Some of their favorite teaching memories include the Road Show and marching in Seemann Stadium for the first time after it opened in 2005.

Requiem for Room 145

The following text was read at the Passing Periods Luncheon on March 5 by alum Brian Fahey ('03). Room 145 was a vocal classroom until this month, when the vocal department moved into a new home in the Arts and Library Addition.

The last week of A Cappella's tenure in Room 145 is upon us. And while I'm over the moon for the new addition, it seems right to take a moment to remember everything the old choir room did for me and so many others.

My first year at Central (1999–2000) was the last year of dedicated homerooms. 145 was mine, so it was my first stop as a new Central student. Seeing the bones of the original auditorium remade into that rehearsal room underscored the grandiosity and history of our palace of a high school. To a fourteen-year-old, it felt ancient, like Roman ruins or a great cathedral.

I returned later in the day for Junior Choir. Lyn Bouma was the choir director, and her husband, Stephen—who'd sung in 145 as a student—was our accompanist. I'd enjoyed singing in middle school well enough to sign up at Central, but I had no idea what I was in for.

My next four years were punctuated by Mr. and Mrs. Bouma teaching, coaching, but really demanding—unfailingly demanding—our absolute best as singers and musicians. All while introducing us to the greatest music ever written: Palestrina, Brahms, Bach—music so profound and beautiful, it changed how you saw the world. But it wasn't from some recording; it was us. Eighty or so random, awkward teenagers from every corner of the city and globe, making this transcendent music come to life.

We were poor and rich, naïve, worldly, atheist, evangelical, and everything in between. We'd come from expensive homes, foster care, even refugee camps. Some of us were sheltered by privilege, and some of us had already seen a lifetime of hardship.

But in 145, we were this unified, miraculous instrument. And none of us knew

we could do it until it was done—except for the Boumas, who never expected less than a miracle out of us.

It's not a feeling you ever forget—discovering the ability and intellect within you to make a cooperative sound so beautiful, and then looking across the room and seeing the same ability in every one of your classmates. You could almost feel—physically feel—yourself growing into your own humanity.

I remember it best in 2001. I was in 145 rehearsing the State-Spangled Banner with CHS Singers when Mr. Bexten announced over the intercom that the World Trade Center had fallen. Unlike a lot of schools that day, Central kept on: Teachers taught, and we went on as normally as we could manage. But like the rest of the world, we were walking in shock.

I returned to 145 a couple hours later for A Cappella. We were preparing Mozart's Requiem to sing with the Omaha Symphony. We weren't supposed to rehearse the first movement that day, but Mrs. Bouma started with it after reading the translation.

Requiem aeternam dona eis, Domine, Grant them eternal rest, O Lord, *et lux perpetua luceat eis.* and may perpetual light shine on them.

Singing that music, with eighty-five classmates, when all you knew was that everyone else in 145 was as scared and wounded as you were, was the only thing that felt right that day. Nowhere felt particularly safe, but if we were going to make sense of how to build something better out of the agony and terror, that music in 145 felt like the place to start.

That's what makes choral singing—and Central—so special. That you can take hundred, a thousand, or two thousand people from disparate places, separated by societal chasms of race, class, ethnicity, language, etc., and unite them through mutual respect and common purpose. And in the process make something more powerful—more meaningful—than what was possible before. A few months after, still in 145, I met the woman I'd marry ten years later, and who for the past seven years has taught as a choir director alongside Lyn and Stephen in that same room. You see, I really do owe a lot to 145.

Whitman was right when he said a school's not "dead floors, window, rails," but rather "living, ever living souls." But when four walls, a boarded-up stage, and 90 chairs change your life so profoundly, I hope the wheels of progress won't mind if I pause to shed a tear and sing the room's requiem.

Of course, 145 isn't dying; it's about to be reinvented and restored. And the real spirit of the program, Lyn, Stephen, my wife Sara, and their students will be a few feet to the South, making the same miraculous music in a gorgeous new space. But it's a fitting time to remember what these teachers, and Bob McMeen before them, accomplished - the beauty they made and the lives they enriched - in that old, refitted auditorium.

Culinary Students Serve Up Success in Competition

Last month, three teams of Eagles competed against 25 other teams in the High School Culinary Invitational hosted by Metro Community College's Institute for the Culinary



Arts. 12 of the Eagles who participated are current or former Culinary Skills students, while 3 Eagles are currently in the Foods and Nutrition class.

Practicing for the competition is an extracurricular activity, and teams have been practicing twice a week for 3 hours each time since returning to school after the holiday break. Competition is separate from, but related to, the classes offered during school hours. In all, students dedicated about 40 hours each, outside of school, to prepare for the competition. Because of so much interest, this is the first year Central had 3 teams competing.



Download the TAGG App and Support While You Shop



You can now TAGG your purchase by taking a picture of the receipt rather than taking a picture of a QR code! That way if you forget to TAGG your purchase before leaving the restaurant, you can take a picture of your receipt after getting home!

Omaha Central High School Foundation has partnered with TAGG (Together A Greater Good), an Omaha start-up, to provide an easy and free way to support the Foundation. TAGG offers a smartphone app that, when used at 120 participating local businesses, the business will donate 5% of your purchase, any day any time! The app, available on iPhone and Android devices, is free to download and easy to set up. Here's how to get started:

1) Go to the <u>App Store</u> or <u>Google Play</u> and download the free app 'Together a Greater Good' to your iPhone or Android device.

2) When it's time to pay at a participating business, click the orange 'TAGG My Purchase' button on the app and tell the cashier that you want to 'TAGG' your purchase.

3) On your phone, enter in the total pre-tax amount of your purchase and click 'Next.'

4) When you go to TAGG a purchase, you will now have the option to take a picture of your receipt (instead of asking a cashier for a QR code to scan). We ask that you do this within 7 days of purchase.

5) On your phone, select Central High School Foundation from the list of organizations.
