But bound together by their strangeness and homesickness they all live in the tiny little Parisian

saving enough money to return to their native countries. There is love, hate, sorrow, and sordidness in
their lives, but it is these human qualities that makes the characters so understandable.
The novel is the international prize winner of the

national board of judges, says, "The great virtues of this book are the freshness of the material and the
