These Ingredients Can Bring Success

Look around the country and it's not difficult to find large urban high schools that are floundering. Chicago, Kansas City, Cleveland, St. Louis, Philadelphia—the list goes on.

But aren't there some urban public schools that are showing the right way to go? Schools that through sound management and high standards achieve community respect?

Yes, and Omaha's Central High School is an example.

Central's reputation is such that Omaha Public Schools has decided to cap the enrollment. About 200 of the 890 students who picked Central as their No.1 choice have received word

that they will need to select another school.

Central, with nearly 2,400 students, has limited its incoming freshman class to 685 spots. It's the first time Nebraska's largest high school has imposed such a cap. The only other OPS high school that does so is Burke.

That Central needs to take this step is a tribute to the school's positive reputation—particularly impressive given that Central stands out for the wide income spectrum among its students, as well as the school's tremendous social diversity.

The many ingredients for Central's success can offer a blueprint for other high schools in Omaha and elsewhere:

- A school culture that encourages excellence in academics and sports and proclaims that message to the community.
- Breadth of academic and extracurricular offerings.
- A demonstrated ability to meet the academic needs of each level of students—those with below-average grades, those in the middle and those with above-average grades.
- Strong leadership from the principal and faculty. Such a reputation attracts high-quality teachers who want to teach there.
- Individual teachers recognized for excellence.
- Positive team spirit among faculty and staff.

- Impressive community support from parents, alumni and the school foundation.
- Ambitious goals that raise standards to new levels. One example is Central's recent addition of the International Baccalaureate program.
- Sensible handling of security procedures. A large urban high school needs to safeguard students and faculty without creating an intimidating prisonlike atmosphere.

There are many Nebraska high schools that can point to their own examples of excellence and success. Of course, no school can rest on its laurels.

The responsibility to maintain high standards and adapt to changing conditions is never-ending.

And Central has an ample share of challenges.

Central is a downtown urban high school, and such schools must deal with difficulties of a size and complexity that many other schools don't face.

But when such a school shows it can make progress and earn the community's respect, that not only speaks well of the school, it also offers hope for public education.

Senior Recognition

Frederick M. Bekins Class of 1943

The life of Fred Bekins is an outstanding example of love of country and family, success in business, and concern for community. After graduating from CHS in1943, Fred served in the Navy on aircraft carriers in combat situations in the South Pacific, receiving commendations that included the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal with battle star, the Philippine Liberation Medal with battle star, and the WWII Victory Medal. Upon his return, and after graduating from both Babson College and the University of Oslo, he began a distinguished career in the family's moving and storage business, eventually becoming president of the four generation Omaha family business. Fred and his wife, Sally, established the Bekins Foundation, an organization that provided grants to many needy organizations, in particular funding flag displays reflecting their deep love of our country. In addition to the work of the Bekins Foundation, Fred was active in many business and civic organizations throughout his life including serving as a 60+ year member of both the American Legion Post #1 and the downtown Rotary, and a Councilor of the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben. Fred also served as a longtime trustee of the Boy Scouts of America, the Omaha Home for Boys and the Church of the Cross.



Mike Gottschalk Booster

The establishment of the Central High School Foundation, Alumni Association, and the Hall of Fame can be attributed directly to the legal work, persistence, and dedication of attorney Mike Gottschalk. It was Mike who led the negotiations with the OPS superintendent and provided the legal work with the OPS School Board, allowing for the approval of the transfer of scholarship funds from the school district to the CHS Foundation, a foundation that was established and acquired 501) (c) (3) status also through the Mike's expert legal work. The intent of the transfer of funds, beyond providing scholarship support, included the hope that the funds collected could, at some point, also be used to address the needs of CHS students and to recognize outstanding students and faculty members. This hope has indeed come to fruition, and the CHS Foundation now oversees the awarding of scholarship funds and provides other financial support, if requested and approved, for additional CHS needs. For these reasons, the CHS community is indebted to Mike for his work in helping to establish the CHS Foundation which continues to grow and to provide support for both scholarships and other CHS initiatives.



Gerald A. Heeger Class of 1961

Having completed a B.A. (Cal-Berkeley) and an M.A. and Ph.D. (University of Chicago), Dr. Heeger developed a unique 40-year career in nontraditional higher education, focusing on adult learning, on affordability and access to higher education, and on the use of online technologies by institutions of higher education. As President of the University of Maryland University College (UMUC), he led that institution to be recognized as one of the leading online public universities in the world. He has also focused on new, entrepreneurial initiatives in higher education. Dr. Heeger served as organizing President of the Whitney International University System, a large scale distance learning initiative in Latin America now enrolling more than 100,000 students, and he was President of the American College of Education, an innovative research-based online teacher education institution that works with school districts to provide graduate degrees to teachers. He has also worked extensively in the field of accreditation, including international accreditation of higher education institutions. Dr. Heeger is an inductee in the International Adult and Continuing Education Hall of Fame.



Steve Marantz Class of 1969

Steve's career as a journalist began at CHS as sports editor of *The Register*. He attended University of Missouri School of Journalism, and went on to report, write and research for the Columbia Missourian, Kansas City Star, Trenton Times, Boston Globe, WHDH-TV, Sporting News, Boston Herald, and ESPN. His investigation of unscrupulous lending practices in Boston in the late 1980s led to home ownership for thousands of low-income families. Later in his career Steve wrote books. Of historical importance to CHS was his second book, *The Rhythm Boys of Omaha Central: High School Basketball at the '68 Racial Divide*. His story of Central's struggle during a time of upheaval and change, he said, was told to honor his family and the teachers and students who helped him come of age.



Aaron Marcus Class of 1961

Identifying Aaron "Buddy" Marcus as the "superstar" in both the theory and practice of information-oriented graphic design and its application to computer graphics is an indisputable fact. Aaron's creativity, vision, and understanding, as seen in the innovative design work produced by his company, Aaron Marcus and Associates (AM+A), in the fields of cross-cultural communication, graphic design, information design, semiotics, symbol design, typography, mobile user-interface design, and information visualization have set the gold standard for all others in this field. These software developments became major navigational keys to opening the world of computers to everyone. His company's creativity and expertise have been tapped by many large corporations, including AOL, Microsoft, Samsung, and Motorola, to name only a few. Aaron is an inductee in the Graphic Design Hall of Fame, a Fellow of the American Institute of Graphic Arts, and a member of the CHI Academy (Computer Human-Interaction), being the first graphic designer ever to be selected. In addition, Aaron has found the time to write six books and over 250 articles, and he has always recognized the importance of his education in the success he has achieved, at CHS where he was Editor-in-Chief of *The Register* and at Princeton and Yale.

Myron P. Papadakis Class of 1958

The skills and knowledge needed to achieve the success that Myron Papadakis has achieved in careers in aviation and law are unmatched. After graduating from Central (NHS and swim team captain), he attended UNL on a full Navy scholarship, majoring in mechanical engineering while competing as a varsity swimmer. "Pappy" entered the Navy as an officer, served as a naval carrier pilot, and as a second tour R&D test pilot. Following the Navy, he flew for Delta Airlines. He qualified as a line captain to fly six different jet airliners. He logged 23,500 accident free hours during a 37 year flight career. While a Delta pilot, Myron completed a law degree in 1974 and has practiced for 38 years. He is and has been an adjunct law professor for 21 years. His trial law career has focused on aircraft accidents; he has evaluated, investigated, or litigated in excess of 450 aviation crash cases. He has written two reference textbooks and published at least 50 articles on aviation safety, product liability and litigation. He is a Fellow of the International Society of Air Safety Investigators. Several cases he has worked have been the source material for television and films.



Leonard L. Rosen Class of 1952

A highly successful business career, holding both Program Manager and President positions at several high-tech companies and lifelong athletic achievements in several sports highlight the life of Leonard Rosen. At CHS, Leonard competed in football, wrestling and track, winning state championships in wrestling and track. At UNL, Leonard competed in football and track, winning several track honors. He has continued competing in Masters and Seniors Track and Field, winning gold medals in several regional and national events. As an engineer with Rockwell International, he led integration and test programs for the first cruise missile guidance system, the first ICBM guidance system, the Polaris/Poseidon submarine guidance system and the first military miniaturized semiconductor digital computer. With Raytheon, he was the program manager of the Hawk Missile Defense System, The Patriot Missile Defense System and restricted Smart Munitions Programs. During his residency at ITT, he directed the total effort for air traffic and other radar systems programs for the U.S. forces and over twenty other nations. In addition to these achievements, Leonard has also been a college MBA instructor, a councilor and seminar presenter for the Small Business Administration and a high school weight coach.



John "Pop" Schmidt Distinguished Educator

The teaching and coaching career of John "Pop" Schmidt covers approximately four decades with 31 of those years at Central High School as a teacher of physics, chemistry, biology, math, German, Head Football Coach (1921-1927), and Head Track Coach (1921-1945), winning state titles in 1922, 1924, and 1945, while being state runner-up in1923 and 1925. In his honor, Central established several awards, including the J.G. "Pop" Schmidt Memorial Trophy to each year's outstanding track athlete. Pop Schmidt's concern for his students was recognized by many, including CHS Principal, J. Arthur Nelson who said, "He was genuinely interested in the welfare and progress of his students and was ever willing to give a helping hand to those who needed it. He was a man of kindly counsel, and he stood firmly by that which is right. John Schmidt is a great part of that tradition which is Central...," a former athlete who stated that, "New blood in the coaching line might bring more winning teams, but it cannot bring a team that has any better ideals of sportsmanship than the teams under the regime of Coach Schmidt," and another former player who stated, "Papa's nickname said it all. He was a father to all kids."



Dr. Melvin Wade, Sr. Class of 1962

Following the completion of his undergraduate studies at Bishop College and his graduate studies at Perkins Theological Seminary and, ultimately completing his M.A. and Doctor of Ministry Degree at Faith Theological Seminary, Dr. Wade served in churches in both Dallas and Houston, and since 1975, he has served as Senior Pastor of the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church in Los Angeles. As Senior Pastor, Dr. Wade has worked to end gang violence and, at the same time, he helped with the community's successful proposal to receive a 4.5 million dollar grant to build a 40 unit apartment complex for his community's senior citizens. He has also been the President of the National Missionary Baptist Convention, and he has served on the Board of the World Baptist Alliance Executive Council, a role which has allowed him to address world issues. In addition to these accomplishments, Dr. Wade is an accomplished author and gospel music vocalist and composer, and with the help of Wade family, he has shown great strength in being a leukemia survivor.



Eric L. Whitner Class of 1976

Eric Whitner, attorney at law, professor of law, and community advocate, gave of himself in support of multiple communities, including Central High School, North Omaha neighborhoods, and the greater metropolitan Omaha area. Preparing himself academically, a CHS graduate at 16, followed by his undergraduate studies at UNO, UCLA, and Emory University, culminating in a B.A. and leading him eventually to achieve two legal degrees, both a J.D. and an LL.M. (Master of Law) from Emory, Eric used his knowledge and desire to help others through establishing his own Omaha law firm, being General Counsel for the Omaha Housing Authority, and serving as a Deputy Douglas County Attorney. His community influence was also felt through his membership on several community boards, including being President of the Midlands Bar Association, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Butler-Gast YMCA in North Omaha, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Metropolitan Omaha/Council Bluffs YMCA. Eric also served as campaign chairman for the Charles Drew Health Center, allowing the facility to expand and, as a result, to provide services to many more people. Eric's actions, indeed, showed his love and support for all communities in the metropolitan area.

EAGLES IN THE HEADLINES





For the first time in Central history, both the Boys and Girls Varsity Basketball teams took first place in Nebraska's Class A State Basketball Tournaments. Both coaches—Tom Lee and Eric Behrens—celebrated the twin wins and each had extraordinary things to say of their players.

Kelly Means, a business and marketing teacher for Central High School, took first place for her submission to "Share an Idea," as part of the annual Mountain-Plains Business Education Association Conference in August of 2011. Her submission for the conference was titled, "This for That: A Barter."

Allison Dutton '12, recent graduate of Central High School, was a featured designer during Omaha Fashion Week on August 22, 2011. Her creativity was featured on the runway during one of their evening shows.

Colin Brown, a teacher in the CHS Music Department, was published in an issue of Nebraska Music Educator. His article, "Teaching with Live, Interactive Videoconferencing," described how music students at Central High School worked with an instructor from the Manhattan School of Music via videoconferencing. The article was published in August 2011.

In September 2011, Central High School's **Veronica Hatfield '15**, was elected by the Omaha Area Youth Orchestras (OAYO) Board to be student representative for the Conservatory Orchestra.

Marika Svolos '13, received city-wide attention for her excellence in academics after receiving perfect scores on both the SAT and the ACT on her first tries. Only a junior, Svolos said she was prepared to take the tests again her senior year. She did not expect the outcome for both tests to be perfect. "I think a 34 would have been pretty good," Svolos speculated of the ACT. "But I would've taken it again." Her fan and teacher, Greg Sand, has full confidence in her ability, calling her future "a bright one" and even claiming that she would be "the perfect professor at a university" one day.





Riley Maxwell '12, a recent senior of Central High School, received recognition from the judges at the Douglas County Fair for her excellence in pottery. Four of her pieces advanced to the Nebraska State Fair, where her Raku pots received first place and her larger piece—a blue pot with bold stripes—received a second place ribbon.

Jodi Martinez, Central High's English Department head, was nominated for the University of Chicago's Outstanding Educator Award in September 2011. Martinez was nominated by a freshman at the University of Chicago for "challenging and inspiring them along their path toward their intellectual goals."

The Eagles Marching Band, directed by Pete Wilger, received first place for their performance at The Battle of the Bands Tournament on September 24, 2011. The annual tournament is held at Papillion La Vista South High School.

Danielle Brandt, an English teacher at Central High School, received support from DonorsChoose.org for a classroom project she calls "Embracing a Part-Time Indian and The Hunger Games!"

On February 18, 2012 **Ronald Wells '12,** won his 2nd consecutive State Wrestling Title and became Central High School's 120th State Wrestling Champion.

Central High School math teacher, **Greg Sand**, and his student, **Nathan Borcyk '14**, were



recognized in The Omaha World-Herald as the Nebraska Department of Education pushed for higher-level math courses. Sand's class, Enrichment Math, was highlighted in the article for its focus on miscellaneous topics designed to strengthen mathematics understanding.

The Eagles represented CHS well at the Midland University Math contest held on October 20, 2011. **Ethan Koch '14** and **Adam Lacroix '12** took fifth place. **Avery Zaleski '13** took second, and **Marika Svolos '13** took first in their respective competitions.

Jayde Balentine '12, recent graduate of Central High School, was awarded the top prize for her work as a student journalist and the Editor-in-Chief of Central's O-Book in March 2012: Nebraska State High School Journalist of the Year. She was recognized at the NSAA State Journalism Competition awards ceremony, held at UNL in May 2012.

Congratulations to **Harrison Simmons '12,** who is the recipient of a National Merit Scholarship. This award is based on strong performance on the PSAT Test taken during the junior year. Harrison was among 16,000 semifinalist who competed for this award.

I'm sure you've heard this before, but the time I spent at Central High School was more valuable to me than the time I spent at the University of Michigan.

I think it was two things. One is rather intangible, but very important. It's the culture that exists at the school. Terms like tradition and culture that may not register with a 15 year-old, now registers with an 84 year-old. Second, specific teachers had a great impact on me, and back then, as I "ran for classes," I knew whose class I really wanted to be sitting in. Even today, the names like Mrs. Elliott, Ruth Pilling, Virginia Lee Pratt are meaningful to me.


In addition to the fine education I received I'd like to tell you about a couple important parts of my life that had their beginnings here.

1941 to 1945 at Central covered the entire World War II. I was in R.O.T.C. and I loved it. As part of the Crack Squad we went around the state to military bases and USO's and performed. When I graduated from Michigan we were required to join a reserve unit. I was in Los Angeles and joined the 40th infantry division of the National Guard where I was the acting platoon leader of a heavy weapons company. One of the reasons I got that rank was the preparation I had in R.O.T.C. When I moved back to Omaha, I gave them notice and four days later the War in Korea broke out and the unit was sent to the Pusan perimeter. Another platoon leader was a friend and he said they just got massacred. When I got to Omaha, I went with an Air Force Reserve unit. You slept in a bed at night and had a much better chance of not getting killed. I was activated and spent my entire career as editor of the base newspaper at Offutt AFB.

I admired the military; it taught me a lot. When I was discharged I became a founding member of the Air and Space Museum, now located near Ashland. And just recently I joined the board of the Korean War National Museum. It all started at Central High School.

My parents gave me a baby brownie camera when I was nine and when I entered Central. I became the photographer for *The Register.* When I went to Michigan I was a photographer for their daily, and photo editor of the yearbook. My first job at the Sun Newspapers in Omaha was as a photographer and writer. I wound up owning those papers and sold them to Warren Buffett, but stayed on and ran them. In 1973, Warren, Paul Williams and I won a Pulitzer Prize for local investigative journalism for a financial exposé of Boys Town.

When Warren bought the Buffalo News, it was in stiff competition with another paper and we knew only one would survive. Warren and I traveled to Buffalo and would plan strategy in Omaha. I moved there in 1980, the competition folded in 1982 and I became publisher.



I'm still there, and Warren Buffett, as you would expect, has had a huge impact on my life. He's the boss, but he's more of a friend, and while we talk business, we also talk politics, leadership, as well as personal matters. If I hadn't started with the Central High School *Register*, I'd be a lot poorer financially and wouldn't have a friend like Warren Buffett.

The other thing I learned in Omaha that I have not found in my travels elsewhere is that Omaha private sector leaders get up in the morning and say, "What am I going to do for my city today?" When Lewis and Clark crossed the plains of Nebraska, they sent a messenger back to Washington telling them that this was a desert and they shouldn't try and settle here. They couldn't have been more wrong when it comes to Omaha. Establishing a successful culture is no small task. Omaha has it; and Central High has it.

You can see why Central High played such an important role in my life.

A 21st Century Capital Campaign

In an effort to bring Omaha Central High School into the 21st century and bridge the digital divide, Omaha Public Schools, Central High School, and the Central High School Foundation all expended effort and money in support of the Central High School Wireless Campaign and made it a reality. Introduced in March of 2011, the Central High School Foundation raised the \$400,000 needed for the wireless infrastructure. The lead gift of the campaign was made by Pamela Bartling Buffett '60 in memory of her late husband, Fred C. Buffett '55.

The campaign, which was chaired by Matt '74 and Sheri Aden, provides a 21st Century learning environment for all students at Central High School. Moving Central high School into the 21st Century was a \$1.4 million dollar project – from building the infrastructure to providing access to wireless devices for every student. The project included wireless Internet infrastructure, the broadband to support it, classroom equipment, and teacher training.

"The campaign focused on raising funds to create a technological infrastructure to support learning at Central High School for the next 20 years," said chair Matt Aden '74. "The overwhelming support of our alumni, community and supporters has been evident throughout the capital campaign, and we sincerely appreciate their investment in the future of Central High School."

In addition to providing a 21st Century learning environment for all students at Central High School, the Central High School Wireless Campaign achieved several other milestones:

- The campaign finished a year ahead of schedule.
- Online state testing was completed at CHS in 4 days rather than the 24 days that it took for the prior school year
- CHS is the only high school in the Omaha Public Schools that is completely wireless.
- Interactive Smartboards were installed in each one of Central High School's 75 classrooms.

"The reality was that our alumni and community answered the bell and supported Omaha's downtown high school," said Dr. Keith Bigsby, Principal of CHS. "Their love of Central High School and their depth of loyalty are just incredible."

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
