

### Foundation Advances "Lighten & Enlighten" Project

For many years, supporters have discussed the possibility of lighting Central High School. Illuminating the school would highlight the building's impressive architectural features while enhancing the safety of students and teachers who are at the school after dark.

"There are so many evening activities going on at Central," said Susan (Strauss) Lebens '70. "And now, with the completion of the new stadium and gym enhancements, there will be even more. My husband Mike (Lebens '70) and I both feel this is a worthwhile project that will accentuate the building's architecture and provide security benefits."

A second component of the project will be the installation of a tasteful programmable electronic sign to "enlighten" Central supporters and the general public about school activities and accomplishments. "The new signage will be a great way to publicize the activities going on at Central and to announce awards and other recognition given to students and staff," said Foundation Executive Director Terry Price. "This information will be appreciated within the Central community and will also be informative to persons who may be driving or walking by the school."

The sign would be installed in an attractive, curved limestone wall in front of the school at the corner of 20th and Dodge Streets. Additional features of the design include a built-in seating area and plaza with an embedded Central "C" in the paving and decorative plantings.

"The materials and detailing of the limestone sign wall will be very similar to the limestone base of the Central High School building, with a wall cap that is detailed to resemble the


limestone trim found on the façade of the building," said architect Bryan Zimmer, whose daughter, Ciara Zimmer '07, currently attends Central. "The curving shape of the wall is a cue from the curved terrace on the east lawn of the school. The curved wall shape, the open plaza for seating and the sign are also a gesture to the downtown of Omaha, opening toward the heart of the city, creating a stronger connection between the two."

Zimmer and his company, The Architectural Offices, have worked on several of Omaha's historically significant buildings including the Joslyn Castle, the McCord Brady Building (the Bemis Center for Contemporary Arts) and the Skinner Macaroni Building. The firm's office is located in the recently renovated historic Buffett Grocery Building in Dundee.

"For those who are currently students at Central High and those who live in Omaha's oldest neighborhoods, the project will bring special pride," said Allison Latenser '73, who is the great-granddaughter of John Latenser, the original architect of Central High School. "And, it will be an impressive sight to greet visitors driving into the city at night."

The Foundation has recently unveiled the plans, which are causing much excitement among supporters, and will need to raise approximately \$360,000 to design and install the lighting and corner signage wall.

"I have to believe that my great-grandfather would be honored to have one of his buildings featured as an Omaha landmark, but more than that, I think he would be proud to know that Central High is still educating Omaha's children and turning out leaders five generations after its construction," added Latenser.



maintain, and even strengthen, the school's longstanding academic tradition.

"He continued to prioritize academic rigor, to develop the Central tradition and to position Central High School for the demands of 21st century education," commented Omaha Public School District Superintendent Dr. John Mackiel.



As Central's parent-teacher organization, PEP supports students, teachers and administrators through a variety of fundraising programs and special projects.

PEP was the organization responsible for the purchase and installation of the fantastic banners displayed in the school and along Dodge and 20th Streets last fall. The banners showcased Central's tradition of excellence in the areas of academics, athletics, music, art, journalism and drama.

"We wanted to do something to celebrate the completion of the new stadium and gymnasium lobby," said PEP co-president Don Erikson. "We thought the banners would be a great way to demonstrate school pride and spirit."

Throughout the year, PEP volunteers supported many traditional Central activities including the National Honor Society Induction, Open House, Parent-Teacher Conferences, Post-Prom Party, Purple Feather Day, Senior Recognition Day and Teacher Appreciation. PEP also managed merchandise sales in the school store.

The organization's major event of the year was the 24th annual PEP Fundraiser and Scholarship Auction held at the Joslyn Art Museum. This year, PEP decided to make the event the culmination of a week-long series of activities called "Fine Arts Week." Although some activities had to be canceled due to inclement weather, the Eagle Doe Project and Alumni Roadshow Retrospective helped make the auction a resounding success.

The Eagle Doe Project featured ceramic eagles created by Central's Art Department. The eagles were decorated by Central supporters in a manner that represented their group or organization. The finished sculptures were used as centerpieces during the auction and were sold later in the evening.

The Alumni Road Show Retrospective, produced by PEP under the direction of retired teachers Pegi (Bryans '61) Georgeson and Bob McMeen, featured dozens of outstanding performances by Central alumni spanning the past 50 years.

More than \$30,000 was raised from the auction and Road Show. These proceeds will fund college scholarships for Central graduates as well as provide continuing education for faculty and staff.

Capping off a busy and successful year, PEP produced an outdoor concert presented at Seemann Stadium on May 13 featuring Ne-Yo, 112, Pomeroy and Swizzletree. The almost 2,000 students who attended had a great time.

"We couldn't have accomplished any of these activities without the support of the Central High School Foundation and Jerry Bexten and his staff," said PEP co-president Don Erikson. "Shelley and I appreciate all of their support and guidance."

As preparation for their comeback, over the summer, 16 students and instructors attended a week-long Bands of America Band Camp held in Normal, IL to learn the fundamentals of marching. Their participation was made possible with funding raised by Heritage Services.

Band Camp for the full band started in June with Tuesday night practices. BPO kicked off its year at the same time hosting several tailgate parties during practice to acquaint new parents with the ins and outs of marching band. The organization also distributed its newly issued handbook.

Two full weeks of band camp featured one week of two practices a day, with the band being the first students to make use of the new field. Parents coordinated meals and provided water at all practices. BPO's Uniform Team made sure all were fitted in uniforms and ready to go in time for the dedication of Central's new Seemann Stadium on August 21, 2005.

Heritage Services provided underwriting for all new flags for the color guard, new color guard uniforms and some new instruments. BPO purchased capes for the drum majors in keeping with the custom of having drum majors designated by differences in their uniform.

Fundraising events for the year included bake sales at all home football and basketball games as well as a pasta dinner served between PEP's Road Show performances. Parents also raised funds by assisting with the Omaha Marching Invitational.

Parent volunteers helped transport the band and equipment to and from the Omaha Marching Exposition and Omaha Marching Invitational. In addition, BPO provided funds for a rental truck to transport equipment to and from these events.

BPO also participated in the Eagle Doe project for the annual PEP auction by purchasing an eagle and decorating it to resemble our drum majors. BPO's eagle, "Lonzerin," was named for the band's drum majors and was awarded a prize in the competition.

A year-end awards banquet was held in May to recognize student accomplishments as well as outstanding parent volunteers. BPO's highest honor, the Golden Dinkle, was awarded to Marty Nisi-McMahon '79 for her work coordinating bake sales and inspiring others to volunteer.

## CHS Athletic Booster Club

The Athletic Booster Club was established to help improve and support Central's athletic teams, cheerleaders and pom squad. The group reviews athletic spending budgets, finances each season's sports banquets, works to promote club membership and organizes fundraisers for Central's athletic needs.

During the past school year, the 96-member club allocated over \$3,500 to the Athletic Department. The items purchased with these funds included court time for the boys' Tennis Team; a heavy net for discus throw for the Track Team; a slow-toss machine for the Softball Team; medicine balls, an agility ladder and stability balls for the Volleyball Team; and singlets for the Wrestling Team.

"The Central High School Athletic Booster Club raises our funds solely from membership sales – and that is where you – our parents, grandparents and friends can help – by joining the CHS Athletic Booster Club," said Co-President Carol Kuzelka.

The Athletic Booster Club has three different membership levels ranging in price from \$25 to \$120. Depending upon the level of membership selected, members may receive free admission to all non-varsity and varsity HOME athletic events.

On Monday, June 5, the Athletic Booster Club held its fourth annual golf outing at Ironwood Golf & Country Club with the support of the CHS Foundation and Athletic Department.

Proceeds from the event are restricted to support Central's athletic needs.

"In the past, golf outing proceeds have funded a variety of needs including a John Deere Gator, a trailer and hitch, a turf cleaning machine and replacement brushes, a hot dog grill and bun warmer for the concession stand, a power washer, privacy slats for the fence surrounding Seemann Stadium and goal post nets," said event organizer and former Central Athletic Director Paul Pennington. "This year, I think some of the money will go towards the purchase of a new video camera. The camera currently used for recording sports events uses VHS tapes which have become obsolete."

During the golf outing, a special recognition plaque

was presented to Jim Martin who coached Central's boys basketball from 1966-1994. Under Martin's leadership, the varsity boys' team won two state championships in 1974 and 1975.

"No one has any kind of success without tremendous help from others," commented Martin, reflecting on his achievements. "Dr. Gaylord Moller, a former Central principal, and Dr. Don Benning, former athletic director, really stood behind me."

Martin was introduced by Dr. Dan Schinzel '85, who played guard for Martin for two years. "Coach Martin was a true gentleman and a great role model," said Schinzel. "He treated everyone on the team the same, whether you were the star player or an average player."

Schinzel was so influenced by Martin that he became a coach himself and worked for two years at Skutt Catholic and eight years at Westside. He recently took on a new challenge as athletic director at Creighton Prep.

This year V.O.I.C.E. planned and hosted three major fundraising events. The Madrigal Faire, held on October 22, was attended by 179 guests who enjoyed dinner, excellent entertainment by the various vocal groups and student-carved pumpkin centerpieces.

On November 5, between the two Saturday performances of the musical, The Music Man, the River City Picnic and Cake Walk were held. Including cast and crew, over 350 people enjoyed dinner and the 4th of July picnic theme.

Finally, on January 28, V.O.I.C.E. sponsored a scrap booking event in the cafeteria. More than 40 people enjoyed the food, companionship, live entertainment and most importantly, the opportunity to capture memories.

The money raised from these events supported other V.O.I.C.E.-sponsored activities and scholarships including two \$50 summer lesson scholarships; three \$100 partial fee reimbursements for students participating in the Regional Honor Choir held here in Omaha; and four \$500 graduating senior scholarships.

Other activities which V.O.I.C.E. funded, or for which members volunteered, included: providing treats for the A Cappella car wash; staffing a CHS Open House booth; assisting with a lunch prior to the A Cappella 75-year anniversary reunion rehearsal and hosting a reception following the concert; serving a dinner prior to the joint A Cappella/UNO concert; and hosting a reception recognizing the seniors and Director Sharon Smith on her retirement following the Spring Concert.

General V.O.I.C.E. meetings are open to parents of vocal students and are held prior to CHS winter and spring concerts. The informal meetings provide the opportunity to learn about upcoming events and volunteer needs and to explore new ideas.

"Over these last two years, it has been our privilege to serve V.O.I.C.E. and to work with nice, fun and dedicated parents," added Brei. "We leave the organization in the capable hands of Scott and Deb Albright and next year's board, and we hope to see you at some V.O.I.C.E. sponsored events."

## Ray Burkhalter Plans Ahead To Support CHS Through Estate Planning

Central alum Ray Burkhalter '63 has included the CHS Foundation in his estate planning. "I am what my accountant calls an 'essential orphan,'" said Burkhalter. "I don't have any surviving parents, siblings or children. Central seemed like the appropriate place to receive this donation."

Burkhalter, who has worked as a Senior Buyer for First National Bank for the past nine years, contacted Executive Director Terry Price about his plans last December. She explained the options and tax benefits for estate giving which are described on page two of this report.

"The education I received at Central High School prepared me for my service in the United States Marine Corps and my college years at Creighton and UNO," added Burkhalter. "I was lucky to be able to go to high school there and I want to do what I can to ensure the Central tradition lives on to serve future generations."

Burkhalter's generous bequest is greatly appreciated and will provide general support for the Foundation.

Bexten also earned praise for his "open door" policy. "Mr. Bexten possessed the quality of being a strong and effective leader who was approachable," reflected 2006 class president Alvin R. Samuels, Jr. "Sometimes individuals who are in leadership positions are not approachable. That was never the case with Mr. Bexten."

Bexten, who spent 33 years as a teacher and administrator, is quick to attribute the success he achieved to the support of his staff and the extended Central community.

"I can't take the credit," said Bexten. "Central has a hard-working staff that provides students with a quality education. They work with the students day in and day out. I provide a supporting role."

He also credits Central alumni and the Foundation for the important role they have played in supporting the school. "The alumni helped pass the bond issue which funded our renovations and the Foundation has been extremely supportive. Terry Price and Rusty Crossman are always there to help in any way they can."

Bexten worked closely with incoming principal Greg Emmel to ensure a smooth transition. Emmel, who has been the principal at McMillan Magnet Center for the past seven years, is looking forward to his new role at Central.

"Central has been blessed with great staff for many decades," said Emmel. "It offers an attractive and unique type of diverse and urban environment unlike any in the country. I consider it an honor to serve as principal."

"Honor" is a word that Bexten also uses in describing his work at Central. "To be named principal in a system this size is an honor, but to serve as principal of Central is really a special honor and I have viewed it that way from the beginning."

While keeping his options open for future professional challenges, Bexten's retirement plans include spending more time with his wife and two young daughters.

# Scholarships/Grants Through The Foundation

## CHS Foundation Honors Teacher and Student of the Year

Held on Sunday, May 7, the Foundation's annual Senior Recognition Event honored Matt Deabler, selected as Teacher of the Year and Dan Susman '06 as Student of the Year. The event also recognized the more than \$5 million in scholarships and awards earned by the Class of 2006.

The Foundation's board of directors selects the Teacher of the Year from among the talented educators who have been nominated. Anyone can nominate a deserving teacher to be recognized. The winner is presented with a crystal paperweight inscribed with their name as "Teacher of the Year" and their name is added to the recognition plaques located in Central's courtyard and the Foundation office.

Matthew Deabler teaches English and Journalism and oversees the production of the Central's yearbook, the *O-Book* and the school newspaper, the *Register*. Under his leadership, Deabler's journalism students have won more than 700 awards local, state and national awards.

"Mr. Deabler is the most dedicated teacher I've ever seen," commented former student Molly Mullen '06. "Students are working on the yearbook and newspaper from 6 a.m. until 11:30 p.m., and it seems

like he's always there looking over our shoulders."

Students nominate themselves for the Student of the Year award by completing the Foundation's nomination form. Candidates list their accomplishments and activities, both inside and outside of school, and submit an essay.

All personal information is removed from the student nomination forms which are distributed to the Foundation's board of directors. The board then votes for its top six choices. The six nominees receiving the most votes are passed along to the Foundation's board of counselors who make the final decision. The winner receives a \$1,000 scholarship and a marble paperweight inscribed with his or her name as "Student of the Year." In addition, their name is added to the recognition plaques in Central's courtyard and the Foundation office.

Dan Susman was honored as the Student of the Year. During his four years at Central, Dan has excelled in both athletics and academics. He is also active in the community and has volunteered at dozens of nonprofit organizations including the Munroe Meyer Institute, Big Brothers/Big Sisters of the Midlands, the Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

"I felt very honored and deeply gratified to receive this award," said Susman. "Central meant so much to me, and to see my name added to the plaque next to all the other kids I always looked up to was really great."

Susman plans to attend Dartmouth University in Hanover, New Hampshire this fall.

## Grants Help Teachers Meet Classroom Needs

The Foundation is involved with a variety of programs that provide teacher grants for supplies and equipment. These grants are funded by individual donations to the Foundation or through fundraisers such as PEP's annual auction and the Athletic Booster Club's golf outing.

Drama Instructor John Gibson has received grants to purchase a variety of stage tools used for constructing sets including power saws, cordless drills and cordless screwdrivers. "With these tools my job becomes much easier and learning is more fun for the students," said Gibson.



"Without these grants, the students would have to do fundraising," added Gibson. "Selling door-to-door is not always the best way to go, because people are very suspicious of scams."

Charles Hinkle, who chairs Central's Social Studies Department, has also benefited from teacher grants which have allowed him to purchase projectors, DVDs and videos for use in the classroom.

"Any time you can present information visually, it helps us obtain our teaching objectives," said Hinkle, commenting on the impact of these grants. "Some students learn better orally and some students learn better visually. These items give us an added resource to explain history."

The "Baby Think It Over" dolls purchased with grant support by Central Family Consumer Science Department Head Linda Milliken have also had a big impact. "Students are excited to check out the dolls on Friday," said Milliken. "By Monday, they can't wait to return them."

The computerized dolls are used to demonstrate the time and effort required to care for an infant.

"It's great to be a part of something where students and teachers are truly impacted by efforts of those supporting Central," said Executive Director Terry Price. "While the donations and grants can vary in value, the bottom line is that they ALL enrich the learning environment for teachers and students!"

## Save the Date: 2006 Hall Of Fame Ceremony is October 5

The lives of 11 individuals whose paths from the halls of Central High School led them to the highest levels of achievement in business and community service will be celebrated in an awards ceremony slated for October 5, 2006. The 8th annual Hall of Fame dinner begins at 6 pm in the Central High School courtyard. The induction ceremony, which is free and open to the public, begins at 7:30 pm in the school auditorium. ### Robert S. Brown (CHS '31)

During his years at Central, Robert Brown participated extensively in the school's extracurricular activities including the ROTC Regiment, the baseball and football teams, tennis, the CHS *Register* and yearbook. He also sang in several of the choirs and appeared in both the musical and the Road Show. After graduation, he completed undergraduate studies at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln. His graduate studies earned him both an M.A. in 1941 and a Ph.D. in 1952. His master's degree thesis addressed the issue of salary schedules for teachers, and his Ph.D. dissertation helped generate a movement that led to the creation of junior high schools in Omaha. Dr. Brown went on to serve as principal of Monroe Junior High School and he was the first principal of Burke High School. A quiet, caring man, he is well respected and renowned for his compassionate care of colleagues and his concern for the world beyond the school room.



### Lt. Col. Robert Chedester (CHS '50)

After graduation from CHS in 1950, Lt. Col. Chedester initially continued his academic studies at Omaha University, but he left to enter the Army where he completed both Engineer Officer Candidate School and the Army Aviation School and graduated in 1955. During his army training, he and JoAnn Egbert (CHS 1951) were married. While in the Army, Lt. Col. Chedester served in Alaska, Panama, the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Germany, and Venezuela. Two tours of duty in Vietnam followed. For his special valor as a helicopter pilot in Vietnam, he was awarded the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star, and 12 Air Medals, among other awards. After his Vietnam service, Lt. Col. Chedester completed his degree at UNO, and he began his own construction business. His service to this country, as well as to other countries in the world, continued as, in 1990, both he and his wife went to Africa where he flew supplies for relief agencies to help people in serious need in Sudan, Mozambique and Kenya. In 1992, Lt. Col. Chedester secured the help of the Russian government to airlift life-saving supplies to approximately 200,000 Mozambique refugees whose lives were threatened by severe drought conditions. More recently, Lt. Col. Chedester directed flight operations for Air Serv International, an agency which supports global humanitarian relief efforts.



### W. Edward Clark (CHS '32)

As both a 1932 graduate and a longtime faculty member at Central, Mr. Edward Clark had a profound influence on the lives of students and in the development of Central's national reputation for a academic excellence. Mr. Clark

was an enthusiastic, knowledgeable teacher at Central for three decades from 1946 to 1976. A thoughtful, reflective writer, he also produced fifteen plays, three novels, and hundreds of poems. His vast knowledge of literature and his clear expectations for academic achievement by all of his students were hallmarks of his teaching, and he continues to be recognized as a revered member emeritus of the Central High School faculty. Mr. Clark was also an accomplished painter and photographer. His other hobbies included traveling, skiing, flying, backpacking, and mountain climbing, spending many summers climbing in the Teton Range near Jackson Hole, WY. In addition to his outstanding teaching career, Mr. Clark served in WWII, rising to the rank of major, and he remained in the reserves until 1974. Mr. Clark passed away on September 4, 2000, at the age of 86.



### Cherie Curry (CHS '54)

Ms. Curry began her music career at the age of seven, studying piano under Florentine Pingston in Omaha. After graduating from Central, she attended Omaha University and earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1960. She names Viktor Wolfram, Aiko Onishi, John Perry, and Frank Mannheimer as other teachers who were important in her growth and development as a performing artist. Receiving her Master of Arts in music from San Jose State in 1972, she remained there as a professor until her retirement in 1999. During her professional career, she performed in the United States, Canada, France, Italy, and England, and attended the international Chopin Competition in Warsaw. At the 1976 Distinguished American Composers Bicentennial Music Series, she performed the Aaron Copland Sonata before the composer himself, who remarked "what a beautiful performance of this sonata." She currently adjudicates piano performances for the MIAC and CAPMT music teachers and is a member of Trinity Presbyterian Church in San Jose, serving as a pianist for her congregation.



### Marc Kraft (CHS '66)

Throughout his life, Marc Kraft has led an active role throughout Omaha, including his involvement with its schools, neighborhoods, businesses and government. Before graduating from Central in 1966, Mr. Kraft attended Dundee Elementary and Lewis and Clark Middle School. After Central, Mr. Kraft graduated from Creighton University in 1971 with a degree in mathematics. Mr. Kraft has been an active leader in Omaha's business community, especially Downtown Omaha, where his business, Kraft DC Furniture and More, has been located for more than 30 years. During his eight years on the Omaha City Council, Mr. Kraft served on many Council committees and with his support, Roberts Skate Park was created, funding for public libraries improved and smoking restrictions were enacted. In addition, Mr. Kraft was a strong advocate for Omaha's neighborhoods, supporting initiatives proposed by

neighborhood associations across the city. Mr. Kraft has been actively involved with numerous service and business organizations including Downtown Omaha, Inc., the Cosmopolitan Club, the BSA, the Leavenworth Business Association, the Old Market Business Association, the Sister City Association, the Public Art Commission, and the Jewish Community Center. Mr. Kraft and his wife, Joan, have four children who all graduated from Central: Natasha (CHS '89), Chris (CHS '91), Alicia (CHS '96), and Erika (CHS '94).



### Robert Mancuso (CHS '51)

A wrestling champion while at Central and later at Kansas State, Bob Mancuso won many honors, among them the Midwest AAU championship, the Junior National AAU championship, and recognition as the Outstanding US Amateur Collegiate wrestler. He also qualified for the 1956 US Olympic Wrestling tryouts. As a wrestling coach at Bellevue High School, his team won its first state wrestling championship and went on to win every major wrestling championship in the state over a five year period. His career led him to join the coaching staff at UNL, where he guided his wrestlers to their best yet won-loss record (9-2-1) during the 1962 season, and took Nebraska to its first top ten rating in the NCAA wrestling tournament. In 1964, Mr. Mancuso left coaching to found Mid-American Expositions, Inc., which produces and promotes trade shows, festivals and sporting events in Omaha, Lincoln, Kansas City, and Minneapolis, among other sites. Mr. Mancuso was responsible for promoting several sports "firsts" for Omaha including the first major league baseball exhibition game, the first NBA pre-season game, and the first regular season NBA game. Mr. Mancuso has been a well-respected leader in many community organizations, including serving as chairman of the City of Omaha zoning board of appeals, chairman of the Greater Omaha Sports Committee, chairman of the City of Omaha Planning Board, and chairman of the Douglas County Visitors Promotion Council.



### Leonard G. Muskin (CHS '36)

Born on Independence Day, 1920, Mr. Muskin was an all-state tackle on the football team. After graduation, Mr. Muskin joined the University of Nebraska Cornhuskers team that played against Stanford in the 1941 Rose Bowl before 92,000 fans. During World War II, Leonard served in the Pacific on an attack carrier, the USS Essex. He was the pilot of a dive-bomber and torpedo plane and earned two Navy Crosses for two successive days of combat, sinking the Japanese battleship Musachi. After the war, in 1947, Mr. Muskin founded Interco Builders in Southern California. His company has built more than 5,000 residential and commercial properties. Even at the age of 87, he remains active in the building industry and managing investments and travels to his office every day.



### Harlan J. Noddle (CHS '54)

The achievements of Harlan J. Noddle in the business world can be seen in the many community shopping centers and office buildings which he helped to build.

After graduating from Central, Mr. Noddle received a degree in economics from the University of Nebraska at Lincoln in 1958. He served as a first lieutenant in the Army from 1959 until his discharge in 1961. Mr. Noddle then joined the American Community Stores Corporation, which operated a regional chain of supermarkets and general-line merchandise stores. While employed there, Mr. Noddle worked in various management capacities including Group Vice President. In 1971, Mr. Noddle formed the Noddle Development Company and built the company into one that has developed or purchased more than 85 shopping centers and five office buildings in 16 states. Headquartered in Omaha, the Noddle Company provides clients with development and management services including site acquisition, development financing, building construction, and property management. In addition to his recognized business success, Mr. Noddle contributed his talents to community service in many ways, including being Chairman of the University of Nebraska Foundation Board of Directors, a board member of the Midlands Board of the National Conference for Community & Justice, President of the Newman Supporting Foundation, Chairman of the Board of Directories of UNMC, and as a board member of the Omaha Symphony and the Omaha Airport Authority. Mr. Noddle passed away in 2005 at the age of 69.

In 2004, Mr. Shukert was named a Fellow of the American Institute of Certified Planners, among other recognitions, for his career achievements. Mr. and Mrs. Shukert are the parents of two daughters, Rachel (CHS '98) and Ariel (CHS '02).



### Howard Rosenberg (CHS '69) \*

Howard Rosenberg is currently a Washington, D.C.-based producer for ABC's *Prime Time Live*. While a student at Central, Mr. Rosenberg served as a photographer for the Register and the *O-Book*,

and went on to graduate with honors from George Washington University and to serve in the US Navy. His *Atomic Soldiers* (Beacom, 1980) documented abuses in the nuclear testing program of the 1950s and established his credentials nationally, especially when his book served as a basis for the 1989 TNT show *Nightbreaker* starring Martin Sheen and Emilio Estevez, and then went on to win the Writer's Guild Award for Best Teleplay. An award-winning investigative reporter, Mr. Rosenberg worked for *The CBS Evening News with Dan Rather* from 1984 to 1990 before becoming a producer for *60 Minutes* from 1991 to 1997. Recent television credits include *Rumsfeld's Rules of War* and *9/11: Moment of Crisis*. A prolific writer, his articles have been featured dozens of national publications.



### Martin "Marty" Shukert (CHS '67)

A city planner since childhood when he mapped the neighborhood around Fontenelle Park for a school project, Mr. Shukert attended Omaha schools until he enrolled in Yale

University where he received his bachelor's degree in city planning in 1971. He went on to achieve a Master of Architecture degree from the University of California at Berkeley. In 1976, Mr. Shukert and his wife, Aveva (CHS '68) returned to Omaha, and he joined the City of Omaha Planning Department. For the next 13 years, Mr. Shukert worked to support his hometown's growth in a dynamic, yet orderly, fashion, including designing redevelopment plans for many neighborhoods. At the same time, his work focused on creating a plan for the revival of downtown Omaha, a successful initiative that continues today. In 1979, Mr. Shukert became head of the Omaha Planning Department, and, under his leadership, the City developed the ConAgra campus and Heartland of America Park, the new Riverfront area, several North Omaha housing initiatives and Omaha's recreational trails system. In 1989, Mr. Shukert joined RDG as a planning consultant and continued his work in several significant projects throughout the Midwest region. Mr. Shukert has developed long-range and short-term projects involving transportation and traffic systems and recreation / parks / trails systems, and he has

The Van Metres have significantly enhanced the health and well being of students at Central through contributions that created state-of-the-art weight training and fitness facilities at the school. While neither Mr. nor Mrs. Van Metre attended Central, their sons David, Jr. (CHS '82) and James (CHS '81) enjoyed academic and athletic success there, and the family has been strong supporters of Central ever since. After helping renovate athletic facilities at Mr. Van Metre's alma mater in Iowa, the couple turned their attention to Central and all OPS schools. Their belief that physical fitness enhances students' overall health as well as their athletic success led to the complete renovation of weight training and fitness programs in Omaha's junior highs, senior highs and alternative schools. In addition, Mr. and Mrs. Van Metre fulfilled similar needs of the North and South Omaha Boys and Girls' Clubs, and continue to work to improve City athletic fields in areas east of 52nd Street. A strong supporter of the Central High Foundation and its activities, Mr. Van Metre was a key player in making the dream of an office for the Foundation a reality. Mr. Van Metre is also actively involved each year in planning the Golf Outing, a fundraiser for the CHS Athletic Department.

## Desk Of Legendary CHS English Teacher And Author Now On Display

The desk where legendary Central High teacher Sara Vore Taylor may have drafted the famous *Style Book* has found a new home at CHS Foundation office. It was a gift of Dr. Jim Wigton (CHS '66) and his wife, Judy.

"My Aunt Margaret (Wigton) Seger (CHS '27) intended to have the desk preserved and displayed somewhere," said Dr. Wigton. "Now, Judy and I are happy to give the desk to the CHS Foundation, where we know it will be cherished and used to bring Central's history to life."

The personal-sized, walnut roll-top example of nineteenth century craftsmanship is now on display in the Foundation office, albeit temporarily.

Barry Combs (CHS '50) said the CHSAA History Committee hopes to produce another historical display, similar to two that already exist at Central, that will use Taylor's desk as a centerpiece in a celebration of Central's long tradition of academic excellence.

Combs and other members of the History Committee are convinced this desk is on which Taylor composed her *Style Book for Theme Writing and Revision*. Taylor also no doubt graded thousands of themes, using the rules laid down in the *Style Book*, at this desk.

Taylor joined the English staff at Omaha High School (its pre-Central name) in 1910 and quickly became head of its famous English Department. She composed the first version of the *Style Book* in 1915, and updated it often over the thirty years she remained at Central.

The *Style Book* provided practice sheets for common grammar problems and established the form for theme writing that has helped generations of Central students develop their composition skills.

Years after leaving CHS, many Central graduates admit to using the stylebook symbols and rules of punctuation when revising their work. Alumni living throughout

the United States often request copies of the "old *Style Book*" in hopes of strengthening the composition skills of their own children and grandchildren.

Taylor retired in 1940 after having gained a national reputation for her *Style Book*, her successful graduates and her developments in the study of English.
