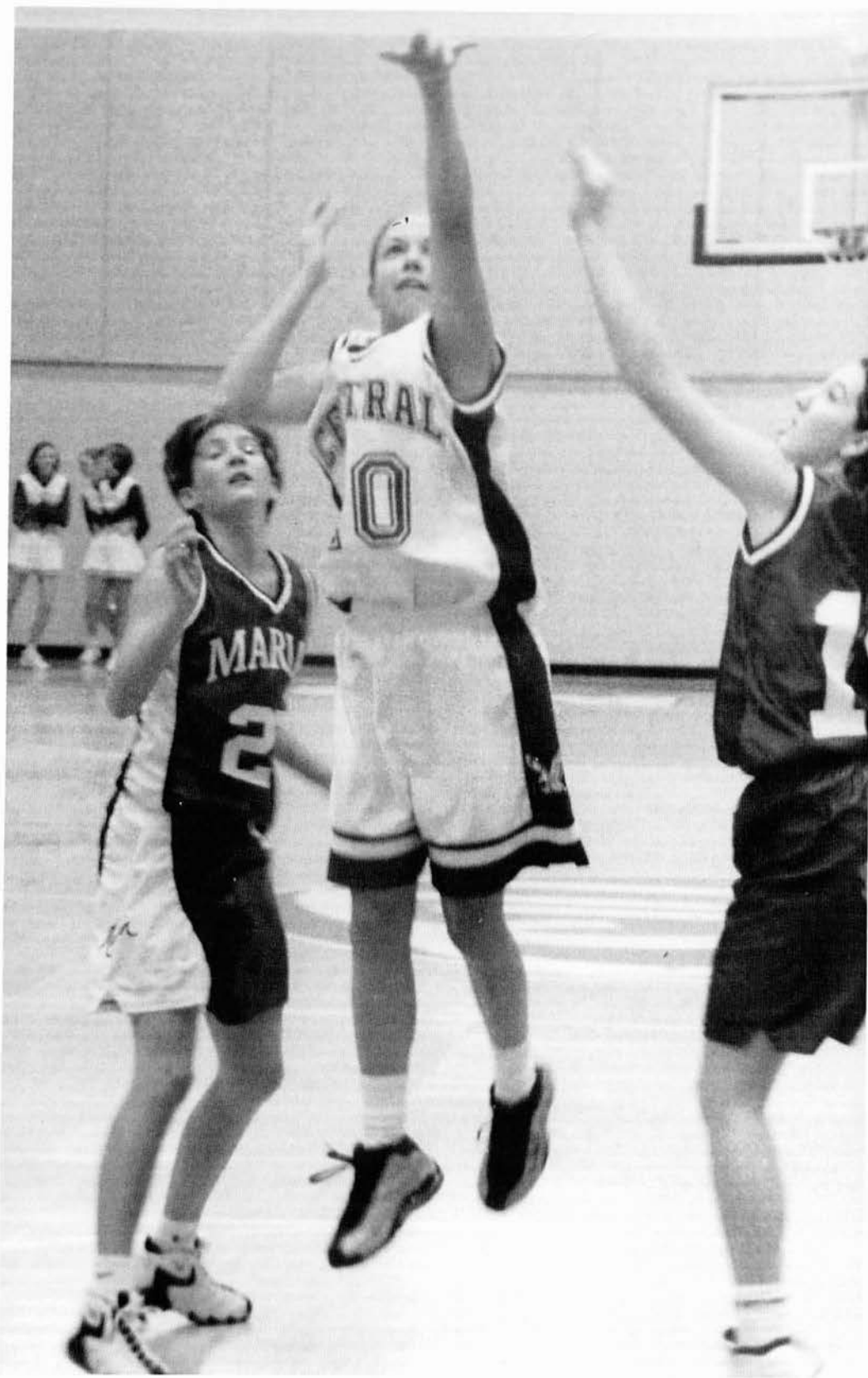
"The captains, Mary Anderson(11) and Tai Burleson(11), provided positive leadership for the team," Roberts said.

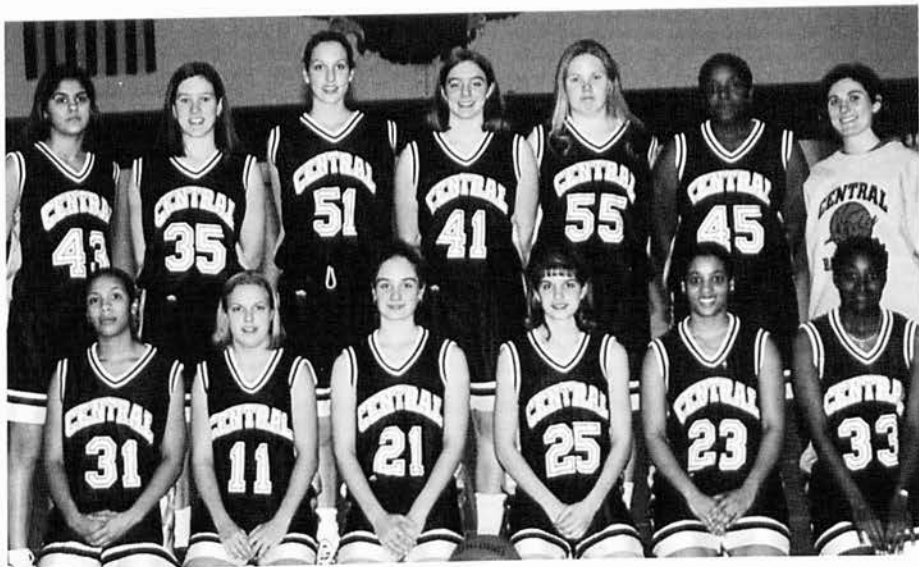

The players made outstanding contributions to the team. The assets that each member brought made a strong daily work ethic and a positive team attitude, Semrad said.

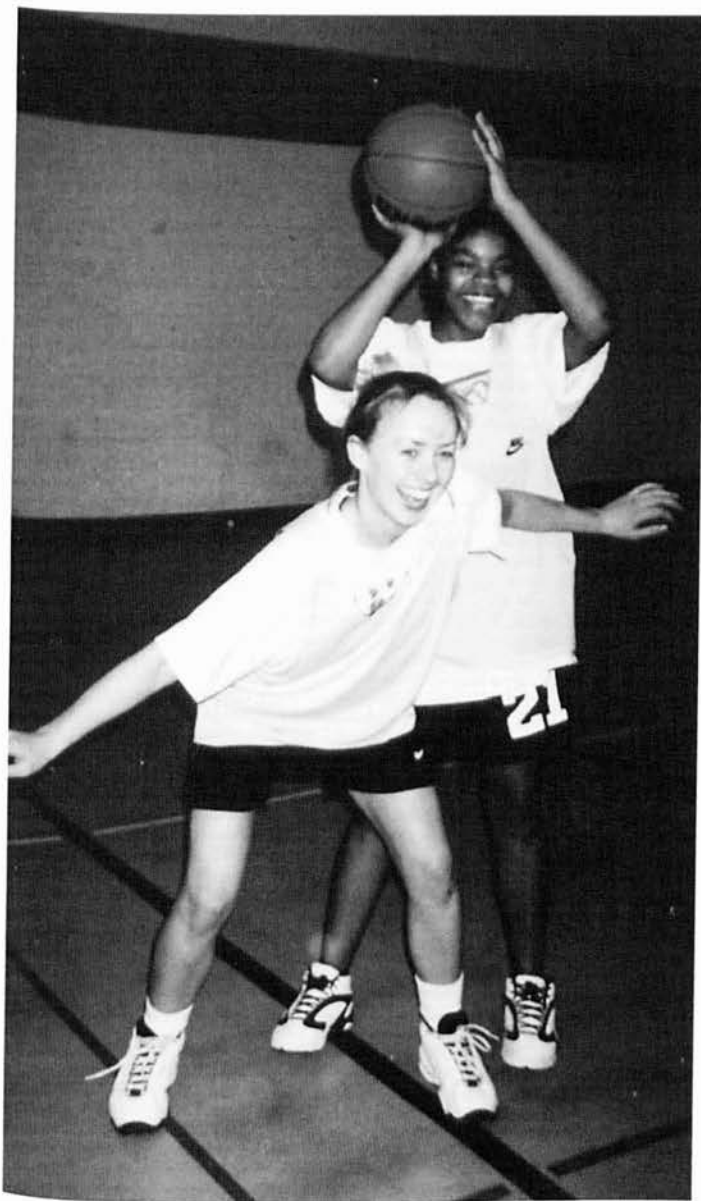

The swim team worked very hard to compete this season, Coach Heather Dunbar said.

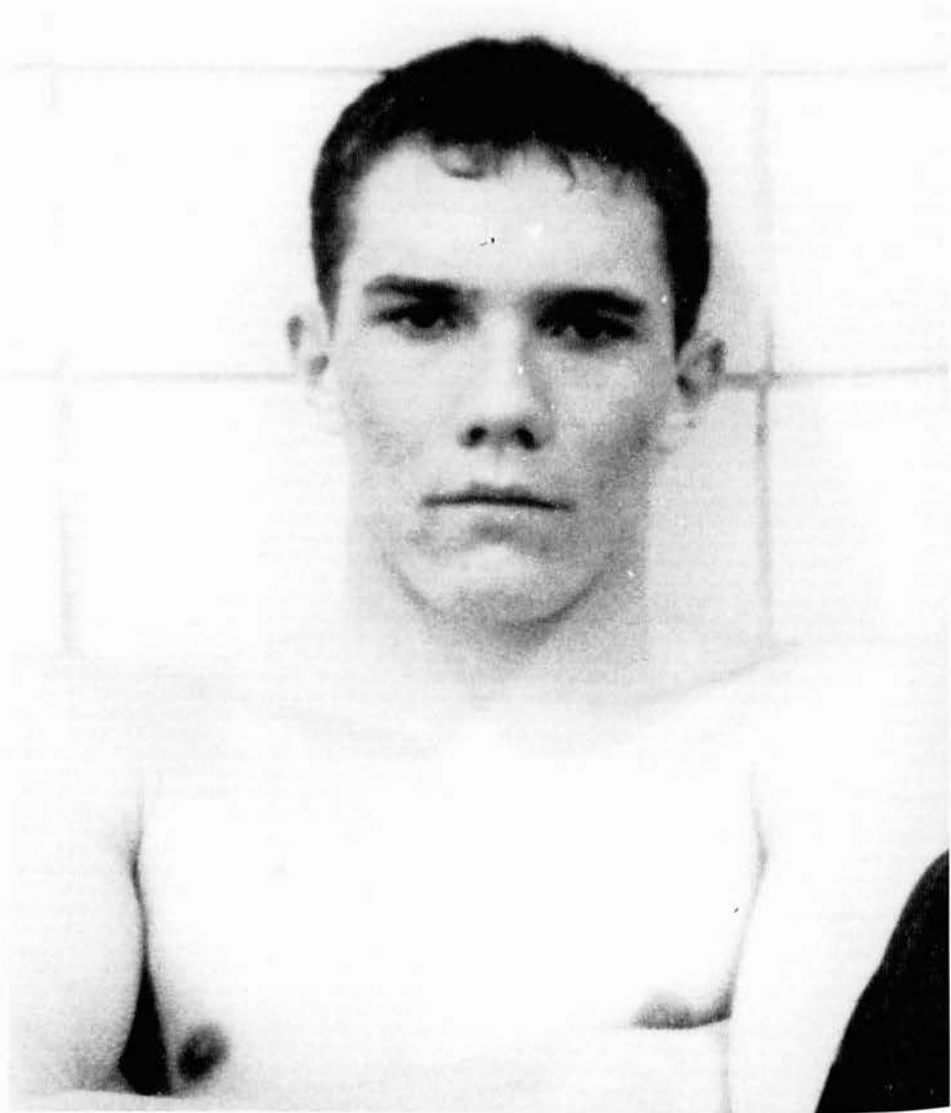

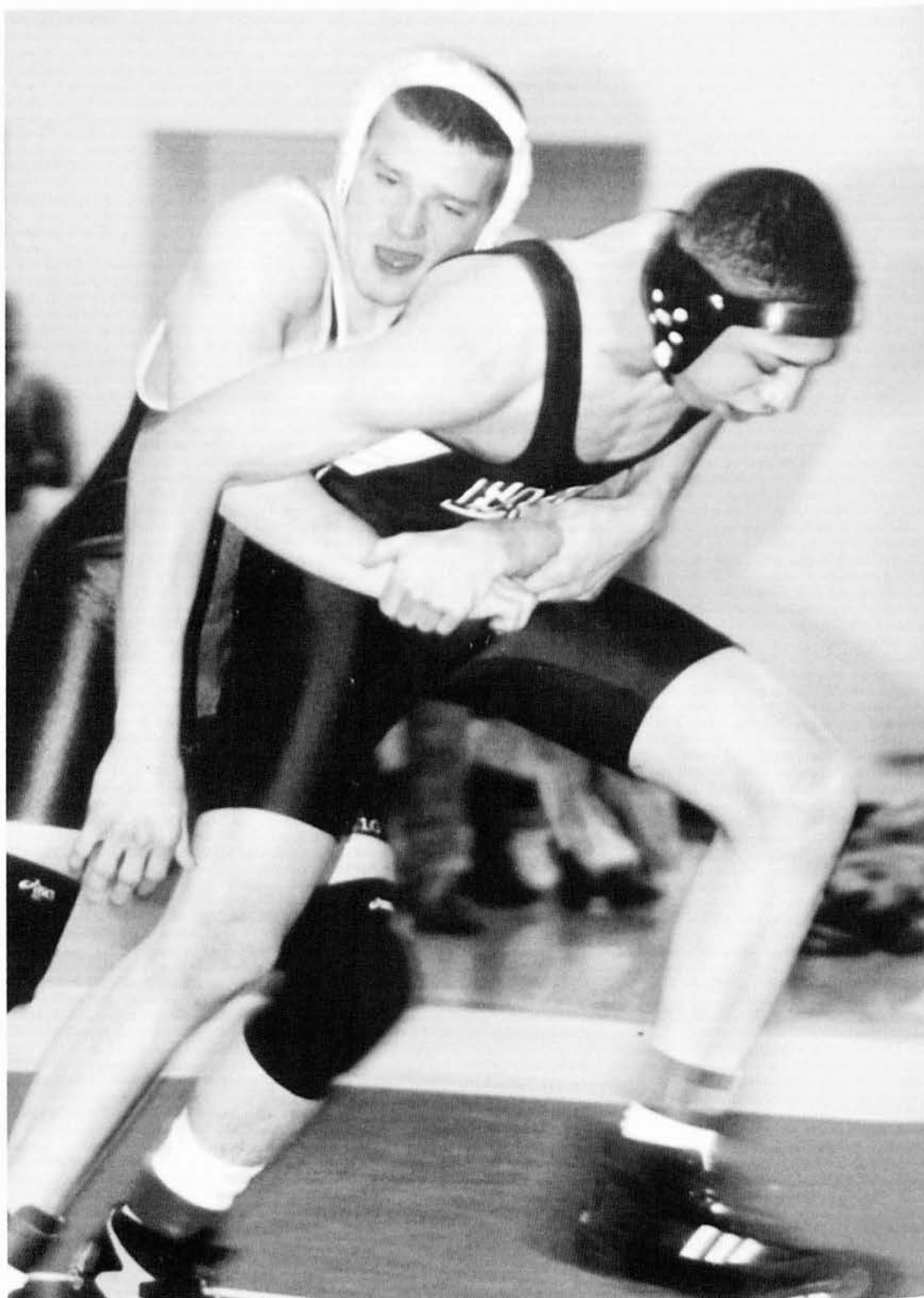

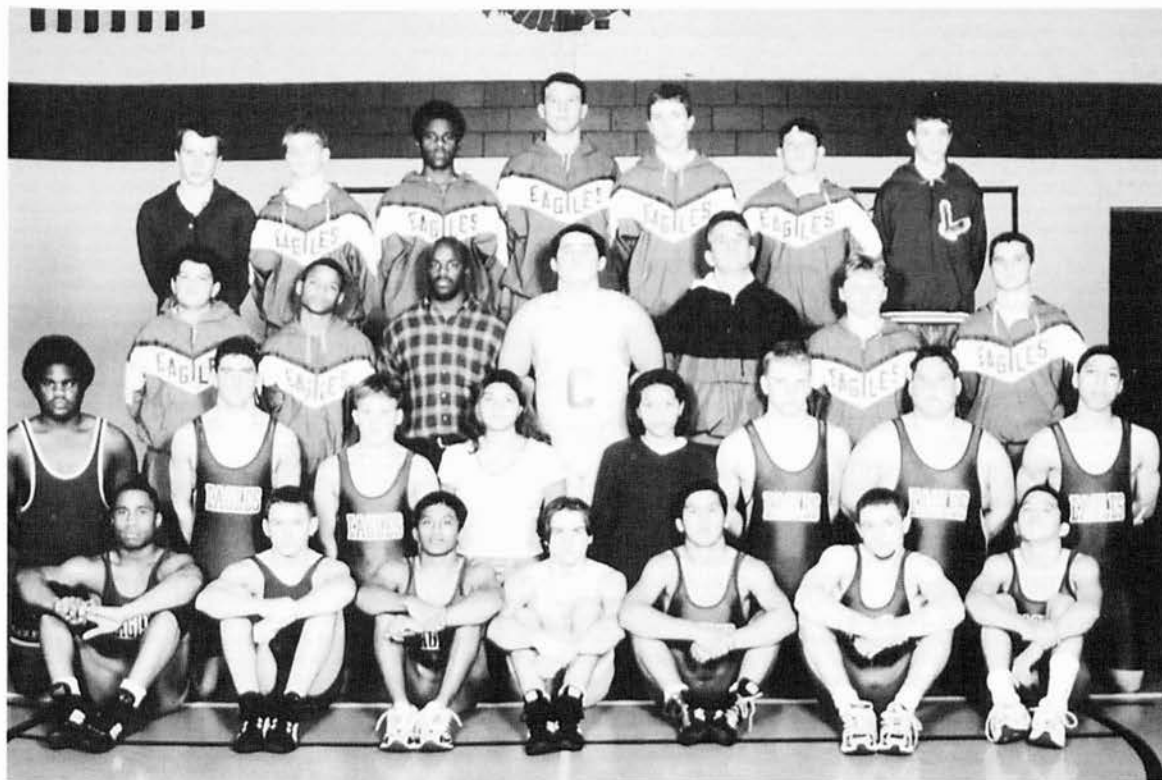
Combined, the wrestling team had over seven first-place finishes, seven second-place finishes, five third-place finishes and seven fourth-place finishes.

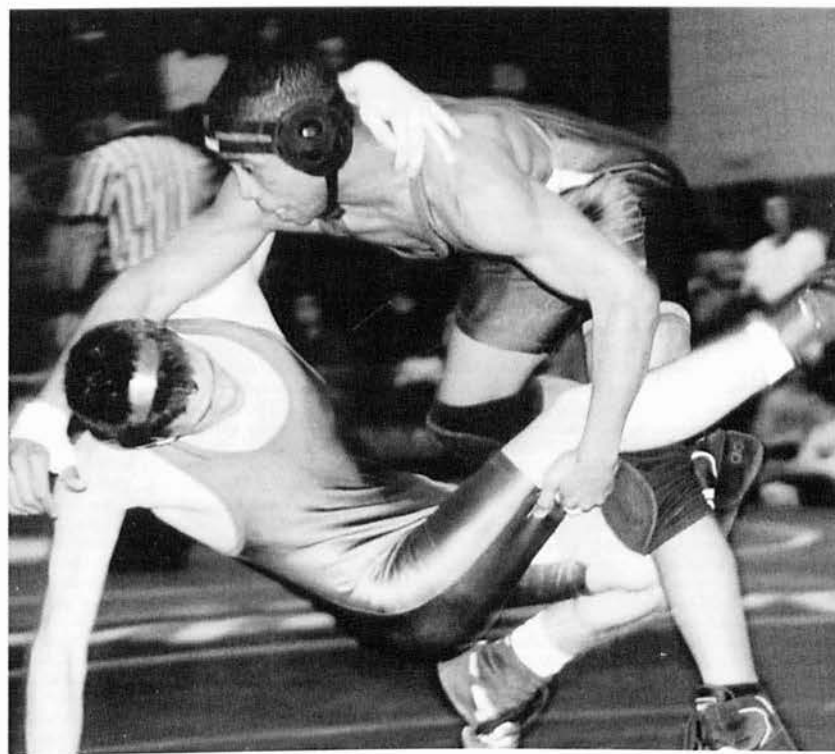
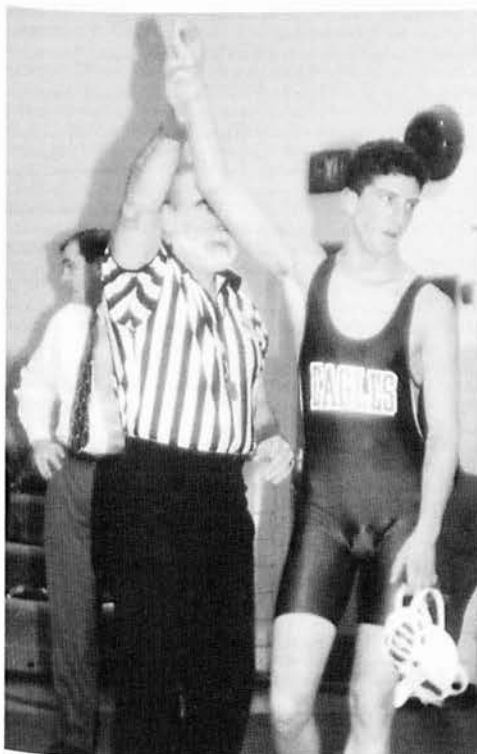

"I wanted to improve as much as I could and test my abilities," Aron Sweet(11) said.

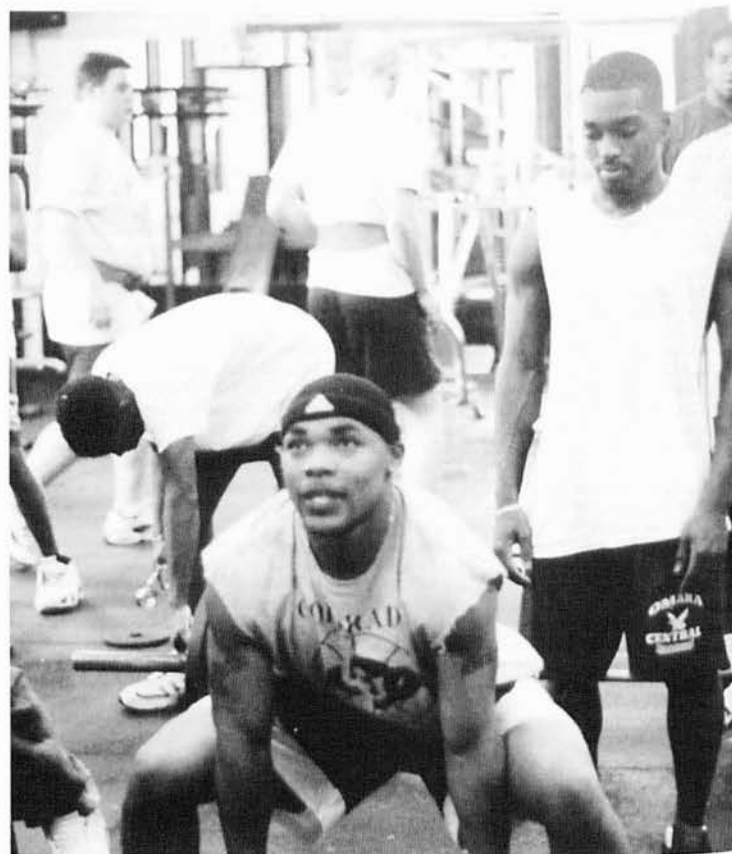

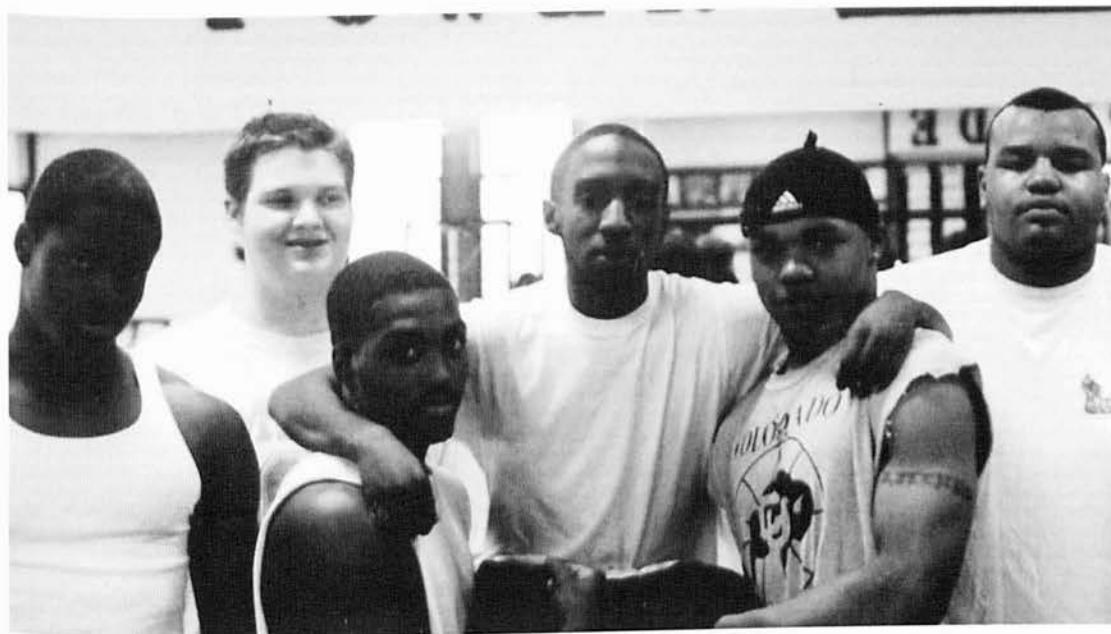
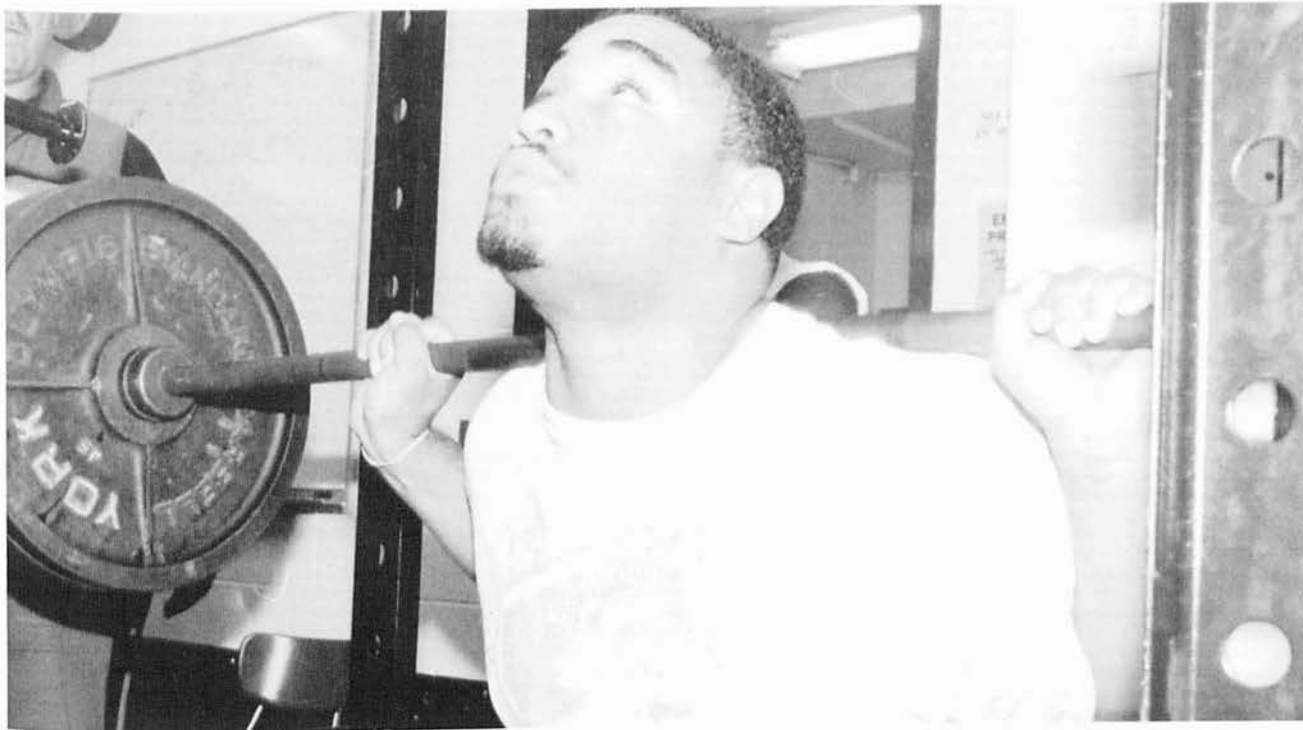
Each member had three chances at three different lifts: squat, bench and dead lift. The best of each of the lifts were added together to determine the winner of the weight class.

They conditioned and practiced from December until the first match in February. They practiced once a week and scrimmaged other teams until the beginning of the season.

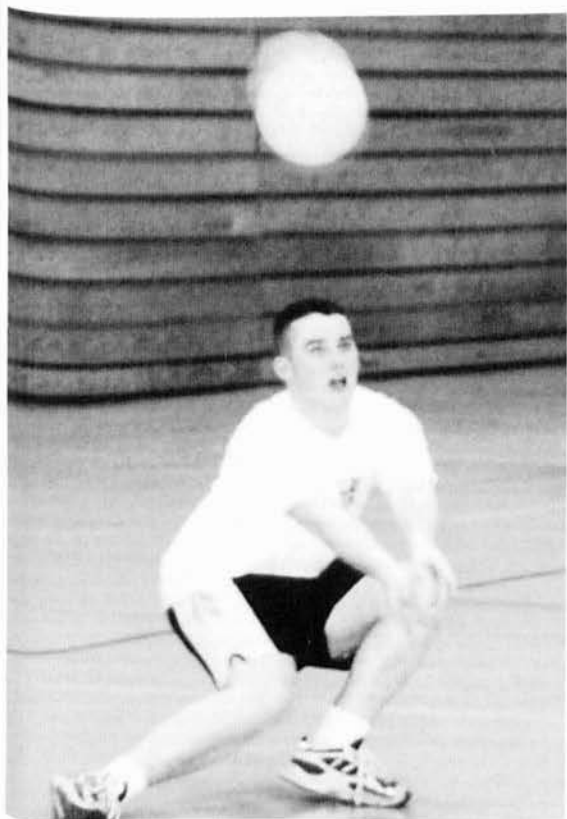
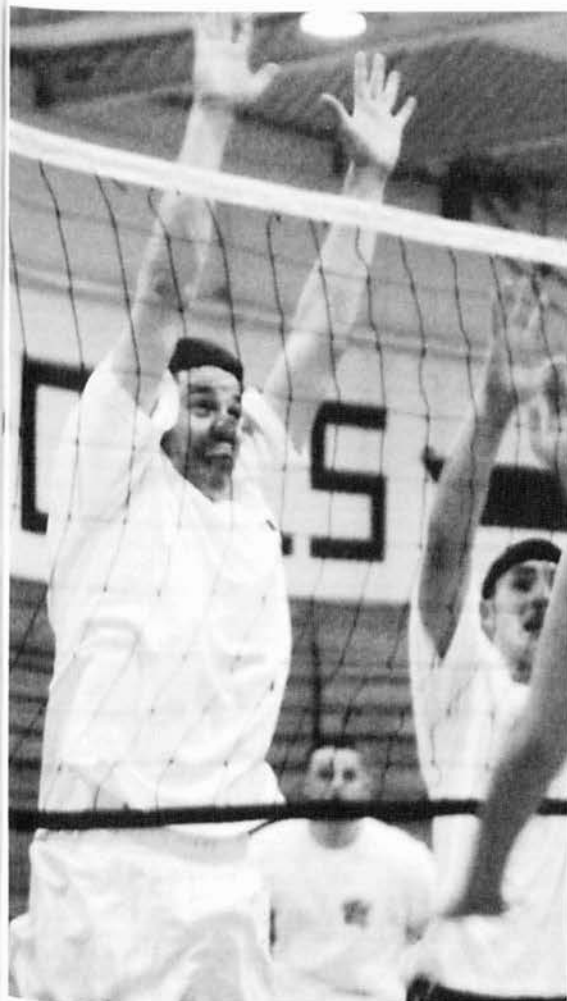

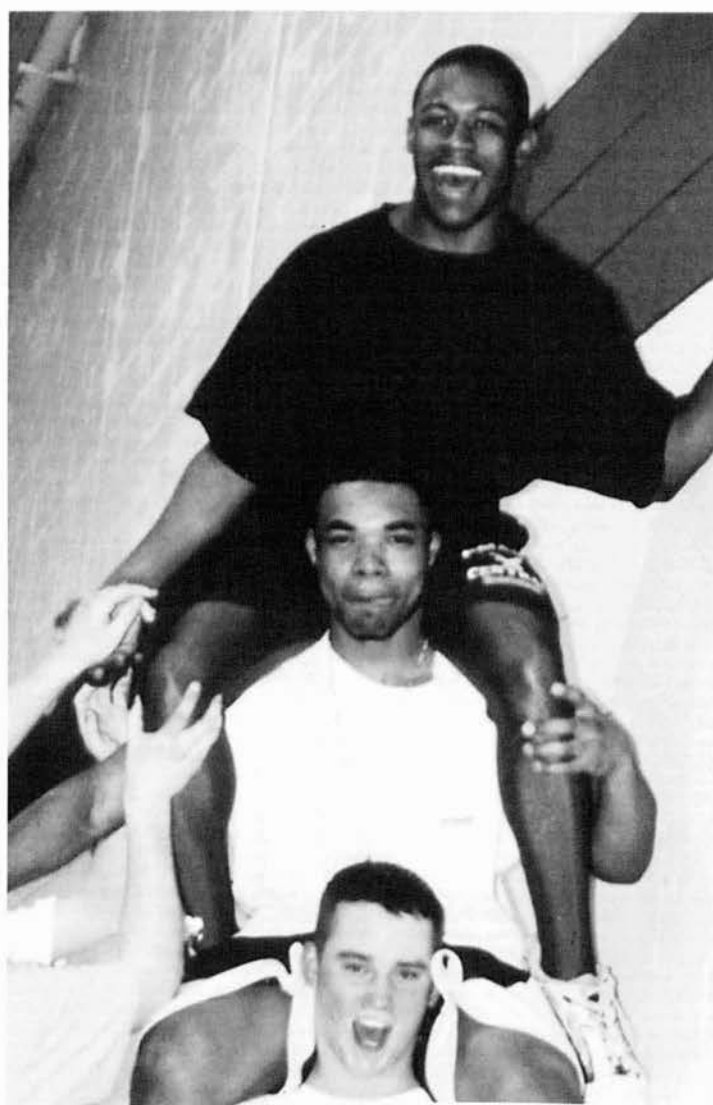
