MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

After my third year as the President of the Central High School Foundation, I am truly honored to be the representative of this great organization; one with 35,000 living alumni, friends, family and fans of the oldest high school in the Omaha metro area. I have also come to have a greater appreciation for what it takes to keep Omaha Central High School, one of public education's great legacy high schools, relevant in the 21st century. Some of the daily challenges that face Central High School include limited financial resources, aging facilities, unfunded federal, state and local government mandates, public relations, student recruitment and a host of other considerations. However, there is one challenge that I have become very concerned about; a challenge that may impact the future of Central High School and its position as one of America's premier secondary educational institutions: the "Opportunity Gap."

The "Opportunity Gap" was identified in 2012 by a Harvard political scientist, Robert Putnam. Putnam's research compared family investments of time and money in today's children with investments made in children 30 or more years ago. What he discovered was that there are increasing income class disparities – in favor of the upper class – in the time and money invested in children, and those children's participation in educational enrichment activities. The participation rate disparities were seen in sports, music, arts and afterschool clubs. Putnam's research also indicates that there appears to be growing participation gaps in student involvement in various social institutions, such as churches and community groups as a result of poor income. In short, Putnam found that for schools like Central, where 58% of the student body qualifies for free and reduced lunch, the chances of it being as academically and socially successful compared to more affluent peer schools is lessened. If left unaddressed, the "Opportunity Gap," which is an issue of educational equality for all young people regardless of their family's income, has serious long-term implications not only for Central High School, but for our entire country.

To minimize the impact of the "Opportunity Gap" on Central's students, the Central High School Foundation works every day to ensure that the educational opportunities and experiences afforded to our Eagles are second to none and available to everyone who chooses to participate. The Foundation has – and currently does – support activities and developments that include securing funding for annual field trips to the Holocaust Museum in Washington DC for Holocaust Literature classes, Language Inversion Weekend in Minnesota for our foreign language students, and the World War I Museum in Kansas City for history students. We have raised funds for a host of individual classroom needs, such as upgrading the sound system in the auditorium, purchasing digital cameras for the Journalism Department, providing iPads for Special Education, and bilingual dictionaries for English Language Learners. These activities and initiatives are just a small sample of what the Central High Foundation does every day to ensure that ALL Central students have access to a four-year academic experience grounded in a traditional college prep curriculum and supplemented with a broad base of experiential and enrichment learning.

In addition to direct student support, the Central High School Foundation has also taken on two major capital projects. The Legacy Plaza and the Central High School Addition are major efforts that will help ensure that the Foundation will be able to continue its mission in working to minimize the impact of the "Opportunity Gap" for years to come. You may overview the scope of the Legacy Plaza on page 7 and the new addition on pages 8 and 9.

It is my opinion that Central High School must be supported by its alumni, families and friends so it may continue its excellence in educating tomorrow's citizens and leaders of conscience, as well as work to narrow the "Opportunity Gap." We must help the school champion the upward academic, social and economic mobility of its increasingly diverse student body. Central High must be able to create and provide educational experiences that allow ALL of our students to participate and excel in their chosen academic and extracurricular endeavors, as well as expand their understanding of their future roles in our global society. The support that Central High School needs today so it can continue to be Central High School tomorrow is truly the mission of the Foundation.

In closing, I would like to thank each of you for your ongoing support of the Central High School Foundation and the unique educational projects, opportunities and experiences it provides ALL Central students. The success of the Foundation demonstrates that our alumni, families and friends have the emotional and financial commitment to ensure our school, Omaha Central High School, will continue to shine as a beacon for public education and not become a victim of the "Opportunity Gap."

Generation “C”

ROGER AND GALE SAYERS

ROGER AND GALE SAYERS are two brothers who exemplify what it means to be Eagles. Both gifted athletes in their youth and motivated businessmen in their later years, they have illustrated a shared commitment to their community and Central High School.

Each brother got their start to athletic glory at Central, both playing football and sometimes sharing time on the field. Roger, CHS 1960, was known for his speed and went on to have an impressive career as a track star for what was then Omaha University and the United States Track Team. In 1962 and 1963, while competing for UNO, Roger won consecutive NAIA championships in the 100 meters while also winning the 200 meter championship in 1963. As a result of his career, he has been inducted into the University of Nebraska at Omaha Hall of Fame, the Nebraska Black Sports Hall of Fame, the Omaha Sports Hall of Fame, and the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame. Gale, CHS 1961, was a dynamic and impressive high school athlete, and became a football legend first at the University of Kansas, and then as a running back for the Chicago Bears. During his four season career with the Bears, he was named Rookie of the Year and All-Pro; and he set season records for total offense, touchdowns, and a single game scoring record with 6 touchdowns. His long list of awards includes being the youngest inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame at the age of 29, and an award-winning movie, “Brian’s Song,” was scripted from his 1970 autobiography, *I Am Third*.

Beyond athletics, Roger and Gale aimed to make names for themselves professionally. Roger is retired following a 26-year career as the Director of Benefits Administration at Union Pacific. He also served the City of Omaha as its Director of Human Relations under Mayor Gene Leahy. He is still an active member of the community, and has held many prominent positions including trustee of Salem Baptist Church, Board President of both the La Fern Williams Stage Theatre and the Urban League of Nebraska, Nebraska Coordinator of the United Negro College Fund, and member of the Board of Directors of the Central High School Foundation and the Make-A-Wish Foundation of Nebraska. Gale had a successful career as the athletic director at Southern Illinois University, followed by various entrepreneurship endeavors. He started Sayers and Sayers Enterprises, a sports marketing and public relations firm, before launching Sayers Computer Source, which provided commercial customers with technology products and brought in revenue of more than \$150 million. In retirement, Gale still devotes a great deal of time supporting and raising funds for dozens of charitable organizations.

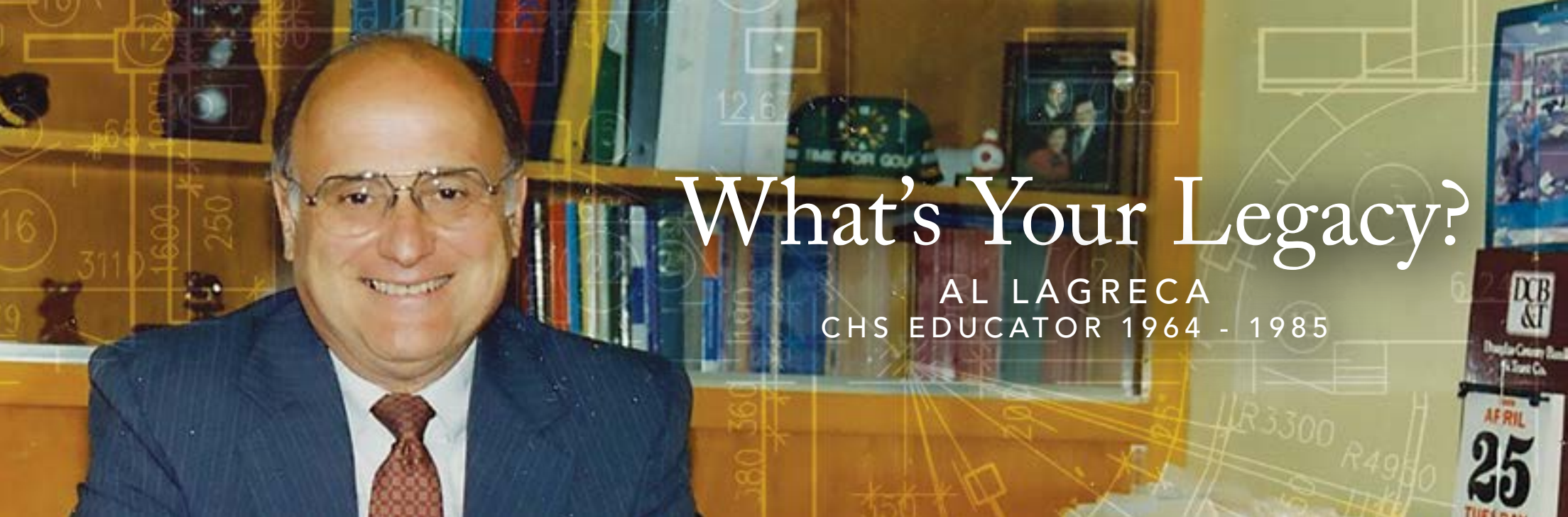

What's Your Legacy?

AL LAGRECA
CHS EDUCATOR 1964 - 1985

THE YEAR 1968 was one of vivid memories for Celann LaGreca and her brother Tim. It was a time of political turmoil and racial tension not only for the city of Omaha, but for the country as a whole. On March 4th, high school and college-aged protesters gathered outside Omaha's civic center to protest the outwardly-segregationist presidential campaign of George Wallace. When counter protesters collided with them, things turned violent. A month later, news of the death of Martin Luther King Jr. made its way into their living room, straight to the ears of their father, Central High School's new Assistant Principal, Anthony "Al" LaGreca.

"I was nine years old," recalled Tim, "We were watching TV with my Dad when news broke of MLK's assassination. Dad shot out of his chair saying, 'No! Oh, no!'"

Celann remembers during that year that her father really showed his spirit as a peace-keeper, an activist, and above all, an educator. She said when she or her brothers asked their dad about what was happening he took the time to explain that while the actions of the riots – looting and destroying property – were not appropriate, they were a reaction to a much larger problem.

"He took the time to explain to us the underlying reason as to why people were reacting the way they did," said Tim. "I am so grateful that my father's example ingrained in me the lessons of empathy and tolerance that I try hard to live up to today."

Al LaGreca took those lessons of empathy and tolerance with him to work every day, too. Finding his calling as an educator, he worked as a history and economics teacher at Central High School from 1964 until he was promoted to Assistant Principal in 1968. Suddenly, Al was tasked with disciplining students at the state's largest and most diverse high school during what's considered to be some of our country's most tumultuous years.

"He used those difficult times as teaching opportunities," said Celann. "He was tremendously proud of Central. He loved the diversity and how it represented the City of Omaha as a whole. He was just so proud of the strong academics and especially the diversity."

Al was born to Italian immigrants John and Anna Paldino LaGreca in 1927. His parents emigrated from Italy through Ellis Island in the early 1900's, married in New York City, and eventually settled in Omaha. He was the youngest of six children, grew up on the western edge of Omaha's "Little Italy" on 12th and Bancroft, and attended St. Patrick's elementary school. His mother embraced American culture and insisted that the family only speak English in their home.

Al graduated from Creighton Prep in 1945 and Tulsa University in 1950 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration and worked for a time at Union Pacific in the accounting department. After marrying his wife Katherine Kennelly in 1954, he went back to school to become certified to teach high school and later earned a Master's Degree in Education from Creighton University. He and Katherine had three children: Celann, Tim, and Patrick. Al was known for all of his 21 years at Central to be a loving, reasonable, and fair student administrator; and a natural teacher, enthusiastic to help, listen, and educate.

"Many times he created a positive situation out of a negative one," said Gerry Zerse, a Counselor at Central from 1974 to 1995. "He was an awesome mediator."

Celann said her father had a deep respect for other people, and that contributed to the success he had as an educator. She thinks his experience being the child of immigrants made him sensitive to the feeling of being an outsider.

"I think that had a profound impact on him and the way he treated other people," she said. "I think he identified with the minority experience. Consequently, he treated all people with respect and was a natural advocate for people who came from challenging backgrounds."

So, in 1968, when faced with the task of educating and disciplining students in the midst of racial and political tension, he approached each situation with deep understanding, firm resolve, and optimism.

"I cannot tell you how many times I was with him when we would run into former students," said Tim, "All of them inevitably told a similar story about getting into trouble and being sent to see Mr. LaGreca. He would deliver a philosophical lecture, maybe try to scare them a bit, and then give them a second chance."

He was known as the king of second chances. He believed that the students were capable of orchestrating their own redemption.

"The majority of Al's job was discipline," said Gerry Zerse. "Sometimes he gave a stern warning, sometimes he dealt out punishment. The awesome thing was that always, after their encounter, Al followed up and maintained a relationship with that student. He thereafter knew that student's name and managed to be a positive influence in countless ways."

In the midst of the civil rights movement, Al volunteered to be a part of Omaha Public School's Desegregation Task Force, which aimed to integrate the bussing system for the entire school district. Although controversial, Celann recalled that he felt it was a very important issue at the time. A result of Omaha Public School's attempt to desegregate the bus system was that many students' families moved their kids to schools in west Omaha, but Al took the backlash in stride.

"Sure it was met with community pushback, but it was needed at the time and he believed in equal opportunities and balance within the school district," she said.

Throughout the years, Al formed relationships with staff from all across Omaha Public Schools. It didn't matter if someone worked as a janitor at the school, or as an administrator, teacher or Principal, said Celann, they all were considered his friends and meant a good deal to him.

It was one of Al's dreams to be the principal of his own school, so in 1985, after 21 years at Central, he moved to Beveridge Junior High for the final 5 years of his career. Celann remembers the transition as being bittersweet.

"As much as he loved Central, he had always wanted the opportunity to have his own school. The last 5 years were a perfect end to his career," she said. "He loved working as a principal, and he loved the middle school-aged kids too. He'd say, 'they're kinda squirrely, but I love them.'"

Al remained a fan of Central High School for the rest of his life, until he passed away on August 25, 2014. For his memorial he asked that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the Central High School Foundation. That support ensures that Central continues to remain a beacon of diversity and acceptance for our community, just as he fought to keep it that way in 1968.

"Central was just so much a part of him and who he was," said Celann. "Central was his life's career. He loved that school. He really did. He thought it was the best school in Omaha. In many, many ways, it still is."

Central High was the second National Honor Society chapter chartered by the NASSP and is known as the Beta Chapter.

BUILDING UPON

WHEN BUILDING A NEST, a bird will often spend time searching its habitat for natural materials, weaving together strong twigs, durable leaves, and soft grass to create a safe space for their young birds to grow. By the time they are done, their nest looks like a work of art. Built from the best materials found in their own community, their home is intricately designed, sturdy, and uniquely their own.

At the Central High School Foundation we have been working hard this past year to do exactly that same thing: weave together support and strength found in our own Eagle community to craft what will be an intricately designed, sturdy addition to our nest meant to meet the needs of our young Eagles.

This year the Central High School Foundation announced a plan for a new 45,000 sq. ft. addition to be built on the east side of the school. The new addition, which will cost between \$15 and \$21 million, will create a new library, black box theater, visual art, vocal, and instrumental music classrooms. The project will also include the repurposing of 20,000 sq. ft. of existing space within the school to be used for general classrooms.

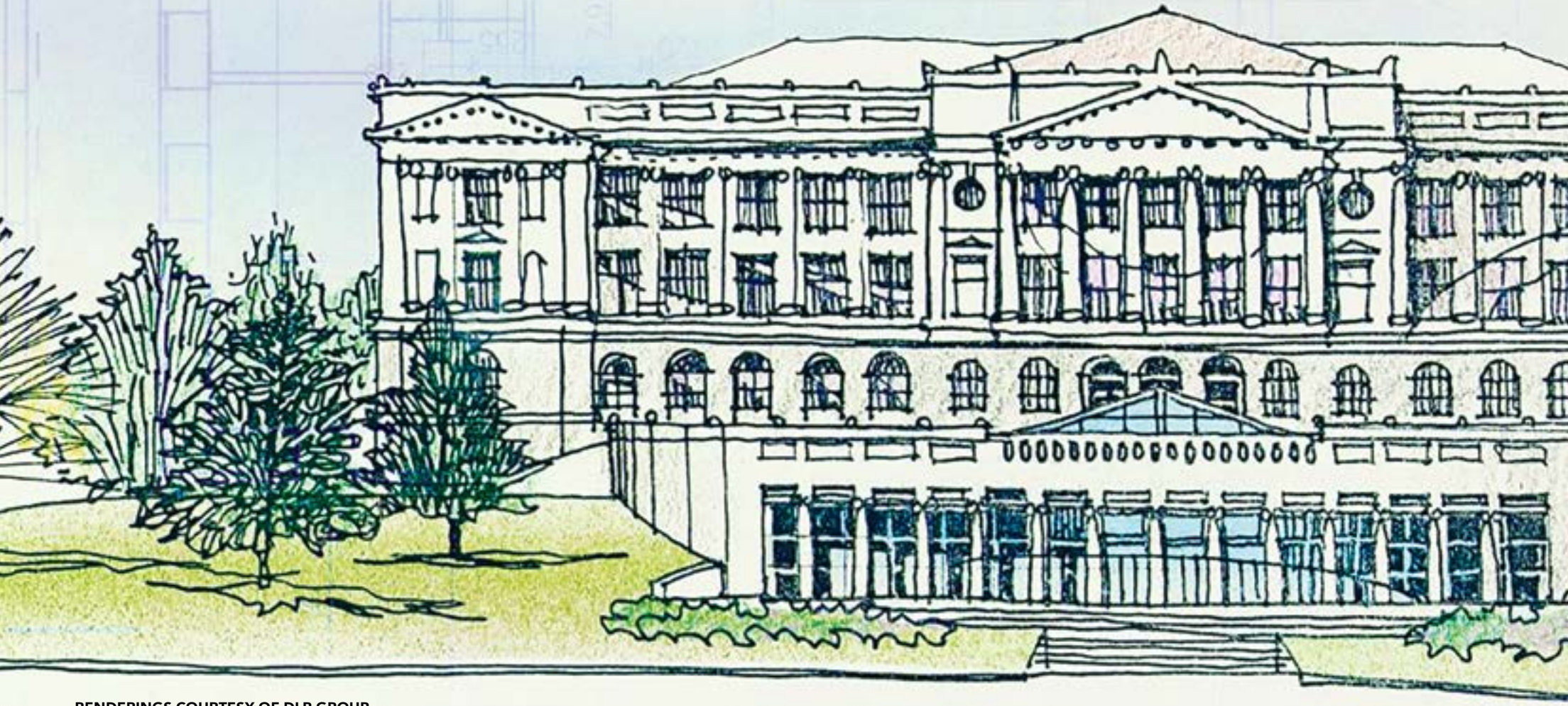
“We’re always excited when private funders want to expand and grow one of our facilities,” OPS Superintendent Mark Evans said.

Central High School hasn’t seen facility updates for visual arts, theater, vocal, and instrumental music since 1932, and the last major renovations Central has undergone was in 1999 when, as part of OPS’s bond program, the school added a new gymnasium, gym lobby, and updated the kitchen and cafeteria. The library hasn’t been moved in the entire 156-year history of the school and, as noted by members of the Omaha Public School board, it is very small given the size of the student population.

“It’s overdue,” said Michele Roberts, Executive Director of the Central High School Foundation. “It really is. The building is over 150 years old. We need to make sure it fits the needs of students for the next 150 years.”

As it is, visual arts and music students are squeezed into spaces too small for the big things they’re creating; the art department uses old attic hallways to store supplies and band students practice sectionals in the gym lobby, outside the stadium, and in the auditorium gallery. Other departments and programs at Central have a difficult time finding space as well: College Planning set up their consultation area at the base of the basement stairs and special education classrooms have been fashioned out of closed-off loading docks. The new addition would free up space to allow other programs to spread their wings.

“We’re thrilled about this opportunity for our fine arts students. But we are equally or even more thrilled about the opportunity to repurpose existing spaces to accommodate all Central students.”

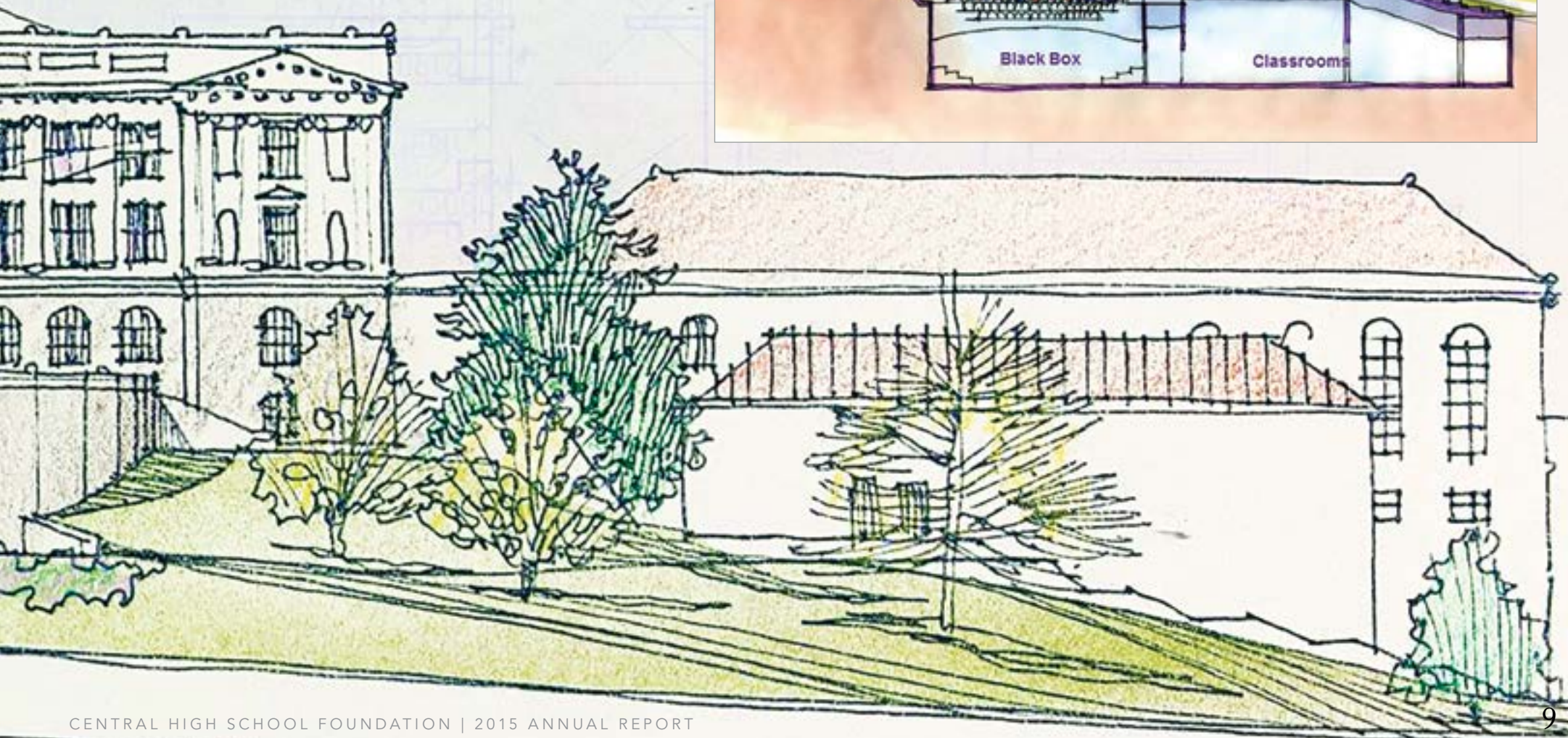
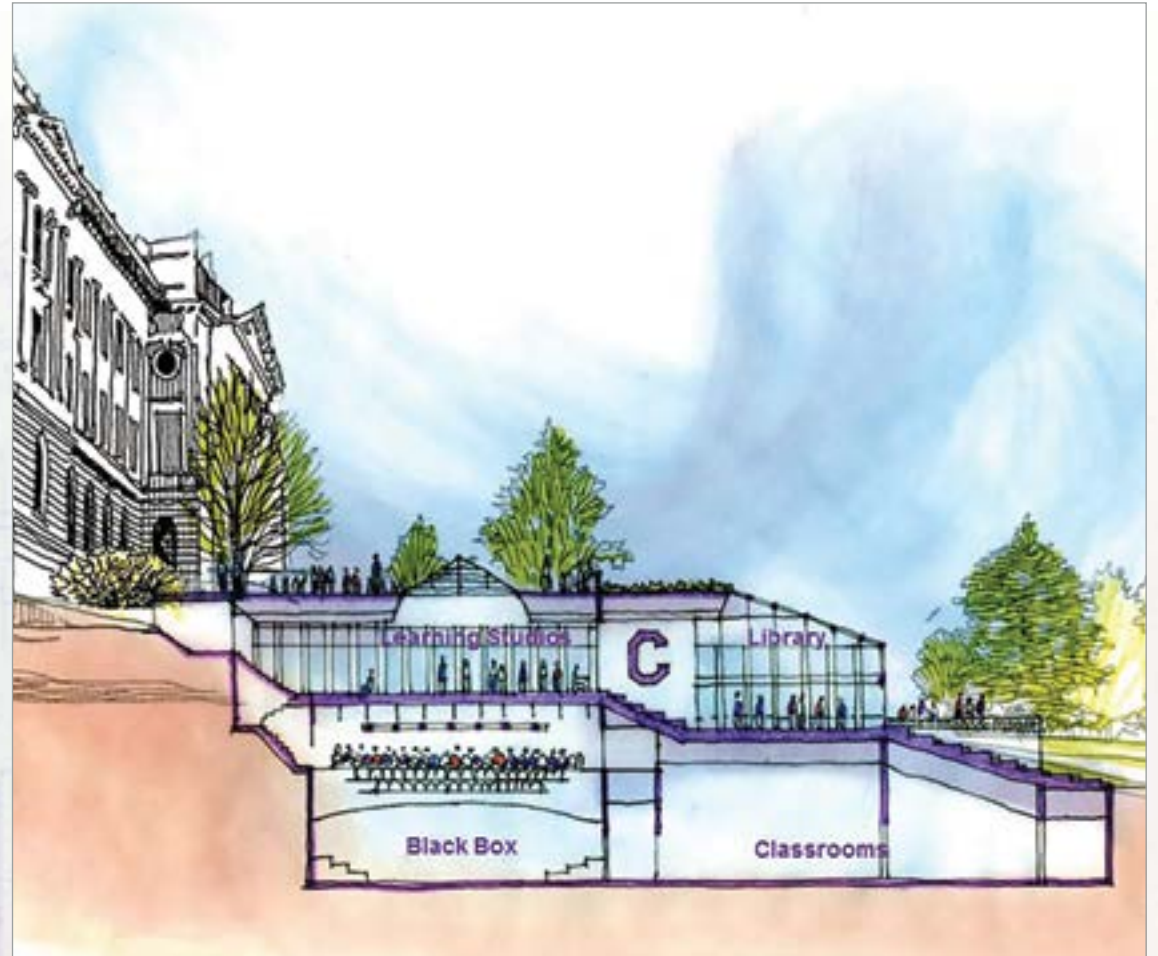

Hall of Fame



J. Scott Barker Class of 1981

Following an active three years at CHS, years that included, among other things, being elected Senior Class President and performing in Road Show, Scott enrolled at Yale, graduated in 1985, returned to enter Yale Divinity School and was ordained into the Episcopal Church in 1992. He returned to Omaha as an assistant at Trinity Cathedral, leaving Trinity to rejuvenate the Church of the Resurrection in north Omaha. Scott and his family then moved to New York state where he rejuvenated another struggling church into a vibrant community. He then returned to Omaha where he was consecrated as the 11th Bishop of the Diocese of Nebraska. As bishop, he cares for 53 churches, both large and small, providing encouragement and spiritual support wherever he goes. Scott is an outspoken advocate for people in need and volunteers on numerous boards at the local and national level. This compassionate cleric still finds time to support CHS activities, when possible.



Robert Batt Class of 1966

Robert Batt is well-recognized in Omaha for the position he held as company spokesperson and Executive Vice President in the management and operation of the Nebraska Furniture Mart, a Midwest institution in the furniture, appliances, and electronics business. In addition to his work with NFM, Mr. Batt exhibited a strong interest in, and sense of responsibility for, the metro Omaha community, for the state of Nebraska, and for our nation. In his community work, he was a mentor to many young people and a supporter of civic causes, e.g., purchasing video cameras for police cruisers, and he is currently a member of the Boys Town Advisory Board. The Heart Ministry Center is his favorite charity. He also served on the Omaha Personnel Board, and he has supported initiatives and collaborative efforts at UNO, his alma mater. At the state level, he is Chairman of the State Liquor Commission, and he has served on other state service committees. At the national level, he served on the U.S. Concert Committee for Yellowstone to help raise funds to restore fire-ravaged Yellowstone Park. For his community service, civic efforts, and university support, UNO has presented him with its Citation for Alumni Achievement and with a Distinguished Alumni Award, and the Omaha Press Club has selected him as a “Face on the Barroom Floor.”



Howard Buffett Class of 1921

Howard Homan Buffett, 1921 CHS graduate, made his mark in the world through his service to our nation as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives. Howard served four terms in Congress, the first three from 1943-1948 and a final term from 1951 to 1953. Though identified as a Republican, he was guided by a moral compass that never bowed to the dictates of his party. He imparted his principles to his three children, leading them to many and varied philanthropic commitments after they had achieved material success. His beliefs continue through their activities.



Mike Gaherty Distinguished Educator

During his 32-year career at Central, Mike Gaherty had a major impact on the lives of many students enrolled in his journalism classes. Mike has been described by one of his students as “a gentle guide, always encouraging, but always also giving us room to fall on our faces ...” Mike’s students won many awards, and the CHS newspaper, *The Register*, was recognized for innumerable awards in many journalism categories. In addition to his focus on expecting excellence in writing and in using creative approaches to problem solving, Mr. Gaherty emphasized the business side of journalism through his emphasis on ad sales – sales carried out by students. This focus helped students understand the business of journalism and helped to keep school publications, both the school newspaper and yearbook, affordable for the student body. Mike’s expectations and guidance as a journalism teacher inspired many students to continue in that field. For his efforts, Mike has been the recipient of an Alice Buffett Outstanding Teacher Award, a Lifetime Achievement Award from the UNO Communication Department, and the Gunnar Horn Journalism Award from Creighton University.



Ahman Green Class of 1995

Ahman’s abilities and achievements as an elite football player are well-known and well-documented at the high school, college, and professional levels. During his years at CHS, he was a World-Herald, two-time, All-Nebraska First Team selection, a First Team USA Today and Parade Magazine High School All-American, a Gatorade Nebraska Player of the Year, and the 1995 World-Herald Nebraska High School Male Athlete of the Year. In addition, he also was the state champion in the 100 and 200 meter dash at the State Track Meet. During his years as a Husker, he was selected to the All Big 8 First Team in 1995 and to the All Big 12 First Team in 1997. During his 12-year, three-team professional career, he was a four-time NFL Pro Bowl selection, became the all-time rushing leader for the Green Bay Packers, and he was inducted into the Green Bay Football Hall of Fame. Beyond his football success, Ahman created his own foundation in order to enhance the quality of life for children and their families whose lives have been touched by hardship and terminal illness. His foundation focuses on cancer research and youth development. He is dedicated to charities that make a positive impact on the community. Ahman is also extremely active with the Alzheimer’s Association, Make-A-Wish Foundation, Boys & Girls Club, Wounded Warriors, Children’s Hospital of Wisconsin and Nebraska, food pantries, youth programs, adult programs, and adult wellness. He is co-owner of D1 Green Bay Sports Training and another opening in Omaha, Nebraska.



Laurance R. Hoagland, Jr. Class of 1954

After his graduation from Stanford, Laurie began an investment career that would see him achieve remarkable success resulting from his many years of investment experience, beginning with his work as a stock investor with his own company, Anderson, Hoagland and Company, followed by his becoming the President and CEO of the Stanford Management Company at Stanford University, and eventually leading to his becoming the Chief Investment Officer of the multi-billion dollar Hewlett Foundation. It is important to note that if a person were to aspire to achieve even minimal success in the investments world, and Laurie, of course, achieved outstanding success, that person would have to be very well-acquainted with many financial terms and concepts, including hedge funds, diversification, venture capital investments, asset allocation policies, risk and return strategies, distressed investments, and absolute return arbitrage strategies. Laurance “Laurie” Hoagland has been favorably compared to Warren Buffett in the investment world, indeed, some have called him “the other sage of Omaha,” reflecting his remarkable success in the endowment and foundation field. Recently, he chaired the Board of the Commonfund, and he currently serves on the board or investment committee of seven endowed foundations and universities.



Beatrice Petersen Kalisch Class of 1961

A life dedicated to nursing research and education, this is the legacy of Beatrice Kalisch. Her lifetime of work as a leader began after her graduation from both Central and UNMC and her achieving both her master’s and Ph.D. from the University of Maryland. She is currently the Titus Distinguished Professor at the University of Michigan and Distinguished Nurse Scholar at the Institute of Medicine, Washington, DC. Over the course of her fifty year career, Dr. Kalisch has been a researcher, writer, and editor of healthcare publications, a presenter at professional meetings in the USA and internationally, and a consultant to hospitals and other health care organizations. She has written 11 books and over 145 peer reviewed articles on quality and patient safety published in such journals as *Medical Care*, *American Journal of Medical Quality*, and *International Journal for Quality in Health Care*. She has also been the investigator for 19 research grants and 11 training grants, a member of review committees, and presenter of over 800 speeches on the subjects of the image of the nurse in the mass media, the impact of federal aid on nursing education and practice, and errors of omission and nursing teamwork. These activities have taken her to multiple cities located in every section of the United States and, internationally, from China to Australia and from Canada to Brazil.



Anthony LaGreca Distinguished Educator

As an assistant principal at CHS for 17 years, following four years of superior classroom teaching of economics and social studies, and prior to becoming principal at Beveridge Middle School, Al LaGreca handled all administrative duties assigned to him with expertise and enthusiasm. His accomplishments included preparing innovative class scheduling, showing compassion with student discipline, and being the person responsible for planning and organizing several CHS renovation projects: the CHS courtyard, the relocating of administrative offices, the removal and replacement of boilers and furnaces, and the reconfiguring of classrooms. Al also led the fundraising effort for needed landscaping and tree planting on the school’s grounds, while, at the same time, serving on the district’s desegregation/ busing task force. Al brought strong business and people skills to CHS, using a personable, patient approach when working with faculty and while helping to make the case for Central’s needs at budgeting meetings with school district officials. Al’s CHS colleagues praised his energy for getting things done and his kindness and sincerity with students and faculty. As one of Al’s colleagues has stated, “He was truly a dedicated ‘Eagle’ from the start.”



Harley Schragger Class of 1965

Recognized for his excellence in both business and community service, Harley Schragger has made significant contributions to Omaha and to the greater metropolitan area. Becoming President of the Pacesetter Corporation at age 29, he successfully directed its growth into the nation’s largest, independent, direct sales home improvement company, employing more than 2,000 people. In 2001 the Omaha Chamber of Commerce honored Harley for his achievements by making him, at that time, the youngest inductee in its Business Hall of Fame. Regarding community service, Harley has served on the Boards of many not-for-profit organizations, including Children’s Hospital, Children’s Museum, the Jewish Federation Foundation (President), Girls, Inc., (President), Omaha Sports Commission (Pres. and Chr. of 2008 and 2012 Olympic Swim Trials), CWS of Omaha, Inc., (Exec. Committee), for 25 years, and he founded and sponsored Pacesetter Youth Baseball for 15 years. For these efforts and others, he has received numerous awards including NCCJ’s Humanitarian of the Year.



Harry O. Taylor Class of 1959

Courage, valor, bravery, heroism, dedication, leadership, duty, honor, and country, these terms, and more, are still inadequate in describing Lt. Col. Harry O. “Skip” Taylor, MA, Infantry, Airborne Ranger, officer in the U. S. Army. “Skip” served his country in many ways beginning with Vietnam where, while completing several tours of duty in combat leadership roles, he demonstrated extraordinary gallantry and valor while under intense, combat conditions. As a result of his heroic actions, Col. Taylor was awarded 16 medals, including the Silver Star for gallantry in action, 3 Bronze Stars for heroism in combat, 2 Purple Hearts for wounds received in combat action, the Gallantry Cross with Bronze Star, the Gallantry Cross with Gold Star, the Armed Forces Honor Medal First Class, the Army Commendation Medal, the Air Medal for Meritorious Achievement Aerial Flight, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, and the Legion of Merit Medal as the Defense Attaché in Belize. Col. Taylor consistently received high praise from his superior officers, including such comments as “combines . . . extensive professional knowledge with courage to get the very toughest jobs done in a superb manner.” Following his exceptional Army career, he has become a Master Naturalist Instructor focusing on the Biscayne Bay and an Adjunct Professor at NOVA, and he remains a community leader.
