To Present Ballet At Mass Meeting

Edw. Strawbridge, Lisa Parnova Lead Group; Played in Japan and With N. Y. Philharmonic

Edwin Strawbridge and Lisa Parnova, two outstanding ballet dancers, will be presented to the students of Central High school on February 8, at 1.15 in the new auditorium.

Accompanying Mr. Strawbridge and Miss Parnova will be an ensemble of six dancers and a piano accompanist. This group is the same one that was presented with the Philadelphia Symphony orchestral ast summer.

During the last coronation celebration in Japan, the Strawbridge group gave six command performances at the Imperial theatre in Tokio. They have danced with the New York Philharmonic Symphony orchestra in Carnegie Hall and with the Civic Opera association of Chicago. Their last New York performance was given in December 1936, at the Guild theatre.

Edwin Strawbridge studied under the famous Russian dancer, Adolph Bolm. He secured a position in the ballet which was then in rehearsal. After acting on the stage with such famous actresses as Margaret Anglin, Pauline Lord, and Arnold Daly, he soon realized that his one ambition was to become a dancer.

After his performances in Japan and a visit to China, Strawbridge returned via the Trans-Siberian railway and stopped off in Russia where he became enthralled by their work and was invited to return to dance

the next year. His success in New York has made him in demand for recitals.

"She has presence, poise, straint, and solidarity mingled with airiness, fragility and floating featherblown lightness. I fully expect to see her gain a spot in the upper stage, along with the sanctified few before whom the populace kneels," said Charles D. Isaacson, of the Dance magazine, in commenting on Lisa Parnova's dancing. Miss Parnova is well known as the ballerena of the opera in Cologne, Germany, with whom she has danced throughout Europe and appeared with great success in New York.

Grads Hear Haynes

Rowland Haynes, president of Omaha Municipal university, addressed the January seniors of North, Benson, and Central High schools in the Central High auditorium last Thursday evening. On the topic "Things Learned by Living."

This is a very good time to register and get acquainted with the library. After you have registered once, you will have no more trouble.

unds Lacking for Needed Improvements

Appropriations Are Decreased While Expenses Remain

Your school is sadly in need of repairs. It is old—and it looks old! If the schools had the money to pay for upkeep, Central would be a much more prepossessing institution. Are new students favorably impressed? Are old students proud to point out this gray and dingy building as their "alma mater"? The answer is obviously no.

The reason for this seeming neglect is lack of funds. Money appropriated from taxes has gone down and down. We still have the same needs and requirements as we did ten years ago, but we have \$940,000 less with which to meet these needs.

The average cost per student in 73 cities of 100,000 population or more is \$101.17 per year. Omaha, ranking fiftieth in current expenses among 73 cities, expends \$72.65 for this purpose. The average cost for instruction per pupil is \$78.98, while Omaha, ranking fifty-fourth, expends \$54.55.

In the year 1933, \$3,440.37 was provided for school supplies not to be sold to students. This year, not only has this amount been reduced to \$1,700, but out of this fund must come laundry for the gymnasium, and groceries, milk, and laundry for the Household Arts department. No relief from this situation can be seen unless a remedy can be found soon.

author played a year's run on Broadway before it started its road tour.

The same cast that has been playing this drama at the Federal theatre for the past three weeks will put it on for Central students at the cost of ten cents per person. The money will be used for the Student Aid fund. Miss Melva Gerard plays the lead as the lady of the jury. Gilbert Ray, Cecil Bernard, Neil Hickey, J. Gordon Kelly, Jean Dixon, and Bud Brownie will also take principal roles.

"Ladies of the Jury" tells of a murder case and a lady juror who has her own way. Between acts the Federal theatre orchestra will play.

Mr. Hill Critically Ill, Is Taken to Hospital

Fred Hill, dean of boys and assistant principal, is critically ill after an operation to remove a ruptured appendix last Thursday night. The appendix had been burst for three days before the operation, but his illness was attributed to flu.
