## Students Prove That Imminent Threat Facing England Not Unparalleled in British History

The imminent threat facing England
today seems unparalleled in history.
Yet such a feat is not impossible, for
it has been done before. Julius Caesar
was the first invader of Britain.
The story of Caeser's first invasion
of Britain and the unusual similari-
ties and contrasts between Hitler's
and Caesar's aims, problems, and
methods were cleariy pointed out in
the World-Herald last Sunday by the
translation of those vivid chapters
from Caesar's "Gallic Wars," Cae-
sar's newspaper reports of those days
to the Roman people.
With the help and advice of Mrs.
Bernice Engle, head of the Latin de-
partment, and of Miss Josephine Fris-
bie and Mrs. Bessie Rathbun, twenty-
nine R.O.T.C. boys translated both of
Caesar's invasions, the first of which
was printed.
